BOY KILLED!

Fatal Approaching Marriage Celebration.

Wonderful Progress of United States the Past Year.

Latest News From Territorial Legislature at Santa Fe.

W. B. CHILDERS NOMINATED.

Lafayette, N. M., Jan. 29.—At an engagement dance and entertainment given by Jose Francisco Anzures and Anastasio Padia, at the residence of the former at the little town of Ochoyeta, a shot was fired through the window by a midnight assassin, and the little 12-year-old son of Anastasio Padia was instantly killed.

It is supposed the shot was intended for the prospective bride, who is the daughter of Mr. Padia, as the shot came very near to her.

Two young boys, named Secundino Martinez and Joseito Chavez, were arrested by Constable Serafin Marquez, and a preliminary hearing will be held before Manuel Padia, the justice of the peace of Ochoyeta.

It is understood that Martinez was in love with the young lady, who will soon become the wife of a son of Jose Francisco Anzures, and had threatened that he would not allow her to marry another.

The father of the prospective bride, Anastasio Padia, is a prominent republican politician of Valencia county, and is the county commissioner of the first district of that county.

Charles Baca, sheriff, has been notified to come at once and take the suspected murderers to Los Lunas for safe keeping.

OUR GREAT PROGRESS.

Commercial Relations of the United States With Foreign Countries.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 29.—Important and interesting summary of what was achieved by the United States in the direction of opening up and extending our markets abroad, is presented in a letter from Secretary Hay, which was laid before congress today, accompanying the annual publication known as "Commercial Relations of the United States with Foreign Countries."

The secretary says: "The general conclusion to be drawn from the survey of conditions of foreign countries as described in reports herewith presented, is that the United States is approaching, even more swiftly than was expected, a position of eminence in the world's markets, due to superior quality and great cheapness in many lines of its manufactures, which must work great economic changes and may result in shifting the center not only of industrial but commercial activity and money power of the world to our shores. Trade indications of American supremacy during the past year have been so marked that many foreign industries, according to reports of our consuls in Europe, are introducing American machinery and labor-saving appliances, remodeling their factory methods, and we may expect in the near future more strenuous competition, for which, it is important, we should prepare ourselves."

Secretary Carey recommends in his address, as was done last year, the printing of a special edition of 10,000 copies of the review of the world's commerce and 5,000 copies of the commercial relations.

THE LEGISLATURE.

Bill Introduced Giving Extra Power to Sheriff—Adjourned to Attend Funeral.

Santa Fe, N. M., Jan. 29.—Both houses transacted routine business till noon, and then adjourned to attend the funeral of the child of Governor Otero. In the house a bill was introduced giving the sheriff authority to employ a large force of deputies. This

is for the purpose of suppressing the strike at Gallup and meets with strong opposition.

PRESIDENTIAL NOMINATION.

W. B. Childers of This City Named for United States Attorney.

Washington, Jan. 29.—The president today sent the following nomination to the senate:
Wm. B. Childers, New Mexico, to be United States attorney for the territory of New Mexico.

Frank H. Richards, Alaska, marshal for the district of Alaska, division No. 2.

[The nomination of Hon. W. B. Childers, to be the United States attorney for New Mexico for the next four years, will meet with the universal approval of the people of this territory. He is one of the best attorneys of the territory, and for the past four years has guarded well the interests of the United States in all cases which he and his assistants have handled.]

DRAPERY TO BE PURPLE.

The King's Order Has Caused Comment and Much Expense.

Cocoa, Jan. 29.—The king's order directing the drapery of buildings to be purple created no little consternation. Many buildings here, in London, and at other places are already covered with black. It will cause no end of expense in addition, the supply of purple is already getting short.

London, Jan. 29.—King Edward VII. and the duke of Cambridge arrived at London at 1 o'clock today. A large crowd welcomed the king at Victoria station.

Suit Filed.

Cincinnati, Jan. 29.—Suit to enjoin the proposed Jeffery-Rothchild contest was filed in the court of common pleas today.

