Cyclones in the south and blizzards in the north, and Albuquerque escapes both.

Japan is following our good example in rapidly withdrawing its troops from China.

Governor Otero has appointed Merritt E. Roberts of Santa Fe county a notary public.

The thirty-fourth territorial legislative assembly will adjourn sine die next Thursday, March 21, at midnight.

Attend the meeting of the city republican central committee at F. W. Clancy's law office at 7:30 o'clock to-night.

A Chicago young man, heir to \$50,000,000 announces that he will enter municipal politics. And there is joy among the "push."

About all that can be said for the latest lynching affair in Indiana is that it was somewhat more hideous than the one that preceded it.

The legislators will do some good work to get their pet measures and schemes through before adjournment next Thursday, March 21, at midnight.

Representative Barnes of Colfax county has appointed Louis Moore of Raton cadet to the New Mexico military institute at Roswell, and Casper Nalle of Dorsey as alternate.

Italy is still under the snows, and all Europe is freezing with unusually cold weather, and from one end of the world to the other Albuquerque is the only place that has had a comfortable winter.

It is now stated that the sultan of Turkey will pay that Armenian demimty to the American claimants just as soon as he can borrow the money. This, doubtless, means about thirty days after the millennium.

Territorial Treasurer J. H. Vaughn has received from Fred Muller, collector of Santa Fe county, \$88.50 of 1900 taxes, and from Mark Howell, collector of Chaves county, \$2.11 of 1899 taxes and \$481.46 of 1900 taxes.

Governor Otero yesterday signed council bill No. 23, the Springer educational bill; council bill No. 3, to prevent the killing of song birds; council substitute for house bill No. 118, an act for the protection of game birds.

The Las Vegas Optic is making a hot campaign against Hon. F. A. Hubbell of this city, and because that gentleman is watching the legislature so as to enter a protest should any pernicious laws be passed, that paper says he is "robbing the school children."

The name of R. W. Hopkins, president of the city school board, and a member of the board of county commissioner, is also mentioned by the republicans as an available candidate for the office of mayor. He would make a race like a Kentucky thoroughbred.

For the office of city clerk the republicans have some most excellent timber. For instance, Dr. E. J. Alger, Dr. L. H. Chamberlin, O. A. Matson and half a dozen others would run like wildfire, completely smothering C. W. Medler, provided the democrats nominate him for the office, under an avalanche of ballots.

A German physician has assured the world that matrimony prolongs life, which is good news, since most people marry sooner or later. He uses figures to prove that the per cent of deaths among the priests who vow celibacy is higher than among ordinary men and that suicides are of tener unmarried than married.

The damage cases against the Cerillos Coal railroad company, eight in number, resulting from the disaster in the White Ash mine at Madrid several years ago, have been set for trial at Santa Fe for March 25. The defendant case, which had been a test case, has been remanded by the United States supreme court for a new trial to the district court.

**ALARM OF THE PLAGUE.**

The spread of the bubonic plague in South Africa is very alarming, and yet similar scares have caused distraction in various other parts of the world in the past without annihilating the population to any great extent. It secured a good start at near Rio Janeiro at one time, and was suppressed, and if the Spanish and Portuguese doctors of Brazil and Lisbon, who are credited with habits of pompousness and superficial methods, can successfully fight the new plague it ought to be possible for the British managers of Cape Colony and Australia and the same. But in Cape Colony there is a difficult element to deal with—a combination of Mohammedans and Kafirs which is probably more perverse than the Hindus.

There have been thirty-seven deaths from the disease at Cape Town, and it has appeared at Malmesburg.

The plague has reappeared in West Australia, where it caused a panic some weeks ago.

**THE LEGISLATURE**

Number of Council Bills Introduced.

Bill Relative to Hogs and Swine Passed Both Houses.

A Coal Oil Inspection Law, After Debate, Passed House.

