GAME AND FLAG WON BY PHILS; BRAVES BEATEN IN FIRST HEAT

Alexander Hurls Philadelphia
Aggregation to Victory and
the Pennant But Others Get
the Scores.

CRAVATH'S HITTING IS FEATURE OF GAME

Boston, Sept. 29.—The Philadelphia aggregation today won the National League championship for 1915, with Alexander Hurling a one-hit game against the present title holding Braves. The score was 5 to 0. Defeat of the Braves makes it possible for the league leaders to win all their remaining games and still have clear title to first place.

The new champions clinched their honors in the first inning. Alexander's single to right and Hurling's home run, followed by Cravath's home run, which brought the latter's home run record to 23. A triple by Paskert sent another home in the fourth, and Cravath cracked a double to left and Luderus a single there for a fifth run in the seventh.

Among the spectators of the game were some of the Boston American players, the probable competitors of Philadelphia in the world series. Manager Carrigan of the Red Sox watched the play carefully. "It seems to be a well rounded combination but I'm sure we can beat them," he remarked.

It was "Patsy Moran day" at Braves field and several thousand persons turned out especially to honor the visiting manager. Most of them came from Pittsburgh, Mass. home town. Among them was David L. Walsh, governor of the state, who presented Moran with a floral home shoe.
