Salvation Army Will Give Christmas Dinners.**MANY GIFTS FROM PRESIDENT****The Mormons Are Celebrating Today Joseph Smith's Birthday.****HITT-GRAY GRAND WEDDING**

New York, Dec. 23.—For two weeks past the familiar gypsy kettles have stood suspended from tripods on the street corners of the metropolis to receive donations for the Christmas dinners which the Salvation Army gives to the poor each year, and the pots have been "kept boiling" with such effect that the organization expects to be able to fill 25,000 stomachs with turkey and accompaniments day after tomorrow. The mammoth feed will be spread in the Grand Central Palace, the army having been unable to secure Madison Square Garden which has been used for many years. The menu will include soup, beef, bread, turkey, potatoes, turnips, apples, oranges and plum pudding. Besides the thousands who will be fed in the Grand Central Palace other thousands will be fed at home by the Salvation Army ladies and lassies who will spend the day in distributing well laden baskets.

AT THE WHITE HOUSE.

Christmas Gifts Arriving for Roosevelt Family.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 23.—Christmas presents are arriving in great numbers at the White House, coming from relatives, personal friends and admirers of the Roosevelts. The character of the gifts is varied. Some are costly, others unique, and not a few on the freak order. They come not only from the states, but from the West Indies and the far east. Cigars without number are sent to the president from Cuba, Porto Rico and Manila, the senders evidently not being aware of the fact that Mr. Roosevelt, unlike his predecessor, has no great fondness for tobacco. From China and the Philippines come many curios and not a few of these are addressed to the younger members of the president's family. Tropical fruits, including crates of pineapples, bananas and oranges, have been received at the executive mansion, and turkeys, barrels of apples, and wild game have come from friends within the states.

The daily delivery of innumerable parcels at the White House bear testimony to the fact that it is indeed going to be a merry Christmas with the chief executive and his family. In spite of numerous exacting duties Mrs. Roosevelt has managed to spend several hours each week at the different stores and in consequence all of her gifts are ready for distribution. Like Mrs. McKinley she selects the presents for her intimate friends from little keep sakes made by her own hands.

Miss Ethel Roosevelt will not receive a doll this year, and this will be the first time that her mother has not dressed such a plaything for her daughter. Mrs. Roosevelt, however, learned that Miss Ethel had concluded that her family was large enough and that she would prefer books or some intricate puzzles, which are popular at her school, instead of more dolls. Little Quintin, however, believes in boy babies, and has quite an assortment of rough riders, clergymen and soldiers, and he will doubtless add to his collection. Archibald scorns such playthings and always asks for something alive or for collars or other ornaments for his numerous pets.

The cabinet women will follow the precedent established last year and will present Mrs. Roosevelt with a handsome gift. This present is exceedingly beautiful and costly. None of the ladies feels free to disclose its nature, but they will say it is something Mrs. Roosevelt has desired for some time and for which she has frequently expressed a wish. Mrs. Hay, as the ranking lady of the cabinet, was selected to purchase the gift.

Mormons Revere a Prophet.

Salt Lake City, Utah, Dec. 23.—Wherever there are Mormons today has been celebrated, and in a number of instances the festivities have entirely taken the place of the celebration two days hence by Christendom. December 23 is Joseph Smith's birthday anniversary, and the observance of it and of Brigham Young's birthday

are official holidays of the Mormon church. The celebrations take the form of anniversary exercises in the different meeting houses with music and discourses on the life and deeds of Joseph Smith. The story is told of his birth in 1805 in a lowly farm house at Sharon, Vt., his alleged discovery of the sacred plates and his subsequent "revelations," the story of his subsequent career, in which he founded the Mormon religion and his tragic death in Illinois.

Wedding of Reynolds Hitt.

