WASHINGTON!

Roosevelt Cheered as He
Stepped to Desk.

Rapped for Order and Seemed
in Bad Humor.

President McKinley Sends in Batch
of Nominations.

MORGAN SCORES GREAT BRITAIN.

Washington, March 6.—The galleries were packed with people, a majority of whom were visitors to the city. As Vice President Roosevelt stepped to his desk, applause rang through the galleries. He rapped sharply twice for order. Glancing sternly around the galleries he said: "If there is any disorder, I will see that it is cleared up."

Platt of Connecticut called up the amendment to the rules of which he gave notice yesterday relating to limitation of debate.

Teller of Colorado inquired of Platt whether he expected to secure action upon the amendment at the present extraordinary session.

Platt replied that he did not desire to discuss the proposed amendment at the present time. He wished to have the amendment referred to the committee on rules, but doubted very much whether the committee could consider it so fully as to enable the senate to take action upon it at this session. He had felt, he said, that the senate ought to change its rules, and he thought the proper time to introduce his proposition was at the beginning of the new session of congress.

The resolution was referred to the committee on rules.

Morgan then addressed the senate upon his resolution to abrogate the Clayton-Bulwer treaty. Morgan said he would exclude from his argument any reference to the Panama canal commission. The only prospect of the construction of the Nicaragua canal now by the United States rested upon proposals entered into between this country and the governments of Nicaragua and Costa Rica. He challenged any senator to point to a single proposition Great Britain has made for such modification of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty as would admit the construction of the Nicaragua canal.

"We will make no concessions to Great Britain," said Morgan. "We shall declare the Clayton-Bulwer treaty abrogated. If a vote on my resolution could be taken today it would inform the president of the United States that he has no two-thirds majority in the senate to adopt any compromise he may make with Great Britain. If it is to be a quarrel with Great Britain to pick a quarrel with us about it, she will find the United States can muster at least half the number of men who voted for the president at the last election and fighting men; and she will find, when that war terminates, that the steel band which binds the throne in London with Australia and India and passes through Canada will have been rent in twain, and will severance down with the empire."

SWORN IN.
Washington, D. C., March 6.—The members of the cabinet were sworn in today. The ceremony was entirely informal. Chief Justice Fuller administered the oaths.

CHAIRMAN OF SENATE.
Washington, D. C., March 6.—Senator Chandler of New Hampshire has been selected president of the Spanish claims commission. Other appointments will soon follow.

NOMINATIONS.
The President Names a Short List of New Officers.

Washington, March 6.—The president today sent the following nominations to the senate: Robert S. McCormick, Illinois, envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary to Austria-Hungary; Frank W. Jackson, Pennsylvania, consul at Patras, Greece; Navy—Captain A. S. Crowninshield, chief of the bureau of navigation, with rank of rear admiral; Commander to be Captain—Chapman C. Todd, Robert M. Berry.

DISORDERLY!

House of Commons in
an Uproar.

Ten Irish Members Dragged
Out by British Police.

Russian Officers Attack Students
Who Were Celebrating.

LIVELY FOREIGN NEWS.

New York, March 6.—A dispatch to the World from London says: There was a scene of unexampled violence and disorder in the British house of commons Tuesday night, when the Irish members, who refused to obey the speaker's order to leave the house, were dragged out by the police. It was the first time in its history that police-men had been seen on the floor of the house. The vote on account of the civil service for \$5,000,000 had been cleared after a single night's discussion. No Irish member had spoken, although several Irish departments were included in the vote.

When Arthur Balfour moved the closure the Irish members protested loudly. The closure was granted. Redmond, Dillon and the other leaders of the Irish party had left the house, understanding that there was no further business to be done. There was no time for deliberation and it was decided that the Irish members should refuse to go into a division on the lobby when called upon by the chair to do so.

Speaker Gully was called in and the Irishmen were disrobed. The chairman's orders were taken down and they were named for suspension. Twenty policemen were called. The ministers and their supporters looked on, shamed.

The ten members who had been named originally for disrobing the chairman of the chair, but thirty other Irishmen present determined to compel the government to the requisition of the police once adjournment. The Irishmen shouted "No!" but the speaker declared the house adjourned.

The Irish members continued their demonstrations as the ministerialists left the house.

Pat O'Neil, employed by the Colorado Fuel and Iron company, as pit boss, in the Gibson mine, near Gallup, and district Organizer Howell representing the National Coal Miners' union, were having an argument this afternoon in front of the Grant central hotel, over the subject of the strike and the conditions that have existed for some time past. Discharged miners were bystanders, and the argument grew heated. The two men were called on by the police and both took part in the controversy, with the result that the atmosphere quickly assumed a dangerous character. BEATEN BY POLICE.
Students Who Had Assembled to Celebrate Emancipation.

St. Petersburg, March 6.—Today was the fortieth anniversary of the emancipation of serfs. A thousand male and female students gathered around the Kasia cathedral, where mass for the repose of the soul of Czar Alexander XII. was being celebrated. For no special reason the police began beating the students and trampling them under the foot of the czar statue. Four hundred were driven into the courtyard of the city hall and others escaped into the crowd. The entire city was horrified by the conduct of the police.

Twenty-five delegates from St. Petersburg's higher educational institutions were arrested Friday night for meeting to participate in the conference between liberal citizens and 150 students called to consider matters relating to student life and start a petition to the czar.

He tried to evade running down some ladies who had got off the trolley car, and in doing so wound up at the pavement on the corner, 315 pounds of himself rolling gracefully on the sidewalk. The mishap was very laughable, and none of the police enjoyed it as much as Fitz himself, although there were several onlookers.
