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**THE BIG STRIKE  
HAS BEGUN**

Fully 35,000 Iron Workers in the  
Vicinity of Pittsburg Are  
Ordered Out.

**LIFE AND DEATH STRUGGLE**

The Great Steel Trust is Endeavoring to  
Crush Out Unionism in the Works of  
Two of Its Sub-Corporations.

Pittsburg, July 1.—As the result of the refusal of the representatives of the American Steel Sheet company and the American Steel Hoop company, subsidiary companies of the great United States steel corporation to sign the workers' new scale at Saturday's conference, circulars were sent from the national headquarters of the Amalgamated association of iron and steel workers today declaring a strike at all plants of the two combines. The great strike is now on. At the outset over 35,000 men are involved. Since the trouble at the Deween wood mills at McKeesport, a few months ago, the Amalgamated association has been actively engaged breaking up the present arrangement of the combine in operating parts of their plants with non-union men, and others with union men. President Shaffer says that if this is not checked, the life of the Amalgamated association is threatened for the combine will always work their union mills last and the union men will be sufferers by this discrimination.

The strike against the American Steel Sheet company has been ordered because this portion of the United States Steel corporation has thus far stood against an increase in the union mills. The American Steel Hoop company stands in the same position. Thus are arrayed against the union organization two branches of the United States Steel corporation.

The scale for the American Tin Plate company, also a part of the greater corporation, has been signed. It is said, however, that in case the struggle continues the Amalgamated officials have power to call out the time plate workers as a means of defense against the parent corporation, which they hold responsible for all disagreements.

The clerical department in all the mills of the Republic Iron and Steel company, located at Youngstown, O., and other points in the Mahoning and Shenango valleys, began taking stock today. This will consume at least two weeks, and after that the mills will be started in full operation under the new scale. The mills of the American Steel Hoop company at Youngstown, closed on Saturday night and will remain shut down until an amicable settlement is reached on the scale question. The mills of the American Steel Sheet company at Struthers, O., also shut down on account of President Shaffer's strike order. During the suspension the company will make extensive improvements and repairs and install new machinery. At McKeesport, 600 men are affected by the strike at the Deween wood plant of the American Steel Sheet company, which closed down last week.

In accordance with President Shaffer's orders, the crews of sixteen of the furnaces of the Lindsay and McCutcheon mills, Allegheny, are on strike and four other crews are expected to quit today. The signatures to the Amalgamated scale by the following companies were resolved today: Lockhart Iron and Steel Co., McKeesport, Pa.; Sharon Tin Plate Co., South Sharon, Pa.; Stewart Iron Co., Limited, Sharon, Pa.; N. and G. Taylor Tin Plate Co., Cumberland, Md.; American Rolling Mill Co., Muskegon, Mich.; Southern Car and Foundry Co., Anderson, Ala.; Bessemer Rolling Mill Co., Bessemer, Ala.

The strike now threatened in the bar mills, following so closely upon that of the sheet mills, has a most serious aspect and may spread to enormous proportions. Indeed, in some circles it is predicted that the gigantic struggle that has been talked of since the organization of the United States Steel corporation was formed, is on the eve of breaking.

The position the greater combine is placed in practically forces the independent plants from complicity in the battle. The fight is not for wages but for organization. Either the Amalgamated association must bow to the will of the greater combine, or else the greater combine will have to give up its non-union mills. The members of the advisory board declared that the association has a surprise in store for the combine.

"We have not been idle," said one, "we have strong lodges organized in several non-union plants in which the combine imagines it has absolute control. We are in better shape for a strike than we ever were before. Our membership is stronger and our treasury has a larger defense fund than we ever had in our history. The question of signing for all the mills must be settled this year."

**Found Dead in Bed.**  
Detroit, Mich., July 1.—George W. Partridge, for eight years private secretary to Zachariah Chandler, was found dead in bed today of heart failure. He was about 70 years of age. He held numerous governmental positions at Washington and at one time was correspondent there for western papers.

**THE CONSTITUTION AND COLUMBIA**

A Race Between the Two Cup Defenders  
This Noon.

Batemans Point, R. I., July 1.—When the Constitution and the Columbia hoisted sail for the first race of the season between the America's cup defender yachts, the breeze inside the bay was very light and the yachts had difficulty in getting out to the starting point. The contest was a windward and leeward affair of thirty miles. The starting gun was fired at 11:40, the Columbia crossed the line first at 11:40:32 and the Constitution right under her lee at 11:40:33. The Columbia outpointed the Constitution and was apparently gaining to the windward.

Batemans Point, R. I., July 1.—The Columbia turned the outer mark at 1:25:05, the Constitution at 1:27:10.

**A LEAD TRUST.**

A Movement to Purchase the Missouri  
Lead Fields.

