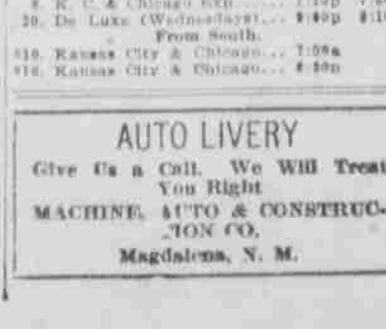

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HERNANDEZ FOUND
GUILTY; GIVEN A
YEAR; SUSPENDEDAttorneys to Carry Case to
Supreme Court to Learn
Whether Crime Charged Is
Common Law Offense.

A jury in the district court early last night found Ignacio Hernandez, of Chama, guilty of adultery. Judge Hernandez at once sentenced him to imprisonment for a year but immediately afterward suspended the sentence. The woman, who was accused jointly with Hernandez, pleaded guilty a short time ago.

At the opening of the case, yesterday afternoon, W. A. Keeler and E. C. Rader, attorneys for Hernandez, moved to quash the indictment, alleging that the crime, with which the man was charged, was not a common law offense of a statutory crime in New Mexico. The court overruled the motion. A motion for a direct verdict on these grounds was made at the close of the testimony and the jury was instructed to find the man guilty. The case was then set for an appeal to the supreme court to pass upon the question whether the offense alleged against Hernandez comes within the scope of the common law. The appeal was understood to be favored by Judge Reynolds and the prosecutor.

It was brought out that Hernandez and the woman had professed a desire to marry. The woman, however, was married. Her husband was in the court room during the trial of Hernandez. While the license was not admitted in evidence Hernandez was permitted to testify in regard to it. He stated he knew it was only a license.

Frank Anderson Acquitted.
Frank Anderson, restaurant keeper, who was placed in trial Wednesday, charged with cruelty and assault upon his wife, was found not guilty yesterday afternoon. Anderson, two sons, 12 and 15 years old, were on the stand Wednesday afternoon and gave testimony highly favorable to their father.

The case against Jose Romero was dismissed yesterday morning by the court. He was charged with assault upon his wife. When the case was called the state attorney was not ready to go on with the trial on account of the absence of an important witness. W. A. Keeler and E. C. Rader, attorneys for Romero, then asked that the case be dismissed, citing the fact that he had been in jail six months.

Judge W. C. Bonham filed a divorce complaint for Mrs. Doris P. Green, who charges her husband with abandonment and non-support, she asks for alimony and suit money. The suit was set for trial in the district court at 10 o'clock this morning.

They were married December 25, 1912, and, according to Mrs. Green, her husband left her December 9, 1914.

Sue Filed Against Horseman.
The New Mexico state fair brought suit in the district court, through Laurence F. Lee, attorney, against A. Chavez, alleging he owes \$31.50 for money received by him which is said to have failed and refuses to pay judgment for this amount and court costs are asked.

Also a criminal complaint was filed in Justice Craig's court against Chavez based on the same allegations as those recited in the civil complaint. Chavez is a horseman and had an entry in the state fair. Last week he made complaint in Justice W. W. McClellan's court against another horseman, charging him with obtaining money under false pretenses, but the case was settled.

PYTHIANS WILL
GIVE WELCOME TO
SUPREME OFFICERNational Committee Holds
Meeting at Commercial Club
to Prepare for Coming of
Head of the Order.

The expected visit of Supreme Chancellor R. S. Young, the highest official of the order of Knights of Pythias, in Albuquerque early in December was the occasion of a most important meeting of the Pythian national committee in the parlors of the Commercial club last night.

The Pythian national committee is composed of members of the order from nearly every state in the union—who are here for various reasons and who have not affiliated with the local lodge of Knights of Pythias, retaining their membership in their original lodges. There are nearly a hundred members of this organization, which is in active co-operation, in all matters concerning the order, with the local lodge.

Big Sanatorium.
For some time past the establishment of a national tuberculosis sanatorium at some point in the west has been under consideration by the supreme lodge of the Knights of Pythias, and the matter will come up for definite discussion at the next meeting of the lodge, which will be held next year. Supreme Chancellor Young is making this trip through the Rocky mountain section in order to get first-hand information in regard to conditions, so that he may be able to make an intelligent report on the matter when the supreme lodge meets.

A smoker will be tendered Mr. Young at the Commercial club, to which a number of prominent citizens will be invited, and an informal discussion will be as to the need of a national sanatorium. All possible information will be furnished as to the advantages of New Mexico as a health resort for sufferers from tuberculosis, and Mr. Young will be given an opportunity to form original conclusions as to the advantages offered by this section to health-seekers.

Relief Committee.
The meeting last night appointed a committee composed of J. J. Daly, R. P. Poole and C. A. McLean to confer with the members of Mineral lodge No. 4, in regard to the entertainment to be accorded Mr. Young during his visit here, and also to the establishment of a permanent committee for the relief of transient members of the order in distress.

A number of cases have been reported of Knights of Pythias, who were in the city temporarily who were in need; and it is the purpose of the relief committee to take all such cases in charge and see that assistance is given in a manner that will be systematic and thorough.

HERE IN JANUARYBetween 250 and 300 Mem-
bers Will Come From Cali-
fornia, Arizona, Texas, Col-
orado and New Mexico.

Holding with the new convention that Albuquerque will entertain within the next few months will be that of the Alamosa Hispano-Americana which will meet here late in January. Between 250 and 300 members, representing lodges in California, Arizona, Texas, Colorado and New Mexico. The convention will open on the third Monday in January and last ten days.

The Albuquerque lodge of the alliance, No. 37, at its last meeting, appointed a committee of ten to make arrangements for the meeting. Nator Montoya is chairman and the following are members of this committee: A. A. Bellini, Frank A. Hubbard, J. R. Salazar, J. A. Garcia, Sanchez, Rafael Garcia, George Armijo, R. Happe, Tomas Duran and C. E. Apodaca.

Has Membership of 2,000.
The committee will rent a hall and prepare entertainments for the visitors. The latter will include a banquet, automobile excursions through the city and to nearby points of interest and possibly a trip by automobile to Santa Fe. These entertainments already have been considered and more may be added in the last days.

Some of the preparatory work probably will be assigned to sub-committees, the committee of ten having been given that authority by the lodge. Railway rates of one and one-fifth fare for the round trip have been granted. Mr. Montoya announced yesterday.

In the four states, in which the greater part of the Spanish-American population resides, and all of which will send delegates here, the Alamosa Hispano-Americana has 2,000 members. The Alamosa lodge has a membership of 167.

TWO KILLED WHEN
