CONGRATULATIONS

Nightingale's Birthday Remembered.

Five Persons Burned in a Hotel Fire.

Miners are Discussing the Question of the Hour.

LIQUID ASPHALT FOUND.

London, May 15.—Congratulations poured in today upon Miss Florence Nightingale, the famous Crimean war nurse, the occasion being her seventy-ninth birthday anniversary. There were a number of callers at her residence, all of whom were received and welcomed, although the health of the venerable heroine has been very poor for several years. The congratulations of the king and queen, in the form of autograph letters, were delivered to Miss Nightingale by special messenger. Dispatches couched in felicitous phrases were received also from Miss Clara Barton, the czar of Russia and other notables.

It is known that for years Miss Nightingale has been an invalid as a result of her experiences in the Crimea a half century ago. It is not so well known, however, that her sick room has been the scene of the most arduous and constant labor for the improvement of the health of the soldier. Although now confined to her bed a large part of the time, she always accorded a welcome to anyone who seeks advice on a question affecting the interests of the sick or those who nurse them. She is always cheerful and spends most of her time in reading.

FIVE LIVES LOST.

Grand Jurors Were Caught in a Burned Hotel.

Point Pleasant, W. Va., May 15.—The American hotel burned here last night. Five lives are known to be lost. Several adjoining buildings were also consumed. The loss will probably be \$30,000.

Among those who lost their lives are: John Slack, of Kanawha county; Elias Hambrick, Glenwood, Mason county, and John Woodall. All were farmers here as grand jurors.

DOWN TO WORK.

Miners Have Reached the Question of the Hour.

Hazleton, Pa., May 15.—The final report of the credentials committee at the convention of anthracite mine workers, called to decide the matter of a strike, was made this morning, after which the question of the hour was introduced by President Mitchell, in the form of an exhaustive report of the negotiations of the Civic Federation and presidents of the coal companies. The same impenetrable veil of secrecy surrounds the proceedings of the convention today. No doubt there will be many propositions introduced by delegates, and it is possible the debate on them will continue until tomorrow.

The convention took a recess from 12 to 1:30. The speeches up to 2:30 o'clock are said to be strongly in favor of a strike. None of the national officers of the organization addressed the convention. The gossip coming from the hall points strongly to a strike.

LIQUID ASPHALT FOUND.

Austin, Texas, May 15.—In the oil fields near here yesterday a drill in the well at a depth of 142 feet dropped into a lake of liquid asphalt which is so thick and heavy that further drilling is almost impossible. The heavy black stuff oozed up into the well quite a distance. It is said liquid asphalt has been found heretofore only at Trinidad.

THE VEGAS FESTIVAL.

Preparations for the May Music Festival Are Completed.

On Thursday and Friday, May 29 and 30, the most elaborate musical event given in New Mexico, will be given at East Las Vegas in the May Festival. Four soloists have been engaged and a large chorus has been well drilled. An orchestra of twenty instruments has been organized and a different oratorio will be given each evening. The moving spirit in the enterprise has been J. G. McNary, of the Normal school.

Death of Capt. Pratt.

A dispatch received in this city yesterday announced the sudden death in New York City on Monday last of Captain John Pratt, formerly a resident of New Mexico's capital and United States marshal of New Mexico under the administrations of President U. S. Grant. It will be remembered that but a few months ago the deceased was married to Mrs. Teresa Symington, widow of the late Dr. John Symington—New Mexican.

Big Tent.

Another large crowd assembled at the big tent last night. The interest in the meetings continues to grow. The meetings will be continued indefinitely. In the afternoons from 4 to 5 at the Lead Avenue Methodist Episcopal

church and in the evening at the big tent from 7:30 to 10 the meetings are held. Tomorrow night, Mr. Smith, the evangelist, will sing "My Ain Country," a song dear to every Scottish heart. Mr. Smith is a Scotchman and is proud of it, and is likely to do the song justice.

OSCAR BEEBE DEAD.

He Died Suddenly Last Night—Was Buried Today.

