STOCK MARKET

Quiet on Exchange and Little Doing.

Island of Mindoro to be Occupied by Americans.

Embezzling Bank Teller in New Orleans Under Arrest.

EX-AMBASSADOR TO GERMANY DYING.

New York, May 11.—With both the stock exchange and consolidated exchange closed today, and practically nothing done on the curb, Wall street was very quiet. The large brokerage houses had clerks at work straightening out the accounts of speculators and putting the books in order. London's prices generally showed advances compared with the close at New York yesterday, the extreme rise being eighteen points in Northern Pacific.

All interest of the financial world remains absorbed in the great contest for the control of the Northern Pacific.

The high price of Northern Pacific was taken by many as indicating that buying for control of the property was still going on wherever the seller had stock to deliver.

CANNOT DELIVER STOCKS.

London, May 11.—A special meeting of the stock exchange committee has been summoned for Monday in the hope of reaching a solution of the difficulty in which the operators and brokers who have given calls for Northern Pacific for the end of May and July find themselves. It developed today that every share here is held by the Morgans and Kuhn, Loeb & Co., and therefore the brokers are unable to secure a single share for delivery. The situation has a distressing effect. J. P. Morgan will be in London this afternoon and a conference will be held. It is hoped that he and Kuhn, Loeb & Co. will do something to relieve the situation.

Will Occupy Mindoro Island.

Manila, May 11.—The trial of Captain Frederick J. Bowers, Thirtieth volunteer infantry, quartermaster of the department of southern Luzon, on charges connected with the commissionary scandals, was finished today. The verdict was not announced. The department of southern Luzon is sending various expeditions in pursuit of the remaining Filipino bands. It is expected that the island of Mindoro will be occupied in the near future.

Embezzling Bank Teller Arrested.

Washington, May 11.—Controller of the Currency Davies today received a telegram from New Orleans announcing that the teller of the Iberian National bank is short in his accounts \$36,000. The United States attorney was informed of the shortage, and the teller was at once arrested. The bank's condition is reported good.

Dying.

Grand Rapids, Mich., May 11.—Edwin F. Uhl, ex-United States ambassador to Germany, who has been ill a number of weeks, had a relapse this morning and, his attending physicians do not expect him to live through the day.

Will Adjourn.

Berlin, May 11.—The Reichstag today agreed without debate to Chancellor von Bülow's proposal to adjourn until November 26.

Vetted the Bill.

Albany, N. Y., May 11.—Governor Odell has vetted the employers' liability bill.

Suit Over Right of Way.

Salt Lake, Utah, May 11.—The state supreme court rendered a decision in favor of the Postal Telegraph company in a suit for right of way over the Oregon Short Line railroad from Salt Lake northward to the Idaho-Utah state line. Nominal damages of \$100 are awarded to the railroad company. Similar suits are pending on appeal in the Idaho and Montana federal courts.

STEEL TRUST.

Its President Gives Information of the Big Combine.

Washington, May 11.—Chas. M. Schwab, president of the United States Steel corporation, was before the industrial commission today. He said that the United States Steel company controls eight companies by owning 80 per cent of the stock of each. It is left to conduct its business in its own way. As a rule the plan had been to take in only companies not competitors, but there were cases in which two institutions of the same line were brought together, and in such cases the managers were expected to get together in making their plans for sales.

STUCK BY LIGHTNING.

A Mexican Boy Severely Burned During the Storm Tuesday Afternoon.

Rosendo Mares, the 17-year-old son of Camilla Mares, was struck and badly burned by lightning during the storm Tuesday afternoon, while herding sheep near the quarry east of town. The lightning struck him on the right shoulder, ranging downward, badly burning his breast and passing down his leg into the ground, tearing off his shoe, which was totally destroyed. It is presumed Rosendo was struck about 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, but he was not found until 4 o'clock that night, lying in the midst of five sheep, which had been killed at the same time.

London, May 11.—Lord Kitchener reports: "Since May 25th, twenty-eight Boers have been killed, 33 wounded, 130 taken prisoners, 183 surrendered. Nine thousand rounds of ammunition, 250 wagons, 1,500 horses and large quantities of grain and stock have been captured."

Needs a Trounsing.

Constantinople, May 10.—A third note, evidently emanating directly from the sultan, was delivered today to the ambassadors, demanding in peremptory language the immediate suppression of the foreign postoffice, and retreating charges of smuggling against foreign officials. The ambassadors immediately returned the note to the sultan, thus creating partial cessation of relations between the embassies and the Turkish government.

HEAT OF THE STARS.

It Can be Measured by a Recently Invented Instrument.

Chicago, Ill., May 11.—A special to the Record-Herald from Williams Bay, Wis., says: "Whether stars, millions of miles away, send to the earth's surface any heat along with rays of light, a question which long puzzled astronomers, has been finally solved. Heat from these far-off bodies has been detected and measured by one of the most sensitive astronomical instruments ever made."