New York, Dec. 23.—The wedding of Miss Edith Gray and Reynolds Hitt, which took place today in St. Bartholomew's church, was a large and fashionable affair. The bride is the daughter of Justice John Clinton Gray, and the bridegroom is the son of Representative Hitt, of Illinois, and at present is second secretary of the United States embassy at Berlin. The wedding guests included many of the Illinois and Washington friends of the Hitt family, and the Albany, Newport and town acquaintances of the Grays. After the ceremony at the church the guests repaired to the Metropolitan club, where an elaborate reception was held. Mr. Hitt and his bride will go to Berlin after a brief preliminary bridal trip.

BIG FIRES

Several Cities Suffer From Accidental Conflagrations.**NARROW ESCAPES FROM DEATH****Appalling Disaster From Earthquake Shock in Turkestan.****SAVAGE WARFARE IN MOROCCO**

Cincinnati, Dec. 23.—Fire in a three story flat in a block on Erie avenue, Mount Auburn, 4 o'clock this morning, imperiled the lives of three families in the building and sent eight persons to the hospital, one or two of whom may not recover. The fire started in the cellar among some rubbish under the gas meter, causing gas explosion, which tore up a portion of the first floor. The fire then caught the stairway and the frightened inmates running down the stairway were painfully burned. Mrs. Thomas and her son and daughter in the third floor were rescued by fire ladders. Theodore Aylward and wife and three children, on the second floor, were all seriously burned. Millard, aged 9 years, inhaled flames and is in a serious condition. Garland Thomas, aged 17, is likewise in a critical condition. Edward Werder and family, on the first floor, escaped by jumping from the window. The damage by the fire was small.

Odd Fellows Block Burned.

Bradford, Pa., Dec. 23.—The fire, which broke out at 1:30 this morning, destroyed the Odd Fellows' block, entailing a loss of \$150,000. Among the losers are the Star Publishing company, postoffice, Bauer's insurance agency, and the armory of company C, national guard. While removing the occupants a ladder broke, precipitating four firemen to the floor. Thaddeus Green was killed and Thos. Angul, W. A. McCafferty and John Bigler were seriously but not fatally hurt.

Incendiary Fire.

Lincoln, Neb., Dec. 23.—A special to the Star from Beatrice, Neb., says: Fire broke out at 2 o'clock this morning in the basement of Day's drug store situated in the Masonic Temple block. The fire was of incendiary origin. The entire Masonic Temple, a three story business block, was destroyed. Loss from the fire at present will aggregate \$125,000, partly covered by insurance.

Girls Fatally Hurt.

St. Joseph, Mo., Dec. 23.—Fire broke out at 6:45 o'clock this morning in Chase & Son's manufacturing plant and destroyed it. Sophia Mintus, aged 15, and Mattie Leslie, aged 20, girl employees, jumped from a third story window and were fatally hurt. There were fifty girls employed in the factory and many others jumped from the second and third story windows, some sustaining slight injuries. The origin of the fire is unknown. The loss on the candy stock is about \$100,000.

APPALLING DISASTER.

Thousands of Lives Lost by Earthquake Shock in Turkestan.

Ashkabad, Russian Turkestan, Dec. 23.—Even the worst of the earlier reports of the recent earthquake disaster at Andjan quite underestimates the appalling loss of life. A telegram today from the scene of the catastrophe puts the number of victims in the native quarter of the town at four thousand. Already 800 corpses have been interred from the ruins. The work of excavation progresses slowly. The shocks continue with increasing violence.

SAVAGE WARFARE.

Rebels Annihilate Troops of Sultan of Morocco.

Tangier, Morocco, Dec. 29.—The imperial troops have been totally destroyed after a sanguinary battle with the rebels headed by the pretender. The latter despatched forty of the sultan's soldiers. Incensed by the successes of the rebels, the sultan has ordered his soldiers to spare no one at Taza, in spite of advice of the chiefs who counseled him not to indulge in excess.

Hanson-Jacoby Marriage.

