The Boers gave the British in South Africa a lively Christmas.

A stop should be put to the wholesale slaughter of game in this territory.

Judge D. H. McMillan, of New York, has arrived at Santa Fe and taken the oath of office, and will at once enter upon the duties of the position at Socorro.

If the federal judges are entitled to territorial salaries, why not extend the list and include the United States marshal, district attorney, land office officials and postmasters?

There is a surplus in the territorial treasury, and the approaching legislature will be importuned in many ways to reduce it. The correct thing is to further reduce expenses, and begin to pay off the big territorial debt and reduce taxation.

When it comes to a choice between an independence which would cost millions of dollars to maintain, and becoming an integral part of the United States through annexation, the Cubans probably will choose the latter if given an opportunity.

Secretary Wilson declares that Alaska can raise just as good crops as Finland, which supports an enormous population for its area entirely by its resources. He says that some day that alleged "frozen zone" may rival the Dakotas as wheat producers.

The twenty-two democratic counties in Missouri increased only 1,610 in population in the last ten years, while the rest of the country increased 1,000,000. The democratic counties, which are ordinarily republican, increased nearly half a million in the same time. Republicanism seems to pay.

The house committee on public lands to whom was referred the bill for the relief of occupants of lands included in the Algodones grant in Arizona, have favorably reported the same. The bill permits the settlers on the grant, which has been declared illegal, to have the first right to pre-empt the lands they occupy.

Representative Waters has introduced a bill which is of much interest to the mining states. It authorizes the Navajo and Moqui Indians to lease for a term not exceeding twenty-five years, mineral lands within the exterior boundaries of their respective reservations in Arizona and New Mexico on a royalty basis, under rules, regulations and supervision of the secretary of the interior.

The foreign trade of the United States continues to advance in a most extraordinary manner, and the figures for the calendar year closing will surpass those of any preceding year, both in the volume of exports and in the balance of trade. The balance of trade in our favor, will be about \$445,000,000, the largest by \$400,000,000 we have ever known, amounting to \$8.52 per capita for the entire population of the country.

**SANTA FE STRIKE.**  
The collapse of the telegraph strike on the Santa Fe is another evidence of the futility of a strike when there is no concerted action among the associated unions. Had there been a perfect understanding the result would have been more satisfactory and the Santa Fe company would have more respect for organized labor as represented by the unions upon its system. As the record of the strike proves, the order withdrawing the telegraphers from their keys on the Olney division was premature and in issuing the order the committee overlooked the solemn compact entered into with the Santa Fe to give thirty days' notice of the strike. It was this very omission which handicapped the officers of the trainmen's union in their negotiations in behalf of the telegraphers at Chicago.

## PAYING ROAD.

The New Mexican says that the Santa Fe, Albuquerque & Pacific railroad, under present conditions, is one of the most reasonable railroad schemes proposed for years in New Mexico. It is to unite the two largest cities of the territory; it is to furnish a connecting link between two big railroad systems and between Denver and El Paso. It will traverse a country rich in precious metals, as well as other minerals, including coal. The cattle and sheep industry, as well as farming, flourish along it are within reach of the line, which should have a paying traffic right from the start. It is not a visionary scheme, but a practical one, for the whole length of the railroad, when completed, will be less than 200 miles, and it will have along its line more people, and more

## Story of a Denver Girl's Love for a Pueblo Buck Indian.

WILL MARRY IN JANUARY.

From a comfortable home on Welton street to an Indian's "dobe shack" in Santa Clara, N. M., is the wedding trip Miss Cora Arnold of this city expects to take some time in January next. If she does not take the trip it will be for the reason that a Pueblo Indian has been found with a slight tooth and has traded with the affections of a more than susceptible maiden.

Surrounding the proposed wedding of the Pueblo and the Denver woman is a tale of love and courtship which sounds romantic when read, but which may run through the comedy setting and end in a tragedy.

The name of the Pueblo who has won the heart of Miss Arnold, together with the dogs, chickens and burros of the Chavarría family, he takes up space in the one room dobe shack, which by his two brothers and their wives and children, Albino has a pony and an Indian costume of great splendor, which he wears on state occasions and when he comes to Denver. At other times Albino's habit consists of a blue shirt and a pair of leather trousers, in which he goes forth to herd sheep or cattle, according to the orders of his employer.

