New Mexico demands Statehood from the Fifty-Seventh Congress.

The New Mexico Territorial Fair will be held in Albuquerque from October 15th to October 19th. Premium List will aggregate \$10,000.

El Paso will have a first-class baseball team at the Territorial fair.

Three new weekly newspapers were established last week in New Mexico.

Anyone can get rich cultivating ten acres of land in the Rio Grande valley.

There are at least 10,000 worthless dogs in this territory. They cause heavy loss each year to the farmers.

Santa Fe is arranging to hold a successful horticultural fair in September. Every county in the territory should have exhibits at this fair.

The Citizen will guarantee gentlemanly and correct treatment in the Santa Fe base ball club if the boys will visit this city and play ball.

Denmark would like to borrow a little of the money of the United States capitalists besides selling her West Indian property holdings.

The Santa Fe company should give serious attention to the proposition to straighten the road into Santa Fe and thus avoid the Galisteo wash-outs.

It is estimated that bugs cause a loss of over three hundred million dollars in the United States annually. This total does not include damages from bedbugs.

There are 680 men on the Santa Fe Pacific shops pay in this city. This number will be increased to over 1,000 when the new machine shops are completed this fall.

Cantaloupes ripen in this valley two or three weeks earlier than in Colorado. There is big money in the growing of cantaloupes. The Pecos valley farmers will sell \$100,000 worth of cantaloupes this season.

The naval works bill now before the British house of commons calls for an appropriation of \$27,500,000 to increase the docking accommodations of the coal depots and reserves of ammunition for the navy of the United Kingdom.

Women have been more successful than men in the recent competitive civil service examinations in Washington. Over 77 per cent of the women candidates passed, against 62 per cent of the men. One-third of the clerical positions in the Washington departments are now held by women.

While New Mexico is paying the Standard Oil monopoly double price for oil, the owners of the oil wells in Texas are facing a serious problem in finding ready markets for their product. There is a prodigious quantity of oil, so much that they do not know what to do with it. The gushers can fill 70,000 barrels a day but the shipment amounts to only 30,000 barrels a day.

According to statistics collected on the subject of school savings banks, there are 3,588 of them in the United States at present, with \$3,567,000 deposited. The number of banks began, up to January 1, is placed at \$73,000,000, of which \$25,000,000 remained on deposit on the date named. The system teaches the children how to save money.

An advertiser who has tried every known method of publicity, and who still uses several with discrimination, tells the publisher of an advertising medium that except the newspaper there defects. He finds that the newspaper goes into the hands of virtually all the people who can be reached, and, therefore, of about all the people who can be influenced by advertising.

**POPULATION FIGURES.**  
The census bureau has issued a complete report of the last decennial enumeration, a study of which reveals the following details in regard to population matters:  
Every state of the union has increased in population in the ten years except Nevada, which has fallen off nearly 3,500, but the country as a whole has grown 20.7 per cent, or 12,927,000, making a total, including Hawaii, of 76,303,387. The greatest increase in any state was that in Idaho, which increased 32.7 per cent and 13 per cent of increase by states varied all the way from this to one-half of one per cent for Nebraska. Oklahoma forged ahead 46.6 per cent, exceeding now the states of Delaware, Idaho, Montana, North Dakota, Utah, Vermont and Wyoming in population.

At the head of the list in the number of inhabitants stand New York, with 7,268,984; Pennsylvania, 6,302,115; Illinois, 4,821,550; Ohio, 4,167,545; Missouri, 3,106,662; and Texas, 2,448,710—six states with more than a third of the population of the whole country.

From the Republican.  
Mrs. W. A. Maxwell and her daughter, Mrs. Fred Ward, are visiting in Albuquerque.  
Richard Fashive, having secured clerkship in the Clarkville store, is removed with his family to that place.  
The survey of the Colorado and Gulf road, at least the one now being made, will cross the Santa Fe Pacific's track near Delance, some twelve miles from here.  
There are several people in Gallup "skating on very thin ice," and the first thing they and their friends know they will get into "hot water" above their heads.  
Who a large number of people in McKinley county find themselves in trouble for not paying the occupation tax, they will wonder why somebody didn't tell them what the law was.  
Stephen Canavan has secured a contract from the C. P. and I. to furnish them with twenty car loads of fire clay, which will be made into filling and brick at their new plant west of Gallup.  
Work was commenced on Thursday at the roundhouse on a new 600-foot building which will be put down near the boiler room. A 12-inch hole will be bored and the water will be raised to the surface by compressed air. When it is finished a standpipe will be put near it to convey the water to a tank which will hold 150,000 gallons.  
Chief Engineer Burns of the Santa Fe Pacific, spent Thursday in Gallup. On Wednesday, McKinley county, with a view to a new coal chute, coal chutes, tracks. The coal chute will be of a pattern to accommodate the large copper bottom cars recently put in use on the road. They hold 80,000 pounds of coal.

A dozen men can find work with the Zuni copper company at \$2.50 per day.

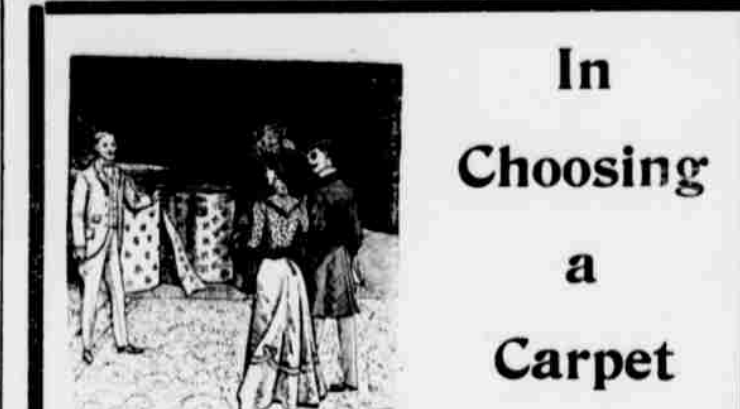
