Columbus Day.

If Columbus had reached the shores of the New World on a day like that on which the good people here in White Oaks undertook to celebrate the 400th anniversary of his discovery we venture the assertion that he would have remained on the water in order to keep dry.

Preparations for the street parade were completed on a scale never before attempted in this place. The Public Schools, the Grand Army, the Old Fellows and the Knights of Pythons were to be in line, with all their regalia, to assist in the ceremonies of flag raising and salute of the National colors. Shortly after 9 o'clock the downpour commenced and it soon became evident that the street parade would have to be abandoned entirely. A large portion of the school children and many of our patriotic citizens gathered at the Congregational Church, where a rearranged programme of exercises was carried through. In the meantime rain continued to fall during the greater part of the day and far into the night. However, umbrellas and slickers were brought to the front, so to speak, and at 7:30 p. m. found every seat in the church filled.

Whether it was by design or accident, the committee on programmes had certainly given the younger element an opportunity and the old stagers, for once, took back seats. To say that the exercises throughout were a success, goes without saying. Who ever saw a new White Oaks to make a failure in any kind of literary entertainment! Friday evening's effort was no exception to the general rule.

After prayer by Rev. Crutchfield the opening exercise was given by Miss Melora Hurd, who recited the address prepared by the National committee. It was well rendered. Remarkable so was that of Leona Rudisill, who recited in Spanish, her rendition sounding to the ear of the League reporter as excellent in smoothness and accent that of the natives themselves. The recitation of Miss Watson was also good.

It was given to Miss Johanna Collier to recite the poem, written for Columbus Day, by Edna Dean Proctor. The applause which followed Miss Collier's rendition of this grand epic showed that no mistake had been made in selecting her for this task.

The address of Prof. S. M. Wharton was scholarly and very thoughtful, besides being delivered in a pleasing and graceful manner. Maurice Parker really did himself proud in an oration that drew forth the hearty congratulations of life every hearer.

These literary exercises were beautifully sandwiched by music and patriotic songs, notable among which was the Star Spangled Banner, sung by Mrs. Carpenter. This lady has a beautiful and very highly cultivated voice. There seemed to be a general regret that she did not appear in other numbers. It is to be hoped that she will in future favor White Oaks audiences with her fine musical talents.

choir also acquitted themselves handsomely, eliciting frequent applause and encores.

A duet by the Misses Allan and Sutfell, was exquisitely fine.

Altogether, it was a pronounced success and those present felt well repaid for braving the storm to become partakers in the celebration of Columbus Day.

Republican Platform

The representatives of the Republicans of the United States assembled in general convention on the shores of the Mississippi river, the everlasting bond of an indissoluble republic whose most glorious chapter of history is the record of the Republican party, congratulate their countrymen on the majestic merits of the nation under the banners inscribed with the principles of our platform of 1858, vindicated by victory at the polls and prosperity in our fields, work-shops and cities, and make the following declaration of principles.

We reaffirm the doctrine of protection. We call attention to its growth abroad. We maintain that the prosperous condition of our country is largely due to the wise revenue legislation of the Republican congress. We believe that all articles which can not be produced in the United States, except luxuries, should be admitted free of duty, and that on all imports coming into competition with the products of American labor, there should be levied duties equal to the difference between wages abroad and at home. We assert that the prices of manufactured articles of general consumption have been reduced under the operation of the tariff act of 1890. We denounce the efforts of the Democratic majority of the house of representatives to destroy our tariff laws by piecemeal, as manifested by their attacks upon wool, lead and lead ores, and we ask the people for their judgment thereon.

We point to the success of the republican policy of reciprocity upon which our export trade has vastly increased and new and enlarged markets have been opened for products of our farms and workshops. We remind the people of the bitter opposition of the Democratic party to this practical business measure, and claim that as executed by a Republican administration, our present laws will eventually give us control of the trade of the world.

The American people, from tradition and interest, favor bimetalism, and the Republican party demands the use of both gold and silver as standard money, with such restrictions and under such provisions to be determined by national legislation as will secure the maintenance of the parity of values of the two metals, so that the purchasing and debt-paying power of the dollar, whether of silver, gold or paper, shall be at all times equal.

The interests of the producers of the country, its farmers and its workmen, demand that every dollar, paper or coin, issued by the government shall be as good as any other dollar.

We commend the wise and patriotic steps taken already by our government to secure an international conference to adopt such measures as will insure a parity of value between gold and silver for use as money throughout the world.

