Mr. Koch and Mr. Smellie were welcomed as full time members of the faculty for this year.

President Zimmerman discussed briefly his views on University finances for the coming year and stated that he was of the opinion that the outlook this year would be better than that of the year just closed. New building possibilities were mentioned, and a hope for considerable expansion was expressed.

MEETING OF THE GENERAL FACULTYOF THEUNIVERSITY OF NEW MEXICO

The second meeting of the General Faculty of the University of New Mexico for the academic year, 1933-34, was held in Rodey Hall on Friday, January 19, 1934, at 4:10 o'clock P. M.

The minutes of the faculty meeting held on September 13, 1933, were approved.

Dr. Zimmerman commented upon the written reports which he had received from the chairmen of the various committees. He stated that he would check over the reports and discuss any matters of importance at the next general faculty meeting.

President Zimmerman spoke briefly regarding the recognition of the University by the Association of American Universities. He stated that the faculty had had an important part in bringing about the approval of the University by that Association at this time.

Dean Shannon of the College of Arts and Sciences presented the following recommendations and moved their adoption:

1. That the statement in the general catalog regarding examinations for advanced standing be amended by the addition of the following provisions:

- (1) Such examinations will be given only to those students with a scholarship index of two or more on all work taken up to the time of applying for the examination.
- (2) An examination will not be given until after a student has been in residence carrying a full program of work for one semester.

The motion was seconded and passed.

2. That the following statement regarding acceptance toward the Bachelor's degree of work completed in professional schools be approved:

A candidate for the Bachelor's degree in the College of Arts and Sciences may offer, in lieu of the last 30 hours at the University of New Mexico, the full first year's work, satisfactorily passed and properly certified, of a class A medical college, or of an approved school of law, requiring in each case three years for entrance, provided

- (1) That written notice of this intention be submitted to the Dean before the end of the Junior year.
- (2) That 30 of the Junior hours (61-94) shall have been taken in residence at the University of New Mexico.



- (3) That, before entrance into the professional school, the candidate shall have completed all specific and group requirements; and major and minor requirements in accordance with University regulations and to the satisfaction of the heads of the Departments concerned.
- (4) That at least 75 per cent of the hours completed before entrance into the professional school shall have been of C grade or better, and that the total of grade points shall at least equal the total number of hours completed.

The motion was seconded and passed.

3. That the following proposal of Mr. Kunkel of the Music Department be considered:

Recommendation  
regarding Band  
and P. E. credit

At the present time only four hours may be earned in ensemble music and none of these credits may be earned during the Freshman year. It is now approved that Freshman and Sophomore students who enroll for Band and make a grade of C or better may be exempted from Physical Education for this work, semester for semester. The class would meet three times per week, twice for Band practice, once for drill. It is understood that no credit for Band will be allowed in the Sophomore year if Physical Education exemption is granted for this work.

The motion was seconded and passed.

4. That the petition of Daniel Mater to receive the two degrees of B. A. and B. S. upon completion of at least 30 hours beyond the normal baccalaureate requirement and two majors and two minors be granted.

5. That the petition of Jean Finnell to be allowed to complete a combined minor in Flute and Piano be granted. It was seconded by Dr. Pearce and passed by the Faculty.

6. That the faculty express its approval of the following statement drawn up by the Committee on Entrance and Credits regarding the acceptance of credit earned in other institutions of higher learning in the state:

- I. Subject to the fulfillment of the requirements for admission to the University of New Mexico, the University of New Mexico grants advanced standing, par value, for credits originating in:

New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts,  
State College

if the courses are the same as or equivalent to those offered as required or elective courses in the University of New Mexico.

- II. In addition to the general regulations with reference to all



transferred credits, the following provisions apply specifically to the

New Mexico Military Institute, Roswell  
 New Mexico Normal University, Las Vegas  
 New Mexico School of Mines, Socorro  
 New Mexico State Teachers College, Silver City

- A. After a student has fully met the requirements for admission to the University of New Mexico, acceptable courses, to the extent of 64 semester hours of Freshman and Sophomore work, may be established by a satisfactory record in the University for one semester or two summer sessions.
- B. Beyond 64 semester hours, acceptable courses may be established by any of the following methods:
  1. By an average of B in a full program of study at the University of New Mexico during one semester or two summer sessions;
  2. By satisfactory grades (C or better) in more advanced courses in any subject in which credit is sought;
  3. By special examinations.
- C. In handling credits for extension work, such further regulations may be made from time to time as may seem necessary.
- D. All questions arising in connection with the evaluation of credits presented which are not fully covered by the above principles will be individually handled by the Committee on Entrance and Credits.

III. Montezuma College has recently been re-established. For the present, its credits in courses known to be adequately planned and taught may be established at the University of New Mexico either by examination or by the satisfactory completion of advanced work in the same departments, with doubtful or exceptional cases handled individually in the light of available information.

The motion was seconded by <sup>Dean</sup> Dr. Nanninga and passed by the faculty.

The Registrar was authorized by President Zimmerman to notify all of the institutions of higher learning in other states in regard to the action of the Committee on Entrance and Credits. The Registrar was also instructed to send the notice of the faculty action to the College Blue Book and to the American Association of Collegiate Registrars.

Dr. Haught of the Graduate School read a statement which had been passed by the Graduate Committee regarding changes to be made in the general catalog. The changes are as follows:

ADMISSION. Rewritten so that the following working plan may be applied to institutions not accredited by a recognized regional accrediting agency, and to professional institutions: (1) each

case will be considered on its merits, including such factors as scholarship and balanced program; (2) Undergraduate requirement in departments in which further graduate work is done, must be brought up to the requirements of the University of New Mexico; (3) The credits will not be validated until at least one semester or two summer sessions have been completed.

