STRIKERS GAIN.

Two More Steel Mills
Closed Up.

Missouri Mob Shooting and
Hanging Negroes.

Wool Market Shows Healthy Tone
and Good Prices.

PENNSYLVANIA REPUBLICAN CONVENTION

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 20.—The tie-up of the Pennsylvania National Tube company of this city was completed during the night. The shutting down of the two plants adds about 1,800 men to the force of strikers. The success of the labor organizers in getting the men out cheered the other strikers to a high pitch of enthusiasm. Officials of the National Tube company would not discuss the strike beyond saying that they have been kept by the attitude of their men, but hope in time they will come back.

The steel managers announced that the Clark mills are now running full time. They denied that there has been a break at Duquesne during the night. The strikers claim that they again have crippled the Lindsay and McCutcheon mills. The explosion of some railroad torpedoes at Monaca early this morning created excitement among large crowds gathered near the steel mills.

Wellsville reports indicate the strikers are in a critical situation, but the cry of the wolf has been raised so often that it is not believed now. Local strike leaders express themselves as fully satisfied with the progress of the strike and are confident of victory.

PROPOSITION TO STRIKE.

Chicago, Aug. 20.—Vice President Davis, head of the Amalgamated association in the Fourth district, has called an unofficial meeting of the steel workers, to be held in South Chicago this afternoon. A vote will be taken on the proposition to strike, regardless of any formal action by the two local lodges.

Will Not Resign.

New York, Aug. 20.—From authoritative sources the Associated Press is enabled to deny the report that Charles M. Schwab is to resign the presidency of the United States Steel corporation.

WORK OF A MOB.

Missouri Town Excited Over the Result of Lynching Negroes.

Springfield, Mo., Aug. 20.—Pierce City, where Will Godley and French Godley, the former's grandfather, were lynched last night as the result of the murder of Miss Cassie Wild, is today in the hands of hundreds of armed men intent on driving all negroes from the town. All negro houses in the city are being fired by the whites and one negro, Pete Hampton, is said to have been cremated in his home. The mob today broke up the arsenal of the local military company and is now in possession of improved rifles.

Most of the negroes have left Pierce City, abandoning homes, which were burned. A report was sent out that two negroes, in addition to the Godleys, were lynched this morning, but this is denied.

George Lark, a porter on the St. Louis and San Francisco railroad, whom Carter before he was shot, was charged with being Miss Wild's murderer, was arrested at Springfield this morning and is in jail here. Lark declares his innocence and says that the man who committed the crime boarded with him and fled. Bloodhounds, which started at the scene of the murder, went at once to Lark's house.

Eugene Barrett, a negro, has confessed that a man named Plavers, who had been boarding with Lark, was the real culprit. Plavers is said to be in the hands of the law. Barrett is under arrest at Mount Vernon. He will surely be lynched if he is brought back. It is believed that Barrett will be molested.

After strapping up young Godley to a pole and riddling his body with bullets, the mob went to the house of French Godley, the young man's grandfather, and shot him to death.

BENZINE EXPLODED

Five Men Killed by the Accident.

River Steamer Capsized and Passengers Drowned.

Minister from Chili to United States Dies at Buffalo.

HANNA TAKING A VACATION.

Philadelphia, Aug. 20.—Five persons were killed by the explosion of the benzine tank at the Atlantic refining company's oil works at Point Breeze at midnight. Dead: John McCulloch, James E. John, John Dougherty, all firemen. The firemen and an employee of the refining company were too badly burned to be recognized. When the explosion occurred the firemen of Engine Co. 49 and the employees of the Atlantic Refining company, about fifty men, were at work at the pumping house drawing oil from the burning tanks. The flames shot high in the air, and the pumping house was almost completely demolished. The firemen then directed their attention to the rescue of men imprisoned in the burning house. It was nearly an hour before the men could be reached. Seventeen men were taken to the hospital, suffering from burns and bruises.

Since early this morning the flames spread to five additional tanks, making eighteen destroyed. At 11 o'clock the fire was not yet under control. The loss is estimated at \$1,000,000.

STEAMER CAPSIZED.

Storm Capsized a River Boat and Thirty-Five People Drown.

