THE GRAND OLD QUEEN IS DEAD!

The Royal Family Watched at Bed-
side Till Life Faded Away.

With a Sigh of Joy She Recognized Em-
peror William of Germany.

TELEGRAMS OF SYMPATHY BEING RECEIVED

London, Jan. 22.—Bulletin just an-
nounces the queen is dead.

Cowes, Isle of Wight, Jan. 22.—Noon:
News from Osborne house confirms the
belief of every one that the death of
her majesty is imminent, and its an-
nouncement at any moment would not
be a surprise.

Mounted messengers from Osborne
ride through Cowes at intervals, at
breakneck speed, sending off the latest
tidings to officials and foreign courts.

The rector of Whippingham church
remained at Osborne throughout the
morning.

It is understood Emperor William will
not leave to-day.

Official bulletin issued from Osborne
house at 8 o'clock says: "The queen
this morning shows signs of dimini-
shing strength. Her majesty's condition
again assumes more serious aspect."

"Signed—Reid, Powell, Barlow."

Berlin, Jan. 22, 3 p. m.—A corres-
pondent of the Associated Press learns
from official source that Queen Victoria
recognized Emperor William when the
latter went to the bedside yesterday, by
giving a sign of joy. She was unable
to converse with him. It is not known
how long the emperor will stay in Eng-
land.

London, Jan. 22, 4:25 p. m.—Official
bulletin from Osborne house, timed at
4 p. m., says the queen is slowly sink-
ing.

London, Jan. 22, 4:55 p. m.—Bulletin
issued at the Mansion house reads as
follows: "Osborne house, 4 p. m.—My
life duty obliges me to inform you of
the death of our beloved queen is in the
utmost danger."

"ALBERT EDWARD."
Cowes, Isle of Wight, Jan. 22, 4 p. m.—
The end is very near. The Prince of
Wales is not left the vicinity of the
queen's bedroom since 9 a. m. Emperor
William and all the royal family are
at her majesty's bedside.

With members of the royal family
gathered at the queen's bedside, the
shop of Winchester and the rector of
Whippingham read prayers for those
extremis. "Truly the queen was
dear to recognize those around her
who came to her bedside but physi-
cians had warned them against at-
tempts to speak to her.

Naturally the family, while recogniz-
ing the claim for public interest, main-
tain that the details of events around
a death bed shall be strictest secre-
cy and impose the strictest secre-
cy upon the whole household.

set for London to-night.

London, Jan. 22.—There was a re-
markable scene outside of the Mansion
house this afternoon. On receipt of the
rumor reports a groan was uttered
by the hundreds of people assembled,
and then some started to sing the na-
tional anthem.

All heads were bowed and in a mo-
ment the crowds were singing with
fervor how earnestly they wished her
recovery. Passengers in passing car-
riages, cabs and omnibuses joined the
singing, the drivers reverently doffing
their hats.

London, Jan. 22, 4:47 p. m.—In a reply
to the Prince of Wales, the lord mayor,
Mr. Frank Green, dispatched the fol-
lowing:

"I have received your royal highness's
and intimation with profound grief,
which is shared by the citizens of Lon-
don, who still pray that under divine
providence the irreparable loss to her
majesty's devoted family and loyal
subjects throughout the empire may
still be averted. Will your royal high-

RESOLUTION ADOPTED.
Washington, Jan. 22.—In the senate

ELECTING SENATORS.
Minnesota Elects Kanute Nelson and
Moses Clapp.

NEW JERSEY RETURNS SEWELL.
St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 22.—The two
houses of the legislature voted today
in separate session for long and short
term senators, the former for the seat
now filled by Knute Nelson, for six
years beginning March 1 next, and the
latter for the place formerly filled by
Cushman K. Davis, extending until
March 4, 1905. The ballot resulted:

Long term, senate—Knute Nelson, re-
publican, 42; Judge R. H. Nelson, dem-
ocratic, 18. In the house—Knute Nelson,
44; Judge Nelson, 22.

Short term, senate—Moses Clapp, re-
publican, 47; Charles A. Towne, dem-
ocratic, 17. In the house—Clapp, 92;
Towne, 21.

A GOOD SCHEME.
St. Paul, Jan. 22.—By a vote of 114 to
1, the house of representatives to-day
adopted a joint memorial to congress
urging the adoption of a constitu-
tional amendment for the election of
United States senator by direct vote of
the people.

SEWELL ELECTED.
Trenton, N. J., Jan. 22.—United States
Senator Wm. J. Sewell was to-day
elected by the New Jersey legislature
in separate ballot to succeed himself.

