Few people have any idea of the
enormity of the insurance business of
the United States. It not only exceeds
that of any other country, but is twice
as great that of the rest of the
world combined.

China is the great slave country of
the world. Of the population of 400,-
000,000 there are slaves to the number
of 10,000,000. Every family of means
keeps its girl slaves, and a man's posi-
tion is usually gauged by the number
he keeps.

Industrial prosperity has started the
tide of immigration from Europe to
this country again. In the first two
months of the present year 48,000 im-
migrants landed at New York, against
35,000 during the corresponding months
of last year.

The army officers are about to estab-
lish a system of wireless telegraphy
from post to post across Alaska. It is
stated that a system—as been in opera-
tion between Alcatraz island and Fort
Mason for nearly two years and gives
perfect satisfaction.

The United States is the only coun-
try in the world which has more than
one city of over 1,000,000 people. She
has three now—New York, Chicago
and Philadelphia—and she will have
another in 1910 if Boston's annexation
plans are carried out.

A change is certainly needed at Las
Vegas. The Record says: "With the
city treasury bankrupt and the taxa-
tion levy almost up to the limit allow-
ed by law, the taxpayers of Las Vegas
are asked to continue this deplorable
condition by electing the demo-citizens
ticket once more."

Since 1898 a fleet of battle ships,
cruisers and torpedo boats stronger
than the two fleets that conquered the
ships of Spain, has been added to the
American navy. The new fleet con-
tains thirteen battle ships, six armored
cruisers, three semiarmored cruisers,
six protected cruisers, four monitors,
twenty-three torpedo boats, sixteen tor-
pedo boat destroyers, and seven sub-
marine boats—in all seventy-eight ves-
sels. Of these vessels five battle ships,
twelve destroyers, twenty-three tor-
pedo boats and four "submarines" have
been completed and many of the other
vessels will be finished this year.

THE IRRIGATION QUESTION.

If the report that comes from Wash-
ington be correct that the people of
the east in general, and the railroad
corporations and the cattle barons of
the west in particular, are fighting
national irrigation, it can only be at-
tributed to ignorance in one instance
and to extreme selfishness in the other.
We can all understand why the cattle
barons should oppose the measure.
They want to retain the public domain
for their own use and benefit ex-
clusively. Why the railroads doing
business in the west should oppose
irrigation we cannot understand. Ir-
rigation would increase population,
and the greater the population the
greater the volume of business that
the railroads would inevitably be called
upon to transact.

Already our great cities are over-

crowded and the tendency to rush from
the country to the city is not balanced
by a tendency of city people to go to
the country. New homes in the west
will help check the flood flowing into
the cities from the farms and will
start the stream of migration from
the city to the country. These new
homes can only be provided by the
reclamation of the arid lands of the
west, and reclamation to be follow-
ed by settlement can only be accom-
plished by government control of the
waters coming from the mountains,
the conservation of waste waters, and
the reservation of the lands to be re-
claimed for actual settlers.

As in all great enterprises and great
reforms there are conflicting interests
involved in the policy of irrigation.
The great cattle companies want to
hold possession of the lands for grazing
purposes. The settlement of people
on the lands is a policy obnoxious
to them. They desire to secure control
of millions of acres upon which no
farmer could ever settle. They would
get rich, of course, but the region
would not increase in population.

THE TRUSTS.

The census bureau's report on trusts
while incomplete puts some facts to-
gether concerning these combinations
in an illuminating way. About one-
tenth of the manufacturing product of
the United States comes from trusts.
The term does not include all great
corporations, nor corporations control-
ling a large number of plants which
have grown up with the expansion of
the corporation's business, but only
those corporations that have been
formed out of a number of smaller cor-
porations and are combinations in fact.
There are nineteen different trusts in
chemicals, twenty-three in food prod-
ucts, twenty-nine in beverages, six-
teen in copper and other metals, eight
in paper, six in leather, etc. Over 2,-
000 plants are controlled by trusts.

CUT ALMOST IN TWO.

Railroad Man, Unfamiliar With Yards,
Gives Order That Causes
His Death.

H. Quinn, a Santa Fe switchman
was killed in the yards at Trinidad on
Sunday night. Quinn, who went to that
city a few days ago, was unfamiliar
with the yards and did not know the
location of many blind switches. While
placing a car of ties at the head of a
number of coal cars, by means of a
flying switch, Quinn signalled the en-
gineer to go ahead and ran the engine
over one of the blind switches directly
in the path of the car of ties. The car
struck the engine on the pilot, where
Quinn was riding and cut him almost
in two. The engineer and fireman ran
around to his assistance. His head and
body were hanging from between the
cars. Quinn looked at them and said:
"For God's sake, boys, get me out of
this." In an instant he was dead.

