BISBEE ROAD!

It May Extend to Silver City.

Tobacco Trust Being Formed in New York.

Two Lake Steamers Engage in Exciting 100 Mile Race.

HIGH PRICE OF BEEF.

Special to The Citizen.
Silver City, N. M., June 4.—The confidential agent of the Bisbee Railroad company has secured an option on certain properties here in Silver City, to be used for depot and terminal purposes, as also right of way through private property in this city.

It is stated by reliable persons here up in the Phelps Dodge combination that they have been considering for some time the building of a branch road from their main line, leaving it near Columbus, south from Deming, and running to and through the town of Deming, thence north by Hudson to Silver City. From this point it will extend on to Hanover and Santa Rita by Fort Bayard. This will give them an outlet for the copper and iron ores produced from their mines here and recently acquired at Hanover and Fort Bayard.

This will be a great benefit to Silver City and the surrounding country as it will give it a competing line, which will result in cheaper rates on all classes of tonnage both in and out of Silver City.

Tobacco Trust.

New York, June 4.—The Journal of Commerce says: "It is reported that a new tobacco company is to be formed to take over both the American and Continental companies, and a new cigar plant is now acquiring various cigar plants throughout the country."

RACING STEAMERS.

Exciting Race for Championship of the Great Lakes.

Cleveland, Ohio, June 4.—Stripped of everything that would unnecessarily catch wind, two large modern side-wheel passenger steamers, the City of Erie, of Cleveland, and the Tashmoo, of Detroit, lined up this morning for a great hundred mile dash from Cleveland to Erie to decide the speed championship of the Great Lakes.

The Erie crossed the starting line at 9:37:51, and the Tashmoo at 9:38:51. On Nottingham, fourteen miles east, the Tashmoo led by a length, the Erie apparently slowly gaining, however.

On Fairport, twenty-eight miles east of the starting line, the City of Erie led by nearly a quarter of a mile. The boats were both steaming at a terrific speed.

Connaught, O., June 4.—The racing steamers passed a few miles off Connaught harbor at 12:45 p. m. Apparently the City of Erie was leading an eighth of a mile. Connaught is about twenty miles from Cleveland.

Erie, Pa., June 4.—The City of Erie touched the stake boat one minute and thirty-four seconds ahead of the Tashmoo, unofficial time.

High Price of Beef.

Chicago, June 4.—Beef on the hoof has been advancing in price for the last two weeks until the retail butchers of Chicago found it necessary to raise their prices to meet the advance. The advance has affected only the cheaper grades of meat, and thus places a burden on people who cannot afford sirloins and porter houses at 18 and 20 cents a pound.

CABINET MEETING.

No Extra Session of Congress Will Be Called this Summer.

Washington, June 4.—The cabinet today decided that no necessity exists for an extra session of Congress. Secretary Root and Attorney General Knox rendered legal opinion to the effect that authority to govern the Philippines rested in the president by the Spooner amendment is ample.

The following statement was issued by Secretary Cortelyou: "The president has determined that existing conditions do not require or warrant the calling of Congress together during the present summer or making any change of policy hitherto pursued and announced in regard to the Philippines."

It can be authoritatively stated that Dingler tariff rates upon goods from the Philippines entering the United States will remain in force as heretofore. The president will put into effect such changes as the tariff commission may recommend. The establishment of civil government, so-called, in the archipelago may proceed without interruption as soon as the military authorities consider the time ripe for its establishment.

Sunk the Steamer.
Atlantic City, June 4.—The British steamer Rinaldo, from Trinidad for New York, whose cargo of asphalt melted and caused the steamer to list so badly that she anchored off here yesterday, sank early this morning off shore. The crew came ashore in row boats.

Russian Loss in China.
London, June 4.—The Exchange Telegraph company has published a dispatch from St. Petersburg saying that the Russian casualty list in China shows thirty-one officers and 628 men killed or died of wounds.

MRS. MCKINLEY CANNOT RECOVER.

London, June 4.—Lord Kitchener, in a dispatch from Pretoria, dated June 4th, says: "Dixon's report of fighting at Vlakfontein, forty miles from Johannesburg, May 29, just received. On our side 1,450 men with seven guns were engaged. The force was returning to camp at Vlakfontein when the enemy, under cover of the void, fired and rushed the rear guard, consisting of two guns of the Twenty-eighth battery and 350 men of the Derbyshire and Yeomanry. They temporarily captured two guns. When the remainder of the force came into action the Boers were driven off and the guns recaptured."

