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## A TRANSPORT IS DISABLED

The Sheridan Will Not Be Able to Leave Nagasaki for Three Weeks.

## SICK SOLDIERS ON BOARD

The Transport Warren Has Been Sent From Manila to Nagasaki to Receive the Sick Passengers of the Disabled Transport.

Washington, Oct. 22.—Word was received at the war department today that the transport Sheridan arrived at Nagasaki in a disabled condition and will not be ready to leave for three weeks. The Sheridan was on the way from Manila to San Francisco and carried about 800 short term soldiers, 280 sick soldiers and 19 insane soldiers. The transport Warren has been sent from Manila to Nagasaki to receive the sick passengers of the disabled transport.

## A CORRESPONDENT ON THE STAND

George Edward Graham Testifies as to a Conversation Between Commodore Schley and Captain Sigsbee off Cienfuegos.

## THE SCHLEY INQUIRY DRAGGING ALONG.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 22.—Lieutenant Wells resumed the witness stand in the Schley court today and continued his narrative of the events in the Cuban campaign under cross examination by Judge Advocate Lemly and Mr. Hanna.

After Lieutenant Wells was excused, Albert V. Mason was called. He was a yeoman of the second class on the Brooklyn during the Santiago campaign, and wrote the ship's log. His testimony related to the log. George Edward Graham, associated press correspondent, was questioned concerning the conversation between Commodore Schley and Captain Sigsbee on the occasion of the captain's visit to the Brooklyn on May 26. He testified:

"Schley said to Sigsbee: 'Have we got 'em, Sigsbee?' The captain said: 'No, they are not here. I have been here a week, and they are not here.' We went aft, further back on the quarter deck, and continued the conversation. Commodore Schley said: 'Are you sure they are not in there?' Sigsbee said: 'I have been very close to the harbor entrance two or three times. Captain Cotton has been in and out the cable, and they are not there.'"

"You heard Sigsbee say that?" "Yes, sir, I took some part in the conversation."

"Captain Sigsbee later took the dispatch, written by me and revised by Commodore Schley aboard his ship, and was to deliver it to one of the small boats or else take it over himself. It was open. It detailed the fact that the fleet was not there."

"Do you remember the reconnaissance on May 31?" "Yes, sir, I was on board the Massachusetts."

"Were you present at any conversation between Commodore Schley and Captain Higginson in the pilot house of the Massachusetts?"

"Yes, there was some discussion about what the Spanish fleet brought with them. The report was current that they brought arms and ammunition for the defense of Havana, and there also was discussion whether they had time to mount them, or whether they had taken any large guns and mounted them from any ships in the harbor prior to the arrival of the fleet. Commodore Schley said his idea was to go in about 7,000 or 7,500 yards and fire, simply to draw their fire. So far as I remember, Captain Higginson acquiesced in that."

Between Evans and Schley on July 5, Evans said: "Schley, did you see Phillips turn around and run out of the fight?" The commodore said: "No, neither did you. He did not run out of the fight." Evans said: "Oh, yes he did, I saw him." The commodore said: "It was not the Texas at all. The Texas was in the fight all the time. The ship you saw turn around was the Brooklyn."

Dennis J. Cronin, orderly to Schley during the Santiago campaign, testified that he was present when Captain Sigsbee came aboard the Brooklyn on May 26. "I heard the commodore ask Sigsbee something I could not understand," said the witness, "and I heard the captain answer: 'The Spanish fleet is not in there.'"

## TROUBLE IN THE PHILIPPINES

An Insurrectionary Movement Has Broken Out on the Island of Samar.

## THE FORCE CONCENTRATED

The New York Left Manila Today for Catbalogan With Three Hundred Marines.—Forces Will Be Landed at Basey and Balangiga.

Washington, Oct. 22.—The navy department received the following telegram from Rear Admiral Rogers: "Cavite, Oct. 22.—There is an active insurrection at Samar. The New York leaves today for Catbalogan with 300 marines, to return to Basey and Balangiga, to co-operate with the army. Nearly all the naval force is concentrated on the Samar patrol. The services of the Arethusa and the Zafiro, two colliers, are needed and being utilized."