An inquest was held but the jury de-
clared they were unable to fix any re-
sponsibility for the accident. Quinn
leaves a wife and four children and
has a mother and two brothers in Kan-
sas.

great convention at Colorado Springs
next fall instead of holding three
smaller conventions at different dates.
We believe that we can accomplish
more by uniting our efforts than we
can separately. Our demands will have
more weight with congress in any leg-
islation that we may desire, when
backed by our great association."

At Trinero, a mining camp, 18 miles from Trinidad, where the Whites and Dominico live, the affair has created no little excitement and dire threats have been made against the Mexican by the townspeople. The authorities state that if he is caught and imprisoned in that place they will not answer for the actions of the citizens.

Dominico, who is a wealthy Mexican, paid attention to the young girl, it is alleged, against her parents' wishes for some time before her disappearance on February 28. Dominico, it is said, has not been seen since until last Saturday, when he returned to Trinero. He was asked concerning the girl by a few of his friends who saw him. He denied having seen her since his departure from the city in February, and left the town before an officer with a warrant could reach him. The officers are doing everything in their power to locate him and many individuals are searching for the girl. It is claimed by the Mexicans that Dominico is in the habit of leaving the town for months at a time and that no one knows where he is during these periods.

An information charging abduction has been filed against Dominico.

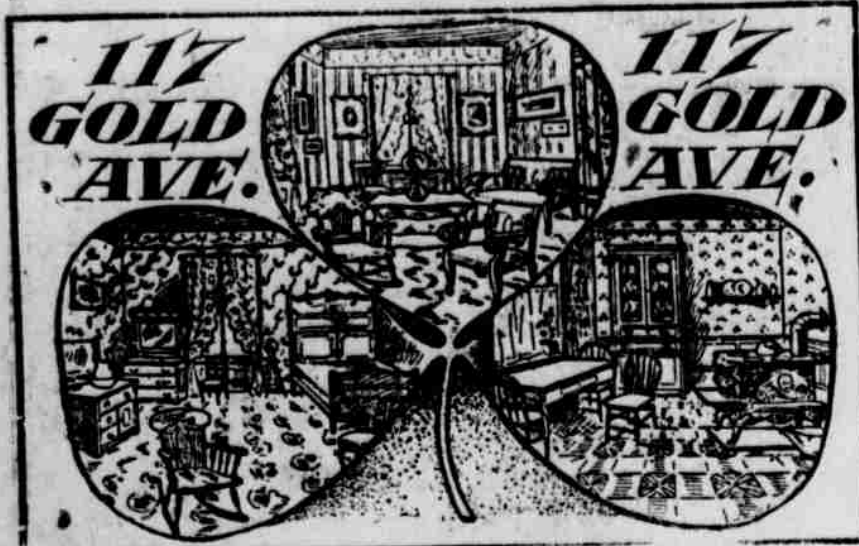

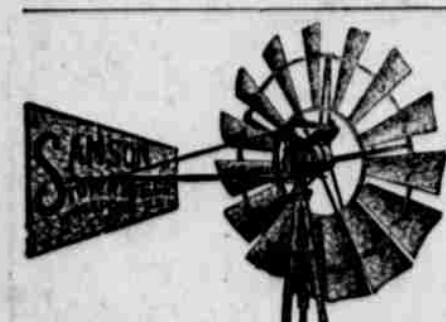

THE DECISION.**Judge Baker's Ruling as to the
Registration Law.****EXPIRED MARCH 27.**

In the cases of George W. Harrison vs. Board of Registration of Fourth ward, and L. H. Chamberlin vs. Boards of Registration of all four wards, the court yesterday, after hearing the evidence and argument, sustained the contention of the plaintiffs and by its order enjoined the respective boards from in any manner changing the registration lists as they appeared at the close of Thursday, March 27, by either adding names thereto, to be added to the revised list to be delivered to the city clerk for use at the polls, or omitting or erasing names therefrom, and in case they had already delivered such lists to withdraw the same from the city clerk and correct and certify them as required by the court's order.