Oscar P. Beebe, of Chicago, who died last night at his rooms at 697 South Edith street, was buried this afternoon at 3 o'clock. The funeral services were held at the house. Interment was made at Fairview cemetery. The deceased came to Albuquerque about a month ago, accompanied by his wife and her parents. Mr. Beebe was suffering from consumption and thought that in southern California he might find relief. He spent about three weeks in California and finding that his health was growing worse, returned to Albuquerque. He arrived yesterday morning on No. 2. Last night he was seized with a hemorrhage and in fifteen minutes was dead. The deceased was born at Jonesville, Mich., and was 37 years old. He was a cigarmaker by trade and quite prominent. He was at one time president of the Cigarmakers' union of North America, and also served as president of the Iowa State Federation of Labor.

The members of Albuquerque Cigarmakers' union attended the funeral in a body.

GRAND MONUMENT.

Indiana Dedicated a \$600,000 Memorial at Indianapolis.

MAGNIFICENT STRUCTURE.

Indianapolis, Ind., May 15.—With bright sunshine and blue skies, with a grand parade of citizens, soldiers, with teeming crowds, and in the presence of a distinguished company the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' monument was dedicated today. It was a gala day in the city. Thousands of veterans here for the annual state G. A. R. encampment took part in the dedicatory ceremonies. The stars and stripes floated from all the public buildings, and from hundreds of private residences.

The ceremonies began at 10 o'clock. The speakers' rostrum, on the north side of the monument, was handsome, decorated with shields, coats and arms and large brass figures. All the hotels, club houses and other buildings facing the circle were decorated with flags and bunting. Rev. D. R. Lucas, past chaplain-in-chief of the G. A. R., opened the exercises with an impressive invocation. Then, came an address by the presiding officer, Major General Lew Wallace, Major G. V. Menzies, on behalf of the board of control, presented the monument to the state, for whom it was formally accepted by Governor Winfield T. Durbin. Following these addresses came the dedicatory ritualistic services under the auspices of the Grand Army. The oration of the day was delivered by General John W. Foster. The exercises were brought to a close with a poem written for the occasion by James Whitcomb Riley.

This afternoon came the spectacular feature of the dedication in the form of a monster military parade. The parade embraced the procession of the Grand Army veterans from all parts of the state and was one of the most imposing military demonstrations ever seen in the city. The line formed shortly after 1 o'clock at the entrance of the state house under the direction of General James R. Caninehan. The various divisions included, besides the Grand Army veterans, a number of companies of state militia, cadets and a band from the Soldiers' Orphan's home at Knights, the famous Black Horse troop from the Culver Military academy, the Seventeenth Mounted Infantry and various other military and semi-military organizations. An interesting feature was the torn and tattered battleflags of the various Indiana regiments.

Washington street, Pennsylvania avenue and other thoroughfares included in the line of march were thronged with spectators, who cheered the veterans and young soldiers enthusiastically. The reviewing stand was located on the north side of the monument. Conspicuous among those occupying seats on the stand were General Eli Torrance, commander-in-chief of the G. A. R., and Governor Durbin, surrounded by his staff.

The monument unveiled today is probably the handsomest memorial of its kind in the country. In 1887 the state legislature made an appropriation of \$600,000 for the monument and its construction occupied nearly ten years. It is an imposing shaft of Indiana white stone and in height is surpassed only by the Washington monument at the national capital. It is capped by an allegorical figure fifteen feet in height. An added attractiveness is given by the magnificent approaches which occupied a space of nearly four acres. About the base are magnificent fountains and huge bronze groups. The memorial itself occupied a conspicuous position in the public park known as the Circle in the very heart of the business district. So lofty is the shaft that it is the first thing seen by visitors approaching the city from any direction.

STRIKE IN SWEDEN.

New York, May 15.—The new home of the naval branch of the Young Men's Christian association, located near the Brooklyn navy yard, was dedicated today with interesting ceremonies in which many persons of prominence participated.

The institution is a gift to the association from Miss Helen Gould. It represents an outlay of close to \$1,000,000 for building and site. It is seven stories in height and on the roof is a magnificent open-air garden. In its spacious interior are library, reading rooms, gymnasium, assembly halls, reception rooms and other features to make the institution complete.

