BOILERS EXPLODE.

Another Frightful Accident in Pittsburg.

Five Men Killed and Twelve Injured.

Killed in the Soho Furnace Disaster Number Eleven.

CAUSE OF SOUTHERN PACIFIC WRECK.

Pittsburg, Dec. 20.—The Black Diamond steel works of Park Bros. was the scene this morning of an accident in which at least five workmen lost their lives and twelve were injured. Reports are circulated that ten to thirty were killed and it will not be known just now many are used until the wreckage is cleared on Monday. About 4:15 o'clock four boilers in the ten-inch bar mill No. 3 exploded with terrific force. The mill was completely wrecked, and the debris piled up to seventy-five feet high. The boiler works of James McNeill, adjoining the Black Diamond mill, were also destroyed. Five dead and twelve injured have already been removed. The dead have not been identified. The injured were removed to West Penn hospital. They are: Thomas Elliott, Albert Golechick, Alex. Wawonick, Robert Street, Valentine Perniski, Jacob Chas. nolana, Isaac Washington, William Steinhaugh, Peter Mikock, John McCluskey, Munroe Larison, Joseph Zanic. It is thought that almost 120 men were in the plant at the time of the explosion. The only man at work in the McNeill plant was Rudolph Hoff, night watchman. One boiler crashed into the residence of Robert Price, Thirtieth street, completely wrecking the house. Price and family rushed to the street in their night clothes.

Eleven Men Killed. Pittsburg, Dec. 20.—The police were notified today that Alex. Clyvedale, one in charge of the Soho furnace at the time of the explosion yesterday morning, is missing. The police believe he was cremated. A note would make the list of killed eleven.

Cause of the Accident. San Francisco, Dec. 20.—John Coffey, engineer of the north bound Southern Pacific train, whose failure to stop at Uplands switch yesterday morning, caused the collision in which two were killed and more than twenty injured, is suffering from a shock to the spine sustained when he jumped from the engine. He has not denied his responsibility for the disaster.

WILL RETIRE. Secretary Gage Will Retire from Roosevelt's Cabinet. Washington, Dec. 20.—Secretary Gage's intention to relinquish the treasury portfolio as soon as President Roosevelt can find a suitable successor and he has no other business, is said to be a fact. Secretary Gage would like to be relieved before spring. The president does all he could to dissuade Gage from retiring, and will probably continue to use his efforts in that direction. After the cabinet meeting Secretary Gage declined to say anything about the rumors of his resignation beyond the simple statement that he had not

WORLD'S FAIR.

Ground Broken for St. Louis Exposition.

Argentine and Chili Want to Go to War.

New Railroad to be Extended From Kansas to Mexico.

VENEZUELA BOUNDARY DISPUTE.

St. Louis, Dec. 20.—The first public celebration in connection with the world's fair to be opened in St. Louis in 1903, in commemoration of the purchase of Louisiana's 100th anniversary was held today, when ground was broken on the site of Forest park. This day was selected for the important event because it is the anniversary of the formal transfer of Louisiana territory to the United States. The day was a holiday in St. Louis and throughout Missouri, as well as most of the purchase states whose governors issued proclamations, asking general observance of "Louisiana Purchase Day."

Great preparations for the event had been made, but owing to the unusual severity of the weather it was decided to abandon some of the striking features. At the site of the educational building President Francis and other officials wielded a shovel successively, slattery A. Missouri national guard, fired a salute of sixty guns and moving pictures of these fires were taken for exhibition. The party were escorted to the Coliseum, where the remainder of the program was carried out.

The sixty guns were divided into nine groups with three-minute intervals, as follows: Twenty-five of the thirteen original states and those created from them; fourteen for the Louisiana purchase states; one for Florida, one for Texas, three for territories discovered and settled subsequent to 1848, five for states ceded by Mexico in 1848, nine for the insular possessions, one for Alaska, and one for the District of Columbia.

Governors Van Sant, of Minnesota, Savage, of Nebraska, Davis, of Arkansas, Beckwith, of Missouri, and Col. John Oglebay, representing Governor Yates, of Illinois, were present at the Coliseum.

President Francis, of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition company, presided. Hon. James A. Tawney, of Minnesota, chairman of the joint committee on expositions, and Commissioner John Aiken, of Mississippi, were the orators. A band of sixty pieces rendered patriotic music.