## THE WOOL MARKET.

### Territorial Wools Continue to Hold Their Own in Demand and Price.

Boston, Mass., Oct. 22.—There was little change to note in the wool market this week. Buyers take supplies of wool as needed. Manufacturers are paying about the former prices. Territory wools continue to hold the list of sales with prices practically the same as last week. Strictly choice fine territories are quotable on a scouring basis at 45, while fine medium range at 40 1/2, and fine staple wools 46 1/2.

The market for fleece wools is quiet. Fall River, Mass., Oct. 22.—Notices have been posted in the iron works and cotton mills, increasing wages 5 per cent, to take effect November 4. This is the second raise of 5 per cent in these mills, owned by M. C. D. Borden of New York, within a month.

### Czolgosz Meets a Priest.

Auburn, N. Y., Oct. 22.—Czolgosz, the condemned murderer of President McKinley, held an interview with a Polish priest of this city.

### CZOLGOSZ WISHED IT.

Auburn, N. Y., Oct. 22.—In accordance with Czolgosz's wishes, Rev. John Hockley, the Catholic chaplain of the prison, appointed Rev. Father Szadziński, pastor of the Polish church at Rochester, to attend Czolgosz in his last hours. He is now with the assassin.

### YALE'S BI-CENTENNIAL.

Speechmaking, Drama, Song and Sports Were Features of To-Day's Program.

New Haven, Conn., Oct. 22.—Scholarly presentations of Yale University's relations to affairs university foot ball, oratory the rendition of a student dramatic performance and jollification in song by graduates, young and old, constituted the features of this day's program of Yale's bi-centennial.

### GOLD EXCITEMENT IN COLORADO.

Pueblo People Rush to Beulah to Stake Mining Claims.

Pueblo, Colo., Oct. 22.—A special courier to the Star-Journal brings news of wild excitement over a gold discovery at Beulah, 38 miles west of this city. Five hundred claims have been located in the 24 hours. The ledge of free milling gold, it is said, returns nearly \$2,000 to the ton. Pueblo people are rushing to the place.

### The Santa Fe's Annual Meeting.

New York, Oct. 22.—A circular has been issued to the stockholders of the Atchafalaya Railway company saying at the annual meeting on December 2, they will be asked to ratify the purchase of the capital stock and bonds of the Pecos Valley and Northeastern Railway company and the capital stock and second mortgage bonds of the Santa Fe, Prescott and Phoenix Railway company.

### Hay Will Get a Degree Too.

Washington, Oct. 22.—Secretary Hay left today for New Haven, where he will receive a degree from Yale.

### A Wreck Blockades Traffic.

Salt Lake, Utah, Oct. 22.—By the wrecking of an Union Pacific freight train near Wamsutter, Wyo., last night, traffic was blocked several hours. Ten cars of coal were piled up. No one was injured.

### J. Pierpont Morgan in Montana.

Butte, Mont., Oct. 22.—J. Pierpont Morgan and a party of eastern financiers and railroad magnates spent the greater portion of today in Butte, inspecting mines and receiving visits from prominent men.

## ROCK ISLAND RAILROAD CONSTRUCTION

A Cut Off in Kansas Is Planned and Will Shorten the Distance Between Chicago El Paso and Los Angeles.

## PUSHING ITS LINE THROUGH NEW MEXICO.

An extension of the line of the Rock Island railroad is contemplated from Belleville, Kas., through Clay Center and Salina to McPherson, making connection with the main line from McPherson through Liberal to El Paso. The length of the contemplated construction is but 90 miles, and will greatly lessen the distance from Chicago west to the coast. This will be an important move of the road in the next year.

When, in the first days of January last, the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific railroad broke ground at Liberal, Kas., for its great southwestern extension, it had 402 miles of road to build to effect a junction at Carrizozo, N. M., with the El Paso and North-eastern railroad, Carrizozo being 114 miles from El Paso, thus giving a total length of line between Liberal and El Paso of 546 miles.

For the special purpose of complying with the best of the Texas law that every railroad within that state shall have state operating headquarters and also for general construction facilities and convenience, the road building was placed under the charters of five different railroad corporations, viz: The Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific itself, the Chicago, Rock Island and Mexico, the Chicago, Rock Island and El Paso, the Rock Island and El Paso and the El Paso and North-eastern.

