The total appropriations made at the recent session of congress aggregate \$1,198,647.

The chances are that the democratic candidate for delegate to congress will come from the Pecos Valley.

New Jersey's experience with anarchists will convince her that there is something worse than mosquitoes.

New Mexico's crop of apricots has exceeded all past experiences, and is keeping the fruit stands well supplied.

If the furniture trust is not stronger than some of the furniture sold on the installment plan it should be an easy matter to smash it.

Strikes are numerous all over the country, and there does not appear to be any sensible way to prevent their constant occurrence.

Last month the freight receipts at Deming amounted to nearly \$200,000. Deming is becoming a railroad center and big shipping point.

"Too much time elapses between the Fourth of July and Thanksgiving day," says the Alfalfa Sage. "It ought to come the next day."

The people of this city can prepare for a large crowd of visitors at the territorial fair in October. They are coming from all over New Mexico and Arizona.

No feature of republican prosperity has been more remarkable than the commercial development of the south. The current census will show that during the last decade 60 per cent of our cotton exports have come from the southern states.

Russell Sage says he has been working nearly seventy years, intends to keep at it as long as he can, and does not believe he would be any better by retiring from work. If Mr. Sage could not labor he would probably watch the tape as a recreation.

President Roosevelt will stop at El Paso on his way to this city in October. His route will be first to San Antonio, Texas, then to El Paso, and then a visit to the territorial fair in this city. From Albuquerque he will go to Kansas City, and from there home.

At the big statehood convention which will be held in this city in October, and which will be attended by President Roosevelt, the territories of Arizona and Oklahoma should be well represented. It is probable that Senators Quay and Elkins will also attend this convention, they having been invited.

Surgeon General Sternberg's report will show that of 4,919 men shot during the war in Cuba and the Philippines, 586 were killed and 4,333 wounded. The mortality of those struck was 11.9 per cent, or one man killed for every 7.4 wounded. During the civil war there were 111,286 killed, or 1 killed to 4.56 wounded.

Patronize home institutions, even to having your printing, binding, ruling, etc., done at home. These outside print shops never patronize the local dry goods stores, the meat markets, the grocery stores, the hardware and plumbing stores, nor pay monthly bills to Albuquerque merchants to help them along. The Retail Merchants' association ought to discuss these important facts and adopt a resolution to "practice what they preach."

### CHAMPION DRILLERS.

A hole 4 1/2 inches deep in solid granite, made by two men in fifteen minutes, is something that a few years

ago would have been deemed incredible. That was the record-breaking feat performed last week at Bisbee, Ariz., by McNichols and Ross, of British Columbia, defeating the former champions, Malley and Chamberlain, who at El Paso a year ago broke all previous records. These contests are of great interest to miners, and unlike base ball, and racing they unite the element of sporting with that of useful labor, just as the printers keep a record of the highest speed made in typesetting.

### NEW USE FOR ALFALFA.

A new use has been discovered for alfalfa seed. A Kansas farmer comes forward as a witness that when the seed is properly ground and mixed with corn it is an excellent beef-producing food for cattle, taking the place of cottonseed meal.

Heretofore the seed of the alfalfa plant has been valuable chiefly to increase alfalfa acreage—in other words, it has been used as seed. Alfalfa growers have feared that as the acreage increases the demand for seed will decrease and the price will go down. Alfalfa is an extremely valuable crop for hay alone, but the seed has added much to its value in the past, some times yielding five and six bushels to the acre and bringing \$5 per bushel.

Baltimore, Md., July 8.—About 300 delegates, representing as many cities throughout the United States and Canada, are attending the annual national convention of the Boilermakers' and Iron Shipbuilders' union. The gathering was formally opened in Baltimore's hall with James McNeal, the national president, presiding. The sessions are expected to continue for ten days or longer, as there is more than the usual amount of important business to be transacted. One of the first matters to be discussed is the advisability of the organization demanding an eight hour instead of a nine hour day.

## RAILROAD SITUATION.

Roswell Trying to Get Senator Andrews Interested in an Extension.

