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CZOLGOSZ HAS BROKEN DOWN

He Showed Upon His Arrival at
Auburn That He is a Craven
Coward.

HE SAID THAT HE IS SORRY

The Deputy Sheriffs Had to Drag Him
Into the Penitentiary as He Had Broken
Down for Fright—He Yelled
Like a Maniac.

Auburn, N. Y., Sept. 27.—Czolgosz, President McKinley's murderer, in the custody of Sheriff Caldwell of Erie county, and twenty-one deputies, arrived at Auburn at 3:15 a. m. The prison is only about fifty yards from the depot. Awaiting the arrival of the train there was a crowd of about 200 people. Either for fear of the crowd, which was not very demonstrative, or from the sight of the prison, Czolgosz's legs gave out and two deputies were compelled practically to carry the man into the prison. Inside of the gate, his condition became worse and he was dragged upstairs and into the main hall. He was placed in a sitting position, while his handcuffs were being removed, but fell over and moaned and groaned, evincing the most abject terror. As soon as the handcuffs were unlocked the man was dragged into the principal keeper's office. During the operation of changing, Czolgosz cried and yelled. The prison physician, Dr. John Cherin, examined the man and declared him to be suffering from fright and terror, but shamming to some extent. Enroute from Buffalo he showed no indication of breaking down. He ate heartily and smoked. He expressed regret for his crime, and said: "I am especially sorry for Mrs. McKinley."

AN ANARCHIST EDITOR ARRESTED.

Spring Valley, Ills., Sept. 27.—John Ciancibilla, proprietor of L'Aurore, an anarchist paper published here, which gloried over the assassination of President McKinley, was arrested here today by United States Marshal St. Clair of Stretator. Postoffice Inspector B. F. Gilbert worked up the case. The charge is publishing lottery notices.

THE START FROM BUFFALO.

Buffalo, Sept. 27.—Before sentence was passed yesterday afternoon, the assassin evinced a desire to speak, but could not get his voice above a whisper and his words were repeated to the court by his counsel.

"There was no one else but me," the prisoner said, in a whisper. "No one else told me to do it, and no one paid me to do it. I was not told anything about crime, and I never thought anything about it until a couple of days before the crime was committed."

Czolgosz sat down. He was calm, but it was evident his mind was flooded with thoughts of his own distress. His cheeks were a trifle pale and his outstretched hand trembled as the guards put the handcuffs on his wrists. He looked at one of the officers and there was an expression of the profoundest fear and helplessness in his eyes. He glanced about at the people who crowded the room in an effort to get a look at him. The prisoner's eyelids rose and fell tremulously and then he fixed his gaze upon the floor in front of him. At this point Judge Titus came over to the prisoner and bade him goodbye. Czolgosz replied very faintly, letting his eyes rest upon the man who has been his counsel. "Goodbye," he said, weakly.

Czolgosz was then hurried down the stairs and through the "tunnel of sobers" to the jail room where he was taken to the Auburn state prison to await death by electrocution. Sheriff Caldwell and eleven men took the prisoner in a special car attached to the regular New York Central train. The train left at 10:06 last night. Czolgosz was "sneaked" out the back entrance of the Erie county jail, surrounded by seventeen men and hustled into a special car, which had been backed down on the Terrace tracks a few rods in the rear of the jail a minute or so before. Sheriff Caldwell arranged for the departure and his moves were kept so secret and were so cleverly managed that no one but the guards knew of the assassin being smuggled out of the jail.

The moment the car arrived Czolgosz appeared, handcuffed to Jailer Mitchell and surrounded by the sheriff and his deputies and Chief McMaster of the Auburn police department. The news that the car containing the assassin was on the track spread rapidly. Just before the train pulled out a representative of the Associated Press saw Czolgosz seated in the car, and smoking a cigar in the seat with the prisoner was Jailer Mitchell, and surrounding him were several armed officers. These precautions were taken because the authorities received word from an official source that the sheriff might encounter considerable difficulty in getting the prisoner to Auburn. Just what sort of trouble was feared cannot be learned, but great care was taken that no advance news of the departure of the train was telegraphed along the line.

A RUSSIAN TRICK.

