DR. SUTHERLAND!

Met a Violent Death
Yesterday.

Knocked Down by Runaway
Horses and Killed.

Was Undoubtedly Dead Before Being
Removed from Street.

BURIAL TO-MORROW AFTERNOON.

Dr. James R. Sutherland, one of the
city's old timers, is dead under pecu-
liarly sad circumstances.

Recently the doctor had removed his
office and room from the N. T. Arm-
jo building on Railroad avenue to the
west end, and late yesterday after-
noon, a few minutes before 6 o'clock, he
walked east on the avenue and drop-
ped in at Richards' cigar store, where
he purchased a cigar and a street car
ticket. He lit his cigar, bid the seller
"good night" and started out to catch
the car for old town. While standing
in the middle of the avenue, waiting
for the car, the big black horse of W.
L. Trimble & Co.'s furniture wagon
came tearing west on the avenue. The
doctor did not see them, for a wind
was blowing at the time, and they
crushed into him, dashing him vio-
lently to the ground, and crushing
him underneath the feet and wheels as
they speeded along. At the corner of
Second street and Railroad avenue, the
horses turned toward the lively sta-
bles, and the wheels of the big wagon
came in contact with one of the Wal-
ter Supply company's plugs at the
Bank of Commerce corner and snapped
it from the main, flooding the street
with water for several blocks. The
conclusion, momentarily stopped, the
speed of the horse and W. L. Trimble
standing at the stable, rushed toward
the frightened animals and stopped
them. The driver, with a helper, was
at the depot unloading a trunk, and
just as the white blow followed by a
toot or two from the switch engine, the
horses started on the run and they
could not be stopped until after 10 p.
m. Sutherland had been killed.

When the doctor was struck he laid
on the ground for a few minutes, af-
ter which a crowd collected and will-
ing hands carried the body, then dead,
to the drug store of B. H. Hays. Phy-
sicians were hastily summoned, an ex-
amination made and death pronounced.
It was found that the left side of the
face was badly mangled and bruised,
the left leg cut and bruised, and the
right wrist broken. When Joseph Lew-
is, his son-in-law appeared, the body
was turned over to Undertaker Strong,
and to-day it is receiving attention at
burial in Fairview cemetery, the fun-
eral to occur at St. John's Epis-
copal church, Fourth street, to-morrow
afternoon at 2 o'clock under the su-
pplies of the Masonic lodge of this city.
Dr. James R. Sutherland, the de-
ceased, was born at Hamilton, Ontario,
Canada, about 70 years ago, and now
has two sisters living at Woodstock,
Canada, and a brother, Rev. John H.
Sutherland, residing in Iowa. They
were notified by telegram last night of

the tragic death. The deceased has a
son somewhere in the northwest, and a
daughter, by his first wife, Mrs. Joseph
Lewis, and a younger daughter, about
9 years old by his second wife, who is
attending the Harwood Home school,
here in this city.

The deceased came to this city in
1881 from Detroit, Mich., under Maj.
or Eastman, of the United States
army, as agent for the Navajo Indians,
and was for a few months at Fort De-
fiance, being then also the post sur-
geon and physician. He came to this
city shortly afterwards, and purchased
the Wells drug store in old town from
Judge L. S. Trimble, where he car-
ried on that business and practiced med-
icine for several years. He then re-
moved to the new town, and for sev-
eral years was engaged in the real es-
tate and insurance business with Capt.
William Borchert as a partner. The
past few years, owing to feeble health
incident to old age, he has devoted to
bookkeeping and the collection of bills,
shutting out a bare living. Before com-
ing to the southwest the doctor pub-
lished a medical journal at Detroit, Mich.
In looking over his papers last night a
man was found showing him to be a
Mason in good standing of the Hamil-
ton, Canada, lodge and that his dues
had been paid up. Therefore, his fun-
eral and burial to-morrow afternoon
will be under the auspices of the local
Masonic lodge.

A coroner's jury was empaneled this
afternoon and the body viewed by the
jurymen. The inquest will be held
Monday morning before Justice
Ribble.

OUTRAGEOUS BILL.

A Scheme to Rob the People of Territory
of New Mexico.

Washington, Dec. 22.—Senator Mon-
ey from foreign affairs committee was
favorably reported bill introduced by
Congressman Culbertson. The bill pro-
hibits use of water of the Rio Grande
and tributaries in New Mexico, and
provides penalty of fine and impris-
onment. The bill provides \$2,000,000 for a
dam at El Paso. The bill would ruin
New Mexico if it becomes a law.