## ADVANTAGES OF PECOS VALLEY.

Several months ago the Register published a number of articles on the subject of an extension of the Santa Fe Central railway at Torrance, its junction with the Rock Island road, to Roswell. A few croakers (there are only a few of them and their ranks are dwindling) did not "take any stock in it," but the most of the citizens of the town saw at once that there was a chance to interest ex-Senator Andrews, president of the road, and his associates, and a few quietly began corresponding with him. Among these were W. H. Godair, president of the First National bank, and J. A. Nisbet, the attorney. The latter received a letter a few days ago from President Andrews, dated June 27, from his office in the Park building in Pittsburgh, acknowledging the receipt of a letter Judge Nisbet had written him about the people of Roswell wanting him to extend the Santa Fe Central to Roswell, in which he said that he expected to leave there for New Mexico about the 10th of July, and after a visit along the line of the road, will go to El Paso, and will let him know when he expects to be in El Paso and will be glad to meet him there. In closing, he says: "Possibly, I may visit your city and look the situation over."

On Wednesday of this week a telegram was sent President Andrews signed by G. A. Richardson, for the Roswell club, as president, and for the chamber of commerce by J. A. Graham, as president, asking him to visit Roswell as the guest of those two organizations. This is the only way in which President Andrews, or anyone else, can form any idea of Roswell's growth, prosperity and resources.

Correspondence is also being carried on with officials of the Dallas & New Mexico Railway company, at Dallas, and considerable interest is being taken in that quarter, in Roswell as an objective point.

When a mild interest only is being taken in a movement of any kind there is not much chance for it to take definite form, or to gather sufficient impetus to amount to much, but the interest now being taken by the business men of the town in trying to secure additional railway facilities by calling the attention of railway managers to the advantages and resources of the Pecos valley, and the opportunity of building and operating a railroad running east and west across the Pecos valley at this point, shows that there may be, and probably will be, something done, and without much delay. The fact that it is only about 100 miles from Torrance to Roswell and that the latter is a town of over 3,000 people, with a rich farming and fruit growing section of country tributary to it, under irrigation, consisting of large alfalfa farms, stocked with the finest registered Herefords and Shorthorns in the southwest and hundreds of acres of the best bearing apple orchards in the world all supplemented by a fine range country in every direction, which is filling up rapidly with small stockmen, and that with that road built to Roswell, its further extension to a connection with some road from Fort Worth or Dallas would make it a line connecting Salt Lake City and Denver with Galveston via Santa Fe, the territorial capital, makes the proposition one that appeals strongly to the commercial instinct of railway promoters.

Every influence in the central portion of the territory is enlisted in the effort to secure railway connection with Roswell. W. R. Clements, of this place, was at Torrance last week and says everybody there is talking about Roswell, and the certain prospect of the extension.

Recent press dispatches indicate that the Santa Fe is going to build a "cut off" from Portales, ninety miles north-east of Roswell, to Albuquerque. General Manager Munge being quoted to that effect. A number of tents and other effects were unloaded there a few days ago and something is going to be done toward pushing the work on the "cut off," evidently. This leaves the way clear for the Santa Fe Central extension to Roswell.—Roswell Register.

## BRILLIANT WEDDING.

Miss Lila Vanderbilt Sloane and William B. Osgood Field.

Lenox, Mass., July 8.—Miss Lila Vanderbilt Sloane was married at noon today to William B. Osgood Field at Trinity church. The bride is the granddaughter of William H. Vanderbilt and a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Douglas Sloane. The bridegroom is a member of the Field family, which has been prominent in the social and business life of New York city for several generations.

The doors of the church were thrown open at 11 o'clock. This was an hour before the ceremony, but wedding guests were arriving in such numbers that it was necessary to let them into the church at once to avoid awkward delays. The first four pews on each side were reserved for the families of the bride and bridegroom. Five hundred representatives of the highest society of New York were in attendance.

Trinity church, the scene of many brilliant weddings in the past, was never more beautifully decorated. Vines and flowers covered the columns at each side of the nave and the intervening spaces were spanned with festoons of white and green. It is understood that Mr. and Mrs. Field will pass the honeymoon at Blitmore, the magnificent country seat of the bride's uncle, George Vanderbilt.