"The casualties were six officers and fifty-one men killed; six officers and fifteen men wounded; one officer and seven men missing. One officer and four men have since died of wounds. Forty-one Boers were killed on the ground."

TOOK COLD POISON.

Lincoln, Neb., June 4.—J. Albert Brink, city solicitor of a wholesale grocery house, and Mrs. Mabel Walker, took cold poison at Brink's room at a hotel. The woman is dead. Brink may recover. Mr. Walker, who is agent for an eastern publishing house, is either in the western part of this state or in Colorado. Brink says that the dead woman and himself were intoxicated and she challenged him to die with her.

MINERS' MEETING.

Western Federation of Miners in Session at Denver.

Denver, Colo., June 4.—The Western Federation of Miners today adopted the labor union convention's resolutions in favor of organizing a labor party.

The federation will select Denver as permanent headquarters. President Boyce will be re-elected.

In the Western Labor Union there is a contest for the office of president. F. J. Polletier, a member of the Montana legislature, will succeed Daniel McDonald. The next meeting of the union will be held in Denver.

The labor union convention raised the per capita dues in the unions from 7 cents to 10 cents a month, the increase being to provide funds for putting several organizers in the field.

Health Not Improved.

Washington, June 4.—It is reported that Mrs. McKinley passed a fairly comfortable night, but her condition this morning shows no improvement.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

General Routine Work Given Due Consideration—Officers Monthly Reports.

A meeting of the city council was held last night and all members were present except Aldermen Wright and McMillin. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. New bills were read and referred to the proper committees.

In the report of City Marshal McMillin it was shown that eighty-seven arrests were made, 141 meals served and \$414 collected during the month of May.

The books of City Treasurer Chamberlain revealed a balance of \$6,781.36 on hand June 1.

The protest from the Postal Telegraph company against the granting of an exclusive franchise to any company to put in a call box system, was committee for further consideration.

The damages to property abutting the new viaduct was appraised by the committee, and it was agreed to pay William and Mary Ruby \$1,000 and M. P. Stamm \$250.

A new six-foot concrete sidewalk was ordered laid on the east side of Broadway from Gold to Wheelock avenues.

The council empowered the street committee to employ a man with a horse and cart at a cost of not more than \$2.50, to cleaning the streets.

Bids for the new hose wagon, which had been received, were opened and referred to the fire committee.

The report of the city physician was read, and no cases of contagious diseases were reported except one case of scarlet fever, which was convalescent.

MINE ACCIDENT IN MICHIGAN.

Deaver, Colo., June 4.—General Merriam, commander of the department of the Colorado, today received the following telegram from Lieutenant Colonel Lee, in command of Fort Wallace, Wyo.: "It is reported that an Arapahoe sheepherder was killed last Friday on the reservation thirty miles north of the agency by a white sheepherder. This, if true, has no connection with the reported disturbances, though it might incite some of the Arapahoes. The agent on the reservation has heard nothing of the matter, and everything apparently is quiet."

This is the only advice that has reached General Merriam regarding the threatened outbreak of Arapahoes on the Snake River. Troop 12, first cavalry, is stationed at Fort Washakie, and General Merriam believes that they are sufficient to meet any emergency. No orders have been issued to send other troops to the scene of trouble. General Merriam said that ill-feeling among the Indians is due to the presence of "scoundrels" who have gone into the country in anticipation of the opening of a portion of the reservation to settlers.

Destructive Fire.
Mattoon, Ill., June 4.—Fire started today in the large plant of the Arapahoe sheep company, and after destroying it spread to the Kingsolver and Duncan warehouses and several dwellings, which were also destroyed. The aristocratic residence of the company is also in jeopardy. The loss at noon amounted to about \$50,000.

Fatal Railroad Accident.

Atlanta, Ga., June 4.—The passenger train from Macon on the Southern railway was run into by a switch engine at the Atlanta shops.

Killed—Mrs. A. A. Lemon, Miss Alma Lemon, McDonough, Ga.; H. M. Vickers, Florville, Ga. Badly injured—A. F. Fouché.

The passenger train was passing the shops at a high rate of speed when suddenly a switch engine standing on the siding started backward into the moving train. Railway officials claim that the engine became suddenly unmanageable. Yard Conductor Duncan, who was in the cab, was arrested.

MINE EXPLOSION.

