COMPARISON OF THE TWO ADMINISTRATIONS

Some Facts and Figures for the Consideration of Those Who Are Disposed to Lay the Blame of High Taxation at the Door of the County Officials of Eddy County.

The Pecos valley people make a rather bad advertisement for the new country in its state in life, but its people have chosen the democratic side with their eyes wide open. Their politics is their own private concern, and nobody will grudge it to them, or will say that they have no right to it. A position in the republican column would give the Pecos valley a big boom all over the country. It would attract more population and capital than democratic affiliations will furnish. Republican association would bestow a prestige on the valley which would advance the value of every square foot of land in it, and of every dollar's worth of property of any sort had within its limits. This, however, affects its own people solely, and they would do well to look to reason; to be governed by their judgement other than their prejudices.

The above coming from the responsible head of the Argus, is amusing to say the least. He seems to forget that the county board was republican and the officials were all named by C. B. Eddy, a republican, for the first four years after this county was organized. What is history?

Funding bonds to the amount of \$15,000, to pay running expense, were issued, and we are not through paying for that four years of republican misrule yet. Then, the territory has had a republican administration since this county was redeemed, and what is history? The rate of taxation for territorial purposes has increased from 70 cents on \$100 valuation to \$1.70 on \$100, or 30 cents more than double the rate under a democratic administration. While the county rate has not increased, despite the various improvements, bridges, public buildings, etc., the territorial rate has gone out of reason to confiscation and robbery.

The cause is easily seen—the county is democratic and the territory republican.

The Current will simply quote the words of Judge A. A. Freeman, the best republican ever in New Mexico, to prove that republican extravagance is responsible for our high taxes, and not the democratic officials of Eddy county:

The right hand column shows the appropriations made for the year of the Thornton administration; the left hand column shows the appropriations made for the year of the Otero administration. The blanks in the right hand column indicate, of course, that as to these particular items no appropriation was made by the Thornton administration, and that for the reason that at that time no such offices existed; the same having been created by the Otero administration for the purpose of rewarding its partisan supporters and for the further purpose of increasing its political following.

COAL OIL INSPECTOR.

The inspector is authorized to levy a tax of one cent per gallon on all coal oil brought into the territory, and to retain the tax for his own use. Amount of this graft estimated at from ten to fifteen thousand dollars.

Mudgett, and was held for the purpose of taking action on matters of deep interest to all stockmen, the most important being the resignation, under certain conditions, of Ed Toner, the inspector of the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association and New Mexico Sanitary Board, and also the consideration of the drift fences and general control of the range by the government, all of which occupied considerable time.

The meeting elected several delegates to represent Eddy county in Denver, at the National Stock Growers' Convention to be held Jan. 20, among them C. W. Merchant, L. L. Fuoss, S. T. Bitting, Allen C. Heard, M. T. Stone, W. P. Mudgett, D. R. Harkey and C. R. Brice.

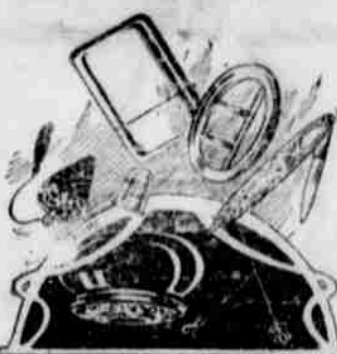

The Pecos Water Users' Association received a letter from the department Monday that fell like a thunderbolt from a clear sky. The letter stated that all under the Carlsbad project would be expected to pay \$3.85 per acre at once. As the project is not nearly completed and many have not yet received water, the Association decided to notify the department that it could not pay the amount and would apply for a modification of the order postponing the date for payment one year. The water users do not propose to pay until they have been served and it will probably take more than the little clerks of the department can do to make them pay until the system is put in operation. A committee consisting of Messrs. Tracy, Fox, and McLenathen was appointed to take the matter up with the Secretary of the Interior.

This is as good an argument as to call a man a booze fighter because he does not believe in prohibition. These allusions to Talbot were not made in anger derision or resentment, but in the same spirit that he exhibits when he calls this paper the weekly Guzzle Guzzle. Recollect that the Current did not commence this personal abuse campaign and is not responsible for the exhibitions of silly twaddle indulged in by the Artesia papers.

Talbot goes on further to say he is not paying any more to the present system of confiscation than he can help. In other words, by perjury he is dodging his just share of taxation and he further says the Current editor has never listed a piece of property at its face value in his life. Mullane says Talbot knows he lies and can prove by the schedules that Talbot has not listed his property for one-fifth of what Mullane has. Talbot lies when he says our property has not been frequently listed for its face value as the schedules will show, besides property is not supposed to be listed at face value, but at a fair and honest valuation such as honest men give in, but only a natural thief will endeavor to escape without rendering any more than he can help and this is what Talbot has proved himself to be and does not really deny it when cornered. These I holdier than thou people who are continually finding the beam in others eyes are the biggest sinners on earth and should be and will be punished if there is a hell to get them in.