Alfred Hanson and bride arrived from Las Cruces yesterday on delayed passenger No. 22 and immediately boarded passenger No. 2, and left for

their future home at Hutchinson, Kan. Mr. Hanson and bride, formerly Miss Lydia Jacoby, of Las Cruces, were married at the Jacoby home Sunday morning. The ceremony, the regulation ring service, was performed by Judge J. R. McFie, of Santa Fe, who went to Las Cruces especially for the occasion. Both parties are quite prominent, the bride coming from one of the best families of Las Cruces, and the groom the efficient and popular manager of the Harvey house at Hutchinson, Kan.

Taken to Canada.

The remains of Mrs. Wilhelm Ludwig Hess, who died at the home of her sister, Mrs. Dunsbaugh, Saturday morning, were sent to the home in Toronto, Can., last night. The husband, W. L. Hess, arrived yesterday and accompanied the body of his young wife to its last resting place. Mrs. Hess, accompanied by her mother, Mrs. Ferrell, came to Albuquerque about three months ago, but the ideal climate and a mother's tender care did not improve the condition of Mrs. Hess.

The remains were prepared for interment by J. W. Edwards.

BRAKEMEN LET OUT.

It Don't Pay to Be Kind to the Hobo Element.

Five Santa Fe Pacific brakemen received time checks last night as the consequence of an investigation which was held in the city yesterday by Superintendent Hibbard and other west end officials. Evidence obtained by spotters that the men were carrying hoboes was produced at the investigation. It is the custom of the Santa Fe officials to weed out and discharge a large number of employees and this Christmas promises to be no exception. It is rumored that January 6 will be the big day for the discharging, and between now and that time some short breaths will be taken by the railroad boys.

FORGER CAPTURED.

Chief McMillin Arrested Here Last Night T. F. Murphy.

T. F. Murphy, a much wanted forger, was captured by Chief McMillin last night. Murphy is wanted by the authorities of Walsenburg, Colo., for a series of forgeries. The chief received a letter several days ago, giving a description of the wanted man. That was sufficient for the quick eye of the chief and yesterday his attention was attracted by a suspicious looking character who resembled the forger. After watching the man a short time he became convinced he was on the right track and placed the street wanderer under arrest. The captive at first denied that his name was Murphy and that he had never been in Walsenburg, Colo., but this talk didn't go with the chief and his questions soon had Murphy on the fence and he confessed.

The details of the forgeries of Murphy are lacking. The authorities at Walsenburg have been notified and an officer will be sent after him.

POLICE COURT.

The Tramps Are Becoming an Annoyance to the Court.

Three vagrants were in Justice Crawford's court this morning. Their story was of the usual trend, broke and not able to get work. As there was nothing doing financially, they were put to work improving the city streets. The hoboes are hitting hard lines in the southwest when it comes to riding in box cars or even riding the freights at all. The railroad officials are becoming more strict every day, and all empty box cars going west are ordered to be sealed, and at Isleta the trainmen and the watchman inspect the whole train, throwing off any wandering genius that may be stealing a ride. Consequently it is impossible for the hoboes to get west. William Rodgers, the cut up and dilapidated wanderer, who has been in and out of jail for the last three days, was given his choice of hitting the road in an hour or taking thirty days in the county jail. After hearing the judge's decision he bolted through the door like a cannon ball, as if he feared the hour would vanish before he passed through the court yard.

Arrested for Stealing.

A young man giving his name as Harry Delaney was arrested by Officer Cooper this afternoon charged with stealing an overcoat, a couple of revolvers and a razor from the home of N. M. Rice. The overcoat belongs to J. H. Ely, who rooms at Rice's residence, and was stolen Saturday night. The revolvers and razors belonged to another gentleman who also rooms at the same place. Delaney was working at the home of Wm. Farr when arrested, but had previously worked for Mr. Rice. The arrested man claims he did not steal the overcoat, but had traded a wheel for it. His case will be tried in tomorrow morning's session.