THREATENED RACE WAR.

Denver, Dec. 22.—Dr. Joseph Canoe,
Italian consul, has appealed to Gov.
Thomas for protection of his country-
men involved in a threatened race war
in Florence, and also has wired the
Italian ambassador in Washington to
appeal to President McKinley for fed-
eral aid should the state authorities
be unable to cope with the situation.

The threatened trouble is the result of
the transportation of Italians to work in
the Rocky mountain smelter, through the
carelessness of one of whom Ed-
ward Reed, employe at the smelter, was
killed yesterday while at work.

SHOT THE AUDITOR.

Disbarred Clerk Kills the Auditor of the
War Department.

Washington, Dec. 22.—F. H. Morris,
of Ohio, auditor for the war depart-
ment, was shot this afternoon in his
office in the Windsor building by a
man named McDonald, formerly dis-
barred clerk in the office. Morris was
shot through the heart and died almost
instantly. McDonald, who did the
shooting, then cut his own throat and
shot himself, after a desperate effort
with the watchman who tried to arrest
him. McDonald had been second dis-
barred clerk in Morris' office, but had
been reduced. It is said that brooding
over this led to the tragedy.

CERRILLOS ALL RIGHT.

The Smelter Will Soon Resume Operations.

Electric Lights for Cerrillos.

H. A. Neel, editor and publisher of
the Cerrillos Register, is in the city
to remain over Sunday. Mr. Neel
states that all indications point to good
times for Cerrillos. He says H. B.
Thomson, vice president and general
manager of the Cerrillos smelter, has
given it out that the smelter will re-
sume operations inside of sixty days.
He also stated that the smelter com-
pany's mine at Magdalena is about to
up a large body of rich copper ore
and the probabilities are that a large
copper stock will be added to the smel-
ter plant. Mr. Neel says that Cerrillos
will soon be lit up with electric lights
a canvasser for the Cerrillos Gold Min-
ing company's electric plant at Ma-
dalena having secured subscribers for 15
lights, and that the town council will
be asked to make contract for about
six street arc lamps.

MARKING BAGGAGE.

An Extra Precaution Which Every Travel-
er Should Take.

"Mark all your baggage." That is the
injunction of every man in any way
connected with the baggage depart-
ment of railroads. It means so little to
the passenger and yet its fulfillment
would relieve much care on the part of
the little army of men who toll hard
from one day to the other, and
in hundreds of instances assist in
materially in facilitating matters
when it comes to making close con-
nections, as is often the case in these days
of railroading.

An agent who has made the handling
of baggage a study at big union sta-
tions said:

"Why is it so many people do not
have some initial, name or other iden-
tifying mark on their trunks and
valises? Simply because they have
the greatest of faith in the railway
baggage men. That is a compliment,
but if they had any gray idea how greatly
this would assist us in preventing bag-

sage going astray they might all pos-
sibly be induced to have some mark
on the baggage.

"Telephones, dress-suits cases and
trunks in these days nearly all look
alike to the baggage clerks and han-
dlers and, it may be said, also to the
owners. Hundreds of instances could be
cited of where two and often as many
as five persons claimed the same piece
of baggage before the checks were put
on. This generally results in a search
through the boxes, which is an annoy-
ing procedure. My advice is: Mark
your baggage."

MINE ACCIDENT.

John Norris Meets Death in the Gillet Shaft
at Pinos Altos.

A mine accident occurred at Pinos
Altos, early Tuesday morning by which
John Norris lost his life. Norris was
a man in the employ of the Pinos Altos
Gold Mining company and was work-
ing in the Gillet shaft at the 800-foot
level. The cage became clogged in
some manner and after being released
descended suddenly upon Norris, who
was standing underneath. The iron
structure struck him upon the head
with tremendous force, crushing his
skull and breaking his neck. Norris
was an unmarried man, about 40 years
of age.

This city is almost sure of a new railroad to the east during the ensuing year.

The Citizen is trying to help the people of New Mexico secure better government.

The republican party is stronger to-day than ever before in the history of the territory.

The value of all Kansas products for 1900, including animals slaughtered, is placed at \$18,796,400.

This city cannot lose by a system of advertising that reaches the home builders and home seekers.