These cases grew out of the facts that the various boards of registration threatened and gave out that they had the right and would exercise it, to erase, add to, strike from or omit any name they deemed should be omitted from the revised lists privately on the last day of registration as was done at the city election two years ago, when eighty or more legal voters were in this manner disfranchised. As soon as it was found that similar tactics were being resorted to, a committee of attorneys of the republican central committee called on the boards of registration, who themselves verified these rumors. The evidence showed that it was a grave question whether the boards had been legally appointed; that none of the boards except the Second ward board had properly qualified as a board and as to quite a large number of the members of the boards that they either did not qualify at all or that they did not qualify until their duties were completed. As to the Second and Fourth wards, that the registration lists were not posted for six days outside of the registration places as required by law, and as to the Second, Third and Fourth wards, that the lists had all been tampered with after Thursday, the 27th day of March, contrary to law. The court, in construing the law, said that the statute contemplates the appointment of the boards by the city council, that, unless proper notice to the public is then given by the boards that they will not immediately proceed to the performance of their duties, they shall, the next ten days following their appointment, register all persons as required by law, on a registration book, that they shall then have one day in which to copy all names onto a list which shall be on the following six days publicly exposed on the outside of the building for the purpose of inspection by the public, when any person may object to any one registered and then any one seeing his name is not registered may apply to the board to have it registered; and at the end of said six days said list as publicly exposed, shall be publicly revised by the boards by omitting the names of persons publicly stricken off or added to the exposed lists, and in no other manner, and delivered to the city clerk for use on election day. In summing up the law and the evidence in this case the court said that the action of the several boards was illegal as to certain specific facts shown by the evidence, and to say the least, showed gross carelessness on their part, and as the plaintiffs acquiesced in the contention of the defendants that the period of registration commenced one week after the appointment of the boards, he would so construe the registration for this particular election to come within the requirements of the statute.

A Gift From France.

M. Cambon, the French ambassador, on behalf of the French government, will present to the United States the Chartran portrait of Mrs. Roosevelt, to be hung in the white house with the portraits of former presidents and their wives. M. Chartran's portrait of Miss Roosevelt, which was also ordered by the French government, has been presented to the family of the president.

Both pictures are now at the French embassy and packed ready for shipping to Europe and will reach Paris in time for the summer Salon. After that is over they will be returned to America and formally presented to their respective recipients. The portrait of the president by M. Makovsky is still at the white house, having been painted with the object of presenting it to this government, but so far no definite presentation has been made.

It was rumored at the time of the reception to M. Chartran at the French embassy, when the pictures were for the first time shown to the public, that they were to be bought either by Senator Lodge or J. Pierpont Morgan, that of Mrs. Roosevelt to be presented to the white house and that of Miss Roosevelt to her family. Not until recently, when it was announced at the embassy, was it known that the French government had given the order for the portraits. Apparently there is a pretty little diplomatic episode behind these portraits. Germany sent over Prince Henry, England expected to entertain Miss Roosevelt, and so, to take a hand in this game of showing attention to Uncle Sam. France ordered these pictures as a present to the American people. When Russia sends an ermine rug or a portiere of sables for the white house the great powers will be on an equal footing once more.

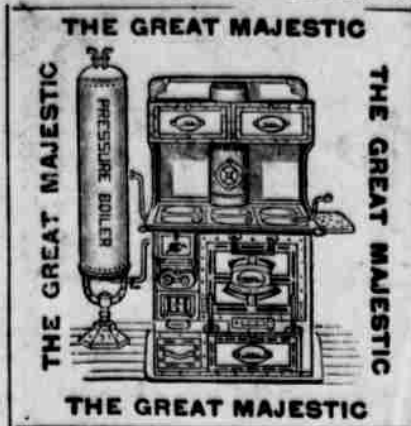

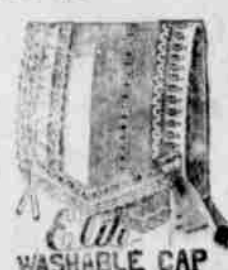

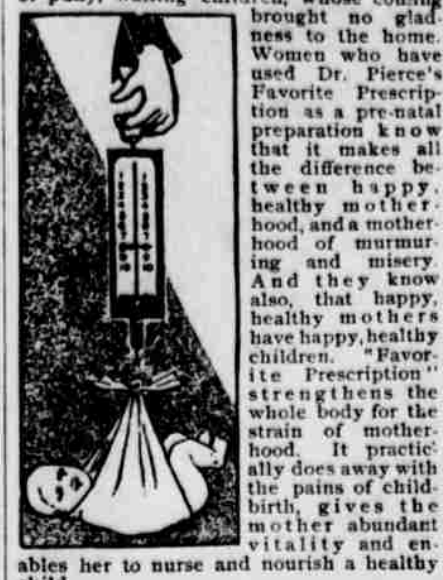

DIRECT SEABOARD OUTLET.
Former President of the Santa Fe at the head of a Syndicate That Will Open Up Rich Territory.

A special dispatch from Pittsburgh, Pa., under date of March 30, says:

A new seaboard outlet from Pittsburgh, the Chesapeake Western railway, is assured, according to the state-

ment issued by Joseph W. Reinhart, formerly president of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe, and who is now at the head of the syndicate which is furthering the project. Mr. Reinhart says:

"It is not generally known, but it is a fact that before the Pennsylvania Railroad company secured control of tidewater traffic through the purchase of the Baltimore & Ohio, Norfolk & Western and the Chesapeake & Ohio a number of men quietly took up the project for the construction of a line of railway from the Ohio river through the northern west Virginia coal fields and Virginia to the Atlantic coast. This enterprise has been carried forward and has now a foundation upon which the whole structure will shortly be erected."