MAY ARBITRATE

President Roosevelt to Settle Venezuela Dispute.**A RAILROAD ENGINE EXPLODES****State Canvassing Board Investigating Alleged Election Frauds.****BOSTON WOOL MARKET.**

Washington, Dec. 23.—The formal proposals of Great Britain and Germany that President Roosevelt arbitrate the Venezuela dispute did not arrive here over night nor were they at hand when the cabinet met, but it is expected they will reach Washington within a day or two. Much strong pressure is being brought to bear upon the president to decline the invitations to act as arbitrator. This pressure comes from the newspapers, from public men and from senators and representatives in Washington. Senator Culver called at the state department today with a bundle of telegrams, all entering protests against the embarkation of the president in this arbitration.

BOILER EXPLOSION.

Denver & Rio Grande Engine Explodes With Fatal Effect.

Denver, Dec. 23.—The boiler of locomotive No. 711 of the Denver & Rio Grande, known as the "Hoodoo engine," exploded near Buena Vista at 2:15 this morning. Engineer George Miller was instantly killed and his body thrown 200 feet ahead of the engine which was badly wrecked. V. A. Potter, brakeman, was fatally and W. S. Newby, fireman, perhaps fatally hurt. Investigation showed that the water was so low in the boiler that the crown sheet was burned. The big locomotive was damaged to the extent of \$4,000.

Colorado Election Frauds.

Denver, Dec. 23.—State canvassing board met this morning and adjourned immediately till afternoon when Mr. Hersey, representative of republican party, said he would introduce two affidavits and two witnesses in support of his contention of fraud in San Juan county.

FRENCH CLAIM

It Will Be Allowed by the Venezuela Government.**THE MISSING PRINCESS LOCATED****Vessel Allowed to Enter Blockaded Venezuela Port.****DEATH OF BISHOP OF CANTERBURY**

Berlin, Dec. 23.—The foreign office has received President Casanova's acceptance of the conditions of the French note. The president says that France will receive equal treatment with the other powers in the settlement and payment of claims.

LOUISE LOCATED.

Hiding Place of German Princess Located by King George.

Dresden, Dec. 23.—King George and the Crown Prince Frederick know where the Crown Princess Louise has sought refuge, but they have decided to accept the estrangement of the princess and her husband as irrevocable. They have made the cabinet privy to the circumstances of the princess' flight, as they see them, and a decree of divorce is talked of as a necessary severance to the princess' resolution to leave the court forever.

Where She Is.

Geneva, Dec. 23.—The crown princess of Saxony is here under the name of Fraulein Von Oben. Her brother, Archduke Leopold Ferdinand, and Professor Giron, are at the same hotel. The archduke has assumed the name of De Hurliano. The party are living quietly and propose to spend Christmas here.

Why She Left.

Munich, Dec. 23.—It is announced that Archduke Leopold Ferdinand has left here to find his sister. The view held at the Bavarian court is that the princess may yet return to Dresden. The court at Munich excuses her conduct, alleging that the princess was terrorized by Professor Giron and yielded to his threats.

The Villain in the Play.

Berlin, Dec. 23.—A dispatch from Dresden to the Lokal Anzeiger confirms previous advices from Geneva to the effect that the crown princess of Saxony is with Professor Giron. He is described as 24 years old and "a striking personality with large bright eyes."

PASSED BLOCKADE.

New York Steamer Allowed to Enter Venezuela Port.

Caracas, Dec. 23.—The Red D line steamer Caracas, Captain Woodrick, from New York, December 13, via San Juan, Porto Rico, and Willemstad, Curacao, is expected this morning at La Guayra from the latter port and will be allowed free entrance by the blockading vessels. This decision, however, as briefly cabled last night, was not arrived at without some difficulty due, it is claimed here, to the lack of unity of action on the part of the allies.

The Red D liner Caracas safely entered the harbor of La Guayra at 8 o'clock this morning.

Death of Archbishop.

London, Dec. 23.—Most Rev. Frederick Temple, archbishop of Canterbury, primate of all England, who has been ill for some time, died this morning of old age.

Congratulations for Tony Pastor.