It Will Acquire the Chinese Navy as Part of Its Indemnity.

Shanghai, Sept. 27.—China is favorably considering the Russian offer to purchase the Pel Yang squadron, consisting of three fast cruisers, four torpedo boat destroyers and some third class cruisers. The price, 5,000,000 roubles, is to be deducted from the war indemnity.

TROUBLE AT PANAMA.

An Attack by the Colombian Rebels is Feared.

Colon, Sept. 27.—Panama for a week or more has been terribly unsettled, owing to apparently well founded reports that an expedition, under General Domingo Diaz, which sailed from Corinto, Nicaragua, two weeks ago, had effected a safe landing at a place called Chane, 50 miles south of Panama. Chane offers splendid natural facilities for resisting attack, and the expedition is said to be well armed and equipped and to be in possession of modern guns. General Diaz, whose son played a prominent part in last year's battle at Panama, is a Colombian and a large cattle owner.

It is supposed that the troops under Victoriano Lorenzo, who was recently in the vicinity of Panama, have effected a junction with General Patino's troops and are now near Cherrera, only one day's journey from Panama. Presumably they are waiting a union with the Nicaraguan contingent under General Diaz in order to make a combined assault upon Panama.

The government has dispatched 200 troops to Matachin station, the nearest point on the railroad leading to Cherrera, and is fully alive to the fact that Venezuela, Ecuador and Nicaragua are openly aiding the liberal or insurgent cause. The Colombian authorities are making strenuous efforts to maintain the sovereignty over a large importation of rifles, guns and ammunition. They have also purchased in Europe two additional war vessels.

Dixon Defeated.

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 27.—Benny Yanger of Chicago, gained the decision here last night over George Dixon, former feather weight champion of the world, after fifteen rounds of fast fighting. It was only Dixon's ring generalship that saved him from a knock-out.

A Divorce for Mrs. Pullman.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 27.—Judge Bishop today granted a decree of divorce to Mrs. Lynn Pullman, from George M. Pullman, son of the late palace car magnate. Alimony, \$1,000 a year, and the plaintiff was granted permission to apply for an increase of alimony.

GOATS IN LINCOLN COUNTY.

A Fine Grade of Animals is Being Introduced There.

Lincoln county is awakening to the profit in raising goats, and the Angora goat and a better grade of sheep are beginning to cover the fine grazing lands of that county. L. W. Stewart and Jesse Vandervoort of near White Oaks have purchased a number of registered goats at the American Angora Goat Breeders Association, Kansas City. Last spring Taylor & Son sold the fine Mohair buck, Lazarus for \$700.00 at the age of 15 months. Moses, the sire of this animal was purchased by Geo. L. Ulrich, and also three half brothers of Lazarus. Eugene L. Stewart bought the famous El Cid, a half brother of Moses; he also bought Argus, a half brother of Lazarus, and 7 head of doe yearlings, all registered stock. Moses and El Cid were valued at \$250 each and each of the other bucks at \$150 per head. These goats are the very best blooded animals to be had in the southwest, and will soon grade the already fine stock of Mohairs these people have up to valuable animals.

NO ATTORNEYS FOR SAMPSON

The Admiral Asks That Messrs.
Stayton and Campbell Be Allowed
to Represent Him.

SCHLEY IN A BAD LIGHT

The Government Will Conclude Its Testimony by the End of Next Week—Fifteen or Twenty More Witnesses Will Be Introduced.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 27.—As usual, Admiral Dewey lost no time today in bringing the Schley court of inquiry to order. Captain Lemly estimates that he will be able to conclude the presentation of the government side of the case by the close of next week, if no unforeseen contingency arises to cause delay. He says fifteen or twenty more witnesses will be introduced.

Captain Wise, in making verbal changes in the official copy of his testimony concerning the order of the navy department of May 20, 1898, directing him to "inform every vessel off Santiago and the flying squadron off Cienfuegos," said he desired to correct his response to the court's inquiry as to why the order was not carried out, by stating that it had been carried out.

Answering the court, he said he did not need Captain Sigbee to give Commodore Schley the information regarding the whereabouts of the Spanish squadron.