## MOTHER AND SISTER.

Both Killed by a Demented Son and Brother.

Boston, Mass., July 8.—Herbert Hill today shot and killed his sister, Mrs. Alice Riley, at their home in Roxbury and then turned the revolver on his mother who had come into the room to protect her daughter, inflicting probably fatal injuries. Hill escaped. He is supposed to be demented.

## BETTER QUIT NOW.

Jessie Morrison Given Twenty-Five Years in Prison.

El Dorado, Kas., July 8.—Jessie Morrison who was convicted June 28 of murder in the second degree for killing Mrs. Olin Castle at the latter's home here in June 1900, by cutting her throat with a razor, was today sentenced to 25 years in the penitentiary. A motion for a new trial was overruled. Miss Morrison, who has gone through three trials, took the sentence with little show of demonstration. It will be appealed to the state supreme court. At the second trial Miss Morrison was given but five years.

## Another War Over.

Panama, July 7.—Gen. Salazar, governor of Panama, has received a dispatch from Bogota, the capital, announcing that Generals Pedraza, Neenito, Ulloa and Teopilo Garcia, army staffs, together with General Martin, the most important liberal leader in the department of Tolima, laid down their arms on account of the guarantees offered by the Bogota government. At Carmen General Detacop defeated the Liberal under General Munoz, killing or wounding over 200 men. This general also won a victory over the forces of General Garcia Rivira thus, it is claimed, rendering it useless to cause any more bloodshed.

## THOMAS HOLLAND PARDONED.

Nine out of Twelve Jurors Signed the Petition.

Denver, Colo., July 8.—Governor Orman today issued a pardon for Thomas Holland, a former Denver saloonkeeper, who was sentenced to eight years in the penitentiary in July, 1901, on the charge of administering knockout drops in his saloon to C. F. Wilson. Nine of the twelve jurors signed the petition, believing him innocent on the face of new evidence.

## FAMILY MURDERED.

No Mark by Which They Can be Identified.

Enid, O. T., July 8.—Near Prudence, thirty miles southwest of here, the bodies of a man, woman and two children, apparently members of one family, all mutilated into almost unrecognizable shapes, were found today. The bodies were stripped of all clothing, leaving no means of identification. It is supposed the family were strangers traveling overland and they were robbed and murdered by men who then made off with their team and belongings.

## Jury Discharged.

Winfield, Kan., July 8.—The jury in the case of O. W. Coffett, on trial for the murder in October, 1901, of George C. Montgomery, a Santa Fe detective, who was assassinated while seated in his home in this city, were discharged today, having failed to reach a verdict.

## POLICE COURT.

A Minister Up for Debt—A Few Vag Cases.

"Trying to beat your honest debts, is a poor way for a young man to do, who is studying for the ministry," said Judge Crawford, as he opened court this morning.

Albuquerque Auction company vs. Rev. Gerlino Aldelete, was the first case on the docket. The suit was to recover two horses that had been attached for a debt of \$9.85, which Rev. Aldelete owed the Auction company for dry goods and groceries. The plea entered by the plaintiff was that the horses were exempt, as they were all the property he possessed. The rendering of a decision was postponed. Rev. Aldelete is a Methodist minister and presides over a little flock in the northeast section of the city.

Henry Pearce, vagrant, was given ten days.

Antonio Balejos, arrested for disturbing the peace, was fined \$5 or five days.

## FENCES MUST GO.

Cattlemen Find That They Cannot Have the Order Changed.

## ACRES OPENED TO SETTLERS.

A Washington special dispatch to the Denver News, under date of July 4, says:

The cattlemen have made a final and wholly unsuccessful effort to secure some modification of the official order for the removal of the fences from the public ranges of the country. A delegation of western senators and congressmen appealed to the president yesterday to grant further extension of time for the removal of the drift fences on the ranges. The president frankly and firmly declined to further back the enforcement of the order. The men then appealed to Mr. Hitchcock, secretary of the interior, but were equally unsuccessful.