The road from Liberal to Carrizozo, Santa Rosa, N. M., a distance of 272 miles, was placed under direct Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific construction, with J. H. Conlen, vice president of the Chicago, Rock Island and Mexico, as chief engineer and general manager, while from Santa Rosa to Carrizozo, a distance of 130 miles, the construction work was given to the El Paso and North-eastern.

The road from Liberal to Carrizozo will be equipped with 80-pound steel; oak or pitch pine ties, and modern ballasting. The construction work is superlative, heavy construction trains making 35 miles an hour with smoothness and safety over fresh laid rails.

This construction work constitutes the initial instance of 80-pound steel being laid on an actually new railroad—to which can be added the even greater construction fact that the Roberts track-laying machine is putting down 80-pound steel at a faster rate than any has heretofore laid 66-pound rails—while, after the crossing of the Canadian river and the coming of cooler weather, Mr. Conlen expects to increase the track-laying pace from the present two and one-half miles to three miles per day.

Depots, sidetracks, switches, station houses, yardage, water tanks and Western Union telegraph lines have all kept pace with actual road building, so that the line as fast as constructed is also ready for full and final operation.

### COAL FOR THE SOUTH.

In connection with the Rock Island-El Paso line is the new 130-mile railroad which is to develop the immense Dawson coal fields, owned by the Rock Island in the northern part of Colfax county, N. M. This road will leave the main Rock Island rails at or near Liberty station, 20 miles south-west of the Canadian river crossing, and will plant its rails in the counties of San Miguel, Mora and Colfax. The route is now under survey, and the road will be fully constructed by May 15, 1902. This New Mexico coal is to feed the southern portion of the Rock Island-El Paso line, and is also doubtless largely to supply Southern Pacific railroad demand with, and in addition a heavy southern domestic custom. This road will also develop extensive and valuable New Mexico stock, mining and agricultural interests, and as it will cross the Santa Fe at Maxwell City or Dorsey, will afford a general new north and south railroad connection.

### A NEW RAILROAD PACE.

The completion of the El Paso road will give the Rock Island a route 222 miles shorter between Kansas City and El Paso than that of any other railroad between the same points, together with a saving of 15 hours of time, the latter fact being largely due to the favorable alignment and maximum 1 per cent grade of the new Rock Island road. Again, the El Paso route will shorten Rock Island distance 40 miles between Kansas City and Los Angeles over any other railroad, while the building this fall and winter of the new Rock Island Missouri cut-off between Trenton and Belknap will give that road an advantage of 18 miles out of Chicago to Los Angeles. In other words, the building of the Rock Island-El Paso road constitutes a veritable western railroad revolution as the other great lines must meet these new speed schedules.

## OOM PAUL KRUGER IS MERCIFUL

He Does Not Want to Make the Campaign in South Africa One of Savages.

## A WAR OF EXTERMINATION

A Council of War Held at the Villa Carcassa in Holland to Discuss the Execution of Boers by the British in the Transvaal.

New York, Oct. 22.—The Vienna correspondent of the London Times and the New York Times quotes from the Pester Lloyd, which says it learns from the Hague that Mr. Kruger, Dr. Leyds and Messrs. Wessels, Wolmarens and Fischer held a council of war at Villa Carcassa to consider what answer will be made by the Boers to the executions in South Africa. There is said to be no doubt among the Boer leaders that diplomatic protests are inadequate. All present at the meeting, except Kruger, says the report, advised immediate reprisals—that for every Boer prisoner executed a captured British officer be shot. Kruger opposed this plan on the ground that he did not wish to give the campaign the character of a war between savages, although it has already become a war of extermination.

