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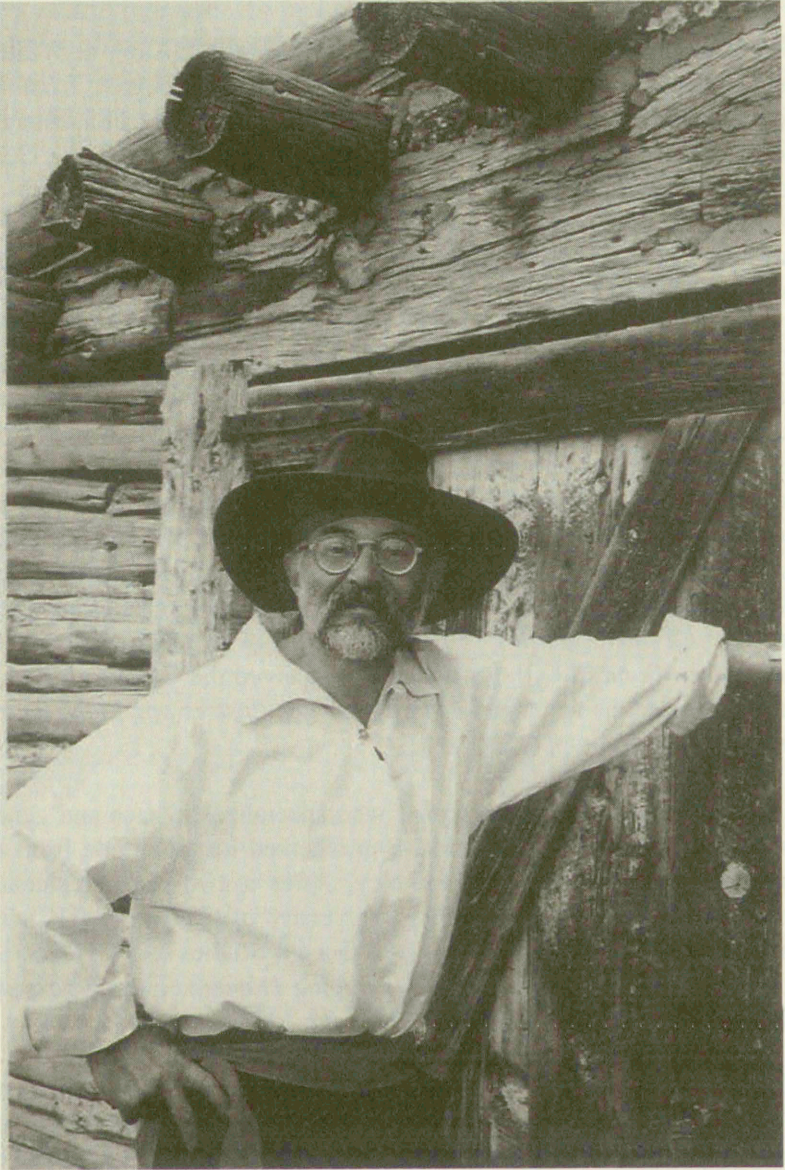

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In Memoriam: Larry D. Miller, 1950-2009

The staff of the Spanish Colonial Research Center (SCRC), publisher of the *Colonial Latin American Historical Review* (CLAHR), is saddened to share the news of the passing of our colleague and dear friend, Larry D. Miller, on 17 August 2009 in Eldorado at Santa Fe, New Mexico. Larry was born on 13 February 1950 in Littlefield, Texas. For the past six years, he was a research historian at the SCRC at the University of New Mexico (UNM) in Albuquerque. As a subject matter specialist, he also interpreted and demonstrated the history and art of blacksmithing at the Rancho de Las Golondrinas, New Mexico, and Bent's Old Fort National Historic Site, Colorado, among others. He was a graduate of UNM where he earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in Spanish Literature. As a linguist, he lived and traveled extensively in Brazil, Portugal, and Mexico, studying the culture, literature, and language of those countries and researching in the archives.

For eighteen years, Larry worked as a compiler, paleographer, and translator on the Vargas Project at UNM which yielded several books of the documents of the period. He was co-editor, with John L. Kessell, Rick Hendricks, and Meredith D. Dodge, of two monographs: *That Disturbances Cease* (2000) and *A Settling of Accounts* (2002), volumes of *The Journals of Don Diego de Vargas*. His most recent publication, co-authored with Joseph P. Sánchez, was *Martineztown, 1823-1950: Hispanics, Italians, Jesuits & Land Investors In New Town Albuquerque* (2008).

For the last six years, Larry contributed his impressive editorial and research skills as a staff member of CLAHR and as the compiler of CLAHR's annual index. We will miss his keen eye, attention to detail, dedication, and loyalty. The publishing world—and the world at large—is a poorer place without him.