Lieutenant Spencer S. Wood continued his testimony. He said that while off Cienfuegos, he was on picket duty, two miles from shore, on the night of May 22. He said Captain Harbor was wrong in saying that no picket vessels were within the line of the fleet off Cienfuegos.

Lieutenant John Hood, who commanded the Hawk, was the next witness. On May 23, he delivered dispatches from Sampson to Schley off Cienfuegos. He said Schley said he would not go to Santiago and expressed the belief that the Spaniards might be at Cienfuegos.

The witness said that Schley also complained of the shortness of the coal supply. The witness told him that a collier was coming within three hours; and that Sampson regarded the information about the Spaniards as definite. Schley replied that Sampson was not in a position to know.

Judge Advocate Lemly read a letter from Admiral Sampson, dated Lake Sunapee, N. H., September 2, asking Messrs. Stayton and Campbell to be allowed to represent him in the case. The court decided that they could not appear.

Captain McCalla, who commanded the Marblehead, was called as a witness at 2:40 p. m. Captain McCalla stated that he first came in contact with the flying squadron May 19, 1898. He had been asked aboard for the purpose of making a report. On reaching Key West, he informed Captain Chadwick, Admiral Sampson's chief of staff, of the secret code he had arranged with the Cuban insurgents, but had not given it to any one else.

Captain McCalla told of his return to Cienfuegos on the morning of May 24. He carried dispatches to Admiral Schley, and then told of his arrangement to communicate with the Cubans and giving the information that the Spanish fleet was in the harbor at Santiago.

Schley immediately assented to his going ashore. Schley said he had trouble coaling, but felt that if he returned to Key West he would be court-martialed. McCalla said he advised him to go to Santiago even if he did not stay there.

At 3:35 the court adjourned until tomorrow.

Found Water at Carlizoso.

Parties boring for water for the El Paso and Northeastern railway at Carlizoso have struck a flow of excellent water at a depth of 700 feet. Another well is to be commenced at once and continued deeper for artesian water.

A Temporary School House.

The board of education of Albuquerque, has decided to erect a temporary frame building with two rooms to relieve the congested condition of the public school houses of the city. The cost of the building will be \$750.

A Busy Flour Mill.

The Gunn Brothers flour mill at Lagunas, Valencia county, is running day and night. A superior grade of flour is being turned out for which there is a bigger demand in New Mexico than can be supplied.

A NEW MINING PROPOSITION.

The Little Charlie Group in the Mogollon District to be Worked—Other Mines.

Two shifts are being worked on the tunnel of the Legal Tender mine at Elizabethtown. The tunnel is being driven to intercept the shaft. After this has been completed, heavy hoisting machinery will be put in.

J. F. Lucius, who recently bought a lead property in the Caballo mountains north of Rincon in Sierra county, has sunk a 70-foot shaft and uncovered a fine vein of copper. The ore averages 26 per cent copper and the vein is three feet wide.

The Smithfield company of Pittsburg, Pa., for whom Frank Spurr is the manager, has put in an 80-horse power boiler for their hoisting works at the Bobtail mine at the head of Grouse gulch in the Elizabethtown district in Colfax county.

The Little Charlie, Combination and Little Giant at Cooney in the Mogollon mining district, Socorro county, are on the extension of the Little Fannie vein. With a depth of less than 250 feet the Little Fannie has already produced \$1,000,000 and has blocked out ore reserves worth almost double that amount. In the Little Fannie drift nearest the Little Charlie and running in that direction the breast of ore is about 12 feet in width and averages about \$50 a ton, principally in gold. At both points of development in the Little Charlie a strong vein is opened and at one point the work is believed to have already tapped the rich ore chute which has given such great value to the adjoining mine. From a sample shipment of 1,900 pounds, the returns were \$7,000.

The Florida belongs to the same group and has produced considerable ore of shipping grade, the values of which are principally in gold. The Laura, Mame, and Christmas adjoining the Florida, are not as yet extensively developed although the surface indications are very promising. The Independence and the Postmistress are on the King vein and the ore averages high in gold, silver and copper. The Ninety-Eight and Bloomer Girl are on the extension of the Silver Bar or Cooney mine, which is now producing above \$20,000 a month in a small mill. Three carloads of shipping ore from the Cooney mine at one time produced \$33,000. The development work on these claims shows gold and silver as well as a good per cent of copper. Shipments of the ore have been made to the Silver City reduction works. The Malachite, Little Johnnie, Nancy Hanks, Selma, Iron Hat, and Little Katie all belong to the same group. They are spurs on the Queen vein. The Mogollon Gold and Copper company was incorporated last week to develop and work these claims.