## OFFICIAL MATTERS.

### TERRITORIAL BOARD OF PHARMACY.

The New Mexico territorial board of pharmacy held its annual meeting Saturday afternoon at the Knights of Pythias hall on West Gold avenue, Albuquerque. All members of the board were present and the following candidates came before the board for examination under the territorial law: Jacob T. Jackson, Fort Bayard; B. H. Briggs, Albuquerque; Bliss Freeman, Las Cruces, and Hugh B. Hayes, Albuquerque. The board consists of B. Kupper, Albuquerque; A. J. Fisher, Santa Fe; E. J. Murphy, Las Vegas; W. C. Porterfield, Silver City, and R. Monero, Las Cruces.

### AN INDIAN SCHOOL SERVICE PROMOTION.

William T. Shelton, who has been instructor in agriculture at the United States Indian school in this city the past few years, has been promoted and transferred to the Yavapai Indian school in northern Arizona, to take charge of the school as superintendent. Mrs. Shelton will be matron of the same school. Mr. and Mrs. Shelton have many friends in Santa Fe during their stay here who regret to see them leave and yet rejoice at their promotion.

### GOVERNORSHIP OF ARIZONA.

There is no confirmation from Washington that Colonel Brodie has been appointed.

There is no confirmation from Washington of the news telegraphed by the same party in Phoenix, Ariz., to the Denver and St. Louis papers that Col. Alexander O. Brodie has been appointed governor of Arizona to succeed Governor Murphy and the announcement is, to say the least, premature. The dispatch in question is as follows:

"The appointment of Alexander O. Brodie to be governor of Arizona was virtually made a week ago, but was not announced till today. The new territorial executive is intimately known by President Roosevelt, whom he succeeded as lieutenant colonel of the Rough Riders when the latter was promoted to the colonelcy of that noted regiment. Colonel Brodie went into the Spanish war as senior major of the regiment, commanding the Arizona squadron. At Guasimas he was shot in the arm, but returned to the regiment in time to take command at Montauk before the muster out."

"He is a New Yorker, born in St. Lawrence county of that state in 1849. In 1870 he graduated from West Point, and for several years he served on the frontier in the 1st cavalry. He resigned in 1877 to engage in engineering work in Arizona. Latterly he has managed a rich Yavapai county mine, in which he is heavily interested. For awhile he served as colonel of the 1st regiment, national guard of Arizona. Twice he has been named for brevet, once by General Crook for service against the Apaches, and again for bravery in Cuba. Two years ago he was the unsuccessful candidate of the Republican party in Arizona for the office of delegate to congress."

### Bound for China.

United States Deputy Marshall John Campbell and Constable James Smith have gone to San Francisco with two Chinamen recently released from the penitentiary. Mr. Campbell upon his return will take up his residence at Tucson, Arizona, and will there engage in the practice of law, having resigned his position as United States deputy marshal.

### A Suicide.

William Graham was found in his room at Jewett, San Juan county, with a bullet hole through his head. He had locked himself in his room and placing his pistol near his right ear sent a bullet crashing through his brains, causing instant death. He was a United States pensioner, a lone man and friendless. A coroner's jury gave a verdict of suicide.

### A Newspaper Change.

Clarence W. Morgan has retired as manager and editor of the Dona Ana County Republican, published at Las Cruces, and has been succeeded by H. B. Mussey.

Perhaps one gentleman explained it, when he said: "I thought I had best come early to avoid the rush." Probably you had better do the same. Professor Wells may be found in Dr. J. H. Sloan's office, opposite the cathedral, from 9 to 12 a. m., and from 3 to 5 p. m.

Judge McFie is in receipt of a letter from his son Ralph who writes that he has been in Manila for a month buying supplies for the district court of which he is the clerk. He met there George Curry who offered him a \$1,800 a year position in the police department of Manila of which Captain Curry is chief. He also met W. M. Tipton, who is superintendent of public lands of the Philippine Islands. Mr. Tipton also offered Ralph any office under his jurisdiction that he desired to choose, but Ralph decided to retain his present position which is proving very congenial to him. Judge McFie also had a long letter from Mr. Tipton.

A number of recruits for the surveying force now at work on the proposed line of the Santa Fe Central left Albuquerque yesterday with 27 head of horses and six wagons loaded with provisions and camping utensils. They will join Engineer A. G. Kennedy and his assistants. This addition about completes the force at work on the survey and it is expected that this part of the work will be completed before the first of the year. The detachment of surveyors which left yesterday was organized and equipped by Vice President Hopewell, who came up from Deming on Sunday. Albuquerque Journal-Democrat.

