SUPREME COURT!

Decision in Insular Cases Handed Down.

Federation of Miners in Ses- sion at Denver.

Yacht Club Races Set to Come Off September 21.

AMERICAN TROOPS LEAVE CHINA.

Washington, May 27.—The United States supreme court today handed down opinions covering all issues on the new insular possessions which have been in controversy. Although several of the decisions upheld the contestants on certain issues raised, yet in the most important decision, that of *Dowry vs. Bidwell*, Justice Brown announced a sweeping decision of the court upholding the general attitude and policy of the government up to the present time. The effect of this decision is to affirm the constitutionality of the Foraker act and to give congress power to deal with the newly acquired territory in such manner as the legislative branch may consider suitable for the new territory. The decision also has the effect of declaring that the new insular possessions do not acquire the rights and privileges of the states.

Washington, May 27.—The United States supreme court today announced its decision in the insular cases. The announcement of the court's decision was begun at 12:27. The main opinion was handed down in the *De Lima* case. Justice Brown announced the court's decision on the point of jurisdiction, holding that the court had jurisdiction.

The *De Lima* case involved the importation of goods into the United States from Porto Rico after the ratification of the treaty of Paris and before the passage of the Porto Rico act.

Justice Brown said that whether sugars imported from or into Porto Rico were dutiable depends upon whether Porto Rico is a foreign country. He held that it is a foreign country.

The opinion was opposed to the contention of the government. He concluded that at the time the duties were collected, Porto Rico was not a foreign country, but territory of the United States.

In the cases of *Gonzalez vs. United States* and *Crossman vs. United States* brought here from the circuit court of the southern district of New York to test in the *Gonzalez* case the validity of the levy duty on importation of tobacco from Porto Rico into the United States after the ratification of the treaty and before the passage of the Porto Rico act, and in the *Crossman* case, the duty on liquors imported into Hawaii after annexation, but before the act providing a government for Hawaii took effect, the court reversed the judgments below for reasons cited in the *De Lima* case, holding the levy of duties unconstitutional.

Justice Brown also announced the opinion of the court in the case of *Dooly vs. United States*, involving the validity of the duty levied on goods imported into Porto Rico from the United States between the date of

Annual Report of the Chief Examiner.

Russian Paper Suppressed for Labor Opinion.

Seven More Victims of the Storm on Lake Michigan.

PRESBYTERIANS WILL REVISE CREED.

Washington, May 27.—The annual report of the chief examiner of the civil service commission was made public today. It shows that during the year ended June 30, 1900, 45,641 persons took competitive examinations for original appointments to the classified service.

The report instances some frauds discovered in examinations, resulting in barring offenders from future examinations and leaving its ear mark and being followed by summary punishment. The report makes a plea for more examinations and for ample facilities to renew systematic instruction to local boards of examiners.

Paper Suppressed.—St. Petersburg, May 27.—The prohibition of the publication of *Novoye Vremya* for a week because of its editorial article on labor troubles is creating an immense sensation as indicating extraordinary nervousness on the part of the government. The editorial in question merely said that the operatives were poorly paid for excessively hard work and suggested that the government carry on the work begun for emancipation and enforced social reform.

Victims of the Storm.—Milwaukee, Wis., May 27.—Seven more victims have been added to the list of those perishing in last Friday's gale. This fact became known today when the waterlogged and dismantled bulk of the schooner *C. H. Hockley* was sighted between Sheboygan and Milwaukee by an incoming steamer.

PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY.—Revision of Confession of Faith Discussed by the Delegates. Philadelphia, Pa., May 27.—It was decided by the Presbyterian general assembly to hold the assembly next year at the Fifth avenue church, New York.

The committee on place of meeting recommended to the next assembly the selection of Los Angeles for the assembly of 1903.

When the order of the day—the revision of the confession of faith—was reached, the moderator advised against hasty action today. A motion to limit speeches to ten minutes was unanimously carried.

Rev. Dr. James D. Moffat, president of Washington and Jefferson university, quoted the opposition to the revision by a revision by the committee on place of meeting.

Dr. Nicolls, of St. Louis, leader of the minority, heartily seconded the amendment. Other seconding speeches were made by the commissioners, who represented all shades of opinion in the assembly, including Dr. W. H. Boyle, of Pueblo, Colo.

The amendment was adopted by a viva voce vote, not one voice being raised in opposition. The question was then on the adoption of the majority report, and Dr. Johnson moved that the three recommendations in the report be taken up seriatim, which motion carried.

Recommendation A, which calls for the appointment of a revision committee, was adopted with only a few votes against it.

Recommendation B, as amended, went through without a sign of opposition.

Recommendation C, on motion of Dr. Baker, of Philadelphia, was amended so that amendments to be prepared by the committee for several chapters of the confession of faith shall be made "either by modification of the text or by a declaratory statement." This recommendation was also adopted with but little opposition.

STRUCK OIL.—Sour Lake, Tex., May 27.—At a depth of 550 feet yesterday afternoon a small flow of oil was struck here. The well is a good pump and will produce fifty barrels a day. Drilling is to be continued in the hope of striking a gusher.

CAPITAL STOCK TO BE INCREASED.—Denver, Colo., May 27.—A special meeting of the stockholders of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company has been called at the general offices in this city, July 12, for the purpose of considering the increase of the capital stock from \$25,000,000 to \$40,000,000. The increase is for the purpose of enlarging the steel plant at Pueblo.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—Electric Cars Collide and Several Persons Killed and Injured. Albany, N. Y., May 27.—Electric cars racing for a switch while running in opposite directions at the rate of forty miles per hour, collided this afternoon, killing five persons and wounding over forty. Killed: Frank Smith, motorman; William Nichols, motorman; Maud Kellogg, Round Lake; Annie Rooney, Stuyvesant Falls; David Mahoney, mate on the Dean Richmond.

Fatally injured: George Barry, Fry; Fred Smith, Albany.