New York, Jan. 29.—(Stocks)—There was a rush of selling orders at the opening in St. Paul, and after an initial decline of about 2 points, a further recession of the same amount occurred, taking the price down to 150. From this there was a quick recovery and the course of the stock for the balance of the day was very erratic, ranging between 151 and 153 for the bulk of the transactions. Northern Pacific followed fairly even with the fluctuations in St. Paul. Other railroads were quiet and somewhat lower in the forenoon. In the ordinary course, domestic milling demand should increase through same period. With these conditions, the probable condition in this country will be favorable to higher prices. QUEEN DENOUNCED

Irish American Societies on Victoria.

Her Reign One of Bloodshed, Murder and Cruelty.

A Half Million Dollar Fire at Des Moines, Iowa.

MANY PENSION CLAIMS DESTROYED.

New York, Jan. 29.—At the monthly meeting of the United Irish-American societies, sixty-eight organizations being present, resolutions were passed unanimously, reading in part as follows:
"We denounce the reign of Victoria as one long act of bloodshed, murder, cruelty and cast, and insist that what its history is truly written and the influence of another, flunkum and toadyism removed, it will be looked back upon as one of the darkest and most shameful chapters in the history of the world."

Resolved, That all other Commercial clubs, city and town councils or trustees and boards of county commissioners, and similar commercial, municipal and quasi-municipal bodies in the territory of New Mexico, and in the portions of the state of Colorado affected by said bill, be and they hereby are respectfully requested to pass proper resolutions and protests in this behalf, and forward the same as these are being forwarded; and be it further

Resolved, That the secretary of this club transmit a copy of these resolutions to the committee on foreign relations of the United States senate, and respectfully request that body to call for and have printed as an annexe document the record in the case of the Grand Dam and Irrigation company, now pending on a second appeal from the supreme court of New Mexico in the supreme court of the United States, so that the said committee may be fully informed as to the rights of New Mexico in the premises.

Shortness in Session.

Coming Home.

Cape Town, Jan. 29.—Albert R. Hay, United States consul at Pretoria, will sail from here January 30, having obtained the permission of the state department to return to the United States.

LEE THE HYPNOTIST.

Marvels and Amuses a Large and Appreciative Audience.

Quite a large audience assembled at the opera house last night to greet Professor Lee, the wizard of the mind, which title he well deserves, judging from his demonstrations. He opened his entertainment with a complete history of hypnotism, or mesmerism as it was formerly termed, dating from its first origin to the present. Then came his call for volunteers to which about six responded, four proving good subjects. It has always been difficult to secure volunteers on an opening night, as the public has been so previously conditioned and abused, but Professor Lee proved last evening to be very much advanced in this treatment. Nevertheless, these four subjects kept the house in a convulsive state of laughter. His cataplectic tests included two that carried out the power of hypnotism to a very clear point—one was the placing of a subject in a rigid state, then set upon the back of two chairs, then supporting the weight of people without the least apparent difficulty; the result of the other is a man, in a restless sleep in the show window of Simon Stern, where he will lay for a period of forty-eight hours. MUNICIPAL REFORM IN ST. LOUIS.

San Francisco, Cal., Jan. 29.—There was a meeting last night at Palace hotel of prominent Southern Pacific and Santa Fe officials, including President Charles M. Hays and Vice President J. C. Stubbs, of the Southern Pacific; President E. P. Ripley, Vice President J. M. Barr and Asst. Agent Chambers, of the Santa Fe. After the conference President Hays said:

"The meeting was for the purpose of talking over a number of new matters in which both roads have common interests. The two roads are thrown more or less together every year, one way or another, and we simply discussed plans by which these relations might be continued to the advantage of both roads."

TO HARD LABOR.

The New Jersey Murderers and Rapists Sentenced to Imprisonment.