COLFAX COUNTY DISTRICT COURT.

Two Murder Cases Disposed of—Sentenced for Larceny.

At district court at Raton this week, Frank Daglio, accused of murder, pleaded not guilty. In the case of the Territory vs. Daniel F. Garcia for murder, the indictment was withdrawn by the territory and the prisoner pleaded guilty to murder in the second degree. The murder occurred at Gardiner, the defendant carving up his victim with a knife.

Guy Wolf pleaded guilty to the charge of larceny and was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary. The sentence was suspended during the good behavior of the defendant, and upon his paying the costs. Napoleon Canton pleaded guilty to the charge of forgery. J. Fidel Martinez was found guilty of assault with intent to murder. Antonio C. Garcia pleaded guilty to forgery.

THE NEIGHBORS RANCH SOLD.

An Important Land Deal Completed in Otero County.

The large Neighbors ranch near Estey City has been sold to a Boston syndicate. The deal was closed for the Boston people by G. Pray Smith of Boston and J. M. Bryson of Battle Creek, Michigan. The ranch is located in the Tularosa valley in the foothills of the Oscura mountains in Otero county, and extends a distance of twenty miles along Tularosa creek. It covers 85,000 acres of patented land under fence with an immense area of outside pasture. The ranch is just north of Major Fowell's ranch. There are 500 head of cattle on the ranch, but the new owners will stock it with 2,000 head of thoroughbred cattle.

Killed in a Coal Mine.

Antonio Visconti was caught in a fall of slate while doing entry work at one of the coal mines at Gallup. His head breast and one leg were crushed. He leaves a wife and five children. He owned considerable property at Gallup and was a member of the Red Men's lodge.

Attempted Murder at Gardiner.

Thomas Woolley shot "Buster" McKee at Gardiner, Colfax county, this week in a quarrel. The chances for McKee's recovery are very slight. Both men are negroes. The shooting occurred a few minutes before midnight on Monday.

A Big Fire at Guayaquil.

Guayaquil, Ecuador, Sept. 27.—A fire on Wednesday night, which destroyed eleven blocks at the south end of the city and involved a loss of a million sucres, caused great distress among the poor people who inhabited that quarter. A fund for their relief was opened yesterday.

MRS. M'KINLEY IS HOLDING HER OWN

In Some Respects She Even Shows
An Improvement in Her
Condition.

M'KINLEY'S WILL IS FILED

No Executors Are Named But Mrs. McKinley Will Recommend Judge Day and Secretary Cortelyou—The Latter is Now at Canton.

Canton, O., Sept. 27.—The secretary to the president, Cortelyou, reached this city this morning. Dr. Rixey met him and they went to the McKinley house. While there is no material change in the condition of Mrs. McKinley since the secretary was here, she has held her own and has shown more interest in personal affairs. Her condition is such that Cortelyou can go over the matters with her which brought him here. The will of McKinley will probably be filed this afternoon. No executors are named. Mrs. McKinley, it is said, will recommend that Judge Day and Cortelyou administer the estate.

ASSESSMENT RETURNS OF GUADALUPE COUNTY.

