Considering Ways to Suppress Anarchy.

Nicaragua Canal Bill Considered by the Senate.

President of Publishing Company Acquitted of Conspiracy.

KRUGER'S HOME IN SWITZERLAND.

Washington, Dec. 11.—Judge Ray, chairman of the house judiciary committee, has called a meeting of the committee for tomorrow, when important questions restricting anarchy and anarchy and formulating an anti-trust measure will be discussed informally. As to the anti-trust legislation, conferences will be held with the president and speaker Henderson with a view of determining along what lines it is desirable to proceed.

Chairman Hepburn has called a meeting of the committee on interstate and foreign commerce for Friday, when plans for isthmian canal legislation will be formulated. Hepburn said today that he saw no reason why the Nicaragua canal bill could not be reported by next Tuesday, but he will not ask the house to act upon the measure until the Hay-Pauncefote treaty is ratified by the senate.

Hay-Pauncefote Treaty.
For twenty minutes the senate was occupied with routine business then went into executive session to consider the Hay-Pauncefote treaty.
In the executive session Senator Culberson spoke briefly in criticism of the treaty. Mr. Bacon criticised it as an American and said it contained many objectionable features of the original agreement, while it was entirely unimproved as the old treaty had been by senate amendments. He said, however, that he would not obstruct the ratification of the new treaty.

At 2:50 p. m. the senate adjourned.

Philippine Tariff.
At a meeting of ways and means committee today Chairman Payne was directed to favorably report the Philippine tariff bill, which the republican members of the committee agreed upon yesterday. The report will be made Friday and the bill will be considered in the house next Tuesday, with a vote at 4 p. m. Wednesday.

CARNAHAN ACQUITTED.
President of a Publishing Company Acquitted of Charge of Conspiracy.
Columbus, Ohio, Dec. 11.—The jury in the Carnahan conspiracy case returned a verdict of not guilty today. Carnahan, president of the United States Mail and Navy Publishing company, Washington, was charged with conspiring with a number of agents, five of whom are now serving time in the penitentiary to defraud by falsifying the agents to be officers of the pension bureau. The case has attracted widespread attention.

Kruger's Home.
Utrecht, Dec. 11.—Mr. Kruger, former president of the South African republic, arrived here and has taken possession of his new residence. Mr. Kruger, who appeared in excellent

health, received a great ovation from the crowds.

SHOT BY A SOCIALIST.

Editorial Writer in New York Shot by a Socialist Publisher.
New York, Dec. 11.—Francis Ives, editorial writer on an afternoon newspaper, was shot early this morning by Alexander Horr, bookbinder and printer, and is in a critical condition. The wounded man made a statement to the coroner. Horr was taken to the hospital to be identified by Ives. Ives said to him: "You are an anarchist and publisher of anarchistic literature." Ives rented a room for himself, wife and 4-year-old son from Horr, about a month ago. The rent had been paid up until today. Yesterday Ives told Horr that he intended to move. The shooting seems to have followed an attempt by Ives to enter his room after he had been locked out by Horr.

Known in Texas.
Dallas, Tex., Dec. 11.—Alexander Horr is well known in Dallas and other Texas cities. Six or seven years ago he published a chain of socialist papers in this state.

Burglars Fled.
Cincinnati, Dec. 11.—Burglars made an unsuccessful attempt to rob the safe of the First National bank of Cincinnati, Clermont county, early today. Thomas Donald armed himself and an exchange of shots followed which awakened the town, and the burglars fled.

No Agreement Reached.
Chicago, Dec. 11.—No agreement was reached in the meeting of western railroads here today relative to the new fast time schedule between Chicago and St. Paul, and the Missouri river.

London, Dec. 11.—Lord Kitchener, in a dispatch from Standerton, Transvaal Colony, announces that General Bruce Hamilton, after a night march, surprised and captured practically the whole of the Boer Bethel command at Trichardfontein, early that morning. Seven Boers were killed and 131 made prisoners.

FEDERATION OF LABOR.
Trying to Harmonize Matters with Federation of Miners.
Scranton, Pa., Dec. 11.—At the American federation of labor convention this morning the report of the executive council was read by James Duncan, of Boston, first vice president.

The council regrets the effort made in certain parts of the west to divide and injure the labor movement, and recommends that members of the council be sent to the convention of the western federation of miners, with the object of bringing about harmony. The following committee was appointed to consider all questions of trade autonomy: President Samuel Gompers; James Duncan, of Boston; John Mitchell, of Indianapolis; John P. Mulholland, of Toledo, Ohio; C. N. Hughes, of San Antonio, Texas.

A resolution recommending that organizers of the federation make an effort to organize the school teachers was unanimously adopted. A recommendation from the committee on labels instructing the executive council to secure the passage of a national law, protecting and unionizing union labels, was adopted.

LOCAL PARAGRAPHS.

Illustrated in the history of the race.

"New Mexico has come within an ace of being admitted to statehood several times, but was never so close to it as in the session of congress of 1874, when an enabling act preliminary to its admission was passed by both the house and the senate. The bill provided not only for statehood for our territory, but also for Colorado, which was vigorously championed by Messrs. Ellkins and Patterson, delegates in the house. Some amendment to the act was the last remaining thing and there seemed absolutely no doubt as to the result, because, as I have stated, there has been talking about it and there were the two branches of congress.

"But right here fate played a trick and spoiled the game. Just prior to final action on the bill Mr. Conger of Michigan changed to make a red-hot speech of the blood shirt order, and party passion being easily aroused in that day, at the close of his remarks he got a tremendous salvo of applause from the republican side. The southern democrats were boiling over with anger at Conger's denunciation of Dixie. Ellkins hadn't heard the speech, had no idea of what the Michigan man was saying, and he, too, got so excited upon the floor just as Conger ended his philippic, pressed forward to congratulate him, because all the other republicans were shaking his hand so delightedly. Here's where Ellkins innocently got a fall. When the Georgia, and Alabama and Mississippi men, who had promised to vote for statehood for New Mexico, saw the delegate rapturously shaking Conger by the hand, they voted solidly against the bill and there were enough of them to compass its defeat."
