At the election last Saturday, December 12th, the city of Pecos abolished its corporation by a vote of two to one.

There is an effective organization. After a long and hard fight against it, the wholesale and retail dealers of that place have submitted to the inevitable. Contrary to the usual the criminal courts backed up the law, and the suppression of the "red-bait" was accomplished. The crusade against this evil still continues and every place in the union has disapproved of it.

In view of the fact that before many years the Pecos Valley will be a point of direct line of railway between the Pacific Coast and Galveston this entire section should be much gratified at the encouraging prospects for the rebuilding of the Galveston harbor from a distance. And a means of advertising our own advantages for the winter tourist this occasion affords an unusual opportunity. Here is an opportunity for our commercial club to perform one of its functions, and thereby impart a little enthusiasm into its membership. Just a little organized effort and this matter can be accomplished to the satisfaction of everybody and the general good of the town.

The real appointee comes very highly recommended as a wise and upright legislator. His career, as outlined in the Argus of this week, shows him to be a man upon whom the people of his native state have showered many honors. We rejoice to hear this. One who has served his own constituents well and faithfully is more fitting to dispense justice among strangers than the ordinary carpet-bagger official, who is given foreign appointment because they can make no place for him at home. We will welcome Judge McMillan with pleasure. We prefer home rule, but if we can't have that then we want the best that can be secured, which seems to be true of the present appointee.

THURSDAY of last week the army bill, which, if it passes the senate, will continue the army upon the present basis until 1905, and establish the minimum force at 75,000, and which also enters upon the president the power to increase the number of soldiers to 100,000 at any time, was put through the house. It was attached an amendment completely abolishing the army "entire." Unmistakably the present administration will cling to the policy of imperialism tenaciously. The spirit of conquest seems to have seized upon the minds of the American people when they heard the sound of Dewey's guns in the bay of Manila, on that eventful May morning in 1898. For two years and more the masses of the people have enjoyed the sweet intoxication of conquest and hero worship. But what of the end? We became a nation with colonial possessions in a single day, but how many decades will suffice to solve the problems arising out of our "accidental" assumption of imperial proportions? Now that we must either take down the flag or subject our "white elephant" to discipline and obedience, in deciding upon the course to pursue it will be well to remember the fact, invariably corroborated in history, that empires crumble and fall when they become unwieldy or unable to extend to all subject provinces the privileges which they themselves enjoy. Can we subject the Philippines without harsh measures, and an indefinite going warfare? Can we civilize them while either of these exist?

### AN URGENT NEED.

The last two fires in Carlsbad have demonstrated clearly the inefficiency of the water service of our fire department. In all probability there is no one to blame. The fact as it may be due to lack of funds to attach fault to persons or organizations, but the spectacle of a well-organized company of volunteer fire fighters standing by, eager to stop the progress of the flames but unable to move to the point, is deplorable. In the extreme, one or two more fires like that recently enacted here will completely disgust the members of our fire department that it will be impossible to get their services for what little good they are enabled to do. It is very embarrassing to one to stand with a water hose in hand when the pressure is only sufficient to throw water over an ordinary picket fence, and several hundred people looking on in derision. Unless the enthusiasm and energy displayed by our fire fighters results in a successful securing of funds they are very likely to become discouraged and quit.

Carlsbad, being very compactly built, so far as the business houses are concerned, is likely to be visited with a widespread and disastrous conflagration at any time, unless we have better protection. And this same grouping of the business blocks renders it possible for the volunteers to give quick service, in the matter of getting to a point and placing their apparatus for work. With good water pressure we need never have a very destructive fire in the business portion of the town. In addition to the lessening of danger, the saving down of the insurance rates, which would surely follow the substantial improvement of our fire department work, would amount to a very considerable sum each year. Some action in this direction is not only essential, but absolutely necessary. This is no case for argument. The fact is something is wrong with the water, and it must be remedied. Carlsbad cannot afford to bear the ignominy of such a condition of affairs longer. The fault may be in the water system; it may be in the contract with the city, or it may be elsewhere. We do not attempt in this article to locate it, but certainly it exists.

It requires a quick mind to grasp all the railroad extension probabilities of today.