New York, July 1.—The Herald says: With the passage of a check for almost \$1,000,000 from the Levi Morton Trust company, this city, to the Union Trust company of St. Louis, the first definite step on the part of the Union Lead and Oil company toward the retirement of title to all purchasable Missouri lead land has been taken. More changes of titles for large amounts are expected soon. Under the name of the Union Lead and Iron company, the Ryan-Whitney-Ellkins syndicate, is operating in close conjunction with M. Guggenheim & Sons, the smelting company which recently became a part of the American Smelting & Refining Co.

**SALOON FIGHTERS REMANDED.**

Judge Palmer Discharges the Three De-  
fendants in Contempt Cases.

Denver, Colo., July 1.—Judge Palmer today reprimanded Rev. M. A. Rader, pastor of Grace M. E. church, and Rev. H. H. Talmage, state superintendent of the anti-saloon league, charged with contempt of court, and discharged them. The judge did not announce his decision on the question continuing permanently the injunctions in the saloon case for the criticism of which Rader, Talmage and Wynkoop were cited for contempt. Wynkoop was dismissed without a word.

**THE CUBAN PRESIDENCY.**

It is Being Discussed by Maximo Gomez  
and Tomas Estrada Palma.

New York, July 1.—General Maximo Gomez has been spending much of his time in conference with Tomas Estrada Palma at the Waldorf-Astoria. Neither would divulge the exact nature of their talk. It is thought that Gomez is here to sound the head of the Cuban junta on the question of his candidacy for the presidency of Cuba. Gomez, who is himself a presidential possibility, declared recently in favor of Palma. Gomez expects to go to Washington tomorrow.

**THE BANK FAILURE AT BUFFALO.**

The City National Bank Did Not Open Its  
Doors This Morning.

Buffalo, N. Y., July 1.—The City National bank which was placed in the hands of a receiver on Saturday night by Comptroller of Currency Daves, did not open this morning. I. D. Lynch, chief of the division of insolvent banks, and Special Bank Examiner W. A. Mason, took charge of the bank today pending the arrival of Mr. Vaughn, temporary receiver.

**MANY DIE OF  
OF THE HEAT**

The Hot Wave East of the Rocky  
Mountains is Doing Deadly  
Work.

**LIGHTNING KILLS TWELVE**

Seven People Died of the Heat in New  
York Between Midnight and Morning  
—Many Deaths and Prostrations  
Reported from Other Cities.

New York, July 1.—The hot weather of last week, continued today. At 10 o'clock the temperature was 89. The humidity 45 per cent. Between 1 and 9 a. m. seven deaths due to the heat were reported in this city.

Six deaths from the heat were reported at Brooklyn between midnight and 10 a. m.

**TWENTY-THREE DEATHS.**  
New York, July 1.—At 2 o'clock the weather bureau reported a temperature of 96. There were 23 deaths due to the heat in New York and Brooklyn between midnight and 1 p. m. today.

**MANY PROSTRATIONS.**  
St. Louis, Mo., July 1.—The intense heat that prevailed for several weeks continues unabated. At 5 a. m., the thermometer recorded 90 degrees; two hours later it had risen to 92. Yesterday there were eight deaths and 12 prostrations.

**NO PROSPECT OF RELIEF.**  
Washington, July 1.—The weather bureau thermometer at 9:30 this morning recorded 91. The hot wave is general east of the Rockies and there is no immediate prospect of relief.

**HOT IN KANSAS CITY.**  
Kansas City, Mo., July 1.—The weather forecast here can see no relief from the hot spell today or tomorrow.

**CHICAGO IS SWEETERING.**  
Chicago, July 1.—At 9 o'clock this morning the thermometer on the street level showed 89. The humidity intensified the suffering, the air showing 85 per cent of moisture.

**THE HEAT AT ST. LOUIS.**  
St. Louis, July 1.—The weather bureau thermometer at 1:30 p. m. registered 95. Eight heat prostrations have been reported, four of them fatal.

At 12 o'clock, the bureau thermometer registered 94 degrees in the shade, while on the streets the record was several points higher. Up to noon there had been reported four deaths from heat prostrations today.

**ONE HUNDRED AT INDIANAPOLIS.**  
Indianapolis, Ind., July 1.—This promises to be the hottest day of the year in Indianapolis. At 10:30 the thermometer registered 100 in the shade.

**A BRIEF RELIEF.**  
Chicago, July 1.—At 11:30 p. m. today the suffering from the intense heat was alleviated by a sudden drop in the temperature to 71 and shortly afterward by a heavy fall of rain. Forecaster Wals declared however, that the relief is likely to be of but short duration.

**THE SMOKE CITY SUFFERS.**  
Pittsburg, July 1.—Two deaths and eight prostrations were reported. The men in the mills suffer intensely.