When the order was issued by the president for the removal of the fences in April the cattlemen urged a delay, asserting that their herds were being prepared for the spring markets and that the enforcement of the fence removal order would work a great hardship and financial loss upon the cattle owners. Upon that showing the president, who understands the conditions on the ranges, agreed to defer the enforcement of the order until July 1. The cattlemen took advantage of the respite and made every effort to secure the passage by congress of a leasing bill, which would give them authority to fence up something like 325,000,000 acres of the public lands in the western states.

Mr. Hitchcock, secretary of the interior, made an open, determined and successful fight against the passage of any leasing bill. He demonstrated to the satisfaction of the committees on public lands that any such enactment would serve as a practical bar to the homesteading of these lands and would also work a hardship upon the small cattle owners in the west. The bills were all defeated. Tired, the cattlemen renewed their pressure upon the president for a further modification of the order. They urged that they be allowed to retain their drift fences. These are fences across the ranges, at distances of from twenty to thirty miles apart, which serve as protection to the cattlemen, preventing their cattle from drifting away from prescribed sections. These fences were allowed to stand without much objection by the government officials until the cattlemen began fencing across the ends and connecting the "drift" fences into enormous pastures.

Settlers who attempted to remove any of these fences, for the purpose of making roads, were frequently assaulted and brutally treated by the cowboys. Millions of acres on the ranges are now fenced in and held by cattlemen, without any warrant of law. The president and the secretary of the interior are determined that these fences shall be removed.

"There is no desire," said Mr. Hitchcock today, "on the part of the department to cause the cattlemen any injury or loss, but there will be no further modification of the law for their benefit. If they show a disposition to remove the fences they will be given a reasonable time to do so, and will be allowed to make provisions for the protection of their herds. But the ranges belong to the whole people, and the settlers and small cattle owners will be protected in their rights."

Special agents of the land department will give attention to this matter during the summer months. Reports of violations of the law and the refusal of the cattlemen to remove the fences will be made to the department of justice and the violators prosecuted.

## FOUND DEAD IN BED.

Harry Scranton, Formerly of Corrallos, Dead in Mexico.

Mrs. Harry Scranton, who resides in this city, has received information of the death of her husband which occurred under sad circumstances, the other day in Mexico City, Mexico. The Mexican Herald, of June 27, tells of his death in the following article:

"Harry Scranton, a restaurant waiter, was found dead in his bed at the American hotel yesterday morning. Mr. Scranton was a man of about 40 years of age with no family in this city. He is understood to have a wife and step daughter somewhere in the United States and had been a resident of this city for about a year during which time he has been in almost constant employment at the Guardiola restaurant and has always sustained a good reputation as a reliable worker. His death yesterday morning was reported at once to the police and the remains were taken in charge by the authorities and taken to the comisaria after which they were removed to the Juarez hospital, where an autopsy was held yesterday afternoon. Friends of the deceased man called at the hospital in the afternoon, however, leaving the statement that they knew Mr. Scranton to be afflicted with consumption and dysentery and that while his death was entirely unexpected, Mr. Scranton was on the streets on Wednesday, but was not well. Funeral from American hospital today at 3 o'clock p. m."

The deceased conducted a restaurant at Corrallos in the early days of that town, going there from Santa Fe. He was a jolly, good fellow, and did the best restaurant business of that town, which, in those days, was one of the best and most promising mining camps in the southwest.

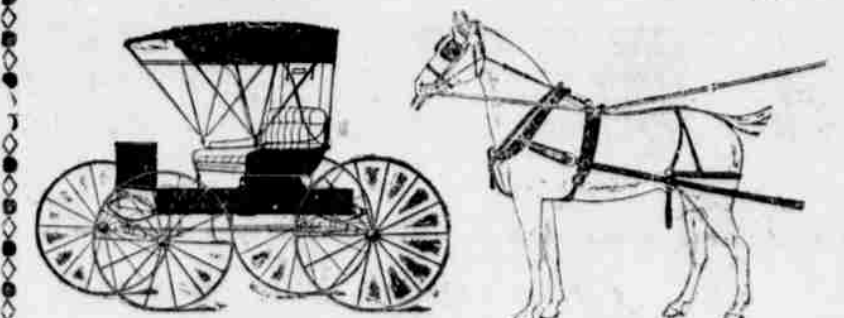

### BIG GARDENS.

Las Vegas Has Fine Truck Gardens—  
Ping Pong in Evidence.

