Disasters on sea and on land to ships and trains will influence many thousands of people to abstain from travel. But it must be remembered the chances of being killed or hurt on a railroad train or on shipboard are less than in taking a walk downtown.

It is hoped that the members of the New Mexico Woman's Suffrage League will not take too much to heart the defeat of the measure to grant women the right of suffrage in school matters in New Mexico. To be sure, life is uncertain, but while there is life there is hope.

St. Vincent's orphanage and hospital at Santa Fe should be fairly treated by the territory. The institution is the oldest of the kind in New Mexico, and has done immense good. The appropriation for it should not only not be cut down, but should be increased. It would be money well spent.

Italy and Uruguay should be promptly notified to call home their consuls from Manila. There seems to be no doubt that these gentlemen aided and comforted the Tagal insurgents, and the mere suspicion of such acts would make them persona non grata with the United States.

The bitter contest for the presidency of the Daughters of the American Revolution has been decided by a substantial majority in favor of Mrs. F. A. Banks of Indiana, much to the astonishment and indignation of the supporters of the other two candidates, Mrs. Roebing and Mrs. McLean. Why women are partisans they are partisans heart and soul.

Wyoming has less than one-half the population of New Mexico, but according to the census it has several larger cities than the largest city of this territory. Cheyenne has 14,087 inhabitants and Laramie 8,207. Take away from Wyoming the population of its two largest towns, however, and there are less than 50,000 inhabitants in the remainder of the state.

The fortune left by Queen Victoria is not near as large as had been popularly reported. It amounts to only \$3,000,000, a comfortable sum, to be sure, but a mere bagatelle compared to the fortunes of many an American millionaire who has not had the opportunities of royalty to enrich himself. One of the virtues of Queen Victoria was that she was honest, and even a queen or king cannot accumulate tens of millions of dollars when adhering to the strict rules of integrity.

The fact that the New Mexico asylum for the insane last year raised considerably over \$30,000 worth of produce from nine acres of land which three years ago was thought to be unfit for agriculture shows what intelligent farming can accomplish in New Mexico. As living is practically as cheap as in the east, the farmer with nine acres of land under irrigation in New Mexico is better off than with twenty-five acres in the east. The average cost for food, and good substantial food at that, for each inmate of the insane asylum was \$50 a year, so that it required only one-seventh of an acre to pay for the food for a year of a full-grown man. It isn't such a hard thing for a poor man to make a living after all, if he only knows the right way to go about it.

No Births for Favorites.

The army reorganization bill passed by congress and signed by the president provides no births for "favorite sons." It will be extremely difficult for such to secure commissions unless they are extraordinarily proficient in military knowledge, and possess a first-class, all-around education and moral record.

Most of these commissions will go, anyway, to officers of Philippine volunteers, or to deserving enlisted men of the regulars. Very few posts will be left for civilian appointees, and as to these President McKinley and Secretary Root are determined to take no chances. They have selected that thorough-going martinet, Adjutant General Corbin, to conduct the examinations of the candidates. General Corbin has just issued his instructions to the examining boards. It is clear that the young officers will be subjected to an ordeal which is certain to exclude all but the ablest and most meritorious.

They will be examined not only in such relatively elementary branches as geography and history, but in constitutional history, the organization of the government, international law, algebra, geometry, trigonometry and surveying, as well as, of course, in military science. Then Adjutant General Corbin warns all applicants that "the most searching inquiry will be made by the board not only into each candidate's physical and mental qualifications, but also into his antecedents and aptitude for the position sought." Attention will be paid also to the physical aptitude of the applicant as shown in athletics,

field sports, etc. All the examination papers will be laid before the president, who is to be the final arbiter. There is nothing of the old spoilsism in all this. The new commissions in the army are to be awarded apparently in strict compliance with the principles of the merit system. This is as it ought to be in every army, and especially in the army of the great republic. The humiliation which another course can work was exemplified in the British experience in South Africa. The British government has long officered its army, not on the basis of the merit system, but on the basis of a social and aristocratic spoilsism, which is vastly more vicious and demoralizing than the political spoilsism of America. It was a terrible shock to Britain to discover in the first weeks of the war that her beaten forces were largely led by rich weaklings and titled incompetents. The chances are that the "favorite sons" of senators and congressmen—men who have fought their way to high places by sheer effort of their own—will be better suited than the sons of dukes and marquises. But either system of spoilsism is intolerable.