**OTHER LEGISLATIVE MATTERS.**

In the council yesterday morning Mr. Cruikshank called for a report on council bill No. 75, an act for the protection of fish and other purposes, which provides for a fish and game warden. The request was deferred for the present.

The following bills were introduced under suspension of the rules: Council bill No. 110, an act to authorize taxpayers to organize for mutual benefit and protection, by Mr. Cruikshank.

Council bill No. 111, by Mr. Harrison, an act to amend section 65 of the session laws of 1899.

Council bill No. 112, by Mr. Fielder, an act relating to employees, commonly called "yellow-serveants" law.

Council bill No. 113, by Mr. Hinkle, relative to the killing of stock by railroads.

Council bill No. 114, by Mr. Hughes, an act relating to contempt cases in the district courts. An effort to pass the bill immediately failed.

Council bill No. 115, by Mr. Fielder, an act to prevent employees from paying their laborers in anything but lawful money.

Council bill No. 116, by Mr. Navarro, an act relating to the distribution of water for irrigation.

Council bill No. 117, by Mr. Martinez, by request, an act validating certain county bonds.

Council bill No. 83, an act relating to practice in the supreme and district courts of the territory of New Mexico was taken up. The judiciary committee presented several amendments, which were explained by Mr. Springer. The bill was made the special order for 2 o'clock.

A joint memorial asking congress to make liberal grants of land to New Mexico for educational purposes, was passed unanimously.

House bill No. 32, an act to prevent the running at large of hogs and swine, was then considered and passed.

House bill No. 83, relating to the release of stock of corporations where the original stock has been lost or destroyed, was passed.

Council bill No. 58, an act authorizing county commissioners to make surveys for assessment purposes, was read as amended by the house, limiting the operation of the law to the years 1901 and 1902. The amendment was concurred in.

**AFTERNOON SESSION.**

The council at the afternoon session took up and concurred in the house amendment to council bill No. 47, relating to licenses for meat peddlers, and the inspection of hides. The amendment substitutes "bears" for the word "meat cattle" in the bill. The bill now goes to the governor.

Council bill No. 83, relating to practice in the supreme and district courts, being a special order, was taken up and considered section by section in committee of the whole. There were many amendments to the bill.

**HOUSE.**

Mr. Trujillo was in the chair during the opening preliminaries of the house yesterday forenoon. A number of clerical errors in council bill No. 108, the Cruikshank refunding bill, were ordered to be corrected. The house took up house substitute for house bill No. 197, an act providing for the inspection and testing of coal oil. 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**THE NEW RAILROAD.**

Completion of Survey of Santa Fe, Albuquerque & Pacific.

FEW CURVES AND EASY GRADES.

A. G. Kennedy, chief engineer of the Santa Fe, Albuquerque & Pacific railway, was in Santa Fe Thursday on business. Mr. Kennedy's camp of railroad surveyors is located about fourteen miles from Santa Fe. A survey of the line from Albuquerque to the point where he is now camped is completed, and he finds a very easy and feasible grade for a mountain road. The line runs from Albuquerque east-northeast for about twelve miles to the entrance of Tijeras canyon. While the line of the road is uphill, it is an easy grade, and there will be no hard railroad work. Through Tijeras canyon up to the divide the general direction being still east-northeast, the line running through the box canyon will have some blasting and other heavy work to do. The grades, however, are very fair. From the divide the line still continues the same general direction, goes to the base of South mountain, skirting the latter there is quite easy railroad work, with very reasonable grades. It leaves the smelter of the Santa Fe Gold & Copper Mining company about three miles to the west, and the town of San Pedro about four miles. It continues its direction north-northeast, then through the O'Mara coal fields, where, if the grades are good enough, there will be some cutting and rock work. The Galisteo river is crossed about three-quarters of a mile east of Ortiz station, on the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railway. An excellent crossing with solid rock bottom has been found at that spot. The general direction of the line continues, and the tracks of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railway are crossed about a mile and a half from Ortiz station. Thence the line turns toward Santa Fe. The grade from Ortiz station to Santa Fe, while all up grade, has so far been found to be very good, and running on an average of 1 to 1 1/2 per cent.