The dedicatory exercises included addresses by Rev. Newell Dwight Hillis, Rev. Dr. Theodore L. Cuyler, Rear Admiral A. S. Barker, Rear Admiral F. J. Higginson and Colonel John J. McCook. Throughout the day the building was thronged with sailors and marines from the Brooklyn, the Indiana, the Buffalo and other warships now at the Brooklyn navy yard.

WERE SMUGGLED OUT.

American Officers in Canada Outwitted By a Detective.

Quebec, May 15.—Colonel John F. Gaynor, and Captain B. D. Greene who came to Canada from Savannah, Ga., during their trial there for alleged complicity in frauds against the government, were smuggled out of Quebec today by an American detective.

PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY.

One Hundred and Fourteenth Session Opened in New York.

New York, May 15.—The one hundred and fourteenth Presbyterian general assembly was called to order by the moderator, Rev. Henry C. Minton, D. D., at 11 o'clock today in the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian church. At 9 o'clock the chapel was opened to receive the credentials of the commissioners and alternates, and from that hour until the assembly convened, Rev. Dr. William H. Roberts, the stated clerk, was kept busy distributing badges and assigning the delegates to their places. The galleries of the edifice were crowded to suffocation when the opening hymn was sung, the spectators joining with the commissioners and alternates in their rendition of the anthem. Spacious though it is, the church was not large enough to accommodate the crowds and many were turned away.

The various local and subcommittees are quartered in the chapel, and adequate arrangements have been made by those committees for the proper entertainment of the visitors. The sermon of the retiring moderator, Dr. Minton, occupied the entire morning session and at its conclusion the assembly adjourned until a late hour this afternoon to prepare for the election of a new moderator, the most important practical business of the day. Of the several candidates in the field no one seems to have a decisive lead and all forecasts as to the outcome of the election are purely problematical.

The most important business will be the report of the committee on revision of faith, which will probably be debated May 23.

BUSINESS SUSPENDED.

A General Strike in Stockholm to Influence Parliament.

Stockholm, Sweden, May 15.—The general strike decreed by the social democratic party in support of the suffrage bill, the debate on which begins in parliament today, was carried out as arranged and the tie-up of business is practically complete. Traffic generally is suspended. Street cars, cabs, vans, cars and steamers are not running and no work is going on in any factories or shops. The strike will last throughout the parliamentary debate.

Stars on the Flag.

Professor Tight gave a lecture on statehood at the university one day this week, and at the close asked the assembled pupils how many stars there were on the American flag. "Forty-five," was the prompt reply. "How many will there be at the close of the present term of congress?" asked the professor. "Forty-five" came the response, which is conclusive evidence that the university students are not sanguine about the passage of the omnibus statehood bill.

In El Paso.

W. T. McCreight, manager and city editor of the Albuquerque Citizen, came in on the Santa Fe this morning and is transacting business here today.

Under the management of Hughes & McCreight the Citizen has increased in size and journalistic value until it now has no superior in the territory.—News.

Fighters Arrested.

The four men who were arrested for fighting at Nelson's camp No. 1 were taken to Las Cruces yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Ryerson. The men showed the effects of their fierce combat. As Nelson's camp is situated just across the New Mexico border they were sent to Dona Ana county for punishment.

The report of another fight in an Arizona camp was current on the streets yesterday. It was said that a crowd of workmen near Benson got drunk and in the fight that ensued three of them were seriously injured, but the particulars of the difficulty could not be ascertained.—El Paso Times.

Trying to Compromise.

Port Au Prince, May 15.—A delegation sent by the provisional government of Hayti started today to Cape Haytien to endeavor to arrive at an agreement with leaders of the northern revolutionary force and prevent a civil war.

To all of his friends Mr. Eakin said he was compelled to kill Smith in self defense and there was nothing else for him to do. It was either kill Smith or be killed. Mr. Eakin spent a part of his time at the wholesale house of Melini & Eakin.

Application will be made to Judge Mills at Las Vegas to admit him to bail and it is expected he will return here in a day or two.