We demand that every citizen of the United States shall be allowed to cast one free and unrestricted ballot in all public elections, and that such ballot shall be counted and returned as cast; that such laws shall be enacted and enforced as will secure to every individual, rich or poor, native or foreign born, white or black, this sovereign right granted by the constitution.

The free and honest popular ballot, the just and equal representation of all the people, as well as their just and equal protection under the laws, are the foundations of our Republican institutions, and the party will never relax its efforts until the integrity of the ballot and the parity of the election shall be fully guaranteed and protected in every state.

We reaffirm our approval of the Monroe doctrine and believe in the adherence to the manifest destiny of the republic in the broadest sense. We favor the enactment of more stringent laws and regulations for the restriction of criminal, pauper and contract immigration.

We favor efficient legislation by congress to protect the life and liberty of employes of transportation companies engaged in carrying interstate commerce, and recommend such legislation by the respective states as will protect employes engaged in state commerce, in mining and manufacturing.

The Republican party has always been the champion of the oppressed, and recognizes the dignity of manhood, irrespective of faith, color or nationality; it sympathizes with the cause of home rule in Ireland and protest against the prosecution of the Jews in Russia.

The ultimate reliance of free popular government is the intelligence of the people and the maintenance of freedom among men. We, therefore, declare anew our devotion to liberty of thought and conscience, of speech and of the press and approve all agencies and instrumentalities which contribute to the education of the people of the land, but while insisting upon the fullest measure of religious liberty, we are opposed to any action of church and state.

We reaffirm our positive declaration in the Republican platform of 1858, that all limitations of a legal organization or trade union are to be abolished. We favor the right of every citizen to organize for the purpose of securing the most efficient legislation as may be required to remedy any wrong in existence, and to extend to all classes and rural communities the advantages of the free and efficient use of the press and of the right of free speech.

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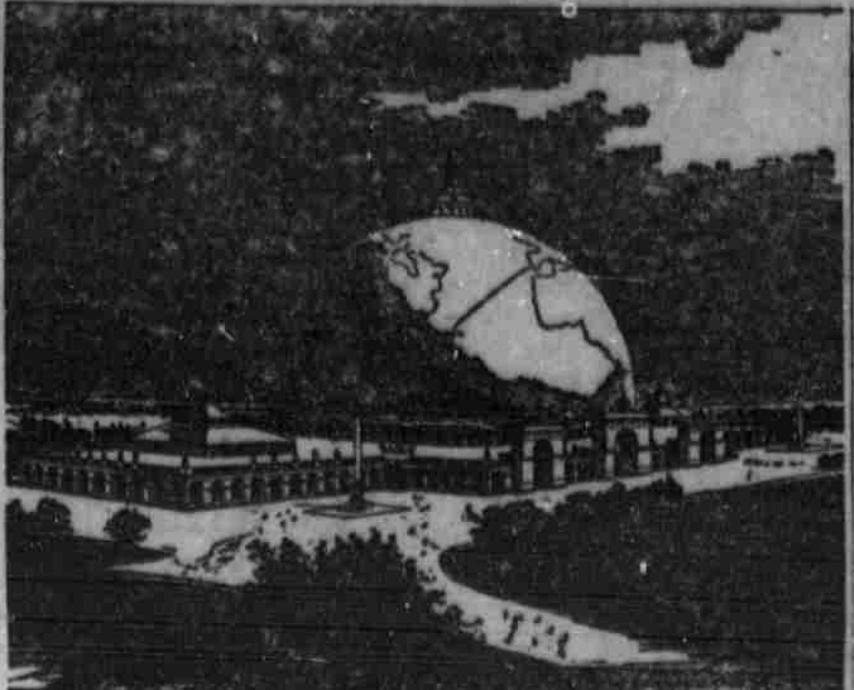

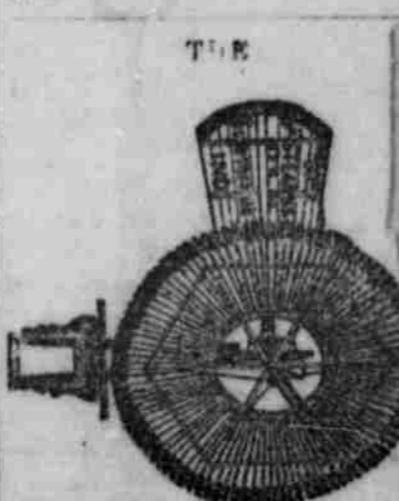