The merchants of the city have immense stocks of holiday goods and are enjoying a brisk business.

The latest tribute to American push is found in the statement that cabbages are shipped from this country to Germany for sauerkraut.

Gold production in the United States in 1900 will reach \$70,000,000, or \$600,000 more than that of 1899, the famous year of California placer mining.

McKinley county will be enlarged by the territorial legislature, and it will be one of the most progressive and enterprising counties in the territory.

It is no mitigation of the offense to say that the Christmas tree formerly imported from Germany, are now manufactured in this country.

The number of sheep in southwestern New Mexico last year was 1,000,000. Many large flocks have come in from Texas during the past few months.

In 1899 Germany had 32,000 postoffices or about as many as the United States had in 1872. The number of letter boxes was 92,300, that of postal officials 131,702.

Ex-President Grover Cleveland urged upon the democrats of the union to get back to first principles if they would ever hope to again achieve victories as in the past.

The Cripple Creek Star issued a handsome anniversary edition on Wednesday, December 19, at the beginning of volume 8, number 1, of that enterprising paper.

The New York Tribune warns people against the use of the word "yuletide," having discovered that it means the time for yelling. Still a reference to merry "yuletide" or "yeltide" is preferable to writing it "Xmas."

There is a degree of confusion in the minds of holiday shoppers. As the weather daily grows warmer and more sunny and bright, they find difficulty in remembering whether they are laying in goods for the Fourth of July or for Christmas.

Uncle Sam does business in a methodical and careful manner. During the past year he cost three-tenths of one per cent to collect the revenues of this government from customs, which includes the losses as well as the salaries and other expenses. In the internal revenue bureau it cost 1.48 per cent to collect \$25,000,000, which also includes all losses as well as expenses of every description.

Exports from the United States to Cuba, Porto Rico, and the Philippine, Hawaiian and Samoan Islands will aggregate \$50,000,000 in the year 1900, against \$41,000,000 in 1899, \$19,300,000 in 1898, and \$17,000,000 in 1897. This enormous growth is shared by each of the islands named but is especially apparent in the case of Porto Rico, to which the exports in the year 1900 will show an increase of about 50 per cent, as compared with last year, and 100 per cent as compared with preceding years.

AGRICULTURE WITHOUT IRRIGATION
As a result of the successful efforts of California farmers to raise farm products on the plains in Otero county without irrigation, J. C. Dunn and N. T. Kinnam of Long Beach, California, will bring a large colony to settle on the vacant government land near La Luz canon. Trial crops of oats and potatoes planted the first of August were raised successfully, and it is contended that farmers who will till the soil cannot not help but be successful. The Californians also assert that orange and lemon growing are within the possibilities of the section.

Another colony is arranging with the Alamogordo Improvement company to secure 2000 acres of land and the necessary water rights for irrigating purposes on the higher plains lands. The improvement company proposes to also sink a number of shallow wells and demonstrate that water can be developed to irrigate land on any portion of the plains. If their experiments are successful there is enough vacant government land in Otero county to furnish subsistence for thousands of farmers and fruit growers, and the market is the best in the west.

O. A. R. RATE NEWS
The fight between the railroads, on the one side, and the O. A. R. on the other, over the annual encampment next fall, will cause considerable discussion in the circles that surround both institutions.

Not only does Denver want the encampment badly, but G. A. R. men in all this part of country prefer Denver. Not only is it handy of access, but every encampment brings its visitors from far-off points who stop off coming or going to see old friends and comrades and those even who cannot actually go to the encampment are in touch with it and benefited by the nearness of those who do.

On the part of the railroads the mat-

This assures the same rate basis east of the river that is given west of the river. The action of the O. A. R. in holding open the placing of the encampment until January 21, to be held at the highest bidding city, does not worry some of the railroads at all. The Rock Island and Burlington, through Denver lines have made a stand and will make a fight to hold it. Some of the other roads are perfectly nonchalant. They look at it in the light that as much as it is to be made carrying a medium G. A. R. men east as far as a great plenty west at a cent a mile. Whether it goes east or west it is immaterial to them. Up to the time of the G. A. R. executive committee's action the five transmissory lines had all agreed to a cent a mile rate from points west of the Missouri river. Doubtless the executive committee did not consider this as fulfilling the promises by which Denver was to be secured, hence its action. These lines are the Santa Fe, Burlington, Rock Island, Union Pacific and Missouri Pacific.