Talbot says county officials are paid too much and that taxes are too high. He says that the county officials are paid six to eight thousand dollars per year. The Current will give Talbot the finest suit of clothes in Artesia if it cannot prove he is a liar a demagogue and mischief maker for no official of Eddy county will, by all the resources from his office be able to show he has received six thousand dollars in 1907. The assessor and treasurer the two best offices in the county have not both together made near \$8,000 for the past year while the sheriff took in about \$4,000 and each must pay a string of deputies out of this. Now Mr. Talbot and all your dupes or disciples of your ignorant shallow pated school you ought to know what you are talking about before you commence running on at the head in the way you have been doing

for some time. You probably know also that the last legislature passed a law to nearly cut the above salaries in half to take effect Jan. 1, 1909. If you do not the Current will refer you to the following: Chapter 45. An act to regulate the classification of counties and fixing the salaries of certain county officers: 37th Legislative assembly approved March 18 1907. As you will note by reading the law it takes effect Jan. 1, 1909 and on account of the territorial auditor placing Eddy County in the C class the assessor and treasurer will only receive 2 1-2 per cent after that date instead of four per cent as at present. The law would have gone into effect at once, but it has been held by the courts that it is unconstitutional to raise or lower salaries during the term for which an official is elected so the best the last legislature could do was to have the law take effect Jan. 1, 1909.

But suppose the offices could be conducted for \$2,000 per annum as Talbot howls for, how much would that reduce taxation? Can or will Talbot answer? He will not, because he knows it would not effect the average tax payer one cent in a dollar while if all would give in equal no one would feel the burden of taxation which bears so heavily at present on a few.

If Talbot's plan to pay the assessor and treasurer a salary was adopted it would increase taxation because men on a salary would naturally be engrossed with making themselves solid with the voters and having no incentive to assess or collect as under the present plan of percentage many would escape, consequently making it higher on the honest tax payer.

Now all this may be too plain, but in dealing with a man who uses only vituperation and abuse as argument it is necessary to be and state facts as well as show up the tactics of a person who never knew the first principle of newspaper ethics, but commenced a campaign of abuse because this paper does not believe that prohibition is right or the proper method to handle the liquor traffic.

If Talbot wants any more of this kind of a newspaper scrap he can have it out personally, for these columns are for use for other matters which are of more importance than skinning skunks like him.

POOR MAN'S COUNTRY.

One year ago about now, S. W. Gilbert sold eighty acres of land to a man near Roswell for one hundred dollars per acre. 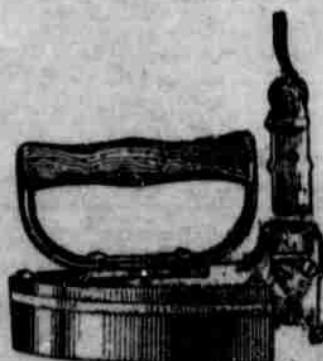

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION —of— "FRASER-BATEMAN COMPANY."

We, the undersigned, citizens of the United States, and residents of the county of Eddy, Territory of New Mexico, being desirous of forming a corporation under the laws of the Territory of New Mexico, have made, signed, and acknowledged the following Articles of Incorporation for that purpose.

I.

The name and residence of such incorporators are, E. W. Fraser, A. Q. Bateman, F. B. Marshall and A. R. Smith, all of Carlsbad, Eddy County, New Mexico.

II.

The corporate name of such corporation and company is, and shall be, the "Fraser-Bateman Company."

III.

The purposes for which such corporation and company is formed are,

(a) To buy and sell general merchandise at wholesale and retail, and to buy and sell any other property, real, personal or mixed, as may be necessary or profitable in the carrying on of a general wholesale and retail mercantile business.

(b) To buy, acquire and hold, or to lease store-buildings, warehouses, stables and other outbuildings, horses, wagons and other vehicles, and to use, operate, manage and control the same in such a manner as shall be deemed useful and beneficial for the promotion of the interests of said corporation, with full power to sell and dispose of the same at pleasure.

(c) To own, lease and operate mills, machinery and other appliances, with such motive power as may be determined upon, in preparing food or feed-stuffs, or both, for market and sale.

(d) To do and perform all and every the acts and things necessary and requisite to be done and performed in order to supply general merchandise to any other dealer, and to consumers.

(e) To buy, own and hold stocks or bonds in any other corporation, either as an investment, or as collateral security, with full power and authority to sell or otherwise dispose of the same.

IV.

The amount of the capital stock of said "Fraser-Bateman Company" shall be Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) divided into one hundred and fifty shares, of the par value of One Hundred Dollars (\$100) each, all of which have been subscribed and fully paid for as follows:

E. W. Fraser has subscribed and paid for seventy-three shares thereof.

The present county jail could have been built entirely of stone range work for a thousand dollars less and left all the cash at home and a far superior building erected."

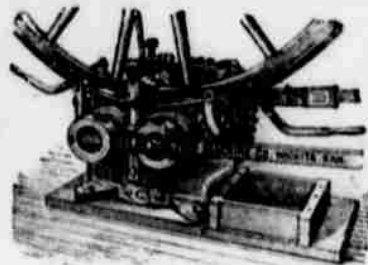
