University of New Mexico Board of Regents

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MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS  
OF THE  
UNIVERSITY OF NEW MEXICO

On Saturday, June 4, 1932, at eleven o'clock A. M., in the Office of the President of the University in Albuquerque, there was held the regular meeting of the Board of Regents.

Present: Mr. Henry G. Coors, President of the Board; Mrs. O. N. Marron, Vice-President; Mr. M. Ralph Brown, Secretary and Treasurer; Dr. W. R. Lovelace; and Mr. Glenn L. Emmons.

Present

The meeting was called to order, and the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Regents from February 17, 1932 through May 25, 1932 were unanimously approved.

Approval of  
Minutes

There followed discussion regarding a cut in faculty salaries for the twenty-first fiscal year, and the following statement was recorded as the sense of the Board:

Faculty  
Salaries

On account of the present economic situation of the State, it appears that the University during the next fiscal year will lose a large portion of its anticipated income. This loss is brought about by a very large decrease in the land income which the University has in the past been able to count upon and also by the apparent danger of losing the payment of a portion of our legislative appropriation. While the State Finance Board and other experts are anticipating that the appropriations to be paid will run only 75%, the Regents feel that the portion of our appropriation which we will actually secure will exceed this. However, on account of the certain loss of a large part of the income, it appears necessary that numerous economies be practiced during the coming year, and it is apparent to all members of the Board that it is impossible to balance a budget without curtailing the amount of salaries paid by the University.

In taking such action in cutting salaries, the Board does so merely as a temporary measure during the next fiscal year, and it should not be taken as a matter of permanent policy. Inasmuch as the amount of our income for the next fiscal year is so indeterminate and uncertain, it is apparently absolutely impossible to definitely set the amount of salaries which will be paid by the University. Consequently in making the appointments of the faculty, we deem that we can only employ the members of the faculty at such compensation as the Board of Regents in its discretion may feel able to pay, depending upon the amount of income received during the next fiscal year. The Board has no desire to reduce salaries of the faculty in any amount that is more than necessary, but whatever amount of salary is paid to the respective members of the faculty must be left entirely to the discretion of the Board and consequently definite contracts as to the amount of compensation cannot be entered into.

#### Appointment of Faculty

Mr. Coors, the President of the Board, nominated the following persons as members of the faculty for the academic year 1932-1933 with the understanding that the amount of salary to be paid will be within the discretion of the Board but will be not more than the maximum amount set opposite each nominee's name, and not less than the minimum amount set opposite each nominee's name:

Mrs. Marron moved that the above appointments be approved and confirmed by the Board of Regents, which motion was seconded by Mr. Emmons, and carried unanimously.

#### Administrative and Self-Sustaining Salaries

Dr. Lovelace moved that consideration of salaries of administrative officers and those salaries involved in the self-sustaining institutions on the campus be postponed to another meeting. Mr. Emmons seconded this motion, which carried unanimously.

#### Insurance

In the discussion regarding insurance for the University, it was decided to drop all tornado insurance policies. It was decided to carry \$90,000 insurance to cover the contents of the Library. In the light of this and other actions taken in regard to the list of appraisals of buildings and contents, it was decided to postpone final action until after certain information was brought to the Board regarding the total insurance situation.

Dr. Lovelace moved that specifications and information be prepared by Mr. Popejoy and Professor Dorroh for a concrete, chain link, steel, or iron fence for the athletic field, notice to bidders to be published twice in each newspaper in Albuquerque. Mrs. Marron seconded the motion, and it was carried unanimously.

Curbing  
of Track

Upon the recommendation of Mr. Popejoy, Graduate Manager of Athletics, Mr. Brown moved that plans and specifications be prepared and that the Regents advertise for bids for the curbing of the track on the athletic field, which motion was seconded by Mr. Emmons and carried unanimously.

## Stadium

Dr. Lovelace moved that the Regents advertise for bids on a water-proof steel stadium according to Plan No. 2 prepared by Professor J. H. Dorroh, such structure to be used not only as an athletic stadium, but, when completed, to constitute one of the buildings of the University. Mrs. Marron seconded the motion which was carried by the following vote:

Affirmative - Mr. Coors  
Mrs. Marron

Negative - Mr. Brown


Mr. Coors voted in the affirmative because the steel can be made water-proof and will thus form the roof of a two-story structure in which there will be 11,000 square feet of floor space for class and office rooms when the University has funds to finish the interior.

Mr. Brown voted in the negative because he believed there should be erected a concrete stadium for the following reasons: concrete will cost practically the same as steel; one of the purposes of erecting a stadium at this time was to furnish employment for New Mexico labor; the labor necessary to construct a concrete stadium could be obtained in New Mexico, while practically the entire labor cost of a steel stadium will go out of New Mexico; a concrete structure is much more sightly in appearance.