Territorial Auditor W. G. Sargent yesterday afternoon received the duplicate of the assessment returns of Guadalupe county, the last of the 11 counties to be received. The assessment of the county is \$987,064, the exceptions amount to \$50,972, leaving the taxable assessment at \$936,092, a loss of \$98,407 since last year and making the per capita assessment \$171, or about the average of the territory. In detail, the assessment is as follows: 1,632 acres of agricultural lands \$12,815, a loss of 133 acres since last year; improvements thereon \$4,632, a loss of \$7,000; 314,238 acres of pastoral lands \$102,327, a loss of 77,000 acres; improvements thereon \$20,154, a loss of \$5,000; city lots and improvements \$25,004; saw and flour mills \$900; notes and book accounts \$400; 3,952 horses \$35,661; 259 mules \$4,890; 14,691 cattle \$165,626, a loss of 3,000 head of cattle; 224,272 sheep \$255,624, a gain of 15,000 sheep; 2,735 goats \$5,042; 39 swine \$78; 736 burros \$1,523; vehicles \$10,277; 164 sewing machines \$2,240; harness \$3,799; merchandise \$17,935; farming implements \$1,746; fixtures in stores and saloons \$900; money \$50; bonds and stock in corporations \$968; watches and clocks \$299; books \$59; jewelry \$163; musical instruments \$241; household furniture \$7,883; hay \$64; wool \$2,380; lumber \$10; blacksmiths' and carpenters' tools \$108; other property \$846.

MRS. FREEMAN HELD.

She Must Answer the Charges Made Against Her in New Mexico.

At Las Cruces on Wednesday Attorney Stealy of El Paso and Attorney Chaffee of Las Cruces attempted to secure the discharge of Mrs. Freeman from the Dona Ana county jail on habeas corpus proceedings before Judge Parker. In asking for her discharge the attorneys set up that Mrs. Freeman was unlawfully detained, and argued what had been extrajudicial for one offense and held for trial in Dona Ana county on another.

After hearing all the evidence Judge Parker held that the prisoner was arrested in New Mexico as a fugitive from justice; that the evidence showed that she could be held for trial on charges against her in Dona Ana county. The several bonds the woman was required to make amount in the aggregate to \$900.

A Suit for \$36,442 Damages.

In the district court for Grant county, a suit has been brought by Selma Montoya against the Azure Mining Co. for \$36,442 for damages for the death of her husband, Bautista Montoya, who was fatally injured by a fall of rock on July 31, 1900, in the turquoise mines of the defendant company in the Burro mountains. The plaintiff alleges carelessness, negligence and unskillful conduct on part of the defendant in the operation of its property and also the employment of incompetent miners, as the result of which the accident occurred. By careful compilation of mortality statistics, it is figured out that the deceased had lived his allotted age and had been employed during the remainder of his life at the wages he was receiving at the time of his death, he would have earned the sum above stated and consequently damages for that amount are asked.

Maggio at Albuquerque.

Antonio Maggio, the anarchist, has been taken from the Silver City jail to the jail at Albuquerque. Maggio is under \$10,000 bond to appear before the grand jury which will meet at Las Cruces next month. Maggio speaks freely, and admits that he is an anarchist but denies that his signs have ever been directed against the United States. Italy, his native land, is the country to be reformed by anarchist methods. Maggio says that his mother, brother and sister, are on their way from Italy to the United States. He has two brothers in the United States who, too, are anarchists.

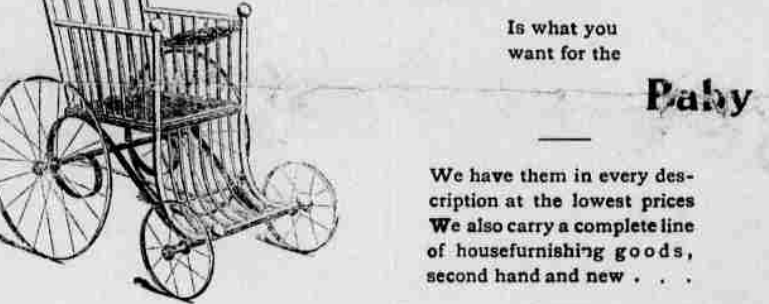

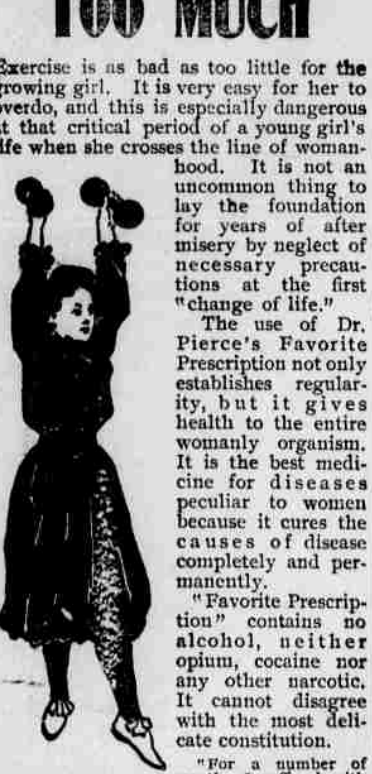

There are 230 convicts in the territorial penitentiary today and all are kept busy.