Paducah, Ky., Aug. 20.—During a severe storm last night the steamboat City of Goldensville, six miles from this city, the boat turned over while the passengers were at supper. There were about sixty passengers aboard and thirty are drowned or missing. Captain Jesse Hauer and Pilot Peck succeeded in rescuing many of the passengers. Peck states that the books will have to be found before it can be determined who are lost. The City of Goldensville plied between this city and Elizabethtown, Ill.

Died at Buffalo.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 20.—The state department is advised by telegram of the death of Senor Don Carlos Morla Vicuna, minister from Chili to the United States, which occurred at Buffalo this morning. Vicuna was one of the best known South American statesmen.

Minister Vicuna came to Buffalo from Washington on July 18 to attend the ceremonies incident upon the formal opening of the Chilean building at the Pan-American exposition. He died of pneumonia, which developed further complicated.

Hanna Taking a Vacation.

Cleveland, O., Aug. 20.—Senator and Mrs. Hanna and two daughters left Cleveland today for a vacation trip west for Hay Lake, near Salt Lake, Mich. Where the family will spend a few days at the Hanna summer cottage. Mr. Hanna is expected to take an active part in the formal opening of the republican state campaign in Delaware on September 21.

Preparing For Statehood.

At the Commercial club last night a number of representative citizens of the city held a meeting, the object of which was to arrange for a grand statehood convention, to be held in Albuquerque on October 15. MUNICIPAL MATTERS.

Ordinances Passed—City Attorney's Salary Raised—Electric Street Railway.

There were present at the council meeting last night the following members: Mayor O. N. Marron, Aldermen McKee, Rogers, Beaven, Harsch, Harrison and McMillin. Owing to the absence of City Clerk Medler that office was occupied for the evening by Marshal McMillin. After reading the minutes of the previous meeting the members lost no time in getting down to business. The first was a request from Mrs. E. E. Ward, through the agency of E. H. Dunbar, to receive \$150 damages done to her property by the construction of the new viaduct. The matter was referred to the viaduct committee.

J. H. Stingle, the attorney, presented a communication regarding the revision and reclamation of the city ordinances. Referred to the mayor and Alderman McMillin.

In order that South Broadway might be straightened near the hospital, the city attorney was directed to prepare condemnation proceedings for the removal of certain buildings in that vicinity. The attorney was also instructed to prepare an ordinance making it compulsory for the payment of \$1 by any one prior to making any excavations in the streets within the city limits.

GERMAN OFFICIAL COMMITTS SUICIDE.

San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 20.—The longest railroad tunnel in the United States and one of the four largest in the world will be built through the Sierra Nevada mountains of California. If the plans of E. H. Harriman are carried out, says the Chronicle, Chief Engineer Hood will send out a corps of engineers to make the preliminary surveys. The tunnel project, which will involve an outlay of \$3,000,000 to \$5,000,000, contemplates boring a hole 27,000 feet through the heart of the Sierras. Besides saving a climb of 1,500 feet, the tunnel will shorten the road about seven miles and effect a great saving in operating expenses. It is stated that with the Sierra tunnel built and other changes in Nevada and Utah completed, passenger trains could be run between San Francisco and Chicago easily in two and a half days.

New Mexico demands Statehood from the Fifty-Seventh Congress.

The New Mexico Territorial Fair will be held in Albuquerque from October 15th to October 19th. Premium List will aggregate \$10,000.

This city will have an electric street car line in a few months.

The annual territorial fair in this city is intended to advertise the resources of New Mexico and Arizona.

The statehood movement will be fairly started at the big convention, which will be held in this city in October.

Rockefeller is probably intending to make another donation to the Chicago university, having raised the price of oil in New Mexico.

Archbishop Ireland has coined a new phrase, talking about the steel strike, in denying the right of anybody "to destroy property."

School Superintendent F. A. Hubbell advertises for several school teachers who are familiar with both the English and Spanish languages.

Modern steamship travel is so safe that the English government has not lost or injured in transit a single man of the 250,000 sent to South Africa.

That mob at Pierce City, Mo., was not satisfied with hanging a negro, but turned in and shot a little boy to death and injured several of their own crowd.

The Animal Rescue league of Boston picked up and cared for 1,000 homeless cats last month. The league also tries to reform the cats by trying to persuade them to quit going out nights.

