A FEARFUL FIRE!

Rochester, N. Y., Orphan Asylum Burned.

Score of Lives Lost and Many Injured.

Heavy Snow Storms in Russia and Trains Completely Buried.

SETTLEMENT OF CREEDE ESTATE.

Rochester, N. Y., Jan. 8.—By the burning of the Rochester orphan asylum early today between twenty and thirty lives were lost, and many of the inmates will die from burns or other injuries. The asylum was a three story structure at the corner of Hubbard and Exchange streets, and its occupants numbered between 150 and 160.

All the fire apparatus hurried to the building and scores of people joined in the rescue of the inmates.

Shortly after the fire broke out the boiler exploded with terrific force, completely blowing out the lower part of the west end connection wing, thereby cutting off the escape of the children from the east end of the building.

In the east wing were the sleeping apartments, mainly on the second and third floors. Here were forty children or more. Miss Sarah Ashdown was in charge, and with her was Miss Brad, of the hospital ward, taking care of two sick children. Miss Ashdown did all within her power to save children and nurses. Miss Brad was seriously injured by falling and she will not live. It was stated by the matron, Miss Dipehart, that there were 70 girls in the west wing, and 70 children and two nurses in the hospital department. It was estimated at 8 o'clock that all the inmates of the west wing were taken out, either dead or alive.

Long ladders were run up and plunging into the stifling smoke, firemen after firemen came sliding down the ladders bearing inanimate forms. Most of the children and adults carried from the burning building were unconscious from the effects of the smoke.

The fire was fought from every available point, but in spite of that the building was almost completely destroyed.

Fireman Morris Keating, carrying a woman, fell from a ladder. The woman was killed outright and the fireman so seriously injured that he may die.

Miss P. M. Hubbard, who had charge of 23 children on the third floor of the main building, said: "I was awakened by cries of the children and realized that the building was on fire. As quickly as possible we made our way to the roof, escape in any other direction being impossible. Already the firemen had ladders to the roof and quickly the children were rescued. After most of them had been rescued the heat became so intense that to save myself I slid down a post leading from the roof to the ground." Miss Hubbard was terribly burned. Early today the morgue reported that already twenty-five children had been brought there.

At noon the identified dead by the Rochester orphan asylum fire had reached twenty-six children, one nurse and one cook.

Trains Snowbound.

STRIKE AT GALLUP

Five Hundred Miners Quit Work.

All the Coal Mines Are Closed Down.

Governor of Colorado Took the Oath of Office.

PRESIDENT HAS SEVERE COLD.

Gallup, N. M., Jan. 8.—Five hundred miners employed by the Colorado Fuel & Iron company held a meeting here on Sunday and declared a strike. No work was done at the mines yesterday, except that five men at the Catalina mine were working.

The strike was caused by the discharge of seventy-five union miners. No demands had been made in the company. The men are conducting themselves in a peaceful manner. They are leaving the mines and moving to Gallup. The Charlotte mines and the Calabazas are still working, although it is rumored that those mines will strike to-morrow.

The miners have the sympathy of the community. Manager Keiser met with the men here yesterday and went east with him.

Organizer Geher of the United Workmen went to Madrid yesterday and will go from there to Colorado to meet President Mitchell. The Santa Fe Pacific has sent engineers seventy miles north of Winslow to examine coal fields.

GOVERNOR OF COLORADO.

Gov. Orman Inaugurated Into Office With Simple Ceremony.

Denver, Jan. 8.—James B. Orman was inaugurated governor of Colorado at noon today with only the simplest ceremonies. The oath was administered by Chief Justice Campbell in the presence of both houses of the legislature and many prominent people attending, being limited by the issuance of tickets. A salute was fired by the Colorado National Guard.

Gov. Orman, who retired today, was to grant a parole to Alfred Packer. He had served seventeen years of a forty year term. Packer was sentenced in 1883, having been convicted of the murder of five prospectors in the wilds of Colorado. He admitted having killed one of the men, who he said, was insane and attempted to kill him. Packer was a hundred miles from civilization and was compelled to eat the flesh of the murdered men to keep from starving.

Fatal Fire.

Three hours further fighting occurred before the enemy were driven off. The Chinese loss is estimated at 200; the Germans lost one killed and four wounded. The Germans after destroying all the dwellings, retired to Ken Yen.

The excess of receipts over expenditures for the first half of the government fiscal year was \$14,747,795, a decrease of over \$2,000,000 as compared with the corresponding period of last year.

The secretary of war has submitted to congress an additional deficiency estimate of \$3,000,000 for army subsistence, caused chiefly by the heavy demands made by the forces in China and the Philippines.

ALL KINDS OF MONEY.

Uncle Sam began the new century with an overflowing treasury. At the close of business on the 31st, the treasury showed an available cash balance on hand in excess of all reserve funds of \$144,141,474.52.