DISTRIBUTION OF WORK. "Work which is to count towards a master's degree cannot be chosen from more than three departments, and not more than two-thirds of the work for the degree can be earned in the major field. The credits may all be earned in the same department, provided that at least ten hours are done in fields that are separate and distinct from the major field. The whole program must be approved and directed by the major professor. Each candidate shall earn at least ten hours in courses open to graduates only. These will usually consist of six hours in the thesis and four hours in problem work or other courses numbered above 200."

QUALITY OF WORK. An average of B changed to require two-thirds of the work of A and B quality. Instead of limiting the time for the completion of the work for the degree, courses completed five years prior to the time of the oral examination will not be accepted.

RESIDENCE. Same as before with exceptions made to instructors on the teaching staff and to graduates of the University of New Mexico, who may do half of their work in other institutions and have the residence reduced to one-half year.

EXTENSION. "The University offers no graduate work by extension and it does not accept any from other institutions."

DEGREES OFFERED. "The degrees of Master of Arts and Master of Science are offered by the Graduate School. The degree of Master of Arts is conferred upon students who major in economics, education, English, history, Latin, political science, or Spanish. The degree of Master of Science is conferred upon students who major in biology or geology. The degree of Master of Arts or Master of Science, depending upon the nature of the work or upon the choice of the students, is conferred upon students who major in anthropology, chemistry, mathematics, physics or psychology."

Dr. Haught also reported that the Special Committee appointed to set the final date for the completion of all work for students included in the June graduating class had decided on December 1 instead of December 31.

The above motions made by Dr. Haught were seconded by Dr. St. Clair and passed by the faculty.

Dean Farris of the College of Engineering read the following point system:

#### PROPOSED POINT SYSTEM

Proposed point system

A point system having the following values is recommended to the General Faculty and if adopted will become effective with the beginning of the school year 1934-35:



### POINTS

A-3; B-2; C-1; D, I, X, F - 0

### REPORTS

Each instructor will furnish a mid-semester and a final report to the Registrar, listing grades for all students in each subject.

### PROBATION

I. A student is placed on probation:

1. If he makes grades of X or F in one-half of the hours carried.
2. If he fails to score three-fourths as many grade points as hours carried.
3. If the points accumulated at the end of a semester total less than the hours accumulated towards graduation.

A student placed on probation will remain on probation until the next final examination period.

II. A student (other than a freshman) on probation is recommended for suspension at the end of a semester:

1. If the points earned for the semester total less than one-half the hours carried.
2. If he makes grades of X or F in more than one-half of the hours carried.
3. If the points accumulated at the end of a semester total less than three-fourths the hours accumulated towards graduation.

III. No Freshman shall be suspended at the end of his first semester in school, but he may be suspended by either rule 1 or rule 2 above at the end of the first nine-weeks' period of his second semester, or by any one of the rules 1, 2 or 3 above at the end of his second semester.

The remainder of the scholarship regulations as given in the present catalogue are unchanged.

### GRADUATION

In order to graduate from any college in the University, a student must earn a total number of points in the hours offered for graduation equal to the total number of hours.

### RANKING

All honors and prizes depending upon scholarship will be determined by ranking the students according to a scholarship index:

$$\text{Index} = \frac{\text{Total points earned}}{\text{Total hours towards graduation}}$$

Transfer students from accredited institutions will receive credit for all acceptable work, if their scholarship index is equal to one or more. If their index is less than one, courses with low marks will be eliminated in sufficient quantity to make index equal to or greater than one.

Only students with a scholarship index of two or more will be allowed to take advanced standing examinations.

That all honors and prizes depending upon scholarship should be determined by ranking the students according to a scholarship index. The index is equal to the total points earned divided by the total hours taken. ✓

Dr. Kercheville, Chairman of the Special Committee to revise the Foreign Language requirement, read the following report of the Committee:

Fourteen credit hours are required in one foreign language.

For students who present one unit in a foreign language and who elect to continue the same language, this requirement is reduced to ten credit hours to be earned in courses above the first semester's work in the elementary course.

For students who present a minimum of two or two and one-half units in one foreign language, this requirement is reduced to six credit hours. Students who present a minimum of three units in one foreign language will be excused from further requirements in foreign language if they choose to prepare for and pass a satisfactory examination establishing their proficiency in the language in question.

The report was passed by the faculty.

Dean Knode presented the Calendar. He stated that this year the dates for the field schools were included. Dean Knode moved the acceptance of the calendar, which was seconded by Dr. Shannon and passed by the faculty.

Dr. Mitchell spoke briefly concerning the Memorial Day exercises.

Mr. Reid presented a petition from Mr. Eduardo Torres in which he requested that he be given credit for Biology 41e taken by extension in Socorro in the spring of 1933.

"I respectfully petition that I be considered as having complied with the spirit, if not the letter, of the senior residence requirements, and be granted graduation accordingly. The circumstances are as follows:



"I transferred 76 hours here and subsequently established 17 hours by examinations for advanced standing. This makes a total of 93 hours and might be considered as giving me senior standing. If it is so considered, then the 31 hours which I actually took in courses here would satisfy in full the senior residence requirement.

"It is true that some of the examinations for advanced standing were taken subsequent to some of the residence work, but for the most part they covered material on which I was wholly or partly prepared when I came here. I hope that the faculty will choose to consider my 31 hours as senior work and to permit my graduation on that ground."

The petition was passed by the faculty.

Dean Shannon presented, in the form of a motion, the case of Paul Benedict, who asked that 58 hours of Freshman work be accepted toward his hours required for graduation. The motion was seconded and passed by the faculty.