CHEERING RAILROAD NEWS

Officers of Santa Fe, Albuquerque & Pacific Road Elected.

ROCK ISLAND CONTRACTS.

The directors and incorporators of the Santa Fe, Albuquerque & Pacific Railroad company held three important meetings here yesterday—the morning, afternoon and evening, and the latter meeting elected the following officers:

Hon. William H. Andrews, a statesman of Pennsylvania, president; William E. Hopewell, of Hillsboro, N. M., vice president.

James T. McLaughlin, of San Pedro, N. M., treasurer.

Joseph E. Saint, of this city, secretary.

After the meeting the president and directors authorized the following statement:

"Arrangements have been made for the necessary capital to construct the road and work will begin as soon as the necessary preliminary arrangements have been made. The road will be pushed rapidly to completion, and when completed will be one of the best paying short lines west of the Missouri river."

"It will connect three great railway systems, the Denver & Rio Grande, the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe, and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific, with its El Paso & Northeastern connection. On the line of this new road an inexhaustible supply of steam, coke and anthracite coal is found, and the mining, live stock and lumber interests along the proposed route are very large."

"Mr. Andrews referred particularly to the benefits to accrue to Albuquerque as a result of the completion of the new road. He has great faith in the future of this city and of the territory in general. But the assurance which the line will give to the country through which it is to pass is an incidental. The road is to be built because it will pay, and pay, too, from the moment the wheels begin to turn."

A short time ago The Citizen published the incorporation articles of the above railway company, showing that the Denver & Rio Grande, the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe, and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific, some of the best mineral lands in the southwest, and would also open up a fine section of country for stock grazing.

Senator Andrews went back to Pittsburgh, Penn., this morning, and he will let the other directors know the progress he is making among eastern capitalists in a very short time. The road, however, is an assured thing, and a considerable amount of the capital stock has already been paid in.

ROCK ISLAND CONTRACTS.
The Rock Island has let several contracts for the extension of its southern line to El Paso, Texas. It will require about ten months to build the El Paso extension from Liberal. The distance is 200 miles. The contracts are given out for 40 miles stretches. Contractors are already rushing men and material on the grounds to begin work at once.

Creech & Lee and Craney Bros., two Kansas City firms, have contracts to have the Sauts contracting company, of Lawrence.

Upon the charter of the Chicago, Rock Island & Mexico railway company, under which title the road is to be built 110 miles through Dallam, Sherman and Hartley counties, Texas, appears the names of half a dozen Topeka men. The incorporators are: M. A. Low, W. F. Evans, D. R. Low, H. D. Crosby, W. O. Nevill, J. E. DuBruehl, all of Topeka; S. B. Hovey, J. C. McCabe, W. E. Dietrich and M. V. Harris, all of Fort Worth. Going through the Texas Panhandle and some of the richest cattle land in New Mexico, the Rock Island will not only have a short-cut route to California, but will tap a territory at present devoid of railroad facilities.

The present southwestern terminus is at Fort Worth, Texas, where connection is made with the Southern Pacific railroad for California. By building from Liberal to El Paso the route to California will be shortened 200 miles. The first construction work will be on that part of the line from Liberal to Santa Rosa, N. M., through the rich valley of the Canadian and Pecos rivers. Cattle raised in that country are now driven 100 miles west to the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railroad and shipped around through Colorado. It is rumored that the company has plans for further extensions beyond El Paso after the completion of the new line.

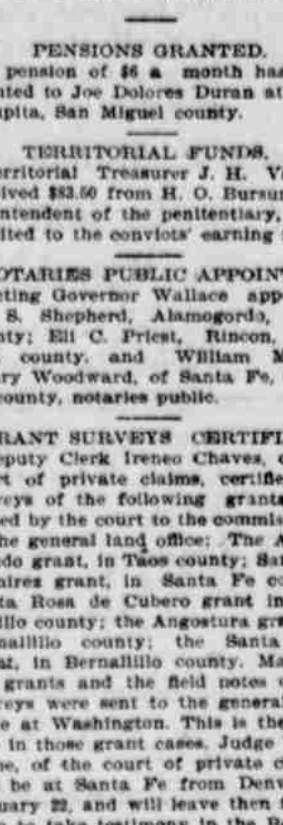
