A BOER VICTORY!

They Invade Cape Colony in Force.

Serious Race Riot at Kingston, Jamaica.

Mine Owners in Mexico Killed Two Highway Robbers.

INDIANA BANK ROBBED.

Cape Town, Dec. 18.—The Boers, who crossed the Orange river into Cape Colony, west of Alwal North, Saturday, encountered Cape rifles and Drabant's force, who retired with loss.

London, Dec. 18.—Lord Kitchener, in a dispatch from Pretoria, reports that the British wounded in the engagement at Noitgedacht have arrived there and are doing well.

Johannesburg, Dec. 18.—Details of the defeat of the British at Noitgedacht indicate that Gen. Clements' entire force had a narrow escape from capture. The Boer plans were splendidly laid. If the British main column had tarried a little longer there would have been a complete success for the Boers, who exposed themselves undauntedly, yelling and waving their arms. Their rushes were only stemmed by artillery.

After the British retreat the Boers held prayer meeting. Their hymns could be heard by the retreating British. All accounts indicate a heavy Boer loss.

Col. Legge exhibited splendid bravery. He shot five Boers with his revolver before he fell with three bullets in his body.

Race Riot.
Kingston, Jamaica, Dec. 18.—Serious rioting growing out of race feeling took place in this city last night. The chief rioters were several hundred negro soldiers of the British West India regiment, supported by natives of their own color. They attacked civilians and maltreated many badly.

Quick With His Gun.
Paral, Mexico, Dec. 18.—G. H. Kernsey when going to his mine, twenty miles from Paral, with \$1,000 to pay off his employees, was halted by two Mexicans. While they were searching for the money he shot both dead.

THE STRIKE.
The Telegraph Operators Holding Their Own in the Contest.

Dallas, Texas, Dec. 18.—There is no change to-day in the Santa Fe operators strike in Texas. The men are standing firm, the railroad doing very little freight or passenger business. Both sides are waiting to hear the outcome of the trainmen and railroad official conference in Chicago to-day.

HIRING TRAINMEN.
Kansas City, Dec. 18.—Santa Fe railroad offices here to-day began hiring men to work as switchmen and trainmen.

men. This action is considered by the railroad men to indicate that the road intends to refuse to compromise with the striking telegraphers, and is preparing for a sympathetic strike. President Dolphin, O. R. T., passed through Kansas City to-day to Chicago for a conference with Vice President Barr of the Santa Fe railway and expressed satisfaction with the situation.

Bank Robbery.
Shelbyville, Ind., Dec. 18.—Kennedy's bank at Hope was entered at 2 o'clock this morning, the safe blown open with nitro glycerine and \$15,000 carried off by two men who were seen to leave the building by the night operator of the telephone exchange. The robbers had a confederate posted outside with a carriage in which all escaped.

Destructive Fire.
Sioux City, Ia., Dec. 18.—Fire at Elk Point, South Dakota, to-day destroyed the entire business portion of the town, involving a loss of about \$150,000.

Executive Session.
Washington, Dec. 18.—The senate went into executive session for further consideration of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty.

Chinese Question.
Rome, Dec. 18.—A Pekin dispatch says that ministers will meet to-morrow, when probably final agreement will be reached as to the text of the joint Chinese note.

Minister to Turkey.
Washington, Dec. 18.—The president to-day nominated John C. A. Leishman, of Pennsylvania, new minister to Switzerland, to be United States minister to Turkey.

Judge McMillan Confirmed.
Washington, Dec. 18.—Confirmations by the senate: Daniel H. McMillan, of New York, to be associate justice of the supreme court of New Mexico; John W. Yerkes, of Kentucky, to be commissioner of internal revenue.

IMPORTANT CASE!

Discuss Status of Conquered Islands.

Case Before the Supreme Court.

Childers, Clancy and Catron Want District Attorney Nomination.

REVENUE COLLECTOR APPOINTED.

