CONGRESSIONAL.

Debate on the Philippine Tariff Bill.

Steamer San Blas Sunk in the Pacific Ocean.

War Again Imminent Between Chili and Argentine Republics.

STORM IN NEBRASKA.

Washington, Dec. 18.—The house today resumed debate upon the bill to provide temporary revenues for the Philippine Islands, under agreement that the bill will be voted on at 4 o'clock this afternoon. Henry of Texas was the first speaker. He characterized the bill as oppressive and outrageous. He dwelt upon the injustice of a double export and import tax on rice, sugar and tobacco, and charged that this double taxation was in the interest of the sugar and tobacco trusts. Williams of Mississippi followed Henry. He said that to avoid embarrassment and difficulties in the situation he believed that we should get rid of the islands soon as we could do so, with honor to ourselves and benefit to the Filipinos. Williams paid his respects to the supreme court, which, he said, arrived at its decision by a shifting majority of one. It made of the old, inelastic, out-bound constitution an instrument that would lead to political necessities. Hepburn of Iowa supported the bill. He declared the Filipinos were incapable of self-government, so also were the Cubans. Motion to recommittal the Philippine bill was lost, 122 to 172. The bill was passed, 163 to 125.

SENATE.

The senate committee on military affairs today agreed to report favorably all army nominations before it except those to staff positions, concerning which questions had been raised. Platt of Connecticut offered a resolution suspending the rule providing for appointment of members of various senate committees and by ballot, the resolution was adopted. Platt then submitted another resolution appointing formally a committee to agree upon a census. It was adopted. The senate went into executive session.

SHIP SUNK.

Steamer San Blas Wrecked Off the Mexican Coast. San Francisco, Dec. 18.—A dispatch to the merchants' exchange says that the steamer San Blas, which left San Francisco, November 27, for Panama, was wrecked December 17, off La Lora, wrecked passengers and crew were saved.

Will Not Strike.

Philadelphia, Dec. 18.—By a vote of 60 to 12, the conductors and motormen of the Union Traction company, which controls all the street railway

lines in the city, this morning decided not to strike.

Copper Further Reduced.

New York, Dec. 18.—It was announced on Wall street today that the United Metals selling company, which handles the output of the Amalgamated Copper company, further reduced the price to the level of about 1 1/2 cents from the rate fixed last Friday. Quoted prices are now 14c for Lake copper, 13 1/2c for electrolytic, 12c for castings.

BLIZZARD RAGING IN ENGLAND.

New York, Dec. 18.—The general committee appointed yesterday at the labor and capital conference today held a private conference to take up its work. It was announced that a committee on the plan and scope upon which Senator Hanna, Archbishop Ireland, Bishop Potter, Messrs. Gompers, Nixon, Mitchell, Callaway, Sargent, Bliss, Senwab and Strauss have been named, would present a preliminary report during the day. Chairman Strauss made a brief statement for publication. "I cannot tell you anything about the plan for putting into practice the peaceful projects of this conference," he said. "We are at work on it and in due time it will be made public. I believe every man named on the committee will serve. All the labor leaders have accepted and in this epoch of making a union of labor and capital no man can deny his services to the project that means such great good for his country. Approval of the labor leaders means the cooperation of more than 2,000,000 organized workers. As we progress in this work it becomes more apparent that the chief cause of trouble in the past has arisen from misunderstanding. Never were truer words spoken than by John Mitchell, when he, who has seen more strikes than any man in his age in any country, said there never was a strike which could not be settled if the opposing interests had first met and fairly considered their respective rights. Senator Hanna was selected chairman of the general committee.

New Mexico demands Statehood from the Fifty-Seventh Congress.

The removal of Governor General Vance is the next thing in order.

The senate committee on territories will be favorable to the admission of new states.

Governor Otero will be given a rousing reception by his friends when he returns to Santa Fe.

Governor Otero has won his fight for the governorship, and the republicans of the territory rejoice.

General Funston has sailed for home from Manila, with other returning soldiers. He will have a big reception on his arrival, no doubt, especially from the people of Kansas.

At the presidential election five years ago the gold democrats cast about fifty votes in this territory, and no one has failed to send in their names for a federal office the fact has not been mentioned.

The statement of gross postal receipts at the fifty largest postoffices in the United States for November, compared with November of last year, shows a net increase of \$482,015, or over 11 per cent as a whole.

That reform league of Las Vegas will have to purify itself before it can gain the confidence of the people. Its present membership consists of old political rounders, who have been all things to all men to get and hold office.

In the death of Miss Gilmore this city loses one of the best of women. She was gentle and her ways lowly. She was a welcome guest in every home in the city, and her remains were followed to the grave by hundreds of mourning friends.

Successive winter storms somehow seem to reach farther and farther south. It may be only fancy, but such things as ice in Galveston and people perishing of cold in Atlanta and orange trees freezing in Florida were practically unknown until late years.

The Electrical Review in a recent issue gives data on the telephone business in the United States showing that including all companies there are 4,311 exchanges in operation with 2,375,711 telephones in use. The total capital invested is nearly \$500,000,000. One company employs 33,000 persons and handles a total of two billion calls per year.