**SEVEN DEATHS AT PHILADELPHIA.**  
Philadelphia, Pa., July 1.—At 2:30 p. m., the police and hospitals report seven deaths today from the heat. There have been twenty prostrations.

**AT THE NATIONAL CAPITAL.**  
Washington, July 1.—At 2 o'clock the official temperature was 100. Twelve prostrations are reported.

**THE HOTTEST PLACE.**  
Baltimore, July 1.—This city is the hottest place in the United States. At 2 p. m. the thermometer indicated 101 degrees. The humidity was about 65 per cent. Two prostrations were reported.

**TWELVE KILLED BY A BOLT OF LIGHTNING.**  
Chicago, July 1.—Twelve men were killed and a boy probably fatally injured this afternoon by a single bolt of lightning which struck a pier where they were fishing.

**100 DEGREES AT PHILADELPHIA.**  
Philadelphia, July 1.—At 3 p. m., the official thermometer recorded one hundred degrees. All departments of Cramps shipyard shut down on account of the heat, and other industrial establishments were forced to close.

**A LATER VERSION OF THE CATASTROPHE.**  
Chicago, July 1.—A single stroke of lightning today killed eleven boys and probably fatally injured a twelfth. A flash occurred during a heavy thunder shower which broke over the city at 12:30 p. m. The boys who had been swimming rushed to the pier at the foot of Montrose boulevard to seek shelter. Suddenly there was a great flash of lightning and people living in the vicinity heard a terrific crash. The pier, which was a heavy construction, was precipitated into the water. In half an hour all the bodies were recovered from the lake.

Willie Anderson, 12 years of age, was the only survivor. He was badly hurt. He managed to crawl to the shore and was staggering along when he met a policeman who was already hurrying to the scene. In a few agonized gasps he gave the officer a bare idea of the horrible ending to an hour's sport, and then fainted.

**A BIG DAY FOR MANILA.**

July Fourth Will Be Inauguration Day in  
the Philippines.

Manila, July 1.—July 4 will be inauguration day of the civil government. The military headquarters will be transferred to the former Spanish headquarters outside the walled city. The palace will be occupied exclusively by the civil government.

**TAKEN TO THE SUPREME COURT.**

A Writ of Habeas Corpus Denied to Edward  
H. Reid.

Denver, July 1.—Judge Hallett of the United States district court today announced the decision denying a writ of habeas corpus for Edward H. Reid, an Omaha cattle shipper sentenced to six months imprisonment by the district court of Arapahoe county for refusing to pay the state inspection fee on a shipment of cattle from Texas. Attorney Ralph Talbot, took an appeal to the United States supreme court. Reid was acting as agent for the National Live Stock Association which desires a decision by the supreme court on the questions involved that will apply to all states.

**THE CASE APPEALED.**

Jose Sanchez Will Probably Not Hang at  
Silver City on July 5.

Special Correspondence New Mexican.  
Silver City, July 1.—Governor Otero to whom the result of the investigation of the sanity of Jose Sanchez who is to hang here July 5th was referred has declined to interfere further in the sentence of the court. It is reported that Attorney Alvin N. White who is defending Sanchez has appealed the case to the Supreme court.

**Commissions Signed.**

**A Writ of Error for Thomas Barker.**  
Trenton, N. J., July 1.—Counsel for Thomas Barker, sentenced to five years in state prison for assaulting Rev. Dr. Keeler, today took out a writ of error, which will carry the case to the court of errors and appeals. In the meantime Barker will be at liberty.

**GRANT COUNTY MINES.**

Another Rich Strike of Gold Has Been  
Made on Whitewater Creek.

Frank H. Nichol, trustee, last week purchased from William H. and George H. Houser the fractional Highland Chief claim at Burros.

Necely Rascom is continuing development work on the Gettyburg mine at Burros. He has encountered some high grade ore as well as any quantity of low grade copper.

A force of eight men is at work on the turquoise mines owned by the Parker syndicate near Burros. It is understood that a deal of considerable magnitude is pending with eastern parties with regard to this property.

Shay, Manila and Bates, who are working the Klondike mine at Burros, are now drifting on the 80 foot level. The main shaft has been sunk to a depth of 100 feet and in all over 300 feet of development work has been done on the claim. Over \$3,000 worth of ore has been shipped from the Klondike. A deal is now on the tapis, which, if consummated, will result in the Klondike and Orient mines passing into the hands of an eastern company.

