### OUR GOVERNOR.

One of the most difficult positions to fill with any sort of personal comfort and satisfaction is that of governor of a territory. The people of a territory are more fault-finding and restive than those of a state, and they generally vent their grievances on the head of their governor. New Mexico has had all sorts of governors, good, bad and indifferent. Politicians, authors and soldiers have filled the chair of governor of this territory, and they have generally gone out of office to the intense relief of themselves and the



people. An exception to the rule is the governorship of M. A. Otero, whose picture heads this article. He is a rare combination of executive ability and the arts of the courtier. He has tried his very best to serve the people, and deserves a happy New Year greeting from all his friends, and will no doubt be rendered a second term of the governorship.

### CHRISTIAN ENDEAVORERS

Held Interesting and Instructive Sessions at Santa Fe.

### REPORTS OF THE SOCIETIES.

The tenth annual convention of the New Mexico Christian Endeavor Union began its sessions Friday evening in the Presbyterian church of Santa Fe, says the New Mexican.

The meeting was presided over by Rev. W. Hayes Moore. After devotional exercises conducted by Rev. Samuel McGill, of Raton, the delegates and visitors were welcomed to Santa Fe by Rev. W. A. Cooper, pastor of St. John's Methodist Episcopal church, in a pleasing and fitting address. In the absence of C. W. Ward, of Albuquerque, president of the Union, Rev. P. A. Simpkin, of the Baptist church, responded to the address in a happy manner.

The address "Bible Saving," delivered by Rev. Bruce Kinney, pastor of the Albuquerque Baptist church, doubtless caused some of those present to wonder if the modern church had not widely departed from apostolic customs and teachings in reaching out for converts. Simple in style, effectively delivered, and practical in its bearing upon the work of the church and its members, the address made an impression on the audience which will be lasting and beneficial.

Rev. Mr. Simpkin, in his address on "The Twentieth Century Church," presented himself an earnest speaker and emphatically practical in his views as to what the religious orders would become and accomplish the coming century.

The tendency of the times, occasioned no doubt by the returning swing of the pendulum of public sentiment from the overbearing chase after the almighty dollar, which, for the past half century, has engrossed the minds of men to a higher conception of duty to fellow men, will enable Mr. Simpkin to live to see many of his desires in that particular realized.

SATURDAY MORNING SESSION.

At the morning session Saturday, B. B. Spier, of Albuquerque, presided in the absence of President Ward. An impressive "Quiet Hour" was led by Rev. W. T. Patchell, of Pueblo, Col. The report of the secretary-treasurer showed that there are thirty-three societies in the union, only twelve, however, reporting. Of the twelve reporting, the Albuquerque Baptist society is the largest, with thirty-eight active members. The largest of the other societies is that of the Albuquerque Presbyterian church. The Pinos Altos M. E. society stands first in "giving" with \$125.50. This society led in that respect last year. The second in giving was the Denning Presbyterian with \$125. The White Oaks Y. P. S. C. E. gave most to foreign missions, \$20. The Santa Fe Presbyterian society has the most subscribers to the Christian Endeavor World, White Oaks coming second. The Santa Fe society also leads in members of the Tenth Legion and Comrades of the Quiet Hour. Only one society uses "prayer" societies for raising money, voluntary offerings being the rule. Nearly all of the societies report being in better condition than last year.

Time and place of next convention—Prof. J. K. Wood, Miss Kate Kennedy, W. V. Hall, Miss Maewarin Mrs. J. B. Johnson.

A spirited discussion as to the co-operation of all societies in supporting the convention resulted in definite measures being adopted for the financial support of these meetings, each society being requested to make a pledge for the year's work of the union.

Saturday afternoon, owing to the indisposition of Judge McPhe, who was on the program for an address, Rev. J. D. Eaton, of Chihuahua, gave a talk on "Christian Endeavor Work in Mexico."