About a year ago Albino was in Denver with a number of Utes and was exhibited at City Park. It was there that he met Miss Arnold. The latter is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Wilder, who lives at No. 1419 Welton street. Miss Arnold has friends who declare her to be more than 25 years old, but this may be an exaggeration. She is a woman of about 25 years of age, and is a native of the Pueblo, being one of the best musicians who have played at night in the city. As usual, there is a woman in the case. After his departure Miss Arnold announced that she was engaged to a Pueblo Indian and expected some day to become his wife. The pictured life of other women unfortunate enough to marry Indians had no terrors for her. She declined to believe that a Pueblo differed from a city home and has frequently declared her intention of marrying the man of her choice, even if his color and domestic habits are "off."

Albino has promised to return in January and make her his bride. The Christians will not have a hand in the marriage, but if Albino does return with that intention, he will be compelled to seek some place other than the door of Mrs. Christy's kitchen on which to repose his muscular form. The old scout and his wife have some too much of Indian life to assist in rearing a white woman of their acquaintance to the domestic slavery accompanying Indian marital affairs.

At the Wilder home there is grief and sorrow over the wayward course of the daughter. The members of the family declined in emphatic terms yesterday to discuss the matter and the visits of the curious were invariably ended abruptly with the slamming of the front door. Miss Arnold is secluded from all comers—Denver Republican.

Albino has promised to return in January and make her his bride. The Christians will not have a hand in the marriage, but if Albino does return with that intention, he will be compelled to seek some place other than the door of Mrs. Christy's kitchen on which to repose his muscular form. The old scout and his wife have some too much of Indian life to assist in rearing a white woman of their acquaintance to the domestic slavery accompanying Indian marital affairs.

At the Wilder home there is grief and sorrow over the wayward course of the daughter. The members of the family declined in emphatic terms yesterday to discuss the matter and the visits of the curious were invariably ended abruptly with the slamming of the front door. ### A TIE GAME.

The Albuquerque Giants and Indian School Teams Play Foot Ball.

BEST GAME OF THE SEASON.

"Best football game ever played in Albuquerque" was the remark heard on all sides at the conclusion of the same Christmas afternoon between the Indian school team and the Albuquerque Giants. The game, which seemed to bear this out, was a sensational play, but both sides played the finest kind of clean, straight football. The first half opened with the Indians kicking off. Albuquerque securing the ball on her 30-yard line and began immediately to buck the Indian line but only for small gains. The most vulnerable point in the Indian line seemed to be between the tackle and end. Barber right half back making two good gains through that point. Barber played a hard game, getting into almost every play, but made the mistake of breaking from his interference. The ball alternated between the two teams, the Indians getting somewhat the best of it in the line bucking, while neither side could make any gains on end runs. The first half ended with the ball on Albuquerque's 25-yard line, neither side having scored, but the chances seemed to be slightly in favor of the Indians as they had kept the ball continually in Albuquerque territory, and once or twice came dangerously near their goal line. After a ten-minute breathing spell, the teams lined up for the second half. This half was almost a repetition of the first, but the Albuquerque eleven played a much more aggressive game, and at one time it looked as though they would get the pigskin across for a touch down, but the Indians took a strong brace and got the ball on downs. The Indians were kept on the defensive throughout this half, the game ending with the ball about in the center of the field, neither side having scored.

The Indian team played a snappy quick game, lining up without delay, and every man playing for all he was worth; their team work was excellent and Johnson used good judgment in his signals and they made no fumbles. The Albuquerque eleven has a fine lot of individual players and considering the small amount of practice they have had, they played together well. Bert Vorhes perhaps played the best game of any man on either side, hurdling the Indian line for a number of gains, and also broke through the Indian interference a number of times downing the runner in his tracks. Stamm at full back did not play the game he is capable of, probably from the fact that he became somewhat dazed from a hurt in the head received in the first half. This eleven with the reasoning it got yesterday and a week to get down to its signals a little better, should make a fine showing on New Year's day, when the final game will be played to see which is the better team. After yesterday's showing there will no doubt be a fine crowd out on New Year's.

Pelix Lester and J. R. Farwell acted as referees. L. C. Brooks and Robert Kuhns timekeepers, and J. W. Travis line-man.

Besides several of the players receiving bad bruises on the face and head, one of the Indian players had his shoulder blade broken and his arm badly wrenched.