The committee of arrangements of the McKinley memorial exercises will hold a meeting this evening at the office of Mayor Amado Chaves.

Luis Gonzales was required yesterday by Justice of the Peace Francisco Anaya to give a peace bond for \$200 to keep the peace. The complaint had been made by Manuel Montoya.

A grand ball will be given at Gray's hall, the proceeds to be used as payment on violin recently purchased by Professor G. H. Bain. The ball will take place on Saturday evening, October 5, 1901. Tickets will be offered for sale at several business places.

Martin Ryan, aged 30 years, who came to Santa Fe several months ago for his health, died this forenoon of throat consumption, at St. Vincent's hospital. Undertaker James McCabe took charge of the remains. Interment will be made in Cedar Hill cemetery.

A slight thunderstorm passed over the city last night, but only .01 of an inch of rain fell. The maximum temperature yesterday was 77 degrees and the minimum 58 degrees. The temperature this morning at 6 o'clock was 58 degrees. Cooler weather is promised for tonight.

Superintendent Bursum of the territorial penitentiary, expects to be able some time in October to detail a force of convicts to construct a brick sidewalk from the postoffice and a crossing across Palace avenue to the Lamy building now occupied by the New Mexican Printing company.

Probate Clerk Manuel Delgado today recorded the deed of the City of Santa Fe to Addison Walker for a lot in precinct No. 4. There are still many city deeds which have not yet been recorded. It may save much trouble and expense to property owners to have this attended to.

The street supervisor has cleaned out the water street sewer and has urged property owners along Water street to cover it. To hide a nuisance however is not to put away with it and the city cannot move too soon in the matter of building a modern sewer on Water street even if each property owner along the street is assessed pro rata to pay the cost of the sewer.

Land Commissioner A. A. Keen has made arrangements with Hon. H. O. Bursum, to have a good brick pavement laid in front of the Old Palace and along Washington avenue as far as the executive mansion of Governor Otero. Mr. Keen deserves the gratitude of the community for pushing the improvements at the Old Palace and it behooves the property owners along Palace avenue and along the other principal streets to follow this good example.

Paul Wunschmann went to Albuquerque yesterday, it being the first visit he has paid the Duke City in twelve years. He went on business and incidentally will take in Ringling's circus.

J. P. Bretz, substitute night operator at the Santa Fe depot in this city, left this forenoon for Dillon. J. C. Sears, the regular night operator, will return home this evening from a vacation trip to his old home in New York state.

M. G. Reynolds, United States attorney for the court of private land claims, left this forenoon for his home at St. Louis, from where he will go next week to Washington, to argue the San Pedro and the Agua Prieta land grant cases before the United States supreme court. Both grants are situated in Arizona.

District Court.

J. L. Van Arsdale and Phillip J. Barber today in the district court for Santa Fe county, filed a suit against James B. Orman of Pueblo, Colorado, for a judgment for \$2,000. In 1885 the district court gave judgment against Orman for \$1,050 in favor of Adam J. Hager. Orman left New Mexico before execution was issued. Hager sold the judgment to the plaintiffs above mentioned in August 1898. They allege that they have upon several occasions demanded payment of the judgment but had been refused and therefore bring suit.

The Nashville Students

The famous funsters and laugh generators that have been gathered together by combining the original Nashville students with Gideon's Big Minstrel Carnival will be in Santa Fe next Monday evening.

Novel and elaborate stage settings and costumes, which have taxed the scenic artist's and costumer's skill and ingenuity have been prepared to delight the eye and the world of music has been probed to its innermost depths for effects to charm the ear. A big street parade is one of the features.

Csolgoss Was in New Mexico.

