MARRIAGE BONDS DISSOLVED.

Decree of Divorce Granted Mrs. R. B. Benham from Erring Husband.

In the case of the Reliable Jewelry Co. vs. Andrew Trujillo, et al., judgment for \$150 was entered to-day, the cause having been heard by the court. The divorce case of Anne M. Benham, of Bland, against Dr. Robert B. Benham, now a practicing physician of Los Angeles, was brought to the attention of Judge Crumpacker through the plaintiff's attorney, Hon. B. S. Rodey, and a decree of absolute divorce was granted. The plaintiff was allowed alimony in the sum of \$50 per month, the custody of their minor child, Robert Benham, and the assignment of all property in Bernalillo county which belonged to the defendant. The cause was heard in Philadelphia in 1876 and lived together as husband and wife until the spring of 1896, when suddenly and unexpectedly the husband took his departure. Desertion and non-support were the charges alleged in the bill of complaint.

Building New Switches.

As an evidence of increased business on the Santa Fe, the officials have given orders to their superintendents and foremen to build more side-tracks and take a few curves out of some of the switches. For a few days past Yard Foreman John Quinn has been busy with his force of men in laying 1,000 feet on the south extension of track No. 2, and as soon as this work is completed they will begin lengthening tracks Nos. 2 and 1.