Washington, Dec. 18.—Arguments in the Porto Rico Philippine cases, involving the status of those countries to the United States, was resumed in the supreme court to-day. There was large attendance of prominent members of the bar and the crowd of spectators overflowed in the corridor. Counsel argued general plan of procedure, by which Edward C. Perkins, senior counsel of Porto Rico case, would conclude the argument to-day, being followed by Lawrence Harmon, counsel in the Philippine case. Appellants would then give way to Attorney General Griggs, for presentation of the case in behalf of the government. Charles H. Aldrich, former solicitor general, senior counsel in the Philippine case, will close in behalf of appellants.

Attorney General Griggs contended that the United States has power to acquire territory, that having acquired it, it has the right to govern it; that administrative construction of congressional action and judicial precedent affirm that every part in a ceded country is properly regarded as foreign until laws are extended by congress to new possessions; that the clause in the constitution of the United States declaring duties uniform throughout the United States is not applicable, and that the constitution does not extend of its own force over the acquired territory.

Referring to the legal aspect of the case he asserted that the Dingley act applied to merchandise imported from Porto Rico and the Philippines after their cession to the United States, the same as it did before, and that in view of the fact that the tariff laws are in force there is no principle of justice which forbids congress taxing in this way merchandise of outlying possessions of the United States when brought into port of the United States.

Taking up the constitutional question, the attorney general declared there was no doubt it was the intention of the Paris treaty not to make the ceded islands part of the United States, and it was not intended to make the inhabitants of those islands citizens.

Washington, Dec. 18.—At the cabinet meeting to-day it was announced that Capt. Asa A. Rodgers, of St. Petersburg, Va., would be appointed collector of internal revenue to succeed the late Col. James Brady.

Cruelly Assailed.
Late yesterday afternoon an old native citizen from Los Corrales came to the city, and fell among the Pharisees, one of whom was David Chavez. They persuaded the countryman to drink, and a debauch was kept up all of last night. This morning David and two companions, with the Los Corrales visitor started up Railroad avenue, intending to visit the Acre on North Third street. En route the countryman was lured into the alley back of the Golden Rule Dry goods company of David and there a quarrel ensued, resulting in the old man being assaulted. The affair was reported to the police and the injured man taken to the city jail, followed shortly afterward by the arrest of Chavez. The injuries consist of a

broken rib, several scars on the face and head, one very bad, and both eyes blackened. The trial of Chavez will take place to-morrow.

Women Denounce the Spread of Polygamy.

Associated Press Has Favorable Decision.

Convention at Chicago Favor Compulsory Arbitration of Disputes.

DESTRUCTIVE DAKOTA FIRE.

Philadelphia, Pa., Dec. 18.—A mass meeting of women to protest against Mormon polygamy was held last night, the principal speakers being Dr. S. J. Elliott, Episcopal diocesan and Rev. W. B. Campbell, missionary among the Mormons.

Dr. Elliott said: "Polygamy is spreading with Mormonism. It is not confined to Utah, but exists in Idaho, New Mexico, Arizona, Wyoming, Nevada and Colorado. If four more states are added to the nine in which the Mormons already have political power, it will be impossible to legislate against them."

Resolutions were adopted urging congress to take prompt action in favor of an amendment prohibiting polygamy, and making it practically punishable by disfranchisement.

Application Denied.
Jefferson City, Mo., Dec. 18.—In an opinion by Judge Sherford, of the supreme court, to-day denied the application of the St. Louis Star for a writ of mandamus against the Associated Press. This is an attempt to secure the service of the Associated Press.

FORCIBLE ARBITRATION.
Convention in Chicago Discussing Plans to Settle Labor Strikes.

Chicago, Dec. 18.—The last day of the arbitration and conciliation conference, composed of practical and experienced men, representing both capital and labor, was marked by the first speech of the conference unequivocally in favor of compulsory arbitration of labor disputes. It was delivered by Hugh H. Lusk, ex-member of parliament of New Zealand. His account of the success of the system in New Zealand aroused great interest. Lusk, in reply to Congress' assertion last night that it was the laboring man's right under all circumstances to strike, declared that Congress was designating as liberty what should be called license.