The treasury year begins July 1st, and the receipts for the first six months of the fiscal year have been \$291,841,961.23, against \$284,793,048.45 for the corresponding months of the last fiscal year.

The expenditures have been \$273,966,422.42 against \$280,000,000 last year, and the surplus of receipts over current expenditures has been \$17,875,538.81, against \$12,115,994.33. As will be seen, the expenditures have grown faster than the receipts.

PUBLIC SCHOOL REVENUES.

The New Mexican says that the report of the territorial superintendent of public instruction will show that the public schools of this territory received from territorial and county taxation, from licenses and fines, from proceeds of the leasing of public lands, about \$400,000 during the last fiscal year. This sum would be largely increased, were there a better and more honest assessment in some of the counties, a stricter and better collection of school taxes, and a better collection of school taxes and gambling licenses, and school taxes, by fines imposed by the district court, and by justices of the peace, and of poll taxes for school purposes. Were this the case the amount could easily be brought up to half a million dollars. This sum is for the support of the public schools of the territory alone and not for the support of the higher educational institutions in the territory, which are supported by direct taxation. Taking into consideration the fact that the assessed taxation is less than \$40,000,000, the raising of half a million dollars more for school purposes by direct taxation, by fines, by gambling, and school taxes, by fines imposed by the district court, and by justices of the peace, and of poll taxes for school purposes, is a very large sum. That many of the school districts do not pay their school taxes, or that they should be in many cases to be attributed, not to the lack of funds for the support of the schools, but to inefficiency or inability to run school matters properly. In such cases, the county, taxation would do no good. The more money collected, more would be thrown away, and without any corresponding good. However, the situation in regard to public school matters in the territory is improving, and at quite a rapid rate. Too much cannot be done in a short space of time, and to-day this territory has a better, fairer, more liberal and more efficient managed school system than some of the southern states that attained the dignity of statehood fifty, sixty or seventy years ago.

IMPORTANT DECISION.

A decision recently handed down by the supreme court of this territory is of more than usual interest to many of our citizens. In the summer of 1898, District Attorney Francis began a number of suits for the collection of delinquent taxes in Bernalillo county. Among others he entered suit against the Co-operative Building and Loan association of Albuquerque, in which many of our citizens hold stock. The suit was begun for taxes claimed to be due on the notes of borrowing members to secure which deeds of trust had been given to the association. Upon the trial of the case in the fall of 1898, Judge Crumpacker decided against the territory and ordered the complaint of plaintiff dismissed. District Attorney Francis appealed to the supreme court, which tribunal has now reversed the decision of the trial court, and holds that all mortgages and stock of corporations are taxable, and that the stock of corporations is taxable to the corporations where it is not returned for taxation by the individual holders of such stock.

Under the stipulation of facts on which this case was tried, the supreme court holds that the Co-operative Building and Loan association shall pay taxes on \$164,374.93 of the stock and \$15,400 in mortgages, which means a tax of about \$10,000 to be paid to the county treasurer.

In concluding the decision the supreme court calls attention to the fact that such an opinion will be rather hard on building and loan associations, but declares that the law is construed as they find it, and that in the absence of legislation exempting stock and mortgages from taxation such associations and property will always be taxable.

The court also calls attention to the fact that the territorial legislature will soon be in session, and informally suggests that this subject demands the attention of that body.

In the proceedings leading up to this decision Sumners Burkhardt represented the Bernalillo County association before the county and territorial boards of equalization, while the firm of Collier & Marroa, the attorneys of the association, represented it before the courts, and District Attorney Francis in his official capacity has looked after the interests of the territory and this county throughout the proceedings.

TIMBER OF ARIZONA.

Arizona has the largest unbroken pine forest in the United States, covering an area of over 7,000 square miles, says Governor Murphy in his annual report. This timber is usually found at an altitude of between 5,500 and 7,500 feet. The total quantity of pine timber fit for sawing purposes within the limits of the territory amounts to 18,000,000,000 cubic feet, which can supply the needs of a populous state for more than a century. The principal forest area is in Coconino county and borders the Grand Canyon of the Colorado, although Gila, Apache and Yavapai counties have considerable timber. In the Mogollon mountains, in Yavapai, Coconino and Gila counties, there are large bodies of oak timber suitable for the manufacture of farm machinery, wagons, etc., and for furnishing timber, but at present it is too inaccessible to be of great commercial value. The government has created some large forest reserves in northern Arizona and promulgated rules for their regulation with a view to their preservation from spoliation and to prevent destruction by fire. The principal lumber mills of Arizona are situated at Flagstaff and Williams, in Coconino county, on the line of the Santa Fe Pacific railway, and their equipment is modern in every way. The Arizona Lumber and Lumber company at Flagstaff and Saginaw Lumber company at Williams have complete plants for the manufacture of lumber, boxes, etc., as can be found in the United States.
