The convention which will nominate the next president of the United States will meet in Chicago June 16.

HON. JAS. M. HERVEY of Roswell must be altogether the right sort of a man. His appointment as attorney general of New Mexico seems to have met with the approval of all parties and all factions of all parties.

EVERYBODY is requested to make note of the fact that the recent financial flurry produced mighty little effect in Socorro. Business went on just about as usual, and it would not be rash to say that business is now as good if not better than before.

GOVERNOR CURRY is now very busy talking statehood and irrigation congress, and, what is still more to the point, is working for both with his characteristic energy and good judgment. The governor has often been relied upon in an emergency and he has always made good.

By the way, what has become of those assistants to the attorney general whose wondrous doings "roared so loud and thundered in the index"? According to the fanfarade of a few pretentious political hypocrites of the territory these assistants were to send a score or more of thieving scoundrels prominent in New Mexico politics to the penitentiary or to the demerit bow-wows by the shortest possible cut. Where are the assistants at?

DELEGATE ANDREWS' statehood bill introduced in the house of representatives on the second day of the sixtieth congress provides for a donation of \$5,000,000 to the common school fund of New Mexico and of 200,000 acres of land to the New Mexico School of Mines. Each of these donations constitutes a mighty strong argument in favor of statehood under the Andrews bill, and when the question of statehood comes before the people of the territory for their acceptance or rejection Socorro county may be depended upon to give a rousing majority in the affirmative.

In the district court in session in this city last week Charles Trulston petitioned for the privilege of changing his name to Charles G. Thorlston. "Have you any objection to telling me your reasons for wanting to change your name?" asked Judge Parker. "None whatever," was the reply. "I wish to Americanize it." Judge Parker wasted no words in granting the petition. "Your reason is the best you could possibly give," he said, and added, "The petition is granted." In order to identify himself more closely with the country of his adoption, Mr. Thorlston sacrificed the very name that his mother gave him. If he is not a good American citizen, it would be hard to tell where to find one.

AUDITOR CHAS. V. SAFFORD'S report on the keeping of the accounts of the School of Mines, as published in last week's issue of The Chieftain, shows a state of affairs that cannot fail to be gratifying to all concerned. If

evidence were lacking to establish the fact that the financial affairs of the School of Mines are well managed by the present board of trustees of the institution, this report would afford it in abundance. C. T. Brown, who is secretary and treasurer of the board, attends to the duties of the position not only without remuneration but also at considerable cost of time and money. The condition in which Mr. Safford found the accounts of the School shows that Mr. Brown is doing his work well.

JUDGE PARKER'S act in imposing a fine of fifteen dollars and costs upon the saloon men of the county who were indicted by the grand jury last week for violation of the Sunday closing law will meet the approval of all good citizens. If the jail sentence of fifteen days which was added but suspended during good behavior proves to be the means of keeping every saloon in the county closed up tight, front and rear, even the saloon men themselves will be glad that the grand jury and the court took such action as they did. Any saloon man will say that he would be glad to keep his place of business closed on Sunday, but that if other saloons are open on that day he must open his also or quit the business. Now that the lid is down to the satisfaction of all concerned let it be fastened down with double lock and key and the key thrown in the well.

What Breathing Amounts To.

In each respiration an average adult inhales one pint of air. A man respire sixteen to twenty times a minute, and a young child about twenty-five to thirty-five times. While in a standing posture the number of respirations is greater than when lying down. A man takes only thirteen breaths of air to the minute while reclining. The superficial surface of the lungs is 200 square yards. The amount of air inspired by an adult in twenty-four hours is about 10,000 quarts. The least amount of air needed by an adult in one hour is 380 quarts. The heart sends through the lungs 5,000 gallons of blood daily.