None of the new officers of the American service can have a training equal to the thorough military education of West Point, but they must have the best possible substitute for it than can be gained by hard study and faithful preliminary service. The rigid examinations will of themselves frighten off the lazy and the untrained, and the general average of the successful aspirants for commissions ought to be notably high.

The New Mexico Asylum for the Insane.
The fourth biennial report of the directors, medical superintendent, steward and matron of the New Mexico asylum for the insane, located at Las Vegas, gives a concise and interesting review of the status of that important public institution, including statistical tables that give food for thought. The report shows that the institution has been managed efficiently and economically, and that like all other growing institutions its needs and its wants for the future are many and necessary to the best fulfillment of the aim for which it was created. The receipts in the past two years have been \$49,845.77, and the expenditures \$46,601.15, including about \$6,500 spent for building a new kitchen and making necessary improvements and repairs to buildings. The property of the institution has cost the territory \$75,063.74. The tax levy of one mill produced \$22,500 for the institution last year, and together with the receipts from pay patients made the total income of the asylum \$24,000 from those sources. To this must be added \$3,240.19 worth of produce from the nine-acre farm of the institution. The average number of patients during 1904 was ninety-five, many of the countries having their full quota. If all the counties fill their quota the institution will be overcrowded, and will have no room for pay patients. The crying need, therefore, is more buildings and a larger farm to give the patients employment.

Of the 135 patients treated during the two years, forty-five have been discharged, seventeen of these had recovered, a remarkably high percentage; six had improved, three remained stationary, and nineteen died. San Miguel county furnished the most patients, 14. The other counties came in the following order: Bernalillo, 13; Santa Fe, 13; Mora, 8; Grant, 6; Socorro, 6; Dona Ana, 5; Colfax, 4; Valencia, 4; Taos, 2; Rio Arriba, 2; Otero, 1; Chaves, 1; Guadalupe, 1; Sierra, 1; Union, 1; Eddy, 1; San Juan, 0; pay patients, 6; penitentiary convicts, 2.

Of 66 patients, 33 were natives of New Mexico, 6 of Germany, 4 of New York, 3 of Texas, 2 of Illinois, Kansas and Ireland, 1 each of Missouri, Pennsylvania, Arkansas, Indiana, Massachusetts, Italy, Mexico, England, France, and of nine the birthplace was unknown. There were 43 males and 23 females, 22 single, 30 unmarried, 4 widowed. By occupation the inmates lined up as follows: Housewife, 16; unknown, 16; laborer, 13; miners, 7; farmers, 4; physician, carpenter and merchant, 2; dressmaker, shepherd, butcher and printer, 1 each.

The causes of insanity are classified as follows: Unknown, 27; sexual causes, 10; intemperance and dissipation, 6; fright, 5; injury to head, 5; grief, 3; epilepsy, 3; overwork, 3; sunstroke, 2; senility, 1; typhoid fever, 1.

The board of directors of the institution consists of the following: Gov. M. A. Otero, Hon. M. C. de Baca, superintendent of public instruction, ex-officio; J. W. Zollars, president; Marcus Brunswick, secretary and treasurer; Benigno Romero, O. L. Gregory and N. T. Cordova.

The officers are: W. R. Tipton, M. D., medical superintendent; George W. Ward, steward, and Miss Margaret E. Twomey, matron.

The insane asylum is one of the necessary and permanent institutions of the territory. New Mexico does not fall behind other commonwealths in caring for the insane and demented, and therefore the legislature should be as liberal in its appropriations for the asylum as the condition of the territorial finances will permit.

AN APPEAL TO THE PEOPLE.
A Liberal Response Should Be Made to the Luna Memorial Fund Committee.

The committee in charge of the Luna memorial fund has addressed the following appeal to the people of New Mexico: Santa Fe, N. M., February 23.—To the People of New Mexico: We, the undersigned, have been selected as a committee to take charge of and expend the funds contributed for the placing of a suitable memorial in the capitol building at Santa Fe to commemorate the life and services of Capt. Maximilian Luna, who lost his life in the island of Luzon while on duty in the United States army on the staff of General Lawton. We have thought it better that there should be an opportunity for all the people of New Mexico to contribute small sums toward that end than to have large amounts from the few, and therefore would ask you to remit whatever amount you choose to Hon. William J. Mills, the treasurer of the committee, at Las Vegas, who will