Eight Men Killed in a Michigan Iron Mine.

Iron Mountain, Mich., June 4.—By an explosion of powder and the suffocating fumes that followed, eight men were killed early today in the seventh level of the Ludington shaft of the Champion mine. The cause of the explosion has not been determined.

Nearly thirty children were rendered fatherless by the accident. The men were using powder in the hauling machine. It is believed that the machine, becoming red hot, set fire to the dynamite and the men were stricken down by the deadly fumes before they could escape.

New Mexico demands Statehood from the Fifty-Seventh Congress.

New Mexico will harvest a big wheat crop this year.

New Mexico will double its railroad mileage within the next two years.

Boston is trying to mend her ways. She has spent over \$50,000,000 in straightening her streets.

Silver City hopes to get the Biscay railroad extended from Deming to the rich mining districts of Grant county.

The telephone lines owned by the British government are said to be run at a loss of \$3,500,000 a year. This would look as if the people who do not send telegrams are being taxed to secure low rates for those who do.

Last year's Kansas wheat crop, manufactured into flour, would have made 12,000,000 fifty-pound sacks, or approximately, one for every person in the United States. Yet the prospects are good for a still larger crop this year.

Blacklisting is the agreement of a large number of corporations in the same business not to employ a man who has offended one of those corporations, and amounts to a cold-blooded conspiracy to ruin that man and starve his family. And yet a Chicago judge has held blacklisting to be lawful.

The conflagration at Jacksonville, Florida, will figure among the great fires of history. The destruction of 130 blocks of buildings, with 1,400 houses, which has rendered 15,000 people out of a population of 28,000 homeless for the time, and which has involved a loss of \$15,000,000, must be classified among the calamities of the age.

The United States is about to send 1,000 school teachers of both sexes to Manila, and the officers who are arranging for their passage are getting gray-haired in consequence. Army transports are not fitted up like passenger steamers and as each woman wants an outside cabin on the promenade deck, the plight of those who have to assign the few staterooms may be imagined.

The increase of the banking facilities of the south is an illustration of the material development and the enormous prosperity in that section. Since the 14th of March, 1900, 123 new banks, representing a capital of \$7,248,000 have been organized under the national banking act in twelve southern states (excepting Arkansas and Missouri) and have deposited \$1,834,000 in United States bonds to secure circulation.

All the volunteers in the Philippines will reach San Francisco in time to be mustered out of service prior to July 1 next, when the permanent forces of the army will be organized on a basis of about 76,000 men. Such progress has been made in the last six weeks, and the schedules are so arranged that the last transport should reach San Francisco with a few days to spare before the end of the fiscal year.

MISSOURI SOCIETY.

A large proportion of the people of New Mexico are natives of Missouri, and it is suggested that societies be formed in each county, the membership to be composed only of native-born Missourians. Such societies could greatly assist in securing a first-class exhibit for the St. Louis exposition in 1903. The Citizen would be glad to help organize such a society in Albuquerque. Will the Missourians of the city please call at this office and be shown how such an organization would be highly beneficial to the members.

ARIZONA PINE FOREST.

Most people will be surprised to learn that it appears from reports to the geological survey that Arizona has the largest unbroken pine forest reserve in the United States, covering an area of over 8,000 square miles. The total quantity of pine timber suitable for sawing purposes within the boundaries of the territory amounts to 10,000,000,000 feet, which is enough to supply the needs of a thickly populated state for more than a century. The principal forest area is in Coconino county, and borders the Grand Canyon of the Colorado, although Gila, Apache and Yavapai counties have considerable timber.

MORRISON PLEASED.

In a letter to The Citizen Judge A. L. Morrison, of Santa Fe, who visited Albuquerque on Memorial Day and delivered an eloquent oration on that occasion, says:

"My visit to your splendid and progressive city was a day to be marked with a 'white stone.' When I look back a few years I remember that there was not a single house across the railroad, and you may judge my surprise when I found miles of elegant streets lined with fine comfortable residences that any city might well be proud of. I could hardly believe the evidence of my senses, but it only goes to show what an energetic, push-

ing, industrious population, such as Albuquerque is blessed with, can accomplish in a few years. I predict a prosperous future for you and believe that a couple more railroads will see a population of 50,000, inside of the next twenty years, in your city limits. I have no language to express my thanks for your generous and hospitable treatment which myself and my daughter received on all sides, and only regret that our stay could not be prolonged."