The death of Charles McDonald almost causes his friends to doubt the wisdom of Providence. He was a man of the dawn of young manhood, with happy home and loving friends. In his chosen business of insurance a bright and prosperous future awaited him. He was an athlete and delighted in the activities of life. Cut down in the midst of his worldly enjoyments, his death is sincerely mourned by the whole city.

NOT DESIRABLE.
A man with such respect for himself will not be a candidate for federal office in New Mexico. To be forced to creep and crawl as at the mercy of any and every one who may file charges; to be deprived of the right to take part in political affairs; to be at the mercy of the powers that be, and possibly removed and disgraced at a moment's notice, is not pleasant to the independent private citizen. It is worth considerable to be able to look President Roosevelt or any other man in the eye, and ask him what he is going to do about it, if necessary to tell him to go to hades.

DANISH ISLANDS.
The United States has finally agreed to purchase the Danish West India Islands. The islands are three in number. Two of the islands, at John and St. Thomas, lie eastward of Porto Rico. The third, St. Croix, or Santa Cruz, lies south of the other two, at a distance of about 35 miles and south-east of Porto Rico.

St. Thomas has an area of 37 square miles; St. John 27 and Santa Cruz 74, making a total of 138 square miles. The islands are for the most part perpendicular. The horizontal portions are rare. The soil is broken and volcanic, but vegetation is tropical and rich.

The harbor of St. Thomas is circular, and from a military point of view very desirable. The city of St. Thomas, once the commercial metropolis of the West Indies, is now in decay. The population is mixed. There are perhaps 40,000 inhabitants in the group, most of them being on Santa Cruz, the largest island. At least half are negroes.

DREAM OF THE ALCHEMIST.

From time immemorial the alchemist has pursued his mysterious course, discredited yet undaunted in the firm determination to revolutionize the world's finances by transmitting its iron or brass or copper into shining gold. As later ages have brought on variations in his breed, nowadays he seeks to rob Neptune of the gold in the sea, or with magic wand strike the barren rock till it glistens with the yellow particles that furnish the root of evil.

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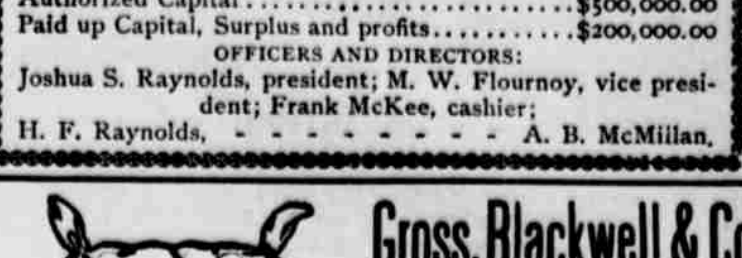

TERRIBLE PERITONITIS.

The Death of Charles Lynn McDonald

Yesterday Afternoon.

OTHER DEATHS.

Charles Lynn McDonald died at 5:35 yesterday afternoon at the residence of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. McDonald, No. 517 South Third Street, from peritonitis.

The subject of this sketch was a well-known and popular young man of this city. He was born in Thompson, Iowa, Davis county, Ill., March 2, 1873, and came to Albuquerque Nov. 16, 1892, with his father, a little over nine years ago, followed shortly afterward by his mother, sister May, and brother Roy.

The deceased was for a few terms the popular clerk of the local board of education, but when he became a benedict, marrying Miss Bess Leand, who was a native of this city, he took up his residence in Roswell and engaged in the real estate and insurance business. This happy event occurred on March 9, 1905, and in September last, desiring to be near his parents and in business with his brother Roy, who had succeeded him as school board clerk, he came to Albuquerque and joined the firm of McDonald Bros. insurance agents, and arranged to remove here, with his wife, the latter part of this month, his wife remaining in Roswell to sell off the household effects and to arrange final matters for her departure.

Four weeks ago last Sunday Charles and Roy McDonald left on a southern trip for the Mutual Life Insurance company and last Sunday morning, while walking along the street in Tucson, A. T., Charles complained of severe pains in his stomach. He thought it was the cramps, but when Dr. Rogers was called he shook his head and said: "He will be very sick and not at all, on this advice, Charles was brought home by Roy, and his death resulted last yesterday afternoon from a most severe attack of peritonitis.

All day yesterday the deceased battled against the inevitable—death, and when his friends, those young men who were athletes in the diamond field, in the volunteer fire department, and as a volunteer soldier, called to see him, he assured them that he was too young yet to yield up his life, and would yet be among them. When his family called at his bed, a few hours before the final dissolution, he was yet full of hope, and while those around could hardly suppress their tears, Charles said: "I am going to live, and here is papa, mamma, Roy, May and Bess (his wife), whom I will make cheerful and happy next week."

Next week will never come to Charles McDonald, and when Dr. Pearce, assisted by Dr. Wroth, announced the slow approach of the patient, submitted to the call without an apparent pain and the grief-stricken family, with the tear-stained faces, resigned themselves to the summons.

Mrs. Payton, a sister of Mrs. Charles McDonald, is expected here tomorrow morning from El Paso.

The funeral will occur at 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon from the Lead Avenue Methodist church.