THEY WILL AGREE

New Rates on the Live Stock.

A Fire Wiped Out an Entire Family.

Large Sum Paid for the Philadelphia Record Today.

FIRE IN IOWA.

Chicago, May 15.—Representatives of western railroads today promised the interstate commerce commission to agree to an equalization of livestock and dressed beef tariffs which would be satisfactory to the Chicago livestock exchange. The agreement must be reached by June 10 and must be in effect by June 30. This result was effected at today's meeting of the interstate commerce commission, called for the purpose of investigating the allegation made by the livestock exchange that the rate on livestock is proportionately higher than the dressed beef rate from the Missouri river east, the same being a discrimination unjust to Chicago packers and livestock men.

A FATAL FIRE.

An Entire Family was Wiped Out of Existence.

Laurel, Neb., May 15.—John Jacobson, his wife and infant child were burned to death and William Snyder, a clerk, and another Jacobson, a child 6 years of age, were seriously burned in a fire in the living rooms over Jacobson's implement store early today.

RECORD WAS SOLD.

Controlling Interest in the Philadelphia Paper Brought \$2,300,000.

Philadelphia, Pa., May 15.—By order of the United States court 9,050 shares of 10,000 shares of the Philadelphia Record Publishing company was sold at auction today. William S. Stenger of Philadelphia, bought the stock at \$230,000. Mr. Stenger also bought \$470,000 of the issue of \$500,000 6 per cent bonds of the Record company, paying \$654,000 therefor.

When asked who he represented in the transaction Mr. Stenger smilingly answered: "Myself," and declined to say anything further. Mr. Stenger is a lawyer. There was a large attendance at the sale, newspaper owners from other cities being among those present.

Fire in Iowa.

Des Moines, Iowa, May 15.—The town of Harlin, Green county, was visited by a conflagration last night that wiped out the entire business section, entailing a loss estimated at more than \$40,000.

NO HISTORIES.

House Objects to Buying Any of Macclay's Works.

Washington, May 15.—The senate amendment to the agricultural appropriation bill was disagreed to by the house today and the bill sent to conference.

By unanimous consent a bill was passed opening to homestead entry the extensive Ute tract in Colorado, embracing about 9,000,000 acres.

The appropriation bill was then taken up, an agreement having been made

extending the general debate until 4 p. m. today.

Mr. Mudd, of Maryland, gave notice he would move an amendment to the bill, prohibiting the use of any money carried in the naval bill to purchase Macclay's history, the animadversions in it against Admiral Schley being responsible, in his opinion, for the court of inquiry. If the history had been clear of partisan feeling, he said, and had the historian accepted the high-minded thought pronounced by Schley that there is "Glory enough for all," the American nation would not be the butt of criticism among the naval officers of the world.

The Senate.

Washington, May 15.—The senate passed the bill for a union railway station in Washington.

Several propositions to amend the bill were defeated. The senate agreed to a conference on the agricultural bill. The conference report on the omnibus claims bill was presented, the conference being unable to agree on the Selfridge board claims.

The Proctor amendment relating to gun carriages was modified and accepted. The fortifications bill then passed and the Philippine government bill was taken up.

An effort was made to fix a time to vote on the Philippine bill, but it was unsuccessful. Mr. McLauren then addressed the senate in opposition to the bill.

Harry R. Elwell will be the new clerk at the Hotel Highland after June 1.

The sulphur hot springs in the northern part of this county are in excited condition over the internal disturbances in the tropics, and we may have an active volcano in sight of the city when the territorial fair is held.

NEEDS PUSHING.

The St. Louis Globe-Democrat says that the passage in the house of the bill to admit Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona to statehood will give great encouragement to the friends of that measure. It is believed, however, that the opposition in the senate will be stronger than it was in the other branch, and there is a possibility that the bill will not be reached in that body during the present session, which is likely to end in June or July. The enactment of the bill during the short session next winter would serve all practical purposes, although the sooner it is passed the better it will be for the communities directly concerned, and the better, too, the political proprieties will be served.

PASSAGE OF STATEHOOD BILL.