Another rich strike is reported from the gold discovery recently made on Whitewater creek in the vicinity of Central. D. E. Butler and George Sanders, who have a lease and bond on the Gold Finch mine, owned by the Copper Box Mining company, a Colorado corporation, have opened up some fine ground at the depth of six feet, plentifully streaked, which gives assays of \$500 to the ton. The character of the ground would indicate that it will prove a very profitable cyanide proposition and if future tests substantiate the surface finds, negotiations will be entered into for the erection of a plant. The discovery of gold in that locality has attracted considerable attention and 25 men are seeking the hidden wealth within a radius of a mile. The deepest working is only 50 feet. Considerable quantities of ore have already been extracted. Some of the ore is found in streaks and stringers, but several rich pockets have been uncovered. The best values are obtained by panning, but a shipment of mill ore recently made gave net returns of \$110 to the ton. The ground was worked in years gone by by the Spaniards and Indians, but all of the old workings have been filled up, and the appearance of the same would indicate that it was done with the idea of destroying all trace of the mines.

The Superior mine near Lordsburg, shut down last week. Samuel Hughes, foreman, returned to El Paso, and there was a shortage of men at the mine, so Superintendent Jennings concluded to shut the mine down until he could get a force of men to work. When the mine was shut down the shaft was 405 feet deep, at which point a crosscut was started, which had exposed four feet of heavy sulphide ore.

**SOCORRO COUNTY.**

It was found necessary last week to close down the big operations of the Helen Mining company at Graham, owing to the failure of the water supply, due to the dry season. The management was very much disappointed in having to take this action, as every effort had been made to guard against this contingency by installing a new 600 horse power engine. The order for this engine was placed last April, but owing to the great demand for machinery and the strikes, the same has not yet reached the camp, and as a result work will likely have to remain suspended until the commencement of the rainy season next month. The company has recently received and is now installing four of the latest improved motors. Another recent improvement is a large stable building, capable of housing from 40 to 50 head of stock.

**FIVE LOOTERS  
CAPTURED**

They Claimed to Be Americans and  
Were Handed Over to the  
Legation Guard.

**THEY PLUNDERED CHINESE**

After Filling Five Carts with Loot They  
Commenced Shooting Not Knowing  
That the Town Was Occupied by  
Chinese Soldiers.

Pekin, July 1.—Five men calling themselves Americans were captured by the Chinese troops in a town fifty miles from Peking and were today turned over to Major E. Robertson, commander of the United States legation guard here. The men who were armed, demanded 5,000 taels from the keeper of a pawn shop and got 600. They filled five carts with plunder, and then began shooting, not knowing that the town was occupied by a hundred Chinese troops. The United States legation was notified and the quintette was brought in. All parts of Peking occupied by the British for police purposes were turned over today to the Chinese authorities.

**NEW POSTOFFICE.**  
A postoffice has been established at Alta, Lincoln county, with William H. Walker postmaster.

**FOREST SUPERVISOR RESIGNS.**  
Richard Vaux, supervisor of the eastern Gila reserve, has resigned his position. No successor has yet been appointed.

**BOARD OF PUBLIC LANDS.**  
The board of public lands met this forenoon in the office of Territorial Land Commissioner A. A. Keen and transacted routine business.

**A HOMESTEAD CONTEST.**  
Hon. B. M. Reed, Esq., has filed a contest for a homestead in the federal land office in this city for Casimiro Chavez vs. Demetrio Rivera, the land being located near Vallecitos, Rio Arriba county.

**PENITENTIARY COMMISSION.**  
The territorial board of penitentiary commissioners met at the penitentiary today and transacted routine business. All the members were in attendance as follows: President F. R. Pierce of Las Vegas; Secretary Col. J. Francisco Chavez of Santa Fe; Hon. Juan Navarro of Mora; Hon. J. T. McLaughlin of San Pedro; and Louis Hild of Albuquerque.

**INCORPORATION.**  
The Burton-Lingo Lumber company of Texas, today filed incorporation papers in the office of Territorial Secretary J. W. Reynolds. The capital is \$300,000, divided into 3,000 shares, and the New Mexico headquarters are at Roswell, Chavez county. Object, the lumber business. The incorporators and directors are J. G. Waples, president; E. H. Lingo, vice president; W. Burton, treasurer and general manager; R. C. Galbraith, all of Fort Worth, Texas.

**A \$200,000 FIRE.**  
Boston, Mass., July 1.—Fire broke out on the Hoosac Tunnel docks at Charleston, just before 9 o'clock, and burned fiercely. At 10 o'clock the firemen obtained control of the flames. It is thought the loss will not be more than \$200,000.

**Carnegie Gives \$750,000 to Detroit.**  
Detroit, Mich., July 1.—George W. Radford, member of the Detroit public library board, received a letter from Andrew Carnegie stating that he will contribute \$750,000 toward the erection of a new public library building in this city.

**End of Strike in Sight.**  
Reading, Pa., July 1.—It looks as if the end of the strike of the Reading railway shop hands, inaugurated ten days ago, is in sight. A conference will be held in New York tonight. Concessions have been made by both sides.

