California, where they will visit for
a few weeks. Mr. Sorenson is a con-
tractor of El Paso.

A. W. Cleveland, Jr., has granted per-
mission to the Highland Tennis club
to use his lots, corner of Railroad ave-
nue and Walter street, where a court is
being established.

Charles and Roy McDonald, who
represent the Mutual Life Insurance
company of New York, on the road,
returned this morning from a very
successful trip to Arizona towns.