New York, Dec. 23.—The home of Mr. and Mrs. "Tony" Pastor at Elmhurst, L. I., was the Mecca today of many theatrical folk who called to congratulate the veteran showman and his wife on their silver wedding anniversary and to help celebrate the occasion. Though Mr. Pastor has been a theatrical performer and manager so long that his early days in the business are beyond the memory of even the oldest playgoer, he continues to enjoy excellent health and from all appearances will remain a popular and prominent figure in vaudeville circles for many years to come.

Death of Ex-Senator.

Chicago, Dec. 23.—Former United States Senator Dwight M. Sahin, of Minnesota, died suddenly in his apartment at the Auditorium Annex of heart disease. For twenty-five years he was prominent in national republican politics.

NOT UNFRIENDLY.

The Washington Star, which is op-
posed to the omnibus statehood bill,
says:"Delegate Rodey, of New Mexico,
had a long conference with the pres-
ident today on the subject of statehood
for the territories, and especially for
New Mexico. Mr. Rodey did not feel
called upon to discuss the details of
his talk with the president, but said:
'I think a mistaken impression of the
president's attitude to the omnibus
territory bill has gone out as a result
of a conference he had with some call-
ers from New Mexico a few days ago.
There is no doubt that great pressure
has been brought on the president
against the bill, and that he is giving

admitting Oklahoma, New Mexico and
Arizona. I am not authorized to say
this, and am simply expressing my be-
lief. I know that the president has a
most kindly feeling for New Mexico.
He raised five troops of his Rough Rid-
er regiment in that territory, and
knows as well as anybody the charac-
ter of the citizenship there. I have not
by any means given up hope that the
omnibus bill will pass the senate and
that the president will sign it.'"

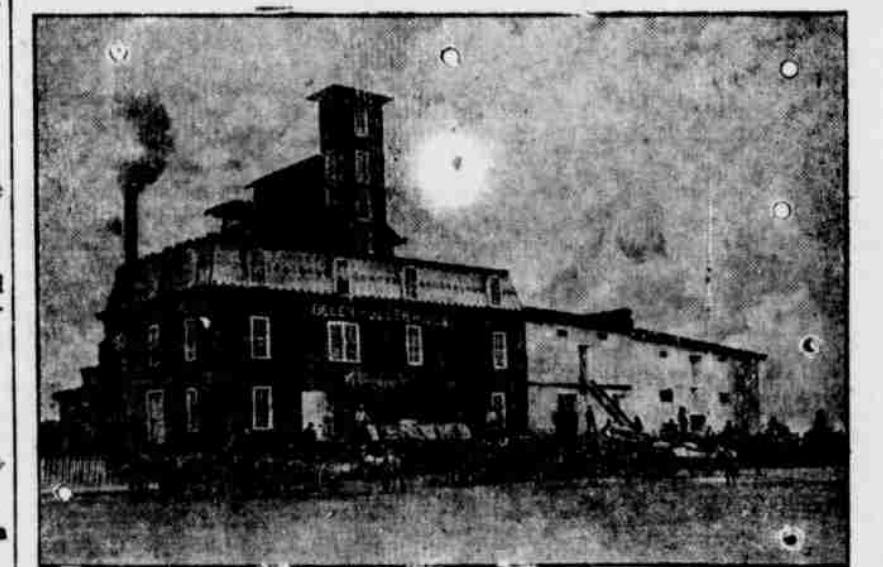

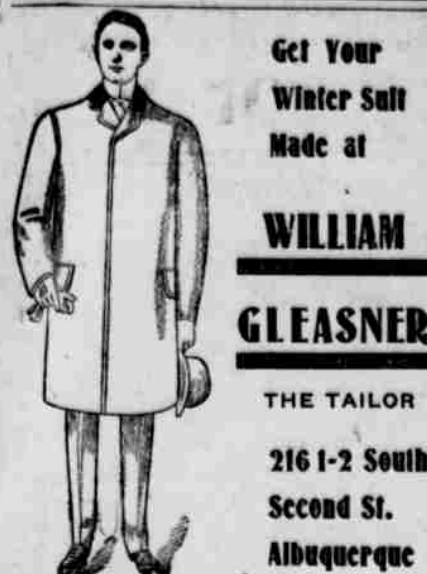

A Chicago dispatch says that by a restoration of freight rates to the basis of a year ago, western railroads expect to recover enough money to make up the additional wages provided for in the wage scale. In other words the people will have to stand the raise.