send a receipt and place your name on the list of contributors to this patriotic purpose. The school children, particularly, are urged to take an interest in this memorial, and we would suggest that teachers bring it to their attention by explaining the object of this letter, and telling them of the life and service to his country of the young man whom they will honor by their contributions toward a suitable memorial. He was born in Valencia county, educated at the Jesuits' College, in Las Vegas, and at Georgetown University, in Washington; returned to his native county, and when barely of age was elected its sheriff; in 1896 was elected to the legislature of New Mexico; in 1898 was among the first to volunteer for the war with Spain, recruiting a company for Roosevelt's rough riders, of which he was captain, and served with distinction through all the battles before Santiago, returning with the highest praise from his colonel and General Wood. He was again elected to the legislature, and served as speaker of the house with marked ability in 1899; and in the summer of that year went with the 34th infantry to the Philippines as lieutenant. Soon after his arrival General Lawton selected him as an aid, and while acting as such he met his death, in November of 1900, when barely 30 years old. In his brief life he did much for his territory and for his country, whose flag he loved so well that he gave up home, family, and life itself for what it represents. He did much also for the young men of New Mexico in showing them by his example what education, perseverance and courage will accomplish even in this remote part of the country, and we can show our appreciation of his courage, fidelity and patriotism in no more fitting manner than by the enduring memorial of marble or bronze that is proposed, the exact character and location of which will be decided upon later; but the committee assures you that it will be worthy of the subject, and of the people of this great territory. The Armendaris Grants.

The Socorro Chieftain records the filing of two important deeds at Socorro last week. By these deeds the Laguna Valley company conveys to the Chicago Cattle Company the Armendaris grants Nos. 33 and 34. These grants extend along the line of the Santa Fe from near San Antonio south about fifty-five miles to Engle, and contain in round numbers 447,000 acres of land. The two deeds bear revenue stamps to the amount of \$520. This land is part of the encumbered estate of the late William Waddingham, and one good feature of its transfer is the payment to the treasurer of Socorro county several thousand dollars of back taxes, for which judgment had been rendered by the courts. In this respect, Sierra county is also a gainer, but her claim is for a smaller amount.

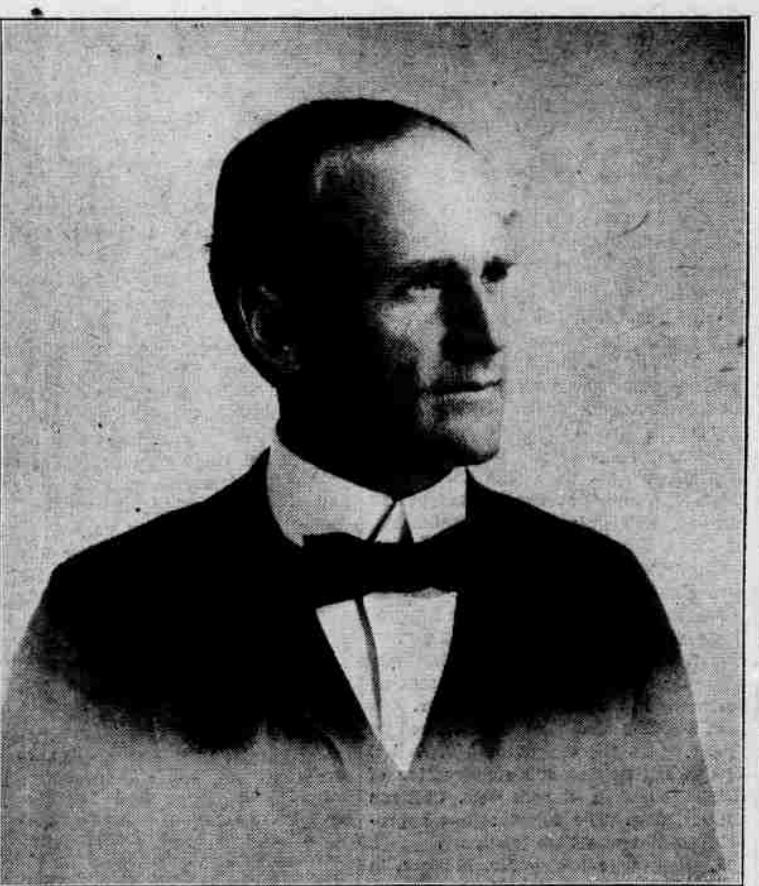

HON. WILLIAM C. BARNES.

Member of the House of the 34th Legislative Assembly from Colfax County.