**Senator Kyle Has a Relapse.**  
Aberdeen, S. D., July 1.—United States Senator Kyle, who has been ill ten days, suffered a relapse at noon today. It is believed he can not recover.

**A Strike at Cincinnati.**  
Cincinnati, Ohio, July 1.—All linemen of the Cincinnati Traction company struck today for an advance in wages. Their places were filled by promotion.

**District Court Notes.**  
Judge McFie has signed a judgment in the case of John G. Schumann vs. H. S. Arnold to recover on a promissory note. The judgment is against the defendant for \$411.54.

In the case of the Territory of New Mexico vs. The Persons, Real Estate, Land and Property enumerated in the delinquent tax list for Santa Fe of 1899 for Santa Fe county, Judge McFie has decreed that any moneys collected under said suit should be used solely for the payment and cancellation of judgments against the county.

**Will Redeem \$10,000 Worth of Bonds.**  
At their last meeting the county commissioners of Eddy county ordered the redemption of \$10,000 worth of Eddy county court house and jail bonds, thus applying some of the idle funds lying in the county treasury. Treasurer J. D. Walker has issued a notice to holders of bonds Nos. 1 to 10 to present same for payment at the La Fayette bank of St. Louis, on after July 1, 1901. This leaves \$30,000 of these bonds yet to be taken up, and under the present contract, only ten years to pay them off. Eddy county finances are very fair these days and improving steadily.

## New Mexico Demands Statehood of the 37th Congress.

### Of Right and in Justice New Mexico Should Be a State.

A Philadelphia editor is trying to impress upon women the proper manner of getting off a street car. Some men are always ready to attempt the impossible.

The Cubans after all are much like the Yankees. They can't agree upon what they want and isn't that one of the characteristics of the American people?

The Virginia constitutional convention is of the opinion that a new constitution for that state can be formed without the advice of Mr. Bryan. And thus are the mighty fallen!

Congressman Gaines of Tennessee, is strongly advocating the nomination of a southern man for president on the Democratic ticket in 1904. Perhaps Mr. Gaines would like the nomination himself.

Some of the Pop-Democratic papers in this territory seem to have a great deal of confidence in the ignorance of their readers. They are still regaling them with fake stories of Republican corruption in New Mexico.

Judge D. H. McMillan, although on the bench but a few months, has already put a stop to some abuses that have crept into the administration of justice in the fifth judicial district. Judge McMillan is alright.

Times are good, the people are prosperous, the territory wants statehood, the present administration of Governor Otero will be the best New Mexico has ever seen, and it will wind up in a blaze of glory as the territory merges into a state a year from next fall.

Since the storm at Denver on Saturday which wrecked the betting stands at the Denver race track and injured many people, that city must be placed in the cyclone belt. People who want to be exempt from the dangers of cyclones and tornadoes must move to New Mexico.

France and Germany are many millions of bushels short in their wheat crop and they must look to the United States to make up the shortage. In view of this condition it is idle on part of Europe to speak of an industrial combination and a tariff war upon the United States.

The war taxes caused by the conflict with Spain have been borne without a murmur by the people of the United States but, nevertheless, there is a feeling of relief now that the greater part of the burden has been removed and the nation is again upon a peace footing.

After full consideration of the delinquent tax cases now pending in this county, it appears that the best interests of the people would be served by compromising these suits even at a discount. The board of county commissioners so believe. The tax payers who can compromise ought to do so speedily for a compromise is a lucky thing for them.

Wyoming since it has attained to statehood is growing very rapidly in wealth and in population. Yet, it has less than one-half the population of New Mexico and as to its valuation, it is only one-third of that of this territory, although owing to better assessment methods, its assessed valuation is the equal of that of New Mexico.

The action of the comptroller of the currency in closing the Seventh National bank of New York and the City National bank of Buffalo is commendable and far better than it would have been to wait until the banks had collapsed totally. Insecure banking institutions should be weeded out and thus the confidence of the public in the national banks will be maintained.

Thomas Benton once said that the Virginian might carry his slave (property) into the territories with him but he could not carry the Virginia law that made him a slave; and so a citizen of the United States living in a state may remove to a territory and still be a citizen of the United States, but he cannot exercise the same sovereign rights as a citizen in a territory that he could in a state. His citizenship becomes a "barren identity" as soon as he enters a territory.

A special grand jury of Teller county, Colorado, scores the school and other officials of Cripple Creek for extravagance and crooked transactions in awarding contracts. It seems the officials in a state are as likely to be corrupt as those in a territory. In fact, more so, for of late years very little has been heard or seen of corrupt officials in New Mexico, the territory having demonstrated that it can carry on its own affairs without fraud or corruption. And yet, there are some people who assert that New Mexico is not fit for statehood.

