BANK ROBBERY IN OHIO.

Washington, Dec. 7.—Deputy Den-
niss Flynn has had a long talk with the
president on the subject of statehood
for Oklahoma. Mr. Flynn and the other
supporters of the statehood project
were very much disappointed over the
fact that Mr. Roosevelt did not recom-
mend in his message favorable action
on the Oklahoma statehood propo-
sition, and it was at first thought the
president's apparent indifference
would be used to advantage by the op-
ponents of the statehood measure. It
has since been learned that he did not
discuss this subject on account of the
difference of opinion in Oklahoma con-
cerning the proposition to include the
Indian Territory in the new state.

But for this some specific declara-
tion would have been made. It is un-
derstood that the president favors the
admission of both Oklahoma and New
Mexico and that he has said that if
congress passed bills creating statehood
of these territories he would sign them
without hesitation. Mr. Flynn will pro-
ceed to push the Oklahoma bill ener-
getically, and he has strong reasons
for the belief that he will be passed.

STOPPED SHIPMENT.
No more wheat for shipment to
Mexico will be taken by the Santa Fe
road, according to an order just issued
by the freight department of the road.
The reason is the congested condition
of the wheat traffic at El Paso, the
Santa Fe's Mexican gateway, due to
the attempt on the part of President
Diaz to smash the Mexican wheat com-
bine.

It is reported that 3,000,000 bushels
of wheat are blockaded at El Paso,
waiting for transfer to cars to carry
it down into Mexico. The Santa Fe
has hundreds of cars tied up at El
Paso, with no prospect of immediate
release.

COMING NEW STATES.
The St. Louis Globe-Democrat says
that the unanimity with which the
leading western newspapers favor the
admission of the remaining territories
to statehood is significant. A strong
statehood movement is under way in
New Mexico and Arizona, while Okla-
homa has been asking admission for
the past year or two. The fact that
most of the people of Oklahoma and
the Indian Territory were in favor of
entering as a single state is going to
make Oklahoma's admission easy. In
the census of 1900 Oklahoma was
given a population of 39,000 and the
Indian Territory one of 392,000. The
recent influx of settlers into Okla-
homa has probably known the natural
increase rate from this, put that ter-
ritory's population up to 450,000 or
over at present.

In the present congress, therefore,
the question of the admission of sev-
eral of the territories will receive
much attention. Arizona, the smallest
of the territories, had 122,000 inhabi-
tants in 1900, but as it more than
doubled in population in the preceding
ten years, the chances are that it will
reach the 150,000 mark by the end of
the present congress in 1903. New
Mexico, the next smallest of the ter-
ritories, had 124,000 population in 1900,
and, though it grew to the extent of
only 26 per cent in the preceding ten
years, its inhabitants are up to the
unit of population in the representa-
tion of the states in congress. Okla-
homa and the Indian Territory, if
united, would enter the union with a
population of not far from 900,000,
which would give them great prestige
as a state. There are about twenty
states which each have less than the
many inhabitants.

The advance of a territory to state
rank immediately and materially adds
to the political privileges of its inhabi-
tants. A state governs itself, while a
territory has most of its political af-
fairs controlled by congress. The
larger prerogatives and opportunities
which come to a community as soon
as it passes into the circle of the states
is an inducement which makes state-
