Boston Club Watch Philles, Their Rivals, in Action Against the Braves While Tigers Hand Their Flag.

Boston, Sept. 24.—There was only a ripple of interest in this city when word came of Detroit's defeat and the consequent clinching of the American championship by the Red Sox. The outcome of the pennant race had been regarded as a foregone conclusion when the Tigers were ousted here two weeks ago. The Sox players learned of the accomplishment of their desire as they boarded a train for Washington, where they play tomorrow. During the afternoon they had watched the Philadelphia Nationals, their rivals in the world's series competition, which began next week, in action against the Braves.

With the exception of Captain Barry, the Red Sox will present full strength in the remaining league games. Barry, whose minor league activities in mid-season have been hampered by the clubbing factor in Boston's success, was left to maintain a watch on the play of the Philles. WORK ON RANGE FOR STATE RIFLE MATCH TO BEGIN TOMORROW

The work of preparing the rifle range of the Albuquerque rifle association for the big state match which is to be held here during the fall will begin tomorrow morning, according to Secretary H. C. Miller, who has the details of the match in charge. The principal work to be done is the digging of pits and erecting targets for the 1,000-yard trial, the greatest distance in the present range being 600 yards. The work will be hurried in a conclusion as rapidly as possible, and by the time of the opening of the match Albuquerque will have one of the finest rifle ranges in the country. Secretary Miller stated yesterday that he expected a big gathering of riflemen from every part of New Mexico to take part in the various events. Letters have been mailed out to all the organizations of marksmen in the state, both civilian and military, and the rifles that are coming in indicate a more general interest in rifle practice than has ever been shown before.

Col. W. S. Hopwood and H. C. Hanson have offered silver cups to be competed for in the matches, and several members of Albuquerque have put up prizes of value, or induce entries in the various contests.

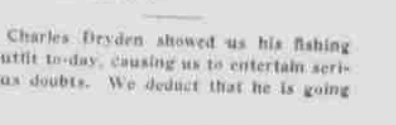