Hon. William C. Barnes, who represents Colfax county in the house of the thirty-fourth legislative assembly, is a man of wide experience in legislative matters, and in serving the public in various capacities in the west. He was born in California, but his boyhood and young manhood was spent in Nevada, Ohio and Indiana. When Nevada was admitted, Mr. Barnes' father was elected representative to the first Nevada legislature, but he died soon after his election. Mrs. Barnes and her son went west, where they remained until Mr. Barnes was 16 years of age, when he returned to San Francisco to work for the largest music house on the Pacific coast.

In 1878 he was appointed U. S. military telegraph operator at Fort Apache, Apache county, Ariz. This position he held for four years, seeing much active service among the hostile Apaches that surrounded Fort Apache. For valor displayed in a siege of the post on August 30, 1880, he was voted a medal of honor upon recommendation of Gen. E. A. Carr, of the United States army. In 1884 Mr. Barnes was offered a commission as second lieutenant, but preferred cowboy life, and went into the cattle business near Holbrook, Ariz.

As officer and active member of the Stockmen's Protective Association of Apache county, he did much toward breaking up one of the worst gangs of cattle rustlers and murderers that ever infested that part of Arizona. In 1899 Mr. Barnes was elected supervisor of

Apache county. In 1887 he had been appointed live stock commissioner by Governor Zuleck, of Arizona, and held that position until 1892, when he resigned to accept the position of world's fair commissioner tendered him by Governor Murphy. In 1894 he was elected a member of the eighteenth legislative assembly of Arizona. At the expiration of his legislative term he was again appointed live stock commissioner by Governor Murphy. He served three years as chairman of the board during which time was completed the registration of cattle brands and a thorough revision of the live stock laws was concluded under his personal supervision.

Several years ago Mr. Barnes decided to throw in his lot with New Mexico. He moved to Colfax county, and near Dorsey engaged in the cattle business, building for himself a comfortable home, where he and his talented and pretty wife live an ideal life.

Mr. Barnes has made himself quite a factor in the thirty-fourth legislative assembly. He has progressive and advanced ideas, and knows how to put them into legislation. He is chairman of the committee on education, and among others, a member of the following committees: County and county lines, insurance, library, capitol and judiciary. He has introduced several good measures, and is endeavoring his best to work for the upbuilding of the territory and to be faithful to the wishes of his constituency.

A MARVELOUS DISCOVERY.
Pre-Historic Ruins Discovered About 75 Miles From Gallup.
(Arizona Gazette.)
That Arizona and New Mexico have long been known by scientists to be the old world of North America is no secret. The thousands of ancient canal beds long years since abandoned, and far above the present water line, the numerous buried cities of the plain uncovered—some of them of remarkable architecture—all of those ancient structures have caused widespread attention to be directed to these territories.
S. J. Holsinger, land inspector for the United States, informed the Gazette that one of the most remarkable discoveries of the age has been made in New Mexico, seventy-five miles from Gallup, and the government has authorized that the country now being denuded by New York parties be protected.

It seems that a couple of Arizona prospectors who were hunting in Arizona and New Mexico for coal and minerals, accidentally discovered a buried city of enormous dimensions in a place called Chaco canon, some seventy-five miles from Gallup. Among the party was a New York man. This gentleman succeeded in interesting New York capitalists in the scheme of opening up the buried city for commercial purposes. The company is now at work with forty men and several car loads of machinery, and is shipping the pottery taken from the ruins to New York, and it is having a marvelous sale. The government has become cognizant of the transaction, and Agent Holsinger, of Phoenix, will take a party of men and proceed to the canon and oust the New York company and confiscate its machinery and property.

Mr. Holsinger says one of the buildings of the city uncovered contains 4,000 rooms, it being the largest building ever discovered in the world's history. The pottery found in the building is of a very superior quality, and shows that the builders and occupants of that old city were men of intelligence and capacity.

The orders of the government to Agent Holsinger are to take immediate possession of the property and preserve it as a national park. The country surrounding the buried city is picturesque. Tall mountains, heavily timbered, the city being in an inaccessible canon. It looks as though the natives had selected it with a view of defending themselves from their enemies, as it seems was the case with the Arizona cave and cliff dwellers.

The company that is working in this newly discovered city has up to date shipped thirty car loads of relics to eastern markets, and the untimely intrusion of Uncle Sam will put a stop to a traffic that ought never to have been permitted. These old ruins are the property of the United States. They are in a measure a source of their wealth, and we are glad that the government has concluded to take a hand in the protection of these ancient ruins.