Two would-be lynchers in West Virginia were killed by their intended victim. Of course, the populace is furious at the idea of a negro defending himself against men who wanted to hang him for a trivial offense. But the sane people cannot help but applaud the brave negro and express the hope that he will be given a fair trial at some point where lynchers cannot reach him.

The commander-in-chief of Great Britain's army, Lord Wolsey, declared in parliament that the army of the United States, considering its size, is the finest in the world. He said that its superiority is due to good wages. Lord Wolsey is right in his statement except that he has not fathomed the true cause of it. The soldiers of a free and independent nation are always superior to those of a monarchy and the question of wages does not enter into the proposition at all.

Eight persons died from the heat in New York between 10 o'clock and 9 o'clock this morning. There are hot places in New Mexico too but the night brings always relief and out of the sun there is always a cool air. Sunstrokes and heat prostrations are unheard of in New Mexico and yet one hears of people who leave New Mexico to spend the summer in New York or in Chicago. But there are always people who do not know when they are well off.

The national government is never affected by how a territory votes, and therefore it does not bother itself much about the question. To look at the local political fight during a presidential year in the territories had some effect. Partisanship in a territory, except for coloring the politics of the future state, is as fruitless as was the alternate removal and restoration of the famed stone pile. There should be but one opinion among the people of a territory on the question of statehood.

Otero county has made a considerable raise in its assessed valuation and Socorro county too is in the line for assessment reform. It looks now as if the assessed valuation of the territory will reach the \$40,000,000 mark again. Although that is still really only one-half of what it ought to be, yet it is a sign of progress and an indication that assessors and boards of county commissioners will not allow their counties to be crippled by false assessment returns. With a good increase in assessments each year there will be a continual decrease in the rate of taxation.

Wayne McVeagh and other Mugwumps are lamenting again over the growth of wealth in this country and the discontent of the poor which they claim is an inevitable consequence. They want to make people believe that happiness is spelled in dollar marks and that a millionaire's chief pleasure is to hoard millions although late years have demonstrated that rich men delight much more in spending their money than in making it. But then mind you, Mugwumps like Grover Cleveland, Wayne McVeagh and others of their class have no thought of throwing their wealth to the wind and giving an example in practice of what they preach in theory.

Today free postal delivery is inaugurated at Las Vegas which means employment for three letter carriers at good salaries and probably in time another clerk in the postoffice. Every little county and Santa Fe is very foolish for neglecting the opportunity it has of securing free delivery for the asking and submitting to the few conditions that are required before the system is installed. The Board of Trade and city council should act in the matter. With Albuquerque and Las Vegas possessing free delivery it is a shame and a reflection upon the territorial capital that it is doing without that advantage and sign of progress.

Pueblo, Colo., closed its pesthouse on Saturday for the first time in almost a year. Smallpox has been prevalent in Colorado the past year while New Mexico has escaped almost altogether. This must seem strange to Colorado people who two years ago were clamoring for a quarantine against New Mexico because a few Pueblo Indians in the territory were suffering from smallpox. New Mexico did not become hysterical when it learned of the prevalence of smallpox in Colorado and although it did not insist upon a quarantine, the good sanitary conditions prevailing throughout the territory prevented the epidemic from securing any hold.

Says the New York Times: "The construction of irrigation systems does more for the progress of civilization than all the banking deals which can be evolved in the board rooms of the Napoleons of finance. They not only make blades of grass grow where none grew before but they make homes for the homeless and add something tangible to the national wealth. This is the best kind of territorial expansion." The New York Times is right for by the construction of large irrigation systems under the favored skies of New Mexico, the United States would erect for itself not only a storehouse of constantly growing wealth but would also found homes for the homeless and a haven for those in the embrace of deadly tuberculosis or kindred ills.

What has been surmised by those who have given thought to the true inwardness of railroad construction in southern New Mexico, is now being announced by newspapers said to be on the inside of the transaction. The so-called Bisbee or New Mexico Southern railway, which is to be built between El Paso, Deming and Bisbee is not an independent concern, but is to be a link in the great Rock Island system from Chicago to the Pacific coast. No wonder, the Southern Pacific is fighting it tooth and nail. The mere thought of the extension of the Rock Island system is not extending merely for the sake of securing additional local traffic or a part of the traffic from Chicago, but it is pushing the Pacific coast to secure a share of the Oriental trade. This explains many of the mysteries of the Rock Island extension through New Mexico and the paralleling of the Southern Pacific in southern New Mexico.

## Governor Otero It Is.

The Appointment Was Made Upon the Merits of the Past Administration.