## GRANT COUNTY MINES

Development Work in the Carpenter District and at Fierro.

A district about which little is heard, but in which considerable development work is now being done and has been for some time past is the Carpenter district, lying in the extreme eastern portion of Grant county, about eleven miles distant from the Mimbres river. The ore is principally lead and zinc, and as a rule is low grade, although considerable high grade is taken out from time to time. The mineral undoubtedly exists in enormous quantities, and just as soon as a plant is erected for its treatment, the Carpenter district is going to be one of the liveliest and at the same time one of the best paying camps in this section.

Some of the principal operations in the district are as follows: Spates and Daniels are developing their group of seven claims with the most satisfactory results. Some of the ore which they have found gave assays of 40 to 60 per cent lead, 10 per cent zinc, 7 ounces silver and 8 to 10 per cent copper. Their deepest shaft is only 100 feet. Another group of a like number of claims is owned by the same gentlemen together with County Commissioner E. J. Swartz. Here also development work is being done, and the showing is extremely gratifying to the owners. Murray and Riggett have a good lead showing on their group of four claims, and are opening up on their properties as rapidly as possible. The Grand View Mining company, a St. Louis corporation, of which D. Bauman of Deming, is the New Mexico representative, is the owner of a group of seven claims, on which considerable work has already been done. An immense body of lead and zinc ore has been uncovered, the same being as wide as 150 feet in some places and averaging 24 feet. This company has some extensive improvements in contemplation for the operation of its properties. A well developed group is the Grand Central, consisting of nine claims and owned by Messrs. Henderson, Hankins and Wray. It is conservatively estimated that these gentlemen have 10,000 tons of ore on their dumps which will run 20 per cent zinc and 20 per cent lead. The ore also carries some silver. Thompson, Ancheta and Grijalva are the owners of the San Pedro mine. They have a 30-inch vein of high grade lead ore, assays from which have given 50 per cent. Swartz, Salis and Enos have a group of nine claims at the head of Hot Springs. Two 50-foot shafts have been sunk. The ore is principally zinc. Gus Harman and Brother have done over 400 feet of development on their claim at the head of Donahue canon. They have a large body of low grade lead ore which is almost entirely free from zinc. The Carpenter district has one very decided advantage and that is water and timber of the very best kind in abundance.

The Pacific Union Smelting company in Lordsburg will be ready to "blow in" the first stack about the 25th. The furnace has a capacity of about seventy-five tons per day. The second stack will be ready by the first of the year. The company have been delayed somewhat, but will now soon be ready for business, which is news of exceeding great joy to many mine owners in that section, as it gives them a chance to make their mines pay the expense of development.

The Colorado Fuel & Iron company employs a large force at their Union Hill workings at Fierro, Grant county, and the output of ore is proportionately large. Three or four different workings are in operation, and the big steel ore cars are kept moving in a solid string from morning until evening. The night force only breaks and loads the ore into the cars, but nothing passes over the tramway after 5:30 p. m. Eighteen cars averaging 22 tons each is about the daily output. The new spur about half way up the tramway is not yet in working order. When completed it will add ten or twelve carloads daily to the present shipments.

Anson S. is working night and day shifts and is extracting considerable quantities of good ore. Sinking and drifting is in progress and everything is moving along with the regularity of clockwork. Michael Hughes, who is working under contract to A. E. Dawson on the Anson S., is not taking out much ore just now, as he is opening up good ground for this winter's work. Several carloads have been shipped recently, and there are several tons on the dump. Ed Baker is working two shifts of six men each on his Hugo lease at Fierro, Grant county. The main working, an incline shaft, is down 112 feet, and is still sinking. Water has been struck, not in sufficient quantity to require a pump, but just enough to make it unpleasant working. A whim has been set up recently, and the work is being pushed vigorously. No. 2 shaft which is down 78 feet, stopped sinking at water level. Ore is being raised from the drifts, and two carloads have been shipped within the past fortnight. The ore will average 15 per cent and granulated and native copper occurs all through the ore body.