Paterson, N. J., Jan. 29.—Walter C. McAllister, Wm. A. Deane and Andrew Campbell, found guilty of murder in the second degree for killing Jennie Boschler, October 15, 1900, by the administration of chloral and subsequent rape, together with Geo. J. Kerr, who pleaded non-vult, contended to the charge of rape, were brought here today for sentence by Judge Dixon. McAllister, Campbell and Deane were each sentenced to thirty years' imprisonment at hard labor, and Kerr to fifteen years' imprisonment at hard labor. The sentences are the full term of imprisonment the law provides.

Krugers' Ailment.
Berlin, Jan. 29.—A dispatch to the Lokal Anzeiger from The Hague says: Krugers' ailment consisted of muscular contraction of the eyelids, which a recent slight operation entirely cured.

The dispatch also, according to reliable information, the Boers do not yet intend at present to take diplomatic steps, but will continue fighting until the general situation suits Africa strong enough to make the success of diplomatic steps certain.

Municipal Reform.
St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 29.—The evangelical alliance, which includes all churches of St. Louis and vicinity, with the exception of the Catholic, Episcopal and German speaking churches, have inaugurated a movement for municipal reform.

Death of a Count.
St. Petersburg, Jan. 28.—Field Marshal Count Gourko, died today on his estate at Scharov, near Iver.

The territorial supreme court expects to adjourn on Wednesday, hoping to clear the docket by that time.

The house is moving very slowly in the transaction of business and it may be several days before they will begin the consideration of bills.

The Creek Indian war seems to be about like those annual latter-day Indian wars in Colorado, New Mexico and Arizona—a bonanza for newspaper correspondents but poor picking for the undertakers.

The members of the legislature have unanimously signed a petition requesting the president to appoint Elmer B. Bacon, of Socorro, to a judgeship in Porto Rico. Mr. Bacon is a bright young lawyer and it is pointed out that the territory will make a good record for himself.

The bill introduced by Dr. Crutcher in relation to the taxing of sheep in the counties where they are ranged instead of where they are owned, has already provoked a lively contest in the legislature. The members from the northwest counties of the territory oppose the bill.

Senator Crutcher has introduced a bill protecting the rights of employees of corporations and preventing their blacklisting when discharged. The bill provides severe penalties on railroads and other corporations for blacklisting discharged employees and thus preventing their obtaining employment elsewhere. The bill should become a law.

The Colorado Springs Gazette states an important fact in the following words: "The states of the west have just as much right, reason and justice in asking for national assistance for their ditches and reservoirs as any eastern state has for its rivers, harbors, and in the majority of cases we believe that the national money would be better expended."

A curious infraction of interstate commerce is witnessed in Kansas, Texas, which has all sorts of queer laws, has among them one which requires the railroads to move the cotton crop, whether they feel inclined that way or not. Consequently many cars have been in use in hauling cotton that there have been none to spare for the Kansas grain, and elevators all over Kansas have been standing full of wheat which could not be moved.

At a meeting of the census committee recently it was decided to call on the director of the census for information concerning the total number of male citizens over 21 years of age in each state and the number denied the right to vote. This is the first step to be taken in connection with the desire of Mr. Crutcher to reduce the representation of states disfranchising negroes. There is no doubt that the subject will be desperately fought over in the next congress.

The situation of the Gallup strike remains unchanged. The striking miners are behaving in a most exemplary manner. The best thing the Colorado Iron and Fuel company can do would be to offer to arbitrate the difficulties. The miners of Gallup have made no demands on the company whatever, and certainly deserve more decent treatment than they have received. They were discharged by the coal company simply because they had organized a lodge of United Mine Workers.

A peculiar situation in New Mexico is presented by the memorial of the bar association of that territory protesting against a provision in a bill pending in congress restricting service on juries in the territories to persons who speak and understand English, says the Denver Republican. If this provision becomes a law it will exclude from jury service in New Mexico a large number of men who understand and speak only Spanish.

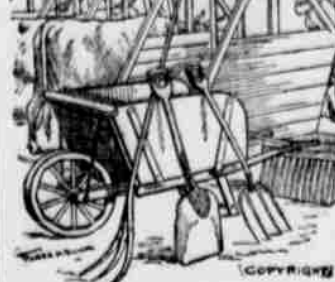