General Wood's report on the situation in Cuba is satisfactory and encouraging. It shows that the island is recovering from the effects of the prolonged war for independence and that its industries are reviving.

It will take only 2,000 acres planted in sugar beets to supply a factory of 350 tons a day capacity for 100 days, sufficient to make it a paying investment. Six thousand acres planted in sugar beets will secure a thousand-ton factory.

Threatened dismantling and removal of the McKeesport mills have been stopped by the presentation of a \$2,000,000 mortgage on the plant. There is no weight like a mortgage for firmly anchoring down any old thing in the way of property.

If the 65,000 workmen on strike against the steel trust would save 25 cents a day for six months, the workmen could easily do so—they could come very near getting control of the entire corporation at the present prices at which the steel is being sold on the market. Then the steel trust would become a co-operative association.

New England still holds the record for density of population in the United States. Rhode Island has 497 inhabitants to the square mile, Massachusetts 349. New Jersey comes third with 250 and Connecticut fourth with 357. There are only four other states—New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland and Ohio—where the density is less than 100 inhabitants to the square mile.

Ladies will be pleased to know that bankruptcy proceedings cannot release faithless men from the consequences of breach of promise. A New York gentleman, having occasion to go into bankruptcy, inadvertently included a breach of promise judgment in his list of debts. The supreme court of New York, however, held that upon the fact of that judgment showed the petitioner had been guilty of fraud and his discharge was refused.

War department estimates of the amounts required for continuing the river and harbor work of the country during the fiscal year beginning next July are announced to amount to \$44,248,404, divided as follows: Estimates of the engineers, exclusive of maintaining contracts, \$25,259,159; continuing contract estimates, \$6,289,294; under Mississippi river commission, \$1,695,000; under Missouri river commission, \$1,965,259.

The geological survey is about to issue a complete report on the coal production of the United States for the calendar year, 1900, which shows that this country leads the world in coal production, notwithstanding the strikes in the anthracite coal regions of Pennsylvania and the Cumberland region of Maryland, which caused a large falling off. The aggregate production in 1900, including anthracite and bituminous, was 249,965,917 long tons, of a value of \$106,891,364, compared with a production in 1899 of 226,553,564 tons, valued at \$256,077,454.

FOREST PRESERVATION.
Public sentiment in favor of forest preservation is rapidly growing, with the result that land owners all over the country are now applying to the bureau for advice on the subject. Speaking of the matter recently an official of the bureau said: "One of the circulars we are sending out is directed to owners of land, explaining to them how their property can be wooded, and the other circular is intended for the information of owners of timber tracts in the eastern and western timber regions and contains advice and instruction concerning working plans which enable owners to manage their forests with a view to maintaining a constant supply of timber. The timber land is not according to our plan—a limit being placed upon the amount felled—and consequently owners, under the proposed system, will have a continued, though some-

Interesting Information Regarding Railroad Officials and Employees.

NEWS IN ABBREVIATED FORM.

The Santa Fe company are so short of power on the Raton and Vegas divisions that they are compelled to run freight engines.

Louis Parlosse is back from the east and has gone to Winslow to accept a clerkship with the railway company.—San Marcial Bee.

Duncan Bell, who served as clerk to D. W. Hitchcock at San Marcial a couple of months, has gone to San Antonio to take charge of the storekeeper's office.

Russell Howell has returned from the Needles, Cal., where he occupied a railroad position for a short time. He found the heat too terrific for mortal to endure, hence his change of program.

Andrew W. Anson of the firm of Anson & Homan, contractor and builders of the Alvarado hotel and depot, left this morning for Santa Fe, where he will look after some business interests for the firm.

Last Friday while going over the Ghorietta mountain brakeman fellows who was sitting on the top of a freight car, was stunned by a stroke of lightning. He was taken to Las Vegas in bad shape, all drawn up and with an arm seriously burned.

It is stated that dogs on all west-end routes should be checked the same as bicycles and baby carriages. Hereafter dogs have been carried on the two systems of the Santa Fe at the rate of one-half a cent a mile, collected by the baggage agent or express messenger, when the two are one.

Work is being rushed on the Santa Fe & Grand Canyon railroad. Two and one-half miles of steel have been laid beyond the former terminal, and the grade has been completed to within about two miles of the canyon. At present the indications are most favorable for the completion of this world-renowned line to the canyon before the first of October.