Mr. Kennedy has two surveys for two or three different lines into Santa Fe, and, of course, he will select the easiest and most feasible as the permanent line. From Albuquerque to his present camp the distance is about fifty-nine miles, and from his present camp to Santa Fe is about fourteen miles, so that the entire distance from Albuquerque to Santa Fe will be less than seventy-five miles.

The line will have very few curves, and is considered by Mr. Kennedy, who has had many years' experience as a railroad and hydraulic engineer, an excellent mountain road. Mr. Kennedy served for several years in the engineering corps of the Northwestern railway, and several hundred

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## FROM WASHINGTON.

## President Signed Order Suspending

Removal of Fences on Public Domain.

INTERESTING WASHINGTON NEWS.

Special Correspondence:

Washington, D. C., March 12.—At last, after a hard fight, the secretary of the interior has signed an order which will be in New Mexico about the time that this news reaches you—suspending the order previously issued to compel cattlemen to remove their fences on the public domain for another year.

When General Benson of Eddy came here it looked very much like a hopeless case to get any change in the order as previously issued. But General Benson led the fight, working day and night, pulling every wire that could be reached, and after a month's strenuous effort he obtained the help of Senator Allison and the Iowa delegation, the Texas and other delegations and had several consultations with Delegate Rodey of New Mexico, and today his efforts were crowned with success when the secretary of the interior signed an order suspending for a year the previous order of the cattlemen to at once remove their fences from the public lands.

General Benson and Frank Morgan of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railroad, will start for the territory this evening, feeling well repaid for their trip and work. The case of Henry Lockhart vs. J. A. Johnson, from the Second judicial district, comes on for argument Tuesday of next week in the United States supreme court. The case was passed over January 16. United States Attorney W. B. Childers of Albuquerque is marked for the defendant, and will be here to argue the case. Brittain & Gray for plaintiffs. It involves valuable property in Bernalillo county and has been a hard-fought case from its first inception.

This city has hardly settled down to its usual quiet condition after the inauguration and the adjournment of congress and the extra session of the senate till now the city is agog over the preparations of the presidential party, including the cabinet, for the trip to the Pacific coast, going over the Southern Pacific and returning by one of the northern routes.

No doubt the governor, the military and all the citizens of New Mexico will see to it making the trip through the territory as historic and memorable as the circumstances will permit, considering the trip will be through the most southern part of the territory, missing all the largest and best towns and prettiest valleys. It would be a great improvement if the route could be changed to go up the Rio Grande to Albuquerque, if not to Santa Fe, then via the Santa Fe Pacific to Prescott and Phoenix, back to the Southern Pacific. A day in the Grand canyon of Colorado, would be an epoch in the life of the administration, including the cabinet, which could be told in verse, song and story. Cannot the New Mexico legislature rise to the importance of the occasion and make the effort to secure the change? Why cannot the entire legislature meet the president at the New Mexico line and be his escort, even should it take an appropriation of a few thousand dollars, as New Mexico expects statehood next winter, the money could not be expended to a better advantage. Let Albuquerque and Socorro city governments and Bernalillo and other county commissioners invite the president to make the much desired change in the program. It can do no harm and may succeed in great degree; particularly considering that by doing so the party will miss the extreme heat of the most southern part of New Mexico and Arizona, and even then will encounter as much heat from Phoenix to Yuma and in southern California as the health of the president and some of the cabinet can stand. As the petrioid forest and the Grand canyon of the Colorado are two of the greatest wonders of the world, the president and party will have a lasting regret if they fail to visit them. It is a rare occasion when a president passes through New Mexico to the Pacific ocean. I. M. B. U.

The gentlemen are well acquainted with and served in the same regiment as Captain Curry of New Mexico. It is thought to be in the apex of the right lung. There apparently is no serious danger expected from the wound unless pneumonia or some other lung complication should set in.
