RIVER FIRE.

Steamer Burned to Water's Edge.

Charred Remains of Several Passengers Recovered.

Quiet Christmas at Washington—Mrs McKinley's Christmas.

A MINNESOTA KILLING.

Memphis, Tenn., Dec. 25.—The stern wheel steamer, Sun, plying between this port and Fulton, Tenn., burned to the water's edge at 5 o'clock today, at the wharf. The boat arrived from Fulton about midnight with fifteen passengers. All were asleep on board when the fire broke out. B. N. Rainey and wife, Old River, Tenn., and Mrs. G. M. Tims, Richardson Landing, Arkansas, are known to be lost. Their charred remains have been recovered. The three months' old child of Mrs. Tims is missing. It is believed all others escaped. The fire originated in a pile of seed cotton on the boiler deck, and probably started by a spark from the furnace. The boat was valued at \$10,000. The cargo was totally destroyed.

Christmas at Washington.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 25.—Washington seldom celebrated Christmas in a more quiet manner than today. Departments all closed. White house was closed to the public and a large portion of the clerical force were excused for the day. The president put in much of his time with the children of the household, who were recipients of many presents.

Mrs. McKinley's Christmas.

Canton, Ohio, Dec. 25.—Mrs. McKinley spent Christmas day alone at her home. Relatives who see her often state that she shows gradual improvement. She remembered many friends with little Christmas presents today, and received flowers and presents from all over the country.

Killed His Aged Mother.

Taylor's Falls, Minn., Dec. 25.—Abe Nelson, aged 55, has been taken into custody, charged with killing his mother, 80 years of age, by splitting her head open with an axe. He was weak minded.

Died from Consumption.

Phoenix, Ariz., Dec. 25.—Clarence H. King, widely known as a mining expert and engineer, died here, aged 58 years. King was intimately associated with organizing the United States geological survey and contributed more literature on the Grand Canyon of the Colorado than any other scientific writer. He was unmarried and made his home at the Century club, New York. Pulmonary trouble was the cause of his death.

SENATOR SEWELL BETTER.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 25.—The Italian government has been renewing its efforts of late with the authorities at Washington to have the federal statutes so extended as to protect foreigners in cases arising within the jurisdiction of the states, thus giving federal remedy for lynchings and like affairs directed against Italians, such as have occurred in Louisiana, Colorado and Mississippi. Exchange of views in this connection recently brought on a discussion in the Italian senate when Baron Pava interpolated the Italian premier as to the progress of adjustment. Immediately on arrival of the new ambassador, Signor Mayor Des Planches, he took up this question, which had arisen in connection with the lynching of several Italian citizens at Erwin, Miss.

WARRING COUNTRIES.

Proposal for Peace Between Chili and Argentine.

New York, Dec. 25.—The Tribune President Rock's organ, according to a dispatch from Buenos Ayres to the Herald, announces a second proposal from Chili, about Ultima Esperanza, which is accepted, and both governments will sign the following protocol:

First—Argentine will withdraw all police from Cerro Palique and transfer it to Los Morros, situated many miles eastward.

Second—Chili will transfer its station to Puerto Conaoco.

The whole zone thus remains included in the disputed territory.

The Macley Case.

New York, Dec. 25.—When informed of his dismissal from his position in the navy yard, by President Roosevelt, Edgar Stanton Macley said: "I have signed the recall service authorities at Washington, asking formal opinion on this subject. I shall be guided in my action by advice received from this source."

Salem, N. C., Dec. 25.—Ray and Milton, sons of John Ruffy, an employee of the Southern railway, were ground to pieces by a passenger train early today. Zeb Trexley attempted to save the children and was seriously injured.