The Santa Fe system, so called, and known as the "Alvarado" system, consists of its own line, measuring 4,816 miles; the Gulf and Colorado branch, 1,087 miles; the Southern California branch, 483 miles; the Santa Fe Pacific, 819 miles; San Francisco and San Joaquin valley, 396 miles—making a total of 7,518 miles.

The Santa Fe Railway company is sending out circulars to select lists all over the country advertising the excursion from Denver to the Grand Canyon of the Colorado which will take place some time in September or the first of October. The project has already met with favor in the eyes of a number of scientists and it will no doubt be well patronized.

The excursionists will go over the line through this city and will take in all the scenery possible.

On Sunday evening the heavy rains which fell in this section caused a considerable amount of annoyance to trains Nos. 1 and 7, which were scheduled to arrive here after 9 p. m. About three miles south of Bernadillo the rain was unusually heavy and when a stream of water coursed over the railroad tracks it deposited about two feet of soil on the roadbed. Several section men were immediately sent to that point and after three hours' diligent work had the track cleared for traffic. On the same evening a short stretch of track near Fort Wingate was weakened by a current of water which came down in an arroyo, but the damage was soon repaired.

Campbell Bros. circus was on route to Silver City last August several of their cars were derailed at a point on the Silver City branch of the Santa Fe. This year, while the first advertising car was covering the same route, an occurrence is recorded of a somewhat peculiar character. An employee of the circus who was in the wreck a year ago, was in the very act of pointing out to the advertising agent the place where the former accident occurred, when the advertising car jumped the track at the identical spot. It was the only car in the mixed train that left the rails and no damage was done.

JOHN BECKER, OF BELEN.
Sketch of One of the Benefactors of New Mexico.

From the Las Vegas Optic:
The subject of this sketch, who to day is considered one of the substantial men of Belen, Valencia county, N. M., and possesses the well merited confidence and esteem of the citizens, was born May 28, 1850, in Hanover, Germany. When nineteen years old he emigrated to America, and landing in New Orleans in August, 1869, he obtained a position in a restaurant and remained in that city six months. He then started for St. Louis but was robbed of all he had before reaching that city. From St. Louis he went through Illinois, Iowa and Minnesota, returning to New Orleans where he remained over winter. In August, 1871, he came to New Mexico, where for the first two years he clerked for Louis Hainig, and then managed Mr. Hainig's business house in Belen, receiving one-half the profits. As an excellent cook, he was very successful. In 1876 he built a Belen mill which has a capacity of

25,000 pounds of flour in twenty-four hours, and which has proved a safe investment. Mr. Becker is what we call a successful man. He carries a general stock of merchandise and his warehouse is one of the largest of the territory, having usually 25,000 gallons of wine in stock. He does a yearly business of \$150,000 and he has an extended reputation as a business man of more than ordinary ability. Mr. Becker was the means of establishing a postoffice at Belen and he held the responsible office of postmaster for many years. He has the distinction of having established one of the first telephone lines in New Mexico and ever since his arrival in the territory has been identified with public interests. In 1877 he was married to Miss Anna Vietsch of Germany.

Compulsory Attendance.
All Children Between the Ages of Five and Sixteen Must Go to School.

A strenuous effort is to be made this year to enforce the territorial law requiring compulsory attendance at school of children of school age. Colonel J. Francisco Chavez, the territorial superintendent of public instruction, has sent the following letter to the county school superintendents:

Dear Sir: Your most earnest and careful attention is directed to section 1556 of the compiled laws of New Mexico of 1897, in reference to the compulsory attendance of children to school of the territory, and that from the ages of 5 years up to and including 16 years, and it is required and demanded by this office that superintendents of schools of all districts of the territory, shall without delay communicate with the school directors within their counties, directing to notify the parents of children, comprehended within the ages mentioned within their respective districts, that they must send their children to school, and that it is compulsory attendance must continue for three months, unless such children are at the time attending some good, reputable, private school, and that the strictest compliance with and implicit obedience to this section of the law is demanded of superintendents of schools, and that their imperative duty to see that the directors of the several districts respectively give compliance and obedience to this section of law, as provided in the section to which attention has heretofore already been directed.