"This project is known as the Chesapeake Western railway. It begins at Gloucester Point, or York Harbor, Va., where a large increase of land for a tidewater terminal has been bought. The line runs northwesterly and westerly, taking in the Chesapeake & Western railway, twenty-seven miles built and in operation in the Shenandoah valley, Virginia, which is owned by the syndicate, through 100 miles of the coal fields of West Virginia to a point near Parkersburg."

"The construction work on over 100 miles of the line westwardly through the Shenandoah and Allegheny mountains into West Virginia is now under way, fourteen miles of track laid and over half of the entire line has been surveyed and located, estimates of construction made thereon and arrangements are now being completed for general construction."

"The line is in no sense a parallel road with any existing railroad, but opens up new and prolific territory throughout its length."

"The greatest care is exercised by the owners to secure an ocean tidewater terminal that would be in every respect suitable for handling the large traffic of the trunk line railway and Gloucester Point was selected."

"It is of much significance that the western terminus of this project is at Parkersburg, W. Va., to which city a line is now being built by the Goulds, from a connection with the Wheeling & Lake Erie at Zanesville. It is also significant that George J. Gould, the head of the Gould interests, spent a week at Gloucester Point last summer and is thoroughly in touch with the whole situation."

Rejected Plans.
Friends of General Miles are anxious to have publicity given to the documents exchanged between the headquarters of the army and the war department on the subject of the pacification of the Philippines. The correspondence contained General Miles' plan for restoring the islands to a condition of peace. The principal feature of the Miles scheme was that of bringing to this country the leading representative Filipinos, selected from all parts of the islands, and giving them an opportunity to see the United States and its inhabitants and to witness its resources and its industries. General Miles' idea was to bring them on an army transport and give them a transcontinental trip at government expense.

This proposition did not apparently anger any one connected with the administration. At least, this is not shown on the papers in the case, although Secretary Root failed to approve the plan. He did this largely on the ground of its political aspect. Mr. Root pointed out to the president that sending General Miles to the Philippines would be regarded in this country as an expression of lack of confidence in General Chaffee and Governor Taft, and that such a plan would give the impression that the situation in the Philippines had reached such a serious stage as to require the pres-

ence there of the highest ranking officer in the army. The secretary went quite fully into the Miles proposition and discussed it temperately in relation to the civil policy in the islands.

The president did not indulge in bitter comment, as has been stated. He merely wrote at the bottom of Secretary Root's indorsement: "Conclusions of the secretary of war approved." This executive comment was written by pen and occupied but one of the lines on the paper, which was, of course, sent back to the headquarters of the army for the information of General Miles. The republican members of the house committee on insular affairs today agreed on a favorable report on the Burleson resolution requesting the president to send to the house the correspondence with Lieutenant General Miles.

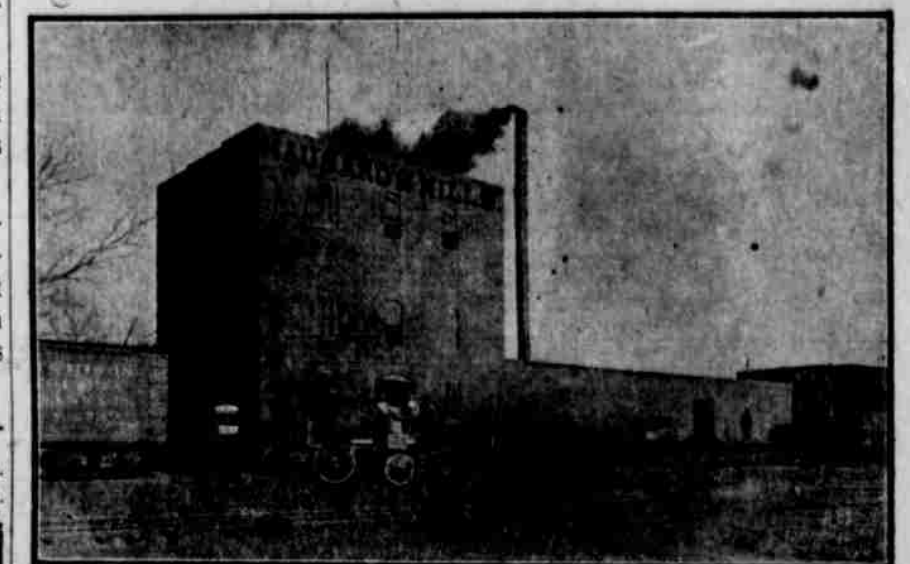
