FUNSTON'S FIND!

News of Aguinaldo's Capture Confirmed.

He and Three Staff Officers Taken in by Funston.

President McKinley and Other Officials Gratified at Result.

FUNSTON'S HOME CELEBRATING.

Manila, March 28.—Aguinaldo and several members of his staff were captured near Casiguran, near Balor, province of Luzon, and brought to Manila. Aguinaldo was brought ashore here at 3:10 p. m. to-day and taken before General MacArthur at Malacanang palace. He talked freely, but seemed ignorant concerning recent events. He appeared in good health, and was cheerful. He lunched with officers of General MacArthur's staff, and was escorted to Andra street jail. Aguinaldo's capture was attended with considerable difficulty, an insurgent major being killed. Twenty rifles and a number of important papers were captured.

NEWS CONFIRMED. Washington, March 28.—General MacArthur has cabled the war department confirming the published report of the capture of Aguinaldo.

AGUINALDO IN CUSTODY. Washington, March 28.—Admiral Remy has cabled the navy department as follows:

"Cavite, March 28.—The Vicksburg sailed on the 28th, with General Funston and eighty-three Macabebes aboard on an expedition to capture Aguinaldo. She returned to-day. Aguinaldo and three staff officers were captured and delivered to the custody of General MacArthur."

MACARTHUR HAS HIM. Washington, March 28.—Press reports of the capture of Aguinaldo by General Funston were confirmed to-day by General MacArthur at Manila. In the following cablegram to Adjutant General Corbin: "General Funston has returned from an expedition to Palanan, province of Isabella, where he captured Aguinaldo, who is now in my possession at Malacanang. Particulars later."

MacArthur is General MacArthur's headquarters and residence in Manila. Secretary Root informed the Associated Press this morning that he can make no statement yet as to the disposition of Aguinaldo. He supposed he will be treated as other prominent insurgents captured.

THE PRESIDENT PLEASED. Washington, March 28.—The news of Aguinaldo's capture by General Funston was received everywhere by officials with intense gratification, but, perhaps, nowhere did it create more satisfaction than at the White House.

It has been the opinion of military authorities for a long time that Aguinaldo was doing more than all other agencies combined to keep the rebellion in the Philippines alive, and every energy was directed to compass his capture. It was the intention of Funston some time ago to return to the United States, but by the direction of the war department he was detained in the Philippines in the hope that just as a conspiracy as did arise should give him an opportunity to test his prowess.

AT FUNSTON'S HOME. Iola, Kan., March 28.—Business in Iola, the home of General Funston, was practically suspended to-day while the citizens gave vent to the enthusiasm they felt. Flags were unfurled and business men left their stores to carry the news to their homes. The local paper will say: "There is not anybody like General Funston. He is from Kansas, God bless him, and when he is told anything cannot be done, he goes and does it."

DREWY IS PLEASED. New York, March 28.—Admiral Dewey to-day expressed the greatest satisfaction at the news of the capture of Aguinaldo, and said he thought this would really wind up the period of resistance.

The Nebraska Legislature. Lincoln, Neb., March 28.—This morning the republican caucus nominated J. H. Millard, of Omaha, for the long term, and Governor Charles H. Dietrich for the short term for United States senators from Nebraska. Prior to this, Rosewater and J. B. Thompson, two leading candidates, withdrew.

REPUBLICAN SENATORS. Lincoln, Neb., March 28.—J. H. Millard and C. H. Dietrich, nominated by the republican caucus this morning, were elected by the joint session at noon. Each received seventy votes, the entire republican strength of the legislature.

WHO THEY ARE. Omaha, Neb., March 28.—Joseph H. Millard and Charles H. Dietrich, who were to-day elected United States senators, are both bankers and neither have been prominent in politics until within the last half year. Millard was born in Hamilton, Canada, in 1826, and came to Nebraska at the age of 20 years.

Chas. H. Dietrich is governor of Nebraska and president of the German National bank of Hastings. He was born at Aurora, Illinois, in 1853. MARKET QUOTATIONS. Market quotations and review furnished by W. F. Metcalf, No. 5 Cromwell block, received over the private wire of F. G. Logan.

A BLACK RECORD.

Chas. B. Hogg, With Many Aliases, in the County Jail.

ARRESTED IN THIS CITY.

Readers of The Citizen will remember that on March 4, Charles B. Hogg, alias Charles Maddox, forged the name of Rev. J. H. Marsh, pastor of the Congregational church, and on the endorsement of the reverend gentleman secured \$200. Vice President M. W. Flournoy, soon after the man had obtained the money, discovered the forgery and promptly placed the matter in the hands of City Marshal McMillan, who thereupon arrested the forger in jail. The marshal was quite sure that Hogg, alias Maddox, was an old offender, and he wrote to the Denver National Detective agency, at Denver, which brought forth the following history of the man:

Dear Sir:—For your benefit, to aid you and the Albuquerque authorities in the trial and conviction of Charles Maddox, now under arrest for a forgery perpetrated against the First National bank of your city, we send you the following criminal record of Maddox, alias Thompson, alias McDonald, alias Fryer, alias Denton, etc., prior to his release from the Nashville, Tenn., penitentiary.

On December 1st, 1896, he secured from Ladd & Bush's bank, Salem, Ore., \$250, using a bogus check for \$75, dated November 26, 1896, drawn on the National Bank of Commerce, of Tacoma, Washington, to the order of Charles Fryer, signed Edward W. Fawcett, to which he forged the endorsement of Rev. W. K. Kentner. On December 7, 1896, he obtained

Geological Survey For the West.

New Trails Granted to Goebel Assassins.

Attorney Generalship Offered to a Pittsburg Lawyer.

NEW MEXICO POSTMASTER ARRESTED.

Washington, March 28.—Several parties from the geological survey, comprising about 100 men, will begin about April 1st work on the California-Nevada border, that is expected to involve an immense amount of labor and the ultimate expenditure of about \$10,000,000, distributed over a period of ten years. This is a project to build large reservoirs on the California side of the California-Nevada border, and the reclamation of fertile lands on the Nevada side. Chief Hydrographer F. H. Newell said to-day that lack of conservation of water sources accounted for the steady loss of population in Nevada.

New Trails Granted. Frankfort, Ky., March 28.—The court of appeals to-day granted new trails to Caleb Powers and James Howard, under sentence for the Goebel assassination. The reversal of the Howard case was by the whole court. In the Powers case Judges Hebron, Paynter and White dissented. The decision of the Powers case holds the Taylor pardon not valid and orders a new trial on the ground of erroneous instructions to the jury and admission of incompetent testimony. The Howard case is reversed because of erroneous instructions, incompetent evidence and minor points.

Attorney General. Washington, March 28.—P. C. Knox, of Pittsburg, to whom the rank of attorney general has been offered, has decided to offer the attorney generalship, with the president over an hour to-day. After he left the following official statement was made: "The president has invited Mr. Knox to accept the office of attorney general. Knox has not yet signified his acceptance and will not until after his return home. Knox will return to Pittsburg to-day."

Postmaster Arrested. Denver, Colo., March 28.—Inspector Doran has ordered the arrest of John H. Young, postmaster at Fruitland, N. M., on the charge of embezzlement of \$500 of money for funds.
