The School of Mines Remembered in a Grant of Two Hundred Thousand Acres.

In order that the readers of makes for education, the provisions of the bill upon that subject are here quoted: Sec. 3. That provisions shall

be made for the establishment An Excellent Company That will and maintenance of a system of public schools, which shall be open to all the children of said state and free from sectarian control, and that said schools shall always be conducted in English; Provided, That this

mission of said state into the Union there is hereby granted unto it, including the sections thereof heretofore granted, four sections of public land in each township in the proposed state for the support of free public nonsectarian common schools, to-wit: Sections numbered thirteen, sixteen, thirty-three, and thirty-six. Sec. 9. That ten per centum

of the proceeds of the sales of public lands lying within said state which shall be sold by the United States subsequent to the admission of said state in the Union, after deducting all the expenses incident to the same, shall be paid to the said state to be used as a permanent fund, the interest of which only shall be expended for the support of the common schools within said state. And there is hereby appropriated, out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, the sum of five milshall be paid by the treasurer of the United States at such time and to such person or persons as may by authorized by said state to receive the same under the laws to be enacted by said state. and until said state shall enact such laws said appropriation shall not be paid. Said appropriation of five million dollars shall be held inviolable by said state, in trust, for the use and benefit of said schools.

Sec. 10. That all lands herein granted for educational purposes may be appraised and disposed of only at public sale, the proceeds to constitute a permanent school fund, the income from which only shall be expended in the support of said schools. But said lands may, under such regulations as the legislature shall prescribe, be leased for periods of not more than ten years, shall not be subject to pre-emp-



SPINELESS CACTUS A FOOD

Register.

Luther Burbank Eats It and an English Doctor Is Trying Its Value.

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 10 .-The Burbank spineless cactus is not only good for cattle, but it is to be made to answer, the purpose of food for humans as well. ing mineral survey No. 1313, as Dr. L. E. Landone, an English doctor, is giving the food a test to ascertain if he can subsist entirely on the cactus plant, but whether he can do this or not, Beginning at cor. No. I, a 32x he says he has already proved 16x8 ins. granite stone chiseled that it is excellent for eating as a vegetable.

"What do you wish to prove by the experiment, doctor?" he was asked.

"Oh, that it is better to preserve the body than to repair it, and that the leaf and stem diet will do it. Keep up the body and the mind will always act. It has been found by experiment location, a 5x5 ins. pine post 4 ft that whenever cell structure is destroyed it is filled with acid. closing corner on the old Socorro Organic salts in the leaves and Grant boundary between sections stems neutralize these acids and preserve the body."

> "How do you prepare the cactus for eating?"

"In several ways. The small, tender portions can be served as to cor No. 2, a granite ledge 2 ft greens, a la spinach. "What is the commercial value of the food?"

"The fruits are worth about \$100 each, and the leaves \$1,000. You see, Mr. Burbank worked thirteen years to perfect this spineless cactus, and his time is valued at \$400 an hour.

"Mr. Burbank contributes the leaves and fruit for the value of the experiment."

"How large are the leaves?" "Nearly two feet in length with an average width of one foot. They are one inch thick. Ninety tons of cacti have been


