## CONGRESSIONAL.

### Memorial from Citizens of Manila.

### Death of Representative Clark of New Hampshire.

### Representative Grosvenor Opposes Reclamation of Arid Lands.

### HOUSE CONSIDERING HARBOR BILL.

Washington, Jan. 10.—On the desk of Senator Gallinger, of New Hampshire, lay a bunch of beautiful roses, sent by friends as a testimonial of his efforts to secure the abolition of the canteen in the army.

West and Hawkins announced that they had been defeated unavailingly from the senate yesterday when the vote upon the canteen question was taken. They would have voted, had they been present, against the abolition of the canteen.

Teiler presented a memorial from 2,000 "Filipino and peaceful inhabitants" of Manila. Teiler stated that it was signed personally by lawyers, bankers and professional men representing the best elements of that community. It reviewed the circumstances leading up to the present struggle of the Philippines for independence, paid high tribute to the work of Aguinaldo and his coadjutors in their endeavor to obtain liberty and independence for the people of the Philippines.

The appeal declares that autonomy similar to that enjoyed by Canada or Australia would not be practicable for the Philippines who desire full liberty.

Mr. Teiler asked that the memorial be printed as a public document.

"I object," said Hawley. "It is a treasonable denunciation of our government and an attack upon our soldiers."

Secretary Wilson made argument before the senate committee on agriculture today in support of the Great Reclamation bill.

The senate resumed consideration of the army reorganization bill. The amendment was adopted providing that persons not over 40 years of age who served as volunteers subsequent to April 21, 1898, may be appointed first and second lieutenants of the regular army.

### HOUSE.

The desk of Representative Clark, of New Hampshire, who died last night, was shrouded in black covered with flowers when the house met today.

By unanimous consent the bill to revise and codify the postal laws of the United States was made the special order for disposal of the river and harbor bill.

The house committee of the whole resumed consideration of the river and harbor bill, Shafterford, Missouri, protested against the action of the committee abolishing the Missouri river commission.

Grove, Ohio, replied briefly to remarks of some of the western members in favor of appropriations in the river and harbor bill for reclamation of arid lands. He applauded the glamour of the prospect of watering the arid region, but denied the power of congress to enter upon a vast scheme of irrigation and questioned its propriety.

Secretary of the treasury, George H. Horner, of New York, and several other prominent financiers today appeared before the house committee on currency, weights and measures, at the request of the committee, and gave their views on the Overstreet, Levy and Hill bill regarding parity of the money of the United States. The three bills, each containing different provisions, each provide for exchange at the option of the holder of gold and silver coins of the United States.

To accomplish this the Overstreet bill authorized the secretary of the treasury to reserve fund of the treasury and the Levy bill authorized him to issue 2 per cent bonds. Before hearing Chairman Overstreet read a letter from John P. Rhodes, chairman of the finance committee of the New York chamber of commerce, heartily endorsing this urgent enactment of the proposed legislation this session of congress.

Mr. Levy, New York, who was present to advocate his bill, created a sensation by stating that Bryan, the recent democratic candidate for president, told him that if elected president he would find a way to pay the obligations of the government in silver.

The house committee on naval affairs today practically completed the naval appropriation bill. The question of increase of the navy was settled by the secretary of the navy for two battleships and two cruisers. The committee also finally decided to give the bill increase of enlisted men asked for by the secretary—5,000 instead of 3,000, as tentatively agreed upon yesterday.

There is a possibility that a number of submarine boats of the Holland type will be provided for at the last moment, but this is hardly probable.

### To Protect the Mines.

Cape Town, Jan. 10.—Refugees are approaching the military authorities to form a corps for the protection of Johannesburg and the mines. The Johannesburg and Sutherland consist of two columns, one advancing in the direction of Claremont, the other towards Worcester, or in this direction. All parties in front of Worcester have been encountered.