He received 45 votes in the house to 13
for former Congressman A. A. Clarke, the
choice of the democratic caucus this
morning. Sewell received 17 votes in
the senate to 4 for Clark.

Charged With Attempt
to Extort Money.

VENEZUELA REBELLION SPREADING.

Fort Madison, Iowa, Jan. 22.—George
Wolf, of West Point, this county, was
landed in jail here last night, a war-
rant having been sworn out by Fred-
rick Kriekenbaum, president of the
West Point bank, charging him with
attempt to extort money. Kriekenbaum
received a letter ordering him to de-
posit \$2,000 at a certain place under the
Pittman creek bridge on a certain date.
The letter stated that unless the money
was forthcoming certain properties
owned by the banker would be burned.
The letter was found to correspond
with the writings of Wolf. Wolf is
about 28 years old. He was arrested a
few years ago on the charge of com-
plicity in murder of old man Honne-
berger, who was foully murdered at
his own house at midnight for the
purpose of robbery, but was acquitted.

Gigantic Corporation.
New York, Jan. 22.—Properties ac-
quired by the American Smelting and
Refining company, according to a cir-
cular sent out to stockholders, as a
result proposed to increase the capital
stock company to \$100,000,000 are as fol-
lows:

At Perth Amboy, N. J., smelting, re-
fining and electrolytic copper plants; at
Pueblo, Colo., smelting, refining and
copper reduction plants; at Acme
Calientes, Mexico, smelting, refining
and copper reduction plants; at Monte-
rey, Mexico, smelting plants; in South
America, mining and smelting interests
and also valuable leases and contracts
running a term of years in the United
States, Mexico and South America.

These include refining and smelting
plants, apparatus, properties and busi-
ness of the Guggenheims.

All owing 100 for preferred stock of
the American Smelting and Refining
company and 60 for common—\$22,000,000
preferred and \$22,000,000 common which
the Guggenheims are to receive—would
be worth in round figures \$35,000,000.
Against this the Guggenheims are to
pay \$6,000,000 cash and roughly about
\$9,000,000 more cash or working capital.

A STRANGE CASE
Surrounds the Burial of a Mexican
Lady in Tijeras Canyon.

IN A TRANCE FIVE HOURS.

A young Mexican lady recently mar-
ried, was buried in a cemetery about
twelve miles east of this city yester-
day. She has been a sufferer from con-
sumption for the past two years, and
her death was expected at any moment
for several weeks past. Residents of
the neighborhood say that at one time
last week the lady lay in a trance for
five consecutive hours and all ap-
pearances were dead. The ladies and
relatives in attendance began prepara-
tions for the funeral, and the apparent-
ly dead body was immediately dressed
in a brand new wardrobe, which had just
been made by willing hands of those
present. Finally the eyes of the sup-
posed corpse opened, respiration be-
came more regular and in a few mo-
ments the lady who lay on the "cooling
board" had complete control of her
mental and physical faculties. She was
greatly surprised to see the fine and
elaborate garments in which she was
dressed, and catalogued a piece of the
dress with her fingers inquired of the
attendants the meaning of all this.
Upon being informed of the circum-
stances she rallied sufficiently to move
about the house for two or three days,
but later was overcome by the disease
and was again confined to her bed,
where she lay in a comatose condition
for some time. Early yesterday morn-
ing her death was announced to the
friends and relatives about the ranch
home and before noon the burial took
place in a cemetery in Tijeras canyon
near Conwell. Mystery appears to still
surround the entire neighborhood in
the matter, and some of the residents
are yet undecided whether or not to believe
the lady was dead when the burial was
made.

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stals presented in newspapers. If the charge is well founded, the legislature will be taken for the impeachment and punishment of the official. If the charge is unfounded, the person making them or the editor responsible for their publication shall be sent to the penitentiary for a term not to exceed five years.

"I would make it a capital offense, if I had my way, and let the sheriff take the guilty man out and shoot him."

"I do not mean that the freedom of speech and of the press shall be interfered with. Newspapers have a right to criticize officials, but I do mean that these journalistic outbursts shall be put under restraint. At present there is no way of reaching those sort of outbursts except with a club."

"I believe the citizens of the state want such a law because I believe they do not sanction such wanton destruction of reputations. The law will be fair to both parties. If the grand jury finds that the newspaper is right, the newspaper will be entitled to the plaintiff of the people. If it finds the contrary, punishment should follow the attempt to rob an official of the respect of the people."

"I go out from the governorship with scarcely enough friends to bury me," continued Governor Stephens. "Governors always make enemies. The provision in the constitution prohibiting a governor from succeeding himself is not needed. He could not do so physically or politically if he wished."
