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INTRODUCTION

This first issue of Volume 33 of the *New Mexico Law Review* focuses on the impact of recent trends upon New Mexico's legal practice. The articles compiled herein are written by professors, practitioners, and students and cover a range of topics. Professor Ted Occhialino, of the University of New Mexico School of Law, sets forth a review of the twenty-year evolution of the New Mexico law of several liability, comparing it to that set forth in the recently adopted *Restatement (Third) of Torts* and providing a counterpoint for jurisdictions that might consider adopting the *Third Restatement*.