May Have a Fight. New York, Dec. 20.—The Buenos Ayres correspondent of the Herald cables: "The Argentine republic main and will maintain her rights. Chili does not accept the proposition, this government will insist upon its acceptance. People should be prepared for every emergency as the government is prepared."

NEW RAILROAD.

Work to Begin on a Line from Kansas to Mexico.

Kansas City, Dec. 20.—President Stillwell, of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient, has called the officers of the road the contract under which a European company is to furnish rails for the Orient in Mexico and take in payment the Mexican government subsidy when it has been signed. The first shipment is expected to reach Port Stillwell within ninety days. Rails will be laid at once to Elfinorte, the grade being ready. The first part of the line to be opened in the United States will be that already graded from Anthony, Kan., southwest into Oklahoma, and building will continue from there and out as fast as the grade is completed.

POLICE COURT.

A Teamster Violated Hitching Ordinance and was Fined.

W. W. Jones appeared before Judge Crawford, of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient, charged with violating the ordinance prohibiting teams being allowed to remain unhitched and unattended. As there has been so many runaways resulting from the lack of compliance with the ordinance referred to, an example was made of the delinquent in this case, but it being his first offense he was let off with a fine of \$5. The authorities are determined to use every means in their power to prevent runaways and possibly serious accidents, and to that end will strictly enforce the law requiring teams to be hitched when not attended by a driver. The public safety demands protection at the hands of the peace conservators and it behooves people who are in the habit of leaving horses alone and unhitched within the city limits to look to their own interests and save costs to themselves.

Case Argued. The case of C. H. Conner vs. The Territorial Medical Board has been argued and is under consideration by the judge, who will not render his decision for several days after having called for briefs on certain points bearing on the case.

SAMPSON'S SAY.

He Objects to Admiral Dewey's Report.

Appraiser Wakeman of New York Removed.

American Adventurers Sentenced to Prison by London Court.

DEATH OF AGED KANSAN.

Washington, Dec. 20.—Objection of Admiral Sampson to that portion of Admiral Dewey's report of the Schley court of inquiry, in which he says that Admiral Schley was in command at the battle of Santiago and entitled to credit for the victory, was filed with Secretary Long today. The document was brought to the navy department by Mr. E. S. Theall, of counsel for Admiral Sampson, who handed it to the secretary. "As counsel for Rear Admiral Sampson, we have the honor to request the department, for reasons below stated, to strike out or specifically disapprove that portion of Admiral Dewey's opinion filed in connection with the case in the proceedings of the special court of inquiry, in which he states his view to be that Commander Schley was in absolute command at the naval battle at Santiago."

1. Commander Schley was not in command at that battle. 2. The president of the United States and the navy department and decided that Admiral Sampson was in command at that battle, and Commander Schley second in command.

3. The question as to who commanded at Santiago was not referred to the court for consideration, and evidence bearing on that point was excluded.

These points are then elucidated in detail, evidence being added in support of each claim.

Appraiser Wakeman Removed. Washington, Dec. 20.—A conference today between the president and Secretary Gage, it is understood that it was decided to summarily remove appraiser Wakeman. Wakeman, it is said, wrote the president, attacking Secretary Gage. The president refused to accept the charge, and the judge sentenced Jackson to fifteen years penal servitude, and Mrs. Jackson to seven years.

Death of Aged Kansan. Allenton, Kan., Dec. 20.—Alexander Gunn, of Herrington, Kan., died here today from the effects of the cold weather. He claimed to be 116 years old.

Southern Pacific Victims. San Francisco, Dec. 20.—Two more names, making four in all, have been added to the list of fatalities resulting from the collision of trains of the Southern Pacific yesterday. John Cardona and Francisco Sanerimonok, section hands, both of whom were seriously burned, died today.

The Great Trotter, Cresceus, Booked to Arrive Tomorrow.
Dr. John Roger Haynes, the portly secretary of the Albuquerque Driving association, yesterday received a telegram from L. M. Boda, manager for Cresceus, giving the information that Mr. Ketcham, with his famous trotter and other horses, will arrive in Albuquerque tomorrow (Saturday) morning.
Dr. Haynes, likewise Colonel Shillock, are two enthusiastic horsemen, and this morning were noticed talking horse in good fashion. Finally, the doctor, with a mass of figures on the records of well-known trotting equines, which he had thoroughly memorized, presented the following interesting facts:

MARSHAL FORAKER'S OFFICE.
Case Postponed—Fornoff's Capture—Force of Experts.
United States Marshal Foraker was notified this morning by United States Attorney Childers that the case against Mock Sing and two other Chinamen, set for a hearing at 10 o'clock tomorrow, had been indefinitely postponed, on account of evidence which had failed to arrive from Portland, Ore., and in consequence Deputy Leatherman, who had detailed to be in attendance at the trial, will not leave for Deming tonight as he intended.
Deputy Fred Fornoff left last night for Gallup on official business. The morning morning, Mr. Fornoff, while returning to the city from the south, suspected a Chinese passenger on the train as unlawfully being in this country. He was arrested and gave his name as Ah Gin. He was required to give a bond of \$250 to await investigation, but, on failure to secure bonds, was lodged in the county jail yesterday afternoon by Deputy Hall. His case will be inquired into on January 7. Ah Gin has a certificate, but the officials believe that it is a forged one.

These experts are kept on the road almost constantly, and it is said, as an added fact, that a man man sneaking across the border of Mexico into Luna, Grant or Dona Ana counties, thitherward, can scent a deputy of the United States Marshal named above the moment he calls at the local depot to take a south bound passenger train, and in consequence, the almonayed celestial sneaks back into Mexico territory. Some few, however, owing to their pig-tails getting caught in the cactus, have been overtaken, but a majority of them usually escape capture.

THE LITTLE GOAT HERDER.
Lost in the Mountains—Found Frozen to Death.
Cornelio Murray, of Old Albuquerque, who was in Tlaxcala canyon when the little goat herder was lost, and who was a member of the searching party, was unable to help her last night and called at the Citizen office. He states that the name of the little fellow was Samuel Vigil and that he was about 7 years of age. He recently came from Valencia county on a visit to his relative, Monica Casias, who has a small sheep and goat ranch near the silver place. Last Friday afternoon, while playing in the sand of an arroyo with a little girl, the latter fell for her home near by, and as she departed told the boy to go up on a hill, where the goats were grazing, and help another boy to drive them to the pens. When the little fellow reached the top of the hill, he was the last time he was seen alive. The goats with the other herder had disappeared. On reaching the home of Mr. Casias, he inquired who was his nephew? Receiving no satisfactory response, Mr. Casias started out to search for the little fellow, but failing to find him, he reported the matter to the searching parties. The searchers also failed to find the boy until Wednesday afternoon. He had wandered over the hills and down the rocky canyon. Night coming on and the weather piercing cold, the little fellow huddled as close as possible to the trunk of a pine tree and did not sleep but to gradually freeze to death with no other sound save the bark of the coyotes and the shrieks of night hawks and owls. There beneath a stunted pinon tree, his frozen remains were found and taken to the home of his uncle, where a few hours later a burial took place.

A GOOD MINE.

"The Grey Eagle" Examined by Expert V. V. Clark.

Jimmy McCarrison, with mine expert V. V. Clark, returned late yesterday afternoon from a two day tour of inspection among the miners and prospectors of the Canyon district, where Mr. Clark was taken to give expert opinion on the ore dump from the Grey Eagle mine, owned and operated by Mr. McCarrison and Attorneys E. W. Dobson and T. N. Wilkerson. Mr. Clark was favorably impressed with the ore prospects of the mine, and says, with considerable emphasis, that the Grey Eagle, when given further development, will produce some of the richest gold-bearing ore of any of the mines now being developed in that district and there are some good properties in that canyon. Mr. McCarrison is thoroughly enthusiastic today over the reports of Mr. Clark, and awaits with interest and even excitement the results of the assay of the ore when Mr. Clark brought back to the city with him.

Specimens of Marble.

On Exhibition at Office of Judge Cnafee.

Special Correspondence.

Las Cruces, N. M., Dec. 19.—In the law court of Judge E. A. Chaffee, several specimens of marble are exhibited which are attracting a considerable amount of attention. The judge is interested in two very fine properties, one is located in the Potrillo mountains of Dona Ana county, and the other in the Trea Hermanos of Luna county. The marble of the Potrillo is white with streaks of black and red running through it, and the ledge is said to be exposed for 200 feet in length and fifty feet in width. This marble runs over 95 per cent. in time as limestone, and over 53 per cent. of lime as quicklime. It is very fine grain, hard, susceptible of high polish and would make a fine building stone. If it should be burned into lime, it carrying 1 1/2 ounces of silver per ton, the silver would make it more valuable for smelting purposes. The property is located three or four miles from the Southwestern railroad, now being constructed. The marble from the Trea Hermanos in Luna county, is situated about five miles from the same road.
