SWEEEPING VICTORY



Republicans Gain in Many of the States.

Tammany Wiped Up in New York.

Bryanism Wiped Out in State of Nebraska.

OHIO SOLIDLY REPUBLICAN.

New York, Nov. 6.—Complete unofficial returns of Greater New York give Low, fusion candidate for mayor, 294,592; Shepard, democratic candidate, 265,128; Low's plurality, 29,464. Grant, fusionist for controller, 299,713; Ladd, democratic, 254,737; Grant's plurality, 44,976.

Unofficial returns of New York county give James O'Connell, fusionist, a lead of 15,880 over Ungor, democratic, for district attorney; for president of the board of aldermen, Forns, fusionist, defeated Van Vorst, democratic, by a plurality of 31,284; Cassidy, democratic, defeated Doherty, fusionist, for the presidency of the borough of Queens by 5,521; Hadron, fusionist, elected president of the borough of Bronx with a plurality of 1,470.

The borough of Richmond elected Cromwell, fusionist, president, with a plurality of 48, over Muller, democratic.

Complete returns of Kings county show the election of Guden, fusionist, sheriff, over Hesterburg, democratic, 108,050; Hesterburg, 94,244.

Complete revised returns show the election of the following justices of the supreme court: O'Brien, democratic and fusionist; Greenbaum, fusionist; Blanchard, fusionist; Clark, fusionist; Clarke beat Van Wyck, present mayor, by 29,098.

CALIFORNIA.

San Francisco, Nov. 6.—Eugene E. Schmitz, union labor candidate for mayor, was elected by a plurality of 2,500; Asa R. Wells, republican, running second; J. H. Tobin third. Mr. Schmitz is leader of the orchestra of a local theater, also secretary and manager of a machine shop. The republicans elected the auditor, sheriff, tax collector, treasurer, county clerk, public administrator and six supervisors. The democrats will have the city attorney, recorder, district attorney, coroner, two police judges, nine supervisors, the union labor party three supervisors.

OHIO.

Republicans Elect State Officers and Majority of Legislature.

Cincinnati, Nov. 6.—Complete unofficial returns of Hamilton county show the following vote for governor: Nash, republican, 42,687; Killbourn, democratic, 35,866. The entire republican county ticket, including thirteen members of the legislature, was elected by an average plurality of 12,500.

Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 6.—Revised returns show that the republicans gained almost everywhere except in Columbus, where disaffection over some of Governor Nash's appointments.
