SEEN BY HIS WIFE

Aguinaldo Visited by Relatives.

Tenement House Fire in New York With Fatalities.

Cablegram of Appreciation Sent to General Funston.

WEEKLY BANK STATEMENT.

Manila, March 30.—The wife and mother of Aguinaldo have been granted permission to visit him. The Spaniard, Lorenzo Prieto, charged with assisting the insurgents by furnishing information to the insurgent general, Calles, in exchange for trading privileges, was tried by military commission and found guilty and sentenced to death. General MacArthur commuted the sentence to imprisonment for ten years.

Burned to Death.

New York, March 30.—Mrs. Esther Cohen and two of her small children were burned to death in a fire in a five-story tenement house on Delancy and Norfolk streets early today. There were thirteen families in the building. Several mothers lost their reason and threw their children from the windows to the streets. All were caught by police and firemen and escaped serious injury.

Express Their Thanks.

Washington, March 30.—The war department made public today the following cablegram sent yesterday to General MacArthur: "The president directs me to express his high appreciation of the gallant conduct of General MacArthur and the officers and men of the army and navy engaged with him in the Palawan expedition. The secretary of war personally joins in this expression." (Signed) "CORBIN."

Destructive Storm.

Dallas, Texas, March 30.—Yesterday's storm spread over a large section of northern Texas, but was almost local as far as damage is concerned. The losses to merchants and general property in Dallas county are estimated at \$75,000 to \$100,000. The weather is very cold today and injury to fruit is feared.

Chicago Sold.

Chicago, March 30.—The Chicago Evening Post was today sold by H. H. Kohlman to a company headed by J. C. Shaffer, of Evanston, who will be president and publisher. Samuel T. O'Leary, for several years managing editor, will be its editor. The paper will be reduced one-half from the present size, but increased in number from eight to sixteen.

Mine Committee Will Meet.

Indianapolis, March 30.—Notice was given today that the national executive committee of the United Mine Workers will meet here April 8, to consider important questions. The officers are greatly pleased over the agreement in the anthracite field, and think it will have a great bearing on the settlement of the questions that may hereafter arise between the hard coal operators and miners.

Option Made Permanent.

New York, March 30.—At a meeting of the board of directors of the Denver & Rio Grande railroad a resolution was adopted authorizing the acquisition of the Rio Grande Western. The Rio Grande has held an option on the controlling interest of the Denver & Rio Grande for several weeks.

WAR CLOUDS!

Great Tension in Official Circles.

Oxford Defeated Cambridge in Close Boat Race.

More Arrests Made in the Rice Will Forgeries.

THE MARKET QUOTATIONS.

London, March 30.—The Yokohama correspondent of the Daily Mail wires: "There is great tension in official circles. The foreign office is open day and night. Frequent conferences are held between the senior generals. The emperor has made anxious inquiries as to the condition of the services. Three staff officers have been dispatched to Korea to make investigation of the possibilities of war were freely discussed."

Cambridge Defeated.

London, March 30.—The closeness of the finish of the Oxford-Cambridge boat race, which was rowed this morning over the course from Putney to Mortlake, which is officially given as twenty-four minutes, is an evidence of the doggedness of the contest. The spectators were treated to a rare race, the rivals leading alternately until they reached Turnham Green, where it looked as if the odds were on Cambridge. Oxford, keeping even a pace, won down the opposing crew and won in twenty-two minutes, thirty-one seconds.

Arrested for Forgery.

New York, March 30.—David L. S. and Morris Meyers, arrested yesterday on warrants charging them with forgery in the first degree, in connection with the will of the millionaire Wm. Marsh Rice, were arraigned today and held in bail of \$5,000 each.

Fine Hotel Burned.

Richmond, Va., March 30.—The magnificent Jefferson hotel, one of the most imposing buildings in Richmond, was practically swept out of existence by fire this morning. The magnificent structure cost over \$1,000,000. The fire was discovered near midnight and messengers were sent through the building to awaken the guests, many of whom had to be dragged out of bed. All of the guests got out safely. Mr. Richards, a traveling man of Danville, Va., fell down a flight of stairs and broke his leg. Several firemen were injured and a boy named Robertson is missing. The insurance on the building is about \$600,000.

Muster Out at Frisco.

Washington, March 30.—The war department has received a telegram from General Shafter at San Francisco saying that it is the unanimous wish of the enlisted men of the Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth regiments to be mustered out at San Francisco.

Last night, at his temporary residence, Fourteenth street, Thomas G. Harriott, an invalid who had spent the last two winters here, entered into his last sleep, the immediate cause of his death being pneumonia. Mr. Harriott was a native of Scotland. The remains will be taken to Trinidad, Colo., to-night for burial. Mr. Harriott was the husband of Mrs. Tiedale, and some friends of the family from this city will accompany the body.