## THE BOERS ATTACK.

### Determined Night Surprises on British.

### Heavy Loss on Both Sides Reported.

### Chinese Have 85,000 Men Drilling at City of Sian Fu.

### BILL TO PUNISH KIDNAPERS.

London, Jan. 10.—The following was received from Gen. Kitchener: "The Boers made simultaneous attacks on all the posts at De Beers, Wonderfontein, Nieuwpoort and Willemstad. Intense fighting prevailed and taking advantage of the cover it afforded, the Boers were able to creep up close to our position. A heavy fire continued until 4.40 a. m., when the Boers were driven off. One officer was killed and three wounded, 20 men killed and 50 wounded. The loss of the Boers was heavy, 24 dead being counted.

"The Boers are now in the neighborhood of the city of Sian Fu, where they are being driven off. The Boers were driven off, leaving eleven dead on the field. Our casualties four slightly wounded."

### CHINESE DRILLING.

Large Army Preparing to Defend the Emperor and Court.

Peking, Jan. 10.—A Chinaman from Sian Fu, where court is at present, says that within the city 85,000 Chinese troops are drilling continuously and the majority are armed with modern rifles. He says the feeling of the people there is bitterly anti-foreign, and they believe they can meet allies in open fight and defeat them.

### THE SISTERS' HOSPITAL.

Plans and Specifications Here—Will be Completed in Three Months.

Sister Hyacinth is here today with plans and specifications for the new Sisters' hospital, which will soon be erected on the Highlands, and this afternoon Mayor Marron examined them. The building will cost at least \$25,000, and will be the most convenient and appropriate hospital in the territory. On the second floor will be the chapel, 27x18, eleven private rooms, four bath rooms, toilet rooms, office with corridor through the building. On the third floor there will be two wards, 25x55 feet each; operating room 13x17; 22 two bed rooms, four private rooms; three toilet and three bath rooms; sitting room 16 by 18; with elzeizing, drug and study rooms, and a balcony. The main dining room and kitchen, two private dining rooms, sewing room, three store rooms, laundry, boiler room and toilet rooms, will be on the first floor and in the basement. The dimensions of the building will be 141 feet long and 67.5 feet wide. It will be completed in about three months.

### RETAIL MERCHANTS.

### They Assembled Last Night in a Well Attended Meeting.

The retail merchants of the city, to the number of about thirty-five, met last night in the large room over Ziegler's Cafe, for the purpose of organization. After waiting for fifteen minutes for the principal promoter of the movement, Herndon Spitz, ex-Mayor Mike Mandell was requested to call the meeting to order, and after assuming the chair, he appointed Fred Marshall as secretary.

Mr. Spitz will be absent. A. Fletcher, who mailed out the call, was requested to explain the object of the meeting, and he did so in well rounded sentences.

Just then Mr. Spitz put in an appearance, and he, in an appropriate talk, placed the objects of the meeting before those present, showing conclusively that the retail merchants have suffered greatly from bad accounts and that the best thing to do was to organize and consult together.

Arthur Everett suggested that, in order to put the meeting on some firm basis, a committee of seven be appointed to draw up plans of organization, by-laws and to name the permanent officers. He also moved that a committee of seven be appointed to see all retail merchants as to joining the organization.

The two motions were promptly seconded, whereupon the chairman appointed the following committee: Simon Stern, O. A. Matson, A. B. McClure, D. H. Bostright, Samuel Vann, H. A. M. Palladino, F. H. Strong.

Seeing that no further business could be transacted, H. E. Fox moved that the meeting adjourn until Thursday night, January 24, which motion prevailed.

F. G. Pratt made an objection, just before adjournment, as to how much publicity should be made of the proceedings at the meeting, seeing newspaper men present with his note book, but on receiving certain information from the newspaper man he modified his expressions by stating that he thought the greater publicity as to the motives of the association would prove beneficial to the retail merchants.

The adjournment then took place, after which the above two committees held a caucus meeting and will report January 24.