### INTERESTING DIVORCE CASE.

Las Vegas, July 7.—Near Las Vegas is developing one of the finest truck gardens in the territory, and next year Las Vegas will have fresh vegetables in abundance, although even this year the market has been fairly well supplied from the same source. 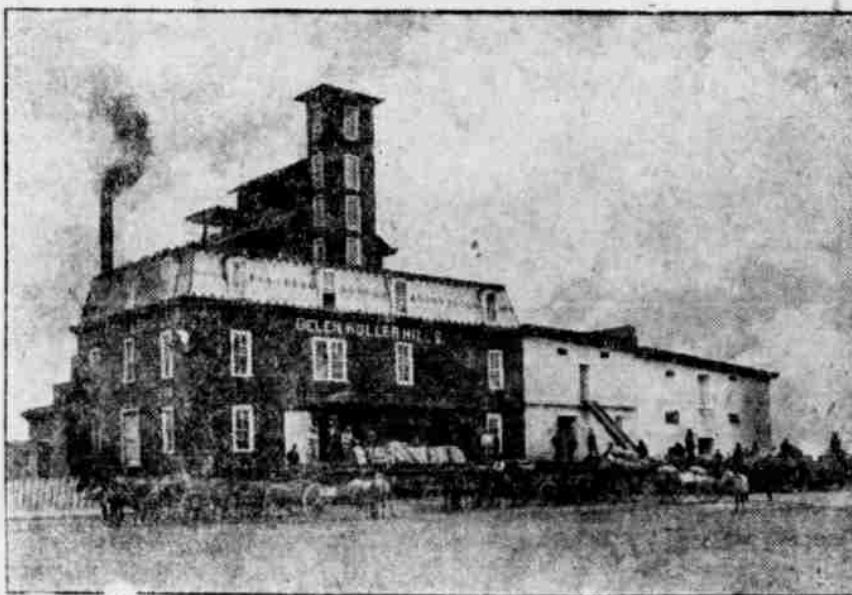

## Railroad Topics

New York's underground railroad is half completed and the first train is promised for January 1, 1904.

Joe Kinsler has been appointed superintendent of bridges for the Pecos system, vice Bob Young, and went to work last Tuesday. He and wife went up to Umlinger, where his first job is to be done.

W. E. Nettleton, assistant general superintendent of machinery for the Santa Fe, is in the city. His mission in Albuquerque is to inspect some of the new machinery which has recently been installed in the local shops.

The local railway round house is to have a new turntable. The old one was just recently equipped with electric motive power, but it was old, rusty and unsatisfactory. The new one will be modern and propelled by an electric motor.

Railroad building is far from being at a standstill in the United States. During the first six months of this year 2,314 miles of new road have been built, which brings the total railway mileage in the country, says the Railway Age, to 201,839 miles. The record of railroad building during the current year is 500 miles ahead of that of last year.

Mrs. George E. Hobbs, of Bridgeport, Conn., recently secured a patent on a car truck which enables trains to round curves without lowering the speed, and also permits the substitution of a broken wheel without the necessity of running the car into a repair shop. The invention was recently inspected by two representatives of the Manhattan road of New York.

Engineer Frank G. Boomer has returned to Raton from Norfolk, Va., where he represented Raton division. No. 251, Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, at the biennial session of the Brotherhood. Mrs. Boomer, who accompanied him and who is an officer of the grand lodge, ladies' auxiliary to the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, is visiting in the east yet, but is expected home within a week.

The Raton Reporter says: H. J. Bennett, foreman of the Santa Fe shops at Trinidad, was over from Trinidad last week and removed his family to that city, where he has bought a handsome home. Mr. Bennett and family have resided in Raton for several years and have made many friends who regret their removal from here. They are, however, well pleased with their new home, where they are surrounded by all the comforts which make living a pleasure.

