New Mexico demands Statehood from the Fifty-Seventh Congress.

The new year opens with bright prospects ahead for this city.

There were more public school buildings erected in New Mexico in 1901 than during any previous year. The census reported that the first day of the 21,322,000 people living in the United States in 1900 were illiterate.

President McKinley's physicians hesitate to submit a bill to congress, fearing that they may not make it big enough.

New Mexico is third as to the number of miles of new railway track constructed. In 1901, 275 1/2 miles being placed to its credit.

New Mexico is contributing handsomely to the National McKinley memorial fund. The school children are doing especially well.

Santa Rosa, Guadalupe county, is to have another newspaper. It will be published by E. C. Cooper of Kansas, who recently came to New Mexico.

PROSPEROUS INSTITUTIONS.

The New Mexican says that every one of the territorial institutions of learning reports a much greater attendance than ever before which shows two things: First, that no mistake was made in establishing these institutions at a time when it almost seemed that there was no pressing need for them; and second, that New Mexico people and those of surround-

...commonwealths begin to appreciate that the New Mexico institutions of learning are the equal, if not the superior, of the same class of institutions of other commonwealths.

INDIAN POLICY.

The first step in the plan to make the Indian self-supporting has been taken in Washington, in accordance with the policy outlined some time ago by Commissioner Jones and approved by President Roosevelt.

A circular letter has been sent to every Indian agent, calling for data as to the number of Indians living on allotted lands and proving capable of looking after themselves. It is proposed to eventually dissolve the tribal funds, and transfer such moneys to the credit of the individuals. As rapidly as the Indian shows himself capable of managing his own affairs, the money will be assigned to him, and thus the annuity will cease.

Commissioner Jones is sanguine that this plan will eventually solve the Indian problem. Those who are familiar with the tribes of the southwest, however, are not so hopeful, says the Denver Republican. All Indians can

HENRY SCHOPPER KILLED.

Yesterday afternoon as the flyer, No. 3, was crossing the bridge near Laguna, Fireman Henry A. Schopper was instantly killed. The young man had just finished replenishing the fire box with fuel and he had stepped into the gangway to get a draught of fresh air. As he leaned his head out, the engine shot onto the bridge, and the fireman's head came in contact with a projecting rod, jerking him from the engine and the body fell through the structure to the ground. The train continued on its journey for more than a mile before Engineer Georges discovered that his fireman had left the cab. He brought his train to a standstill at once, notified the conductor. The train was run backward to the bridge, and there the trainmen found the lifeless body of Mr. Schopper. The body being badly crushed on the left side above the ear. A couple of hours later the body was placed on No. 8 passenger train and brought to this city. It was turned over to the charge of Undertaker J. W. Edwards. A brother of the deceased, William Schopper, engineer on the Santa Fe, with headquarters in Newton, Kan., was notified last night of the unfortunate occurrence, and it is expected he will arrive here tonight.

Henry A. Schopper was about 23 years of age. He was married a year ago to Miss Elberhardt of this city, and together they resided at No. 214 South East street. He has been in the employ of the railroad company for several years and was one of the most popular young men in the city.
