Silver City has reason to be proud of its excellent normal school.

Many prominent democrats say that the silver issue is dead, without mentioning the fact that all the rest of the platform is in bad condition.

For the year ending June 30 the number of immigrants arriving in this country was 457,315, the largest since 1893, and an increase over last year of 29,346.

There was \$90,000 worth of ice manufactured in New Mexico last year, exclusive of Las Vegas, where an immense quantity of natural ice is harvested in the mountains.

Americans have methods of thrift that are but little practiced abroad. Thirteen million regular life insurance policies are held in this country, representing a value of \$5,000,000,000.

Although India has spent \$15,000,000 during the past three years for the relief of the famine-stricken, a surplus of \$6,337,000 has accumulated during the same period in the treasury.

Another tremendous consolidation, this time of the copper mining interests of the world, is being effected. The combination gives promise of being more extensive in its scope than the steel trust.

It is unofficially estimated that at least \$175,000,000 will be realized by the farmers and millers of the United States from the sale of wheat and wheat flour abroad during the present fiscal year.

Georgia's state pension law now requires \$251,000 a year. Last year the state paid out \$266,000 in pensions, but since then 2,000 new applications, representing an outlay of \$125,000, have been filed.

The total population of New Mexico in 1900, according to the census report, was 125,315, more than three times as large as in 1850, the first census report in which the population of the territory appears.

The issue of every patent contains a grant to the patentee, his heirs or assigns, for the term of seventeen years, of exclusive right to make, use and vend his invention throughout the United States and territories.

Before the industrial commission a manufacturer and dealer recently stated that in 1870 nine-tenths of the carpets and rugs sold in the United States were imported, but that nine-tenths of the present domestic consumption is produced in this country.

In the neighborhood of 11,000 Boers are still in the field, according to General Kitchener's estimate. This is only about one to fifteen of the number of British troops, but the Boers know the country better and are not encumbered with baggage or a base, they have a big advantage over their enemies.

Just twelve farms were reported in Alaska in 1900, the total area of which was 125 acres, of which 104 acres were devoted to the cultivation of vegetables and hay, the remainder being used for pasture. The total farm products are valued at \$5,046. The total farm wealth of Alaska was \$15,086, of which \$2,190 is invested in live stock.

The recently issued report of the deputy master of England's mint that the output of new money was beyond all precedent in 1900. A total of 102 tons of standard gold, 224 tons of standard silver and 391 tons of bronze was coined into 107,689,513 pieces, in addition nearly 30,000,000 pieces were struck in the colonial mints. The output of the English mint amounted in value to \$15,776,169.

INDEX OF PROSPERITY.
From statistics furnished by Territorial Secretary J. W. Reynolds it is gleaned that as large and as many as were the incorporations in New Mexico during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1900, that record is exceeded by that for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1901, which shows 119 incorporations with a capitalization of \$2,725,225, and fees paid for incorporation to the territorial secretary amounting to \$7,440. This certainly indicates that capital is flowing into the territory and that New Mexico is making rapid strides forward. During the year previous the number of incorporations was 108, with a capital of \$7,318,000. That year the foreign incorporations furnished the greater part of the capitalization, namely, \$17,420,000, with twenty companies, while during the fiscal year ended on June 30, 1901, there were twenty-six for-

eign incorporations, with \$17,570,000 capital, while the domestic incorporations were 123, with \$89,755,925 capital. Of the foreign incorporations nine were from Colorado, four from West Virginia, three from New Jersey, two from Arizona and Illinois each, and one from Delaware, Kansas, Missouri, South Dakota, Texas and Canada. Of the incorporations of the last fiscal year sixty-five were for the purpose of mining, milling and smelting, having a combined capital of \$21,885,000, and twenty-five for manufacturing and other industrial purposes, with a capitalization of \$2,517,425; nineteen for the development of oil, with a capitalization of \$15,500,000, while during the year previous only one oil company was incorporated with \$25,000 capital; six bank, building and loan associations, with a capitalization of \$1,530,000; five railway companies, with a capitalization of \$16,561,500 to build 730 miles of railroad, against two railroad companies the year previous, with a capitalization of \$3,500,000 to build 130 miles of railroad; five irrigation and improvement companies, with a capitalization of \$1,292,000; and two benevolent and charitable institutions. The fees for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1900, were \$2,722.25, while for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1901, they amounted to \$7,440.

THE DIFFERENCE.
Why do the railroads charge lower fares when large crowds are going to one place, as to a great exhibition, and why do hotels take the same occasion to raise their charges? The reason is simple, little as we like the fact, when we are confronted by the hotel bill. Hotel accommodations are limited in amount and cannot be increased except at great loss; railroad facilities permit almost unlimited expansion of business at a small expense. A large demand for a book lowers its price; a large demand for feathers of a certain bird has an opposite effect.

In 1889 the southern lumber mills had an output valued at \$18,116,000. In ten years they had advanced to \$105,575,519. Since then there has been a steady increase in production, until today they are conservatively estimated that the value of the output, including the material used for crates, fuel and fencing, and the naval stores by-products, is between \$225,000,000 and \$250,000,000.

Half a century ago a thin stream of Niagara falls was first led aside to turn a gristmill. Today a larger stream, which diminishes seriously the amount of water that passes over the falls, furnishes almost half a million-horse power. 