**Santa Fe Central Wires Work.**—Yesterday afternoon, for the first time, a message was flashed over the Santa Fe Central telegraph line. From the general offices at Santa Fe to the terminal station, Torrance, on the Rock Island-El Paso. A relay station is located at each of the many storehouses, that are located along the line for the convenience of securing supplies. Now that the telegraph line is working, the officers can issue their orders from Santa Fe. Six miles of the gradings have been finished. The company is now working 475 men and will increase the force, as the men can be secured until the force reaches 1,000.

**Switch Lamp Patent.**—Frank Benson, a tinner, left Topeka Tuesday evening for Kent, Ohio, where he is to look after matters in connection with the manufacture of his patent switch lamp. Benson is the author of a lamp which while burning for six days and nights continuously, gives a better light, it is believed, than any in this part of the country. It is for him made by the Coffman-Megath company, of Franklin, Pa., with which John Player, formerly superintendent of machinery of the Santa Fe, is associated. More than 4,000 of these burners are in use on the Santa Fe system and other roads are investing heavily in them all the time.

**New Gas Plant.**—A party of surveyors in the employ of the Pintach Gas company are at work east of the Pullman house at the Port Richmond, Cal., yards staking off the site for the Pintach gas plant, soon to be installed there. Hitherto the gas for lighting Pullman sleeping cars and Santa Fe day coaches at that place has been brought from Oakland in large tanks, and the idea of the company in establishing a plant there is to do away with the expense of transportation.

**Union is Organized.**—The boiler-makers at the Standard Oil works and Santa Fe machine shops at Point Richmond have organized a union. C. D. Rogers, of Oakland, state organizer, was present and assisted in the work. There was a large number of those interested present, all of whom signified their willingness to become members of the organization. The following were elected officers: M. Williber, president, and George F. Cusack, secretary. Another meeting will be held at an early date to elect the remaining officers and complete the organization.

**Rock Island Stock.**—At a meeting of the directors of the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railroad company, in New York, it was voted to distribute to stockholders 12½ per cent of their holdings in new stock at par. Transfer books will open on July 7 and close again on July 21. The stockholders of Peoria & Rock Island and the Burlington, Cedar Rapids & Northern were notified that the time during which they may exchange their stock for Rock Island stock had been extended to July 15.

### WHY RESSEGUE LEFT.

Disagreement Said to Have Been Concerning Maintenance.

The real reasons for the dismissal of General Superintendent C. F. Ressegue from the Santa Fe are gradually coming to the surface, in spite of the refusals of all of those in authority to make any statements concerning the matter, says the Topeka State Journal. The rumor is now that Mr. Ressegue's disagreement with Third Vice President Kendrick and the other officials was on the subject of track maintenance. Mr. Ressegue believed that

his chief duty was to make money for the road. It is claimed that to accomplish this object, he sacrificed to some extent the maintenance of the roadbed and general care of the interests entrusted to his charge. By this course, it is asserted he was able to make a record for small expenditures in his department, but that it was done at the expense of the condition of the road.

Those who think that the alleged deterioration of the road was the real cause of Mr. Ressegue's disagreement with the company say that the recent wrecks on the Chicago division can be attributed in several instances, at least, to the bad condition of the track and ties.

The officers of the company state that there is no truth in the published rumor that Mr. Ressegue was dismissed in order to conciliate Third Vice President Kendrick, and keep Mr. Kendrick in the employ of the company. They deny that there has been any clash between President Ripley and Mr. Kendrick.

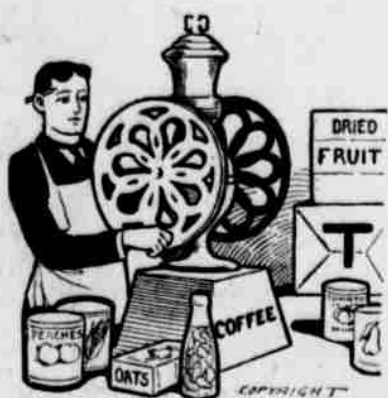

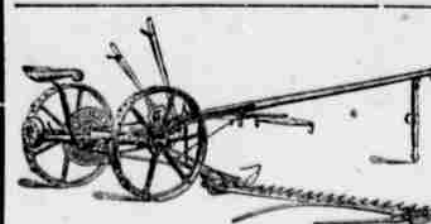