John Card, a hardware merchant of Silver City, believes that Csolgoss worked for him, while Card was in the mining business several years ago. He says that in the summer of 1887 a man about 22 years of age made his way about across the country from Silver City to their mining camp at Black Hawk, about 30 miles southwest, and requested employment which was given him. The young man stated that his name was Fred Nieman, but insisted that he be called "Fritz" and later admitted that Nieman was not his correct name. Mr. Card stated that he early observed that Nieman was a precipitate sort of a fellow as for instance at one time he dropped a large tin can full of water down a 60-foot shaft to the men below; this, in the opinion of Nieman, being the surest and quickest method of delivery. At another time at the risk of men's lives he delivered some heavy tools to them in the same manner. Nieman was finally discharged for his peculiar actions. Mr. Card is positive the man is the same one that shot President McKinley as he recognizes him by his picture.

Albuquerque's Railroad Plans.

Mayor O. N. Marron of Albuquerque, has called a mass meeting of citizens for next Monday evening to consider the railroad situation, and to devise ways and means to secure the building of the projected line from Albuquerque to San Pedro to connect with the proposed Santa Fe Central railroad.

Hon. W. H. Andrews, state senator of Pennsylvania, who is the principal mover in the enterprise, is expected at Albuquerque in a few days and he comes fully prepared to build the railroad if he receives the right kind of treatment from Albuquerque.

A Murder Trial at Albuquerque.

The trial of Jose Baca, one of the alleged murderers of John Maxwell, on the Navajo reservation in November, 1899, has been up before the United States court at Albuquerque the past few days.

L. E. Densmore, who was also accused of doing the murder, was tried as the last term of court, found guilty and is now out on appeal. It is now stated that Densmore was not the person who shot and killed Maxwell, although both men had been drinking and quarrelling with each other.

Albuquerque Shop Improvements.

The finest electric plant in the west is being installed in the railroad shops at Albuquerque. Two large engines and several dynamos will be placed. Every wheel in the shop system will be operated by electricity. The new buildings at the shops have been nearly completed and new men are being taken on daily as the shop force will be gradually increased from 700 to 1,200 men.

Injured by a Fall.

The youngest son of B. T. Link of Central, Grant county, was seriously injured by a fall from his horse. He was riding very fast with Roy News-ham and while attempting to turn a corner the horses were thrown together violently. Link's horse fell and Link was thrown about 20 feet. He was picked up unconscious and taken to the hospital at Fort Bayard. He will recover.

Another Fight at Gallup.

The colored miners working for the Colorado Fuel and Iron company at their Gallup mines seem to engage in frequent scraps. Tuesday night at the Catalpa mine saloon two got into a quarrel, and one was shot, the bullet making a big furrow in the forehead of its intended victim. The latter tried to get the revolver and in so doing, slipped and fell, breaking his left knee cap.

From Timber Land to Truck Farm.

Trains will be run to Cloudcroft, Otero county, all winter. Formerly trains were run only in summer, but the timber now being used by the Alamogordo Lumber company is taken from the south and east of Cloudcroft. As fast as the country is denuded of merchantable timber, the lumber company sells the land in forty acre tracts at \$1 per acre. The land is fertile and adapted to truck gardening.

Bridge Material at Canadian River.

The first train of material for the bridge of the Chicago, Rock Island and El Paso railroad over the Canadian river has arrived at its destination. This is the largest consignment of bridge material ever sent out for a single bridge in the west. There are 100 cars of material. The bridge is to be 800 feet long and 135 feet high. It is to be finished by December.

The Sisters' Hospital at Albuquerque.

The hospital which the Sisters of Charity are building at Albuquerque has risen to the top of the second story and already presents an imposing appearance.

Will Bore for Oil in Guadalupe County.

Machinery for the development of the oil fields of Guadalupe county, near Santa Rosa, has been ordered by the Southwestern Oil Development company.

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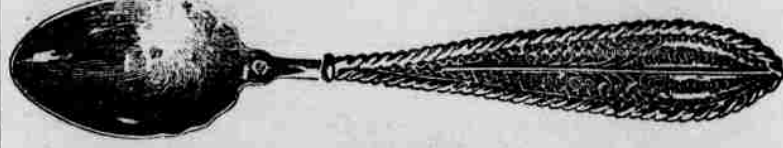
