Las Vegas is noted for poor side walks. However, this city council has ordered 60,000 feet of new walks.

Since New Mexico began knocking at the door to statehood she has seen fifteen territories admitted to representation in both branches of congress.

The decision of the United States court to carry its own insurance will be a total annual loss. It is said, the insurance companies of something like \$1,000,000 in premiums.

The members of the St. Louis fair commission of New Mexico will meet in this city on June 6, and perfect organization. Officers of the commission will be elected at this meeting.

The British museum now has thirty-nine miles of books, and inasmuch as they are increasing at the rate of about a mile a year the problem of housing them is becoming a serious one.

Paul Morton, second vice president of the Santa Fe, says that his road is negotiating with the Hamburg-American Steamship company for the establishment of a new line to the Orient from San Francisco.

The contract for the trans-Pacific cable, connecting Australia and Canada, has been let. The line is to be complete in 1902; will cost \$9,750,000, and will run from San Francisco to Queensland by way of Panning Island, Fiji and Norfolk Island.

The canals of the United States are 4,500 miles in length. There are fourteen times four thousand five hundred and ninety miles of canals that need to be built before the arid region of the west shall have reached a fair degree of development.

Russia is discussing water connection between the Black Sea and the Caspian by way of the Sea of Azov. The projected canal is to have a depth of twenty-two feet and a width of twenty-five feet, and is estimated to cost about 40,000,000 roubles.

The New Mexican says that the school funds of the different counties are being handsomely increased by collection of delinquent gaming and liquor licenses by the sheriffs, who are now charged with that duty. The law providing for this is proving very wholesome.

The rapidity with which the insurance has subsided in the Philippines during the past few months is remarkable and significant. The collapse began almost immediately after the news of the re-election of McKinley reached the islands. That was the deathblow to the rebellion.

The New Mexican claims that the Journal Democrat is for the re-appointment of Governor Otero, and the Capital claims that the J. D. is opposed to the governor. The editor and business manager of that paper signed a petition to the president urging the reappointment of the governor, which should be considered good evidence that the paper favors Mr. Otero.

PROTECTION OF FORESTS.  
"The forestry and irrigation problems in almost all countries of the world are solved by the respective governments. The comparatively small country of Sweden," says National Irrigation, "owns nearly 20,000,000 acres of forest lands, the income from which maintains numerous forestry schools besides yielding a handsome revenue to the state. Germany and France both have extensive forestry departments and Spain controls all irrigation works. The general government is always the logical manager of both classes of such work, for successful irrigation depends not only upon proper supervision, but likewise upon a comprehensive forestry system which will protect this important source of irrigation supply."
