OCEAN DISASTER!

Rio Janeiro Sunk at Golden Gate.

**Lives Lost Various Estimated From
Fifty to One Hundred.**

FATAL RAILROAD ACCIDENTS.

San Francisco, Cal., Feb. 22.—The steamer Rio Janeiro, struck a ledge of rock while entering Golden Gate and sank in twenty minutes. As far as known no lives are lost. There were on board twenty-nine cabin passengers; seven white steerage; fifty-eight Japanese and Chinese, and a crew of 140 men. There was a smooth sea. It is thought all got off on small boats. A part of the crew and passengers have already landed in two boats. The third boat full of passengers is on the way to town. Captain Ward was in command of the steamer.

The steamer had been lying off the heads all night, an unusually heavy fog preventing her from entering the harbor. At 5 o'clock this morning she weighed anchor, and headed for the city in charge of Pilot Frank Jordan. Shortly after, the vessel struck a hidden rock. Pilot Jordan shouted for men on board to take to the boats. Passengers and crew alike scrambled for the boats and in the endeavor to escape from the rapidly sinking vessel many jumped overboard.

Captain Ward had several boats along side and ladies of the cabin and some of the gentlemen passengers were placed in them. The boats were manned by part of the crew. As far as known but three of the ship's boats left the vessel.

Tugs and other small boats put out for the scene of disaster and already are arriving with rescue. There is an unverified rumor that Consul Wilkins, of Hong Kong, and son were drowned. The following is a list of known saved: Mrs. K. West; Mrs. Kelly; Miss Lehrman; J. K. Carpenter, Oakland, Cal., capitalist; Captain Heche, of the German navy; William Caspar, Toledo, Ohio; R. H. Long, Honolulu; Freight Clerk Englehart; Chief Engineer Hurley, of the Rio Janeiro; Second Officer Coulburn; Carpenter F. K. Trump.

The vessel sunk in less than twenty minutes. It is positive the list of fatalities will be large. The vessel is almost completely submerged.

It is reported that Captain Ward locked himself in the state room and went down with the vessel. Pilot Fred Jordan was picked up by one of the boats. He is severely injured and was removed to the hospital. Nineteen Chinese are known to have been rescued.

At 6 o'clock, the German navy officer, was rescued by the life saving crew. He said he procured a life preserver and jumped overboard. Captain Ward superintended launching life boats and rafts.

The number of lives lost in the wreck of the Rio Janeiro is estimated from fifty to 100. Consul Wilkins, wife and two children have not been seen since the vessel struck. The purser, John Rooney, is missing with all his papers.

One of the rescued passengers expressed the belief that the loss of the vessel was caused by the explosion of her boilers.

It is certain that Captain Ward was drowned and Pilot Jordan is the only living person qualified to tell exactly how the catastrophe happened and who is responsible. The pilot says that after the ship entered the Heads and the fog enveloped her, he noticed the captain that it was necessary to proceed, but the latter ordered him to go ahead. The captain's order was obeyed.

Some people say the officers and sailors were cool and considerably undisturbed to get out the boats and save as many passengers as possible, while others declare as soon as the seriousness of the situation became apparent there was an effort to discipline. Captain Ward's voice was heard above the din ordering his men to save the women. In launching boats it is said confusion prevailed, and one boat was damaged in the sea. Another boat was impaled upon a spar as the men aboard were trying to row it away from the suction caused by the sinking vessel. Four boats were cleared

The walls of the room were beautifully decorated with pictures, evergreens, mottoes and the national colors. In the Second ward the departments united and a very pleasing program of exercises was carried out. Everyone in the Third ward school took a part in the observance of the patriotic exercises, which resulted in much good to all concerned. The little ones in the Spencer building also took a great deal of interest in the program that had been prepared.

Owing to a slight wreck which occurred in Colorado and caused an annoying delay the party did not have time to stop in Santa Fe, and consequently the major of the Mesilla valley failed to meet his friend.

The special train bearing the tourists passed through here yesterday night on route to Coronado Beach, where a brief stop will be made. The train consisted of three handsomely furnished private cars, one palace car and a baggage car, including Dr. and Mrs. Webb the party consisted of Miss Fredericka Webb and Master Vanderbilt Webb; James Lawrence and George Webb and wives; Misses Metcalf and Dicks. The distinguished party is attended by three maids, one valet, a steward, three chefs, four waiters and a policeman.

Denver, Col., Feb. 22.—W. H. Scott has been appointed general superintendent of the Fort Worth & Denver City railroad by President Trumbull to succeed J. V. Good, resigning. Scott has been for a number of years superintendent of a division on the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe.

Expedition Postponed.

Bedlin, Feb. 22.—It is announced in a dispatch from Peking, dated February 21, that Count Von Waldersee has postponed the expedition he planned, as China has conceded to the demands of the powers for the punishment of guilty officials.

San Francisco, Cal., Feb. 22.—The Chronicle says: The old Colony company, of which Geo. H. Proctor of Cripple Creek, Colo., is president, is planning to build a railroad from Eureka, Humboldt county, to a connection with the Southern Pacific at Shasta. The road would open up a rich timber section.

Director J. E. Saint, of the Santa Fe, Albuquerque & Pacific railroad, who has been performing his duties as sergeant-at-arms in the legislative council for a week past, accompanied his friend, W. S. Hopewell, from the capital city as latter Correll, where the latter left the railroad for San Pedro. Mr. Saint informs us that the engineers have been making rapid progress on the proposed route of the new railroad. They have reached San Pedro, which is more than half the distance between here and Santa Fe. As soon as the survey is completed the directors will hold a meeting when the final preliminary work of construction started. Mr. Hopewell's trip to San Pedro was for the purpose of consulting with J. T. McLaughlin, also a director, in regard to the future plans.

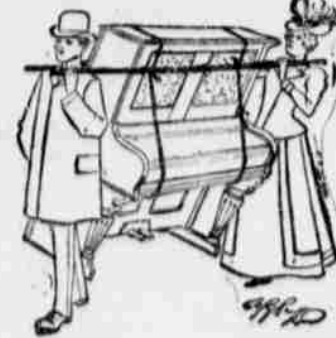

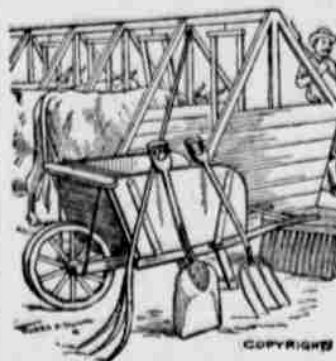