President McKinley reappointed Hon. Miguel A. Otero governor of New Mexico on the 15th instant, his new commission being signed that day. The appointment was made upon the merits of past administration; upon the endorsement of the Republican party of the territory; the support of the financial and business interests, and despite the opposition of a small group of men who for the past several months have conducted a scurrilous and personal fight against the governor, and who had their representatives in Washington to continue their crusade before the president.

Their efforts were without avail. Founded upon chagrin and disappointment induced by failure upon the part of the governor to recognize their great political worth, it was only necessary to make this clear to the president to effectually annul their influence.

Governor Otero's reappointment is pleasing, and what was desired by the great majority of the people of the territory. It portends a continuance of present prosperous and healthy conditions, and is an intimation that the wishes of the people of New Mexico are being carefully considered at Washington. Knowing the governor's pronounced views upon the question of statehood, his re-election by the president would seem to indicate that it is the wish of the administration to further New Mexico's admission as a state.

With a governor pledged and earnest for statehood; with an energetic and aggressive delegate in congress, striving for the same purpose, and with the two political parties of the territory committed to New Mexico's admission, that would seem to be that untidiness of purpose sufficient to attain the coveted honor.

It would have been unfortunate, indeed, under these circumstances, had the president selected another executive for the territory, and the fact that he did not is but another evidence of his wisdom and skill in statesmanship. Salutations and congratulations to Governor Otero on his success and for the confusion of his enemies.

## FOR ANOTHER TERM.

The First Time That a Governor for a Territory Has Been Reappointed.

Last Saturday President McKinley satisfied the larger portion of the Republican party of the territory by reappointing Governor Otero for another term. This is said to be the first time that a governor of a territory has been reappointed. ## 160,000 POUND ENGINES.

Heavy Locomotives to be Used on the Rock Island Extension.

Two new locomotives which recently arrived for the El Paso-Rock Island route are the heaviest and most powerful engines in the southwest.

They are the Vaucain, ten-wheel four cylinder, compound, consolidation locomotives. Their low pressure cylinders are 24 inches and their high pressure cylinders are 17 1/2 inches and are arranged the large or low pressure cylinders above the others. They are equipped with piston valves which give a perfectly balanced pressure.

The engines weigh 160,000 pounds each. The drive wheels, eight in number, are sixty inches in diameter. The fire box is 120 inches long, 42 inches wide and 65 inches deep. The flues are two-inch No. 12, wide gauge and 337 in number. The total heating surface is 2,025.9 sq. ft. The smallest shell of the boiler is seventy-four inches in diameter. The tank capacity is 6,000 gallons and the tender will hold nine tons of coal.

The engines are fitted with New York air brakes, air sanders and other modern improvements. They were built for fast freight service and are the only compound locomotives in the territory. They will be used by the El Paso & Northern Railway for passenger service until the new passenger locomotives have been ordered and are expected in July. Ten more of the big freighters like the ones already received have been ordered, four of which are already on the road and the others will arrive in July and August. If these engines prove the proper motive power for the El Paso & Rock Island line about twenty more will be ordered before the end of the year.

## THE SUPERB CLIMATE

**Santa Fe Has Fine Summers and Moderate Winters with Equable Temperature.**

### NEARLY ALWAYS PLEASANT

The Salubrious Atmosphere of the Territory and Reasons Why the Climate Is Healthful and the Country Chosen for Sanitariums.

A knowledge of the contour of New Mexico in relation to the surrounding country is necessary to clearly understand the cause of its climatic advantages, that are not possessed by any other part of the United States. A study of the Rocky mountain region reveals the fact that the great chain from the far north is broken in its continuity as it leaves Colorado. In New Mexico there are smaller ranges with here and there lofty peaks with timbered slopes and barren crowns to relieve the clouds of moisture. From them incline fertile valleys and grassy upland plains to the gulf region until when the southern border is reached, there are no mountains between New Mexico and the southern water. Three fourths of this territory has an altitude of 5,000 feet. At the southern border the valleys have dropped to from 3,000 to 4,000 feet, while the Santa Fe valley, at the capital city, has an altitude of 6,987 feet at the plaza.

A country of such varied altitudes must have some variety in climate, but the variation is in degrees of temperature mainly, for in general the climate of New Mexico is dry and salubrious. The rainfall is principally confined to showers in the summer, with little rain or snow in the winter, except in the northern part of the territory.

Near the extreme southern line, in the Sacramento mountains, a lofty peak is the first considerable elevation met with, as the moisture-laden gulf clouds drift to the northwest, and this precipitates rain to greater extent than any other mountain, the rainfall there having in exceptional seasons been estimated at 48 inches. But over the territory the normal precipitation ranges from 8 to 35 inches, according to elevation. The air is dry, rapidly absorbs the dampness of the skin and has a cooling effect. The weather is never oppressive, the nights are always cool enough to sleep under cover and generally under tent.