The Denver Republican says: The house did well in passing the bill for the admission of New Mexico, Arizona and Oklahoma. The measure was combated somewhat vigorously by certain prominent members, and its fate in the senate is doubtful; but there is no question that it ought to become a law at this session.

The opposition of republicans to this bill on political grounds is altogether unwise. New Mexico and Oklahoma are republican, and while Arizona may be democratic at present, there is no assurance that it will remain so. The republican party would gain at least four senators and the democrats at the most only two. Mr. Grosvenor, of Ohio, who opposed the bill on partisan grounds, should have made better inquiry into the political situation in the proposed states, and we hope that the same error will not be committed by any republican member of the senate.

To keep these territories out any longer than may be necessary for them to adopt constitutions and otherwise comply with the conditions of the enabling acts would be a great wrong and injustice to their inhabitants, who are today deprived of the right of self-government. They are fully equipped in population and the valuation of taxable property for the maintenance of state governments, and no good purpose whatsoever would be served by excluding them any longer.

In the matter of population it should be remembered that they are much stronger than some of the now powerful states were when they were admitted. According to the census of 1900 the population of Arizona was 122,931, of New Mexico 195,310 and of Oklahoma 398,321. Ohio was admitted in 1803 and according to the census of 1800 it had a population of only 45,365. This was but little more than one-third the population of Arizona at the last census. It was less than one-fourth the population of New Mexico, and but little more than one-ninth the population

of Oklahoma in 1900. Certainly no Ohio man has a right to object to the admission of a state which has nearly nine times as many inhabitants as his state had when it came into the Union.

The republican members of congress should have some regard for the wishes and the views of the members of the same party in the far west. Republicans residing in this part of the country are strongly in favor of admitting the proposed three states, and they understand the situation much better than people living in the east. Right and justice and the interests of the republican party in the far west alike demand that these states be allowed to come in.

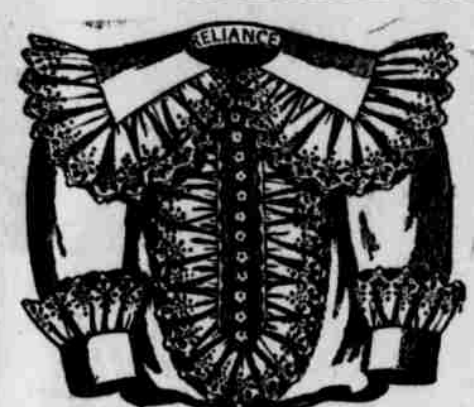

A Black Knight.

The death of Sir William Conrad
Reeves is recorded. He was the first
gentleman of color to receive the dis-
tinction of knighthood and to occupy
the position of a British chief justice.
He was, according to "Whittaker's
Peerage," born in 1841, and married, in
1885, Margaret, nee Rudder. In early
life he came from the Barbadoes to
England, entered the Middle Temple,
was called in 1863, and after returning
to the West Indies practiced for some
time at the bar. He became attorney
general in St. Vincent in 1867, was ap-
pointed queen's counsel in 1883, in
1886 was made chief justice of Bar-
badoes, and in 1889 received the honor
of knighthood.

SUTHERLAND DEAD.

Died of Pneumonia Contracted While Fighting a Fire.

A few minutes after 7 o'clock this morning the spirit of Eugene Sutherland, late captain of the city fire department, passed to its Maker. The deceased was sick only ten days. Death was caused by pneumonia which developed from a severe cold contracted at a fire on South Edith street. He leaves a wife and one child, a boy about 7 years old. The body will be held until tomorrow night, when Mrs. Sutherland will arrive from Grand Rapids, Mich.

Captain Sutherland came to Albuquerque about two years ago and was for a while in the employ of the Santa Fe at the freight depot. When the Albuquerque city fire department was organized, in June, 1900, Mr. Sutherland was recommended to Chief Ruppe as a man of experience and was installed as captain of the new department, and has since occupied that position. In a number of instances the deceased captain has distinguished himself as a fire fighter. The captain was a member in good standing of the Masons and also of the Foresters, in which lodge he carried \$1,000 insurance policy. It is probable that the funeral will be Masonic and held in this city. At present the remains are lying at O. W. Strong & Sons' undertaking parlors.

