\$15,000 Appropriation to the School of Mines Was Validated Yesterday at Noon.

THIS INSURES A DORMITORY

Hon. W. H. Andrews and Governor George Curry Telegraph the News to Socorro.

The New Mexico School of Mines will soon have fifteen thousand dollors at its disposal for permanent improvements.

The act of the last legislative assembly appropriating that sum for the benefit of the School was validated by congress yesterday noon, and the money will now be available as soon as the necessary territorial bonds can be issued and sold.

Nothing that could be done with the money would supply a more greater benefit to the institution. This will make it possible to offer prospective students rooms and board at a much less cost than that for which it is possible for them to obtain the same accommodations now. It is but reasonable to believe that the result will be a large increase in the enrollment at the School, as the item of living expenses in Socorro has heretofore worked to the great disadvantage of the School of Mines as compared with other territorial educational institutions. The dormitory will probably be ready for occupancy at the beginning of the next school year in September.