**COMPARATIVE TEMPERATURE.** The southern valleys are, of course, the warmest portions of New Mexico in the summer, but the hottest are pleasant.

Santa Fe, being up out of the great valley of the territory, is especially blessed as to summer temperature. The highest record by the thermometer in this city in twenty-six years was 96 degrees in 1878, an extreme rarely approached. In the last ten years 91 was the highest absolute temperature. It should be borne in mind that in a dry climate the record of the metallic thermometer does not indicate the real temperature felt by a human body, which is cooled by the drying effect of the air. It has been demonstrated that a temperature of 90 at Santa Fe is not more oppressive and heating than 72 at St. Louis, or at any place with a humid climate.

The following table was made up from reports of the climate and crop service of the weather bureau, and gives a general idea of the relative intensity of heat as indicated by the metallic thermometer:

### SANTA FE SUMMER.

Were Santa Fe located in sight of St. Louis or Chicago, with its present elevation, residents of such place would behold a city more than a mile and a quarter skyward, above the hot, malarial, moisture-soaked earth, in a pure atmosphere, which all would seek. Should they behold the city where she is they would find a still cooler and purer atmosphere, where there is little moisture, a porous soil to drain away the rain that comes, and a precipitous descent for escape of the snow-fed streams and gorges in sight of the city.

The records show that no other city in the same latitude possesses so cool a summer temperature as Santa Fe, where the average is 67 degrees and the change between night and day temperature too slight to be detrimental to health. Thanks to elevation, to wooded mountains far southward, and shelter from the hot winds of Arizona that are warmed off by the rising series of mountain ranges between Santa Fe and the sandy, lower levels of desert, this city is the coolest of the upper lake region. It is far cooler than Denver, as thermometer readings about as low as San Diego, and is free from the humid heat of the coast.

### THE WINTER SEASON.

One who has not seen the lay of the land might think that an elevated place having so delightful a summer climate would have a severe winter. Yet this is not true. The winter temperature is not so low as in the lower Ohio valley, and is free from moisture, there being less of cloudy weather in winter than in summer. To the north, the great mountains of Colorado receive the greatest snowfall, and break the force of northern winds; other mountains closer stand guard to shelter the Santa Fe valley, which lies at their feet. To the east, a range keeps out the cold winds as they rush southward to Texas. Westward also, nature has interposed barriers to shield New Mexico from gales,

and when a wind finds its way up the winding Rio Grande, Santa Fe receives but the feather edge of the blow.

### NEW MEXICO SANITARIUMS.

Sunny, bright days mark the winter season, which, until Christmas at least, is quite as delightful as the glorious summer, though crisp and cool. Even the spring months in Santa Fe cannot be equaled for mildness in any eastern state. While hundreds of tourists visit the city in summer and make a more or less protracted stay, many of them come to remain permanently for the curative effect upon tubercular diseases is all the while increasing. The proportion of the latter will be undoubtedly enlarged in consequence of the indorsement given New Mexico's climate by the United States marine hospital service, which has in 1899 established two permanent sanitariums in the territory, and will maintain them as homes for soldiers and sailors afflicted or threatened with tubercular troubles. Many years of life at New Mexico army posts and a careful examination by experts led the authorities to take this action in the interest of military invalids, and it is also intended to remove to New Mexico consumptive inmates of soldiers' homes in California and eastern states.

Favorable conditions exist all over New Mexico for restoration to health or for improving the condition of such sufferers; a dry, aseptic air, light atmosphere, pure pressure, well drained soil, a minimum of cold and heat, the absence of great changes in temperature and a maximum of sunshine.

### SUNSHINE RECORDS.

As to the latter point, the latest figures available from the government records are those of 1897, the year book of 1898 having not yet been published. The summer of 1897, as it happened, was unusually cloudy and rainy at Santa Fe, yet the superiority of this city in the matter of days that were sunny throughout, can be seen by a few comparisons with places in various parts of the country.

This table shows that in the year 1897 only El Paso had more sunshine than Santa Fe, but that Texas city has much hotter summers and almost as great an amount of wind in the winter.

The government records do not show that any place in the United States excels Santa Fe in sunshine, year in and year out, the average number of hours of sunshine daily in a period of five years being seven hours and forty-five minutes, which is just about right for variety, comfort and health.

A favorable point in comparison with the east is that the most summer here is in the fall and winter, November leading, while in the east the sun is more in evidence in the summer months, when it is sometimes neither wanted nor needed.

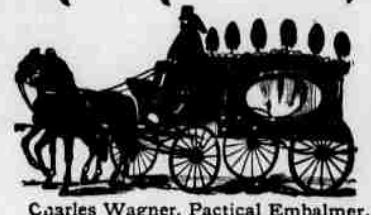