STORY OF NEW GOVERNOR.

How Lieutenant Brodie Captured Band of Indians Twenty-Two Years Ago.

Twenty-two years ago Colonel Brodie was a lieutenant in the army stationed at Fort Thomas near the San Carlos Indian reservation. At that time the Apaches were warlike and threatening. In counting up the Apaches on the reservation one time the commanding officer discovered that some sixty bucks were out without leave. In those days that simply meant that a band of Apaches were out on a murdering trip.

The officer ordered Lieutenant Brodie to take a company of men and go out and bring the Indians in. The lieutenant, being a young man, full of vigor and courage, selected one man whom he could rely upon, and started out on his dangerous mission. On reaching the point where the Indians were stationed, young Brodie and his solitary soldier presented themselves to the chief. The old Apache was mad at being interfered with, and told Brodie that he proposed to kill him and his companion. Colonel Brodie, realizing that to show the least evidence of fear meant death, the young officer told the chief that he had come to take him back to the reservation. The big chief looked disdainfully at the soldiers, and again informed the officer to prepare for death. Lieutenant Brodie, without further parley, pulled out a revolver and shot the chief dead, and then, in a commanding tone ordered the sixty Apaches to fall in, which they did, and marched sullenly back to the reservation under the command of Lieutenant Brodie.

Negotiations are about completed for the sale of the Cincinnati mine in the Tres Hermanos district to the owners of the Golden Cross and Eagle properties.

It is now nearly a month since W. E. Mitchell, the contractor and builder, has disappeared from Deming and not a word has been heard of his whereabouts.

County Surveyor George Brown, of Grant county, has started out with several assistants to make a survey of the boundary line between the counties of Luna and Grant. Substantial monuments are to be erected along the line.

MEAT QUESTION SETTLED.

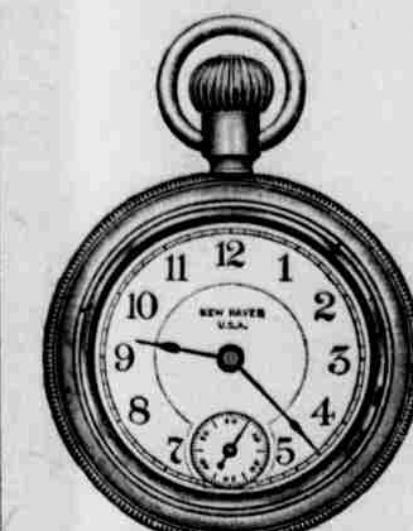

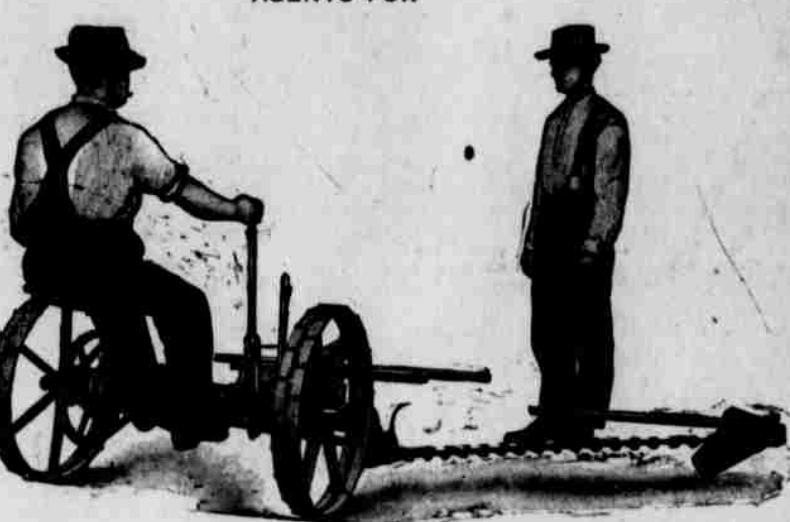