CONSTITUTION AND THE FLAG.

"We hold that the constitution follows the flag," said the late Kansas City democratic convention.

Mr. Bryan, in his speech of acceptance, said: "The Porto Rico tariff law asserts that the territory that the operation of the constitution is confined to the forty-five states. The democratic party disputes this doctrine, and denounces it as repugnant to both the letter and spirit of our organic law." Let us see. Under the provisions of the treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo, of February 2, 1848, New Mexico became a territory of the United States. "The flag," borne by the gallant troops of General Kearney, had already been here over two years, but where was the constitution?

General Kearney evidently left it behind when he crossed the Missouri river, for four years later, viz., September 9, 1850, congress passed the act establishing the territory of New Mexico, in which we find:

"Sec. 17. And be it further enacted, that the constitution and all the laws of the United States, which are not locally inapplicable, shall have the same force and effect within the said territory of New Mexico as elsewhere in the United States."

This act was signed by Howell Cobb, speaker of the house of representatives, and William R. King, president pro tem. of the senate, and approved by Millard Fillmore. This congress that sent the constitution after the flag contained such statesmen as Clay, Webster, Cass, Benton, Calhoun, Douglas, Shields, Jefferson Davis, Foster, Seward, Chase, Corwin, John Bell, Wm. Meetings of Several Territorial Boards-New Officers Elected.

A REQUISITION HONORED.

DEAF AND DUMB ASYLUM. The board of trustees of the deaf and dumb asylum met last evening at the office of the secretary, Hon. B. M. Read, Santa Fe.

A REQUISITION. Acting Governor W. Reynolds honored the requisition of the governor of Texas for Andy Messer, who is at present in Otero county and who is wanted in Haskell county, Texas, for the larceny of one beef.

CAPITOL CUSTODIAN BOARD. The capitol custodian board met yesterday with Members A. A. Keen and Solomon Spiegelberg present; Hon. E. L. Bartlett being ill. Only routine business was transacted.

TERRITORIAL BOARD OF HEALTH. The territorial board of health met yesterday at the capitol for organization and the transaction of other important business. Every member of the board was in attendance, as follows: Dr. T. P. Martin, of Taos; Dr. W. R. Tipton, of Las Vegas; Dr. William D. Radcliffe, of Belen; Dr. John Tascher, of Albuquerque; Dr. George C. Bryan, of Alamogordo; Dr. W. H. Lope, of Albuquerque; and Dr. J. H. Sloan, of Santa Fe.

The board organized by the election of the following officers: Dr. G. C. Bryan, president; Dr. John Tascher, vice president; Dr. Radcliffe, treasurer; Dr. Hope, secretary.

Considerable routine business was transacted, and the board continued in session during the afternoon. It is a singular fact that not a single position was given to northern New Mexico. Miss Grace Kennedy, expert stenographer, acted as official reporter of the proceedings of the board.

The above paragraph, taken from the New Mexican, is unjust. For years Las Vegas and Santa Fe have held the principal offices in the territorial medical board, and it was about time that central and southern New Mexico had some representation among the officers.

BOARD OF EDUCATION. The territorial board of education met yesterday at the capitol. There were present Superintendent of Public Instruction J. Francisco Chavez, Miss Maggie J. Bucher, of Las Vegas; Prof. Louis C. Butcher, of Raton; and Brother Botolph, of St. Michael's college. The other three members, the president of the University of New Mexico, the president of the College of Agriculture and Governor Otero were absent.

Hon. J. W. Reynolds, as acting governor, represented Governor Otero. Committees were appointed to take charge of certain duties of the board relating to the examination of candidates for teachers' certificates. Nothing else of importance came up at the meeting.

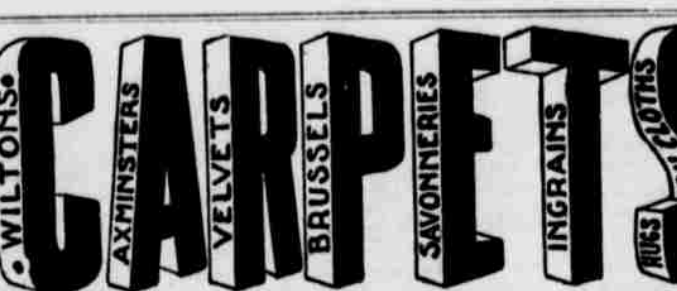
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