GET MORE PAY.

Santa Fe Coast Lines and Southern Pacific Increase.

Beginning January 1, the southern Pacific and Santa Fe railway systems in the local jurisdiction will increase the pay of operatives to an amount in excess of \$50,000, says a dispatch from Los Angeles. Between 9,000 and 10,000 persons are affected, the new conditions being more sweeping than any similar movement ever attempted in this territory. Average increase will be from 3 to 8 per cent a month, and the concessions will have been effected with little or no friction between employers and the employed.

Telegraphers, station agents, dispatchers, freight clerks and freight handlers on the Southern Pacific have had their demands granted. The Santa Fe took the initiative and made the concession December 1. The Southern Pacific rule in the new conditions will go in effect January 1.

Engineers and firemen of both systems also will obtain more pay after New Year's day. The schedules are now being readjusted and the result will be announced in a few days. Freight clerks in River station have had their salaries raised \$5 per month, with eight hours' work, and clerks in the passenger department are in hopes the present visit of G. A. Parkyn in San Francisco will redound in similar advantage to them.

WILL BEGIN JANUARY 1.

Western Railroads to Make Increase on Commodity Rates.

Over 80 per cent of the commodity rates that were reduced below the regular tariff basis since last March, when the temporary injunctions against rate cutting were granted, will be knocked out by the western roads January 1, says a Chicago dispatch. The rates on a majority of the articles will go back to tariffs in effect prior to March 25, and on some heavy freight, like cement, stone, brick, etc., the advance is from 10 to 25 per cent above the old tariffs. The advance on groceries and iron articles from Chicago to Colorado and Utah points amounts to over 100 per cent.

stock rates from the Missouri river to Chicago to 18 1/2 cents a hundred pounds. For several months it has been making a 12-cent rate because the Chicago Great Western cut the rate on packing house product to 18 1/2 cents. The rate on live stock prior to that time had been 23 1/2 cents. All the other Missouri river lines had met the Santa Fe rate from points west of the Missouri river, but continued to make a rate of 23 1/2 cents east from the Missouri. They still continue to make this rate east from the Missouri river, but have met the Santa Fe's rate of 18 1/2 cents from points west of the Missouri. The advance in live stock rates by the Santa Fe was made to induce its competitors to agree to an advance in rates on other articles which it considered too low.

THE SANTA FE CUT OFF.

It Will Bring Los Angeles Several Hours Nearer Chicago.

The Los Angeles Times, in commenting on the Santa Fe cut off, says:

"The Santa Fe's proposed cut off that will bring Los Angeles several hours nearer Chicago will begin at a point at or near Rio Puerco, on the Santa Fe Pacific, in Valencia county, N. M. The road will run in a southeasterly and easterly direction through Valencia and Guadalupe counties, N. M., to a point of connection with the Pecos Valley & Northeastern Railway at or near Texico, near the eastern New Mexico boundary. The estimated length of the line will be 265 miles. Branch lines will be constructed from Rio Puerco to a crossing of the Rio Grande river in Socorro county, N. M., thence easterly and northeasterly to a connection with the main line in Valencia county. This feeder will be fifty miles long, and will tap a section rich in agricultural possibilities. Another

feeder will be constructed from Brazil Springs, N. M., southeast through Guadalupe and Chavez counties, New Mexico, to Portales, on the Pecos Valley & Northeastern railway, thence running southeasterly to the eastern New Mexico boundary in Chavez county. The length of this proposed feeder will be sixty-five miles."
